Two Firemen Killed.

And More Than a Score Overcome by Fumes at Warehouse Fire at New

New York, June 6.-Two firemen were killed and more than a score were overcome by stifling fumes in fighting a stubborn warehouse fire near the Hudson River front to-day. Ten of the firemen overcome were aught in a back draught on the 4th floor of the building. Two men who managed to avoid the worst of the burst of flame and dense smoke screamed from a window for help. Ladders were raised and the uncon-

scious men carried down. Fireman Timothy Cotter died on the idewalk, after having been carried from an upper floor, where he had ain unconscious for more than an hour in a pool of water.

Fireman William Healy was taken out of the building dead.

Three of the injured firemen are in ospital in a serious condition. The fire was in the five-story building at 110-116 Washington Street, occupied by the Free Storage Bonded

Warehouse. The loss is estimated at \$75,000.



British Monarchs.

King Edward terminated his reign on a Friday, as four other English sovereigns have done. Queen Victoria began and ended her reign on a Tuesday, as also did four other sovereigns. Five died on a Sunday, six on a Monday, four on a Wednesday six on a Thursday, and six on a Saturday. Nine began and ended their reign on the same day of the week Henry I. and Edward III. began and ended on a Sunday, Richard II. on a Monday, Edward IV., Anne, and George I. on a Wednesday, Mary on a Wednesday, George III. and George IV. on a Saturday.

His present Majesty George V. is the first of the sovereigns who have sat on the English throne since William the Conqueror who has acceded in May. Each of the other eleven months has been notable for one accession or more, but, so far, no monarch had ever ascended the throne in May.

Prince Edward will be the twentieth Prince of Wales. King George was Prince of Wales for a little over nine years and three months. King Edward was Prince of Wales for fiftynine years and ten weeks.



The House of Hanover was blessed with remarkably long life, the average age of its reigning members being seventy-four. Queen Victoria lived to be the oldest monarch who has sat on the English throne. All the Hanoverian rulers lived to be over sixtysix years. Two were octogenarians, two sentuagenarians, and two were in the sixties. The act is the more remarkable because there have been only eight monarchs in our national history who have lived to be over sixty, and only one before the accession of the House of Hanover, who lived to be seventy. The average Hanoverian reign was thirty yearstwice as long as the Stuart reigns. Nine years ago a prominent insur-

ance manager in New York stated that King Edward VII. was the most heavily insured man in the world. Even so early as 1895 his death would have cost the American companies some 10,000,000 dollars, and the amount by now would be much larger. More than £2,000,000 have been placed on the life of the late King by persons who did not know him and had no relations with him. They simply insured his life as a gambling speculation. Therefore many people have reaped a financial benefit by his death. King Edward was perfectly aware of all this.

Sentiment versus Sentimentality.

Mr. Roosevelt's Idea Regarding Them. London, June 4 .- The 'Times' this norning publishes a letter from Mr. Roosevelt in reply to a correspondent, who requested him to substitute the word 'sentiment' for sentimentality, which he used in his address at the Guildhall last Tuesday, when the freedom of the city was conferred upon

Mr. Roosevelt said in that speech: Those who have to do with uncivil ized peoples, especially fanatical peoples, must remember that in such a situation as that which faces you in Egypt, weakness, timidity and sentimentality may cause infinitely more harm than violence and injustice Sentimentality is the most broken reed on which righteousness can

To the objector to the use of the word 'sentimentality,' Mr. Roosevelt writes

'I exact sentiment as the exact antihesis of sentimentality and to substitute sentiment for sentimentality in my speech would directly invert my meaning. I abbor sentimentality and on the other hand, think no man is worth his salt who is not profoundly influenced by sentiment, and who does not shape his life in accordance with a high ideal.'




