



Report of Inland Revenue Commis sion on Land Tax Cause. London, Oct. 21.—The Unionist press is enthusiastic over the report of the commissioners of inland re-venue showing how Lloyd George's 1909 budget is operating with regard to the land tax and the bitter feeling hat this aroused at the time. It may be recalled that for the pur pose of assessing and collecting the reversion and undeveloped land duties then imposed, it was necessary to un-

land valuation of the United Kinglom. Lloyd-George set about drawing up a new doomsday book. The inland revenue report now shows that there are 11,000,000 hereditaments, or different plots of land to be taxed. For this work, a veritable army of officials has been instituted. There are 172 permanent civil service officials with aggregate salaries of \$388,000 with 1,376 assistants of various kinds, draftsmen, technical assistants and others, bringing the total salary and payroll to the estimated amount of \$1,480,000. To this, there is to be added \$250,000 for office accommo

If population in the prairie country was at a standstill or was decreasing, and in consequence the demand for lumber in the prairie country stagnant or actually skrinking, there might be no injury done the public and no fault to find if the millmen individually or in conference decided to curtail the output o" lumber in proportion to the shrinkage of the demand and to cut down their expenses by discharging travellers and establishing a general selling trust through which their whole business would be handled. But the conditions are absolutely the reverse of these. The population on the prairies is growing as it never grew before. Outside an absolute business paralysis such as nobody looks for it is as certain as anything can be that the demand for lumber will be greater in any single year for many years to come than in any preceding year. With these conditions in mind, what construction can be possibly put upon the action of the millmen but that it is a deliberate decision to take the consumer by the throat and to force him to pay more for lumber, not because lumber costs more to manufacture nor because the supply cannot keep page with the demand, but just because the demand is so keen as to give the mil' men the opportunity to manipulate the market. In plain language these decisions outline and declare a deliber ately prepared scheme for bringing about an artificial scarcity of lumber for the single and sole purpose of mak. ing it possible to increase the price of lumber. Competition among the lum ber manufacturers is to be eliminated, not for the sake of economy but for the purpose of extortion. The object,




