





LONDON, Jan. 1.
The peace conference between the delegates of the Balkan Allies and the Turkish Empire settled down to real LONDON, Jan. 1. business this afternoon, in spite of a Madagoroff, one of the Bulgarian dele-gates, departing in indignation from the meeting with the declared intenthe Allies. The Turkish envoys when the conference gathered again, presented in writing new proposals which are a great advance on their first efare a great advance on their first effort. They now express themselves ready to cede absolutely Macedonia and Epirus with Saloniki, and as being ready to discuss the question of the fortress of Adrianople and the future boundary between Turkey and Bulgaria in the province of Thrace. They still refuse to give up the islands in the Aegean Sea, and desire to submit the question of Albania and Crete to the European Powers. The Conference to-day lasted three hours and a half, when the delegates adjourned unhalf, when the delegates adjourned until Friday. The official account of the conference says the Turkish delegates proposals which were discussed by the Conference were agreed to on certain points, while on certain other points discussion was adjouried until Friday.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1. Several lively riots, yesterday marked the strike of garment workers. The most serious trouble was at the Smith factory, in driving away five or six hundred men and women who tried to storm the building. The strikers advanced from four directions, and started to climb the fire escapes to reach the employees on the top floor, The few who succeeded in entering were met by a squad of clerks and for nearly an hour the fight waged both inside and outside the building. The employees of the upper floor helped the police by raining missiles upon the heads of the attacking party. Four the heads of the attacking party. Four attack, were badly used. Reserves stopped the fight, but made no arrests. Strikers and their sympathizers attacked several other factories, and at one place ten were arrested before quiet was restored.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1. As the clocks ticked off the first secend of 1913, Postmaster-General Hitchcock inaugurated a new era in the American postal service by depositing in the Washington post office the first package that has been entrusted to the domestic parcels post service. The strokes of the last hour of 1912 were dying away, when the Postmaster-General stepped to the window under the newly painted incription, "Parcels post packages," and handed in the official first package. At the same moment the parcels post service opened for business in every post 'office in the States. Postmaster-General Hitchcock's package contained a silver loving cup, enclosed in a stout box, and was addressed to E. M. Morgan, postmaster of the city of New York the cup. will be sent back to Washington to be engraved and preserved in the National Museum to commemorate the inauguration of the parcels post system.

LONDON, Jan. 1. The Birthday Honour's List issued on New Year's Eve, includes two peerages, seven baronetcies and eighteen knighthoods. Sir George Sidenham Clarke, Governor of Bombay and Sir George Kamp formerly M.P., are the new Peers. Vice-Admiral Sir Percy Scott, naval gunnery expert and inventor, is among the baronets. Premiers Sir Edward Morris and Sir James Whitney of Ontario, are made K.C.M.G.'s. Amongst the new Knights are John Stephen Willison, Editor of the Toronto News, former lieutenant Governor Angers of Montreal, and Francis Darwin, son of the late Charles Darwin. Sir George Simon, Solicitor General, and Earl Desart, have been made Privy Councillors.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1. The hotel employees' strike proved a fizzie, less than five hundred quitting work. At three famous hotels, at which 100,000 persons kept midnight vigil, there was not the slightest indication of the strike.



Solway Arrives.

LEFT DERELICT NEVADA, AT FERMEUSE.

The s.s. Solway, Capt. Parsons, arrived at noon to-day from Port aux Basques with a full freight, large foreign mail and 2 passengers. The ship left here for Port aux Basques Tuesday week and got the full benefit of the storm which then raged. The wind blew a hurricane from the N.W. and after rounding Capt Pine it veered to S.W. with a terrific sea running. The ship had to steam slowly against this and time and again heavy seas boarded her. She arrived up Christmas Day and left for St. John's Monday last at 3 p.m. Tuesday morning The s.s. Solway, Capt. Parsons, arlast at 3 p.m. Tuesday morning a heavy sea ran and that afternoon a heavy sea ran and that alternoon a hurricane sprang up from the S.E. and off St. Pierre the ship had to lay to for hours when it moderated somewhat. Yesterday afternoon a steamer showing signals of distress was sighted 10 miles to the S.E. of Capa Page miles to the S.E. of Cape Race, and the Solway bore down on her proved to be the missing Nevada, and was knocking about in the sea with her rudder head gone and other damages.
