

### What Are the Terms?

The Commissioners of Newfoundland, Canada and the United States who have been conferring at Washington during the past few days have come to an agreement. The subject under discussion was the reasonableness of British regulations, largely Newfoundland, in British waters to which Americans can resort for fishing under the Convention of 1818.

Last September the Hague Tribunal decided and awarded that--  
The right of the British to make rules, without the consent of the United States, to regulate the liberty of the Americans to take fish in treaty waters is inherent to the Sovereignty of Great Britain. Such regulations must not violate the treaty. Regulations, bona fide, not discriminating between local and American fishermen, which are (1) appropriate or necessary for the protection and preservation of such fisheries, or (2) desirable or necessary on grounds of public order and morals without unnecessarily interfering with the fishery, are reasonable and not in violation of the treaty.

Here of course there is room for differences to arise between the parties as to whether particular regulations are or are not in accordance with the dispositions of the Convention of 1818. That Treaty provided no express means of adjusting these differences. The settlement of differences was implicitly left to the channel of diplomacy.

Originally, according to the text of the Submission, these differences were to be settled by an impartial tribunal. They were properly divided into two classes. Those which had already arisen and those which might arise in future. A Commission of fishery experts was formed to deal with present differences.

Newfoundland, however, preferred to resort to a conference to adjust these differences. Hence the presence of Premier Morris and Attorney General Aylesworth at Washington.

The dispute was between two parties differently situated. On the one side there was the British, largely Newfoundland, the authors and makers of the fishery regulations. On the other side there was the American, disputing the accordance of the regulations with the disposition of the Convention of 1818.

If the matter had been referred to the judicial tribunal, Newfoundland might have had all or any of these regulations reaffirmed as in accordance with the Treaty.

The resort to a conference was an intimation that Newfoundland was prepared to modify some of the regulations in order to get America to agree to the rest. Such was the spirit in which America received and accepted the invitation of Newfoundland, and this feeling was expressed in the American press.

Our Washington dispatch to-day declares that the Newfoundland Govern-

ment will modify the fishery regulations. According to the Daily News, Sir Edward Morris has cabled Hon. D. Morrison, the Attorney General, that a satisfactory arrangement has been made.

We do not know the terms of the agreement and therefore cannot express any opinion as to being satisfactory or not.

Sir Edward's offer to confer was an intimation that he was prepared to give way to some extent. How far he has given way is left undisclosed. We can only wait and see.

The Daily News betrays some concern about the arrangement, declaring that information as to the terms will be awaited with interest, and possibly with some anxiety.

It looks as if America has got something for nothing. We, however, are still hopeful for the best, and that the something is inconsiderable.

We do not believe Sir Edward has given away the pass.

We believe he is reserving the strength of the Newfoundland fishery position to make a deal with America for free fish for free entry, should the Canadian negotiations for reciprocity fail, as they are likely to do.







**Young Hero Drowned.**

Myles Marriott Lost His Life in Chocolate Lake While Trying to Save His Brother Yesterday.

One of the saddest drowning accidents that has occurred for years was that of yesterday afternoon when Myles Marriott, of Melville Island Road, lost his life while trying to save his brother, Ainsley, aged 12 years, from drowning.

The two lads, who had attended Sunday School at the head of the Arm during the afternoon, were on their way home when the accident occurred. They, in company with two younger children, decided to take a short cut to their homes by going across Chocolate Lake. The two smaller children got along all right, but the ice was not sufficiently strong to bear the larger boys. When about twenty feet from the shore Ainsley broke through, and his brother, Myles, in going to his assistance, also went through the ice. The two younger children stood on the ice-frightened to move one way or the other.

Marshall Rogers, Muriel Rogers and Dudley Martin, three young guests at Birchdale, with Archie Johnson, a bell boy at Birchdale, arrived walking and were the first to arrive on the scene. Seeing the danger of the two children on the ice, they shouted to them to crawl, which they did, thus reaching the shore in safety. The party then ran to nearby homes for assistance. At Arnieview a rope was secured and unsuccessful attempts were made to throw it to the struggling boys. Martin, who is but 13 years old, then tied the rope about himself and waded out into the lake to his neck, but he could not reach the boys and was pulled back to the shore.

A shed was broken open and a boat launched. Johnson made an effort to reach the boys by the boat, but when he got half way out could proceed no further. A man who arrived about that time then went with Johnson. When they reached Myles Marriott, who was the nearest to the shore, the little fellow told the rescuers to save his brother, first as he thought that he could keep afloat a while longer. They went out after Ainsley and reached him as he lost consciousness. By the time Ainsley was taken into the boat, and the boat started to the shore, Myles had lost his grip on the ice and disappeared.

Ainsley was taken to the residence of James Billman, where he received medical attention, and was later removed to his home.

The body of Myles was recovered at 7 o'clock last evening by County Constable Umih and two men named Keady and Drysdale. An inquest was held by County Stipendiary John McDougall, and the verdict was that the lad lost his life while trying to save his brother.—Halifax Record, Jan. 9.

## Morris Will Modify Fishery Regulations.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.  
The Commissioners of the United States, Canada and Newfoundland have reached a decision. The Canadian and Newfoundland Governments undertake to change the existing regulations in order to remove the objections of the United States, thus making it unnecessary to call upon the Board of Experts. The effect of this arrangement is to make it unnecessary to re-assemble the Hague Tribunal to act upon the reports of the experts and eliminate any further proceedings at the Hague. All differences which may arise in future as to these or any future regulations which cannot be disposed of by diplomatic negotiations will be referred to the permanent mixed fisheries commission which is to be established in accordance with the recommendations of the Award.

## Cable News.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 12.  
Japan's first official protest against the proposed anti-Japanese legislation in the United States, comes in the form of a letter from Consul-General Nomura of San Francisco, to Senator Wright, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Federal Relations. "I think the people of this State hardly realize the deep concern felt in Japan on this subject," says the Consul-General. "Discrimination this time will be particularly surprising to the Japanese people, in view of the efforts made during the past two years to cultivate the good will of the American people, and to prove to them the sincerity of Japanese good will."

BOMBAY, Jan. 12.  
Troops were called out today to quell a riot. They fired a volley into the crowd, killed eleven persons and wounded fourteen. Every year riots mark the celebration of Muharram, the first month of the Mohammedan year. Trouble is sure to arise between the Sunnites or the Orthodox section, and the second great division of Mohammedan rioting began with stones and the police found themselves unable to stop the fighting. Then troops were rushed to the scene and at the first rioting afterwards were given the order to fire. The bodies of the dead lay in the street for a considerable time after the rioters were dispersed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.  
The claim of Captain Peary for congressional recognition of his Polar achievement advanced a step. The sub-committee adopted a favourable report to the full committee of Naval Affairs on Bates Bill which extends the thanks of the Congress to Peary and returns him with the rank of Rear Admiral. It is approved by the full committee of the House and agreed to by the Senate. Peary will be placed on the retired list with \$6,000 a year, the pay he is receiving as Captain on the Active list.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.  
Bubonic plague is making ravages in Manchuria. According to cable reports to the State Department in the City of Harbin alone 600 deaths occurred in 15 days. Cases are appearing at the rate of 100 daily. Out of 700 patients 40 died from the disease.

TOKIO, Japan, Jan. 12.  
Despatches from San Francisco to the Japanese newspapers, detailing the uncompromising attitude of Californian legislators to the Japanese, have called forth editorials, expressing surprise and regret.

**Liner's Food Bill.**

They do not victual ocean liners on the "snack-from-the-joint-and-two-veg." principle. Here are some items culled from a large Atlantic liner company's food bill for one year:

Meat: Fresh beef, pork, veal, mutton and lamb, over 10,000,000 pounds. Poultry and game: Ducks, fowls, turkeys, etc., more than 1,000,000 pounds. Fish, about 1,900,000 pounds, says the Washington Post. Beverages: Champagne, claret, minerals, etc., 800,000 odd bottles, besides 500,000 gallons of lager beer. The amount of bread consumed was 3,900,000 pounds. Potatoes stand at 20,000,000 pounds, butter at 1,200,000 pounds, and ice at 24,000,000. Cigarettes and cigars were smoked up to the tune of 2,327,225. Taking just this last item, and allowing three cigars and seven cigarettes as a daily dose per head, the number of smokers consumed in one single year on these liners would keep 19 men in tobacco every day of their existence for a period of about 70 years.

**Horney-Man Monkeys.**

Queer Shaped Skeletons Found in California Canyon.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 6.—What are described as skeletons of a strange tribe of horned man-monkey pigmies are being exhumed from an ancient burying ground discovered near Jack Rabbit Lodge in the delta of Topanga Canyon near Santa Monica. Forty-four skulls and almost as many complete sets of torso and limb bones have been recovered, together with strange antiquities apparently used by the tribe as weapons, and many stone mortars.

The tribe is thought to have been the last of the kind, and it is asserted by a legend of the oldest Spanish families that Aztec Indians exterminated them upon their invasion into Southern California.

**Prisoners Brought In.**

By the shore train last night Const E. Quinlan arrived here with two young men, residents of Harbor Main, who were tried before Magistrate O'Toole yesterday on charges of looting and disorderly conduct. For several nights past these chaps gathered with others about the station at Avondale and committed various depredations, annoying people about there, and Constable Quinlan summoned them. One was held on two charges of disorderly conduct and fined \$5 or 20 days for one offence and \$10 or 30 days for the other. The other man was fined \$19 or 30 days. Both could not pay their fines and came here to serve the terms of imprisonment imposed. A third party, who also was fined, paid the amount.

**Trouble on Mullock-st.**

The neighbours were alarmed by the cries of a woman who repeatedly kept shouting: "Father, I'll be killed." In the dead hours of the night, on Mullock Street last night. Some of the people arose from their beds and on going out saw that it was Mrs. Clance, whose father, Mr. Kelly, lives in the same house with herself and husband, four children and Mrs. Kelly's brother. They all live in a small room and people fear that there will be trouble.

**Australia's Capital City**

Washington, D.C., Jan. 6.—Architects and landscape artists from practically every section of the world will be invited to submit designs for the new capital city of the Commonwealth of Australia, according to consular reports. The Commonwealth Government has selected Canberra, New South Wales, as the site for the new city.

The new capital city lies among a series of hills, of slight altitude, which make ideal sites for the principal public buildings. The capital building itself probably will be built in the valley of the hills, to be protected from the winds.

**A Venturesome Peer.**

The adventures in strange lands of Lord Headley, who was sixty-five recently, would provide material for more than one fascinating volume. An Irish peer, he has seen a great deal of soldiering. He fought in the Carlist war, and went through the Franco-Prussian War with the French Army Corps. And he has made long journeys and explored the slopes of the Andes and the hinterland of Peru. Some months after Lord Headley was expected back from a shooting expedition in Mashonaland, a grisly story arrived of his having been out to pieces by Matabele. But he came home safe and sound, while obituary notices of his career were still current.

**In Terrible State.**

When the Telegram yesterday recorded the illness of sanitary man George Cheeks, the hopes of the citizens that typhus fever would be quickly stamped out, received a serious set back.

Cheeks has been ill since Saturday, and only yesterday the case was diagnosed as typhus fever. The man, who has been in the Sanitary Department for many years, occupies the under flat of a small house on Barte's Hill on its western side, and far removed from Pope Street, the scene of the first outbreak of the disease. The upper part of the house is occupied by Mrs. Kelly, daughter of Mr. Collins who was the second to be stricken with the malady after it was first noticed to be in the city. Mrs. Kelly and her friends naturally called at Collins' house while Mr. Collins was ill, and also when Mrs. Collins was stricken, and the belief is that they brought the germs to the Cheeks' residence.

The house is now quarantined and placarded, and Cheeks was in hospital in very ill of the disease. The house on Pope Street where the disease first made his appearance was in a terrible condition and filled with filth and refuse of all kinds! No less than 18 cart loads of rubbish were taken from the cellar and closets in the place, and the other houses near were almost as bad. The wonder is that some deadly malady did not long ago occur in these hovels which should not have been used as dwellings for years past, being utterly unfit for human habitation.
