



"I am Sorry."

"I am sorry."
 That sounds like a very simple and easily spoken phrase, doesn't it? And yet I wonder if in all the English language there are any words that are harder to say than these three. I doubt it. Unless, perhaps, by chance, they be the three words "I was wrong."
 Mistakes are the commonest thing in the world. We all make them. To err is human, and even the most perfect folk err occasionally. While we ordinary mortals scarcely live through a day without one or more mistakes. And yet how seldom we hear anyone acknowledging a mistake—and thus at least half atoning for it—by saying frankly and fairly, "I am sorry" or "I was wrong, or words to that effect."
 "When my husband is unkind or unjust to me in any way he is usually sorry for it almost immediately," a woman said to me the other day in speaking of this matter. "And there is nothing he won't do for me the next few hours or days—the time depends on the size of the wrong, of course. He can't say and do enough kind things and the shows me in every way that he's sorry, but he never, never says it. Of course, I'm grateful for all the nice things he does, but somehow I'd give anything to have him acknowledge he was wrong and say he was sorry and didn't mean to hurt me."

I think we all know people who are like that, and I think we all feel in regard to them very much as the woman did. Kind words and deeds are healing salve for a hurt, but there is something about a frank acknowledgment of wrong that does the stinging and poising part of the wound as nothing else can.

Undoubtedly, there are people who think it shows strength never to acknowledge that they have erred. I know a man who frequently made just that boast. He considered it one of the strong points in his character; as a matter of fact, it was his greatest weakness. It antagonized his wife, it lost him friends right and left and it finally "got" him in his business career.

There is nothing that sounds more manly, or womanly, than to hear anyone say frankly, "I am sorry" or "I was wrong." Learn to say, "I was wrong," my boy. It will be just as valuable to you as a command of the negative.

Incidentally, don't forget to acknowledge a wrong when necessary to those to whom it is somehow hardest to say things like that, your nearest and dearest.

And one word more: If by any chance you are ever rebuffed, do not be discouraged in well doing. Remember that anyone who fails to receive your acknowledgement thereby transfers the burden of wrong from your shoulders to his.

Famous Rugby Kickers.

By E. H. D. Sewell, The Well-Known Football Expert.

I suppose all of us have, from our days in the School XV, down to the last match seen some kicks and kickers that stand out in the memory above and before all others. Everyone has his or her favourites in all branches of life from Rugby football down to politics, and I am going to write about mine in the matter of kicks and kicking.

For sheer dramatic interest I have never seen a kick of so much import as the kick for goal taken by D. F. T. Morkel in the second London v. South Africa match of the 1912-13 season. Let us consider the circumstances. No English team had beaten the South Africans; London was leading, with but half a minute more time to run its course, by ten points to eight, and now Douglas Morkel, one of the finest (he was certainly the longest) place-kicks the game ever knew, was seen carefully arranging the place for a "penalty" kick at goal at a point near the London twenty-five, rather nearer the touch-line than the centre of the field—precisely, in fact, at what is known as the awkward angle.

A Dramatic Moment.

Everybody knew the game ended with the kick. Everybody knew London was beaten if Morkel kicked successfully—and that an English side had beaten the almost invincible invader if he failed. It had been, besides, a most exciting match, and during the final quarter of an hour or more the Colonials had done everything but score; the London defence having very sound.

Here, if ever, was a case of a silence that could be felt, of one of those moments when one could distinctly hear a "hea sneeze." That was as Morkel stepped back for his short run. Three quick steps and—thud! as best men leather. "Goal!" roared the crowd as the ball started straight. "Ah!" gasped a quick-eyed section of the on-lookers, as it was seen to swerve. Then came the victorious "No goal!" from hundreds who felt sure and hundreds who could only guess. It was, indeed, a dramatic moment.

Another was when "All Black" Wallace dropped for goal at Swansea

seen: The accuracy with which he directs the ball is almost that of a machine. I wonder how many matches he has won by his accuracy, either by drop or place-kicking, alone? His kicking is a gift nobody can hope to attain unto such perfection by virtue of practice alone. It has been said, and quite rightly said and written, that by dint of sheer hard work in the nature of constant practice a player can become great at place-kicking. It was not practice that made W. J. Wallace, D. F. T. Morkel, P. Carmichael (of the Australian team of 1908), G. P. Morkel (of the last South African team and cousin of D. F. T.), K. C. Macleod, H. T. Gamlin, and R. A. Lody the great kickers they were, and are. Not practice but a natural gift, with which they practised in order to become memorable exponents of what is almost a lost art. Would our Rugby Clubs had more like them!

A Mead Of Praise.

While Nature exacts a terrible penalty for mistakes; misfortunes, dangers and disasters after all brings out much that is of the best in human nature. On Saturday the common talk on board the Bellaventure was that Capt. Randall deserves a gold medal for the noble work he did in devoting his whole attention and that of his crew to the purpose of rescue. He spared neither himself, nor his officers, men or ship in getting through to those in dire need of assistance. A mead of praise has already been given to Capt. Parsons for his exertions. But there are many others who deserve honorable mention in this connection. There is Capt. James Newhook, the barrel-man, of St. John's, who first saw the men coming to the Bellaventure. There is Capt. George Fowlow, of Trinity, bridge master, and Capt. Charles Bailester, of Port Rexton, bridge master, John Bailey, master watch, who did great work in rescuing the stricken sealers and in looking after them, when they were brought aboard. No man was more assiduous in his attention to the sick than Philip Way, of this city, who did exceptionally good work in the case of the sick. Then, too, the master, watches and other officers gave up their quarters, bedding and clothing, to give a bed to the sick sealers and to provide them with a change of clothing. It is only right to mention the kindness the Newfoundland's men met with aboard the Bellaventure, for it is one of the bright aspects of a terrible black cloud which is hovering over Newfoundland.

Again, the Government, under the general direction of Hon. J. R. Bennett, acted efficiently and promptly in dealing adequately with the reception and attention to the living and dead sealers. We saw almost every member of the Government and of the House of Assembly doing their best to give the work. The Speaker, Mr. Goodison, came in from Carbonear to give his services. Mr. Stone with other helpers went out with the bodies the Reid Nfd. Co. thoughtfully attached a dining car to the train and provided meals for them on the four day free of cost. Dr. Campbell has general charge of the ambulance arrangements, which were well carried out by Dr. C. Macpherson and his staff of helpers from the ambulance corps, the brigades, the Calypso. Dr. Keegan, the superintendent, Dr. Knight and the staff of nurses had excellent arrangements made at the Hospital and Superintendent Jones did yeoman service at the Seamen's Institute.

The Newfoundland Disaster Enquiry Before Judge Knight Began This Morning.

The Attorney General, Hon. R. A. Squires, K.C., and the Deputy Minister of Justice, Mr. Hutchings, K.C., appeared on behalf of the Crown to assist in the enquiry; Mr. Warren, K.C., on behalf of Bowring Bros. and Capt. Abraham Kean; Mr. Morine, K.C. and Mr. Lloyd also watched the case on behalf of the men.

The Attorney General said Mr. Hutchings would assist the Magistrate in conducting the enquiry. Capt. Robert Randall, Master of the Bellaventure, swore he had been prosecuting seal fishery, returning last Saturday, 4th inst. On Tuesday, March 31st, the Bellaventure about forty miles R.S.E. of Spiller's Ridge, Bonavista, Newfoundland and Bonaventure in sight Newfoundland bore N.N.W. from us and about 5 miles away. Bonaventure about N 5/2 W, about 5 miles away. We sighted steamer we took to be the Etie about 10 a.m. bearing W. Newfoundland and Bonaventure not then in sight. Before that

shifted our position about 15 miles south. Did not put crew out until 1 p.m. Weather conditions about 7 a.m. fine and clear, but sky was overcast. Very little indications of storm all the morning—not of severe storm. The barometer did not give any indication in the early morning. The barometer gradually fell towards noon and just slightly. It commenced to snow about noon. The wind at this time was about S. E. all morning—but there was scarcely any wind. Slightly increased up to noon. The wind and snow increased considerably in the afternoon. It became bad weather all at once between two and three p.m. At 4.30 p.m. it was a blizzard, could not see any distance. The wind about the same direction, S. E., it was a little frosty. There was not as much frost about 8 or 9 it became milder, the wind a little more easterly and increased. After that it turned in—about 10 p.m. I put my own men on the ice between 1 and 2 p.m. They remained

out about an hour. I picked them up, because there were no more seals there, not on account of weather. I was also anxious to reach position where the Red Cross boats and Bonaventure were. The ships were N. by W., but not in sight. The ice was good where we were, but not loose. The men did not travel more than 3 mile from ship. I was up two or three times during the night and I could not see the length of ship owing to storm. The wind had changed mostly north, and it became quite frosty. That weather continued until 9 a.m. on Wednesday. Then it cleared at intervals. About noon we could see about two miles, between the squalls. It gradually became better during the afternoon. About 3 p.m. the sky was quite clear but there was quite a ground drift on ice. We saw the Stephano about 1 p.m. about E.N.E. three miles away. We saw no sign of any ships in the ice. After 3 p.m. there was a drift, not so much, which prevented us from seeing any distance. Our men went out at 2.30 and remained out till dark. Some going two miles and perhaps a little more. Wind was N.N.W. at night and part of next day, gradually dying out. The drift gradually decreasing until dusk there was scarcely any. Wednesday night continued fine, but very frosty.

On Thursday we got under way about dawn. The ice was very tight and heavy. We steamed S.W. a little distance, about a quarter of a mile, and we turned S.E. As soon as it was daylight a barrel-man named Newhook reported he saw some men on ice, about 2 miles S.E. He said two men were coming towards us. I took the glass and saw them myself. I saw six or seven men; two seemed to be coming towards us, and the others I lost sight of. By this time the barrel-man reported the men appeared to be staggering, as if something was wrong. We concluded the men had been out all night. We gradually drew near to one man because we were hitting and he was walking towards us. When he got near to the ship, I could see he was a bad shape. I sent two or three men to help him on board. He reported 60 men out from the Newfoundland since Tuesday morning. He also said here were 50 men dead. We knew some of them must be in bad shape by that time. The ice being so tight the ship could not get to them. I sent out three or four men to help the second man, who was then nearing the ship. I think one of the two was Jesse Collins, but I am not quite clear. The second hand suggested we turn out all our men to search. We immediately did this, and gave the relieving party spirits and blankets. The second-hand, Abraham Parsons, went in charge. We continued working the ship towards the place where we had seen the men during the early morning. Not long after, some of our men began returning, helping the other men along. The ship continued on until 3 p.m., picking up the live men. They were coming in twos and threes.

At that time, squads of our men helping them. At 3 p.m. they were all on board, 34 of them. Several were brought on stretchers, as they could not walk. Most of them were in a bad condition. The second-hand had the bodies put on pans together so that here would be no trouble in picking them up. These were picked up between 3 and 4 p.m. We had on board 18 bodies. The Newfoundland was in sight when we finished picking up the bodies, about six miles to the East. She was in sight all the evening before, as soon as the weather cleared. The Stephano, Florizel and Bonaventure were in sight all Thursday. We then tried to work towards the Newfoundland. I think she was jammed all the time. We were trying to rescue her all that night. The ice was very tight and we could only make slow progress. We stopped a few hours during the night and reached the Newfoundland about 11 a.m. the following day, Friday. The Stephano was alongside the Newfoundland when we reached her, and Captain Abraham Kean came on board us with the Newfoundland's articles. Previous to that he had been on board the Newfoundland and got the articles. He ticked off the names of those aboard the Newfoundland. I gave him a list of the live men we had on board the Bellaventure. These men were distributed over the ship. We ticked those off and saw who were dead. Then we took the sick men from the Newfoundland on board the Bellaventure, about 13, and 2 from the Stephano, and also two dead men from the Stephano. Then we started for the Florizel. She had in the meantime picked up nine dead bodies. We took them about 4 p.m. We then had on board 69 dead men, and 43 sick. After we had ticked off the sick men and counted the bodies we had, there were 5 men dead and missing. After the first member of the Newfoundland's crew came on board, we got in touch with the Stephano by wireless. After I received a message from A. Harvey & Co. I reported. We arrived in St. John's about 5 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, hauled into Harvey & Co's wharf, where the sick men and bodies were taken charge of by the authorities.

eight years at the ice. The seals were much scattered. We had to steam considerably more than usual this year. Seals were scarce, picking up small quantities for several days before the Tuesday. We were killing and we picked them up at once. The Newfoundland's direction and the men's direction about 45 degrees. The men were not straight between us and the Newfoundland. We saw the Newfoundland between 3 and 4 on Wednesday. Nine of the thirteen sick men had been out in the storm with the second hand and got back to Newfoundland. I cannot speak of the other four.

To Mr. Lloyd.—The nine men had been out about 48 hours. We had no wireless connection with the Stephano on Wednesday. Some of our men reported on Friday after we had discovered the Newfoundland's men that they had seen men of another ship to the eastward on Wednesday evening. They did not report this to me on Wednesday. I heard from the second hand, the direction from which the Newfoundland's men were subsequently picked up. It is not customary to make barometrical records at the sealery. Public weather messages are not sent to us at the sealery. On Tuesday the barometer did not sink rapidly at any moment to my knowledge.

The Internally-Cooled Engine.

A serious loss in the gas engine is the passing into the metal of about 20 per cent of the heating value of the fuel. The heat is usually carried away by a water-jacket, but the cooling in large engines is imperfect, so that interference with running is a loss added to that of waste heat.

Prof. Bertram Hopkinson, of the University of Cambridge, now claims that his improvement of the old plan of introducing water into the inside of the cylinder has been made to give effective cooling. Cold water is injected through a number of 1-32 inch holes, giving fairly coarse jets against the piston face and into every part of the combustion chamber, and by keeping the whole engine above 212° F., the water is converted into steam before reaching the walls, avoiding any accumulation of liquid to form corrosive sulphuric acid with the sulphur dioxide of the gas. The water required is about 24 pounds per brake after removing the jacket, the internal cooling gave continuous running without overheating, and the engine reached fifty brake horsepower, an increase of 25 per cent. with the same fuel. Not least of the advantages of the unjacketed engine is the greatly lessened weight.

Missionary Services.

As previously arranged for the Cochrane Street congregation now worshipping in the Methodist College Hall, held their annual Missionary services on Sunday. The Rev. Mr. Guy, M.A., came to the city from Grand Falls on a special invitation, and was the preacher at the morning service, taking as the basis of his remarks the words, "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." The preacher said in part Jesus Christ considered Christian missions to be the supreme business of the Christian Church. Every member of the Christian Church must pass on the gospel to others, the responsibility does not rest upon the missionary but upon every man that makes the name of Jesus Christ. One of the obstacles we are face to face with was the legalized liquor traffic. The reverend gentleman in strong and forcible language denounced this traffic as having a damnable effect on a number of the missions in this our island home.

A very large gathering assembled at the evening service. After the opening exercises conducted by the Rev. C. A. Whitemarsh, M.A., reference was made to the terrible disaster which overtook so many of our fellow countrymen. The prayers and sympathy of the congregation were asked for. Mr. Alex. Robertson was introduced as Chairman; he was quite happy in his remarks. His reference to the great Presbyterian convention of which he was a member, held at Toronto last summer, were much appreciated. The first speaker was Mr. H. E. Cowan, who gave a short and practical address on the work of the Congregational Church missions in various parts of the world, reference was also made in choice language to the work being done by the Methodists' the world over. After the singing of a well-known hymn, Rev. N. Guy delivered perhaps one of the most enthusiastic addresses we have ever listened to, as he portrayed the great changes coming over the church—the interest in Christian missions—the lands of the East—the mighty revolutions in every department of life, he was given the closest attention by a large congregation of sympathetic listeners. Newfoundland Methodism raised \$18,000 for missions last year, and the ideal for the present conference year is \$20,000. The solo by Miss Herder, as also the solos in the anthem, "Hark! Hark my soul, by Miss Vincent and Mr. Alex. Mews were pleasingly rendered. After singing of "Nearer my God, to Thee," and the "Benediction" by the Rev. Dr. Fenwick, the Dead March in Saul was played by Organist Mews, while the large gathering remained reverently standing with bowed heads.

Wesley Church.

At Wesley Church, Sunday night the service was most solemn and impressive. After the opening hymn "Eternal Father Strong to Save," fervent prayer was offered for the bereaved in so many of our outport homes and well as several in the city. The choir then sang that beautiful hymn, "Peace, Perfect Peace," and after the lesson was read another hymn "Deem not that they are blest alone," in which all joined. The preacher, Rev. F. R. Matthews, B.A., announced his text, Jeremiah 31:15 verse: "In Ramah there was a voice heard, lamentation and bitterness: Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted." After referring to the appalling disaster, the utility of wireless telegraphy, the sympathy of the King and other by cables, the stirring efforts of members of the Government, the order and precision with which the arrangements for the removal of the suffering and deceased were carried out on the arrival of the steamer, the manifest value and convenience of the Grenfell Institute in such an emergency which justified its erection and support, the preacher went on to pay a high tribute to the brave seamen who too often dare the elements in order to secure a living for themselves and those depending on them. With much pathos he referred to some incidents told him by survivors, some encouraging each other with Christian consolation, giving messages to dear ones at home they would never greet again, the terrible sufferings from cold, one man had told him he had been in the water five times. The lessons were then applied, of contentment with our calling which is immensely easier than the hardships many are called upon to endure, and show more regard for our toilers upon the sea, and others who work amongst machinery. After the hymn, "A few more years shall roll," the organist, Mr. Pratt, played the Dead March in Saul.




The Meeting This Evening.

Willing Workers.




There are many

The Tragedy at the Floe.

It is now when the aftermath is settling
in that this never-to-be-forgotten
catastrophe is being more adequately
realized. Yesterday business in the
city was practically suspended and the
grief and sympathy expressed on all
sides looked as if the terrible
affair had just commenced. In every
home yesterday there was widespread
sorrow for the afflicted widows and
orphans who lost their breadwinners
on the wing-swept icefloe.
Last night at every club room and
hall in the city the one and only subject
of conversation was the disaster
while in every church on Sunday large
congregations were present, and offered
up prayer for those hardy seafarers
of the Newfoundland who succumbed
in that awful blizzard.

THE SURVIVORS.

Many other survivors were interviewed
but all virtually corroborated the
stories told by previous survivors as
published in this paper. They told
how men fought with each other
before death, pinched and bit the
dying to keep them alive and other
similar pathetic and awe-inspiring incidents
that words fail to depict properly.
The bodies that were embalmed
Sunday night and placed in the
mortuary will be sent home to-morrow
night on the S. S. Beothic. The body
of Fred Hackett, of Cat Harbour will
be interred here. The bodies to be
sent to their respective homes in the

No Tidings of Southern Cross.

Her Absence Causing Grave Anxiety—
Cruiser Fiona Joins in Search.
Much anxiety and grave concern is
being felt for the Southern Cross. Her
non-arrival is causing universal
alarm but there is no reason why
hope should be abandoned.

Exactly a week ago this forenoon
Capt. T. Connors, of the Coastal S. S.
"Fiona," passed the Southern Cross
finishes W. S. W. of Cape Pine. That
same afternoon the fatal blizzard came
and it is believed the Southern
Cross was driven off to sea a couple
of hundred miles and since then has
not been able to reach the land.
Ever since she was reported by Captain
Connors relatives and friends of
those on board have been beseeching
the telegraph offices in the city and
outports and the eager information of
"Have you any news of the Southern
Cross" is sought for, but, unfortunately
the reply is always in the negative.

FIONA MAKES SEARCH.

Yesterday afternoon the absence of
the Southern Cross was discussed by
the Executive Government and it was
decided to send the revenue cruiser
"Fiona" to assist the Kyle and U. S.
Scout ship Seneca in searching for the
overdue vessel. The unanimous hope
is that the "Cross" will turn up all
right.

Since we went to press yesterday
the following wireless messages were
received from the S. S. Kyle:—
Colonial Secretary,
Hon. J. R. Bennett,
"Ship's position at 6.15 p.m. 52
miles S. W. by S. off Virgin Rocks,
now lying to; ship's head S. E. half
East, blowing a gale from S. S. E. with
glitter. Saw no sail or any
steamer to-day."
At 8.30 p.m. to the Reid Nfld. Co.:—
"Ran 67 miles S. W. half south
from Virgins; changed course east
28 miles; 2.30 p.m. changed course N.
W. and ran 41 miles. At 6.15 p.m.
Cape Race N.N.W. 85 miles, N.E. gale
with thick sleet; ship laying to."

Newfoundland Coming Home.

The S. S. Newfoundland is returning
from here lateful trip to the ice-
fields and will likely arrive here this
evening. Mr. Gerald Harvey did not
order the ship home as he could not
communicate with her, the ship not
having wireless, but he assumes that
in view of the Florida coming home
as ordered last evening by Bowring
Prom. that in all probability the Newfoundland
is accompanying her.

Speeches More Conciliatory.

Special to the Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day.

The announcement of the figures on the second reading of the Home Rule Bill, evoked louder cheers from the Opposition than from the Ministerialists, the Opposition interpreting them as gratifying proof of a dwindling Government majority, but the diminution is accounted for to some extent by the abstention from voting of the O'Brienites. Speeches were generally conciliatory in tone. Redmond who opened the debate again held out the olive branch to Ulster in a speech of great eloquence, but insisted that it was impossible for him and his colleagues to agree to the permanent exclusion of Ulster and to abandon the principle of "Ireland a Nation." Andrew Bonar Law, though professing in certain passages of his speech to see hardly any hope of a peaceful settlement, and predicting civil war was certain if the Government persisted in pushing the Bill through, declared that he and his colleagues would gladly accept a proposal for the renewal of conversations with Government leaders, but feared nothing would come out of it. Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland, was most optimistic. Despite all criticism he was certain that great progress had been made towards a peaceful settlement. Civil war he declared was impossible. The second reading of the Home Rule Bill was carried a first time by a majority of 101; second time by a majority of 85. Last night eight O'Brienites abstained from voting, two Liberals voted against the Government, one Nationalist was absent through illness, three Laborites also absent, and Charles P. G. Masterman who had previously voted as member of the Government, lost his seat in the election for Bethnal Green. A large gathering of Irishmen assembled last night outside Parliament to celebrate the passage of the Bill. They cheered wildly when the result of the vote was announced. Asquith took no part in the voting.

Bonaventure Arrives With 12,000 Seals

GOT DEAD BODY ON BOARD.

The S. S. Bonaventure Capt. John Parsons, arrived from the icefields at 12.20 p.m. to-day and reported to the Quarantine Officer to have 12,000 prime harp seals.

Like the other ships that arrived the "Bon" reports a terrific spring, the worst in the experience of Capt. Parsons. The steamer brought along the body of Henry Fridman, a sealer belonging to Petty Harbour, who was killed in the early part of the voyage by falling into the hold of the ship.

The Bonaventure's crew had nothing new to report of the Newfoundland disaster because the first intimation Captain Parsons had of the tragedy was by wireless from Capt. Randall, of the Bellaventure. At that time the survivors and dead were on board the latter ship. The Bonaventure then made a diligent search for the eight missing bodies but found none of them.

Capt. Parsons says he never saw the ice so heavy and seals so scarce. He reports passing a quantity of ears, poles, blankets, etc., about 4 o'clock this morning. He reports the catch of the other ships the same as the "Bell" did, namely:—

SYDNEY, April 6.

WASHINGTON, April 6.

LONDON, April 6.
Sir Edward Morris, the Premier of Newfoundland, who arrived here Saturday, on being interviewed stated that he had been appalled by the wireless message received on board the ship the day before landing, conveying the news of the sealing disaster.

JUAREZ, April 6.
Rudolfo Fierro, of Villa's staff, is to be executed for killing Gen. Benton, on Feb. 17th, as a result of the findings of the commission of enquiry. He is now in the penitentiary at Chihuahua, and has been stripped of his rank. The commission's report shows that when Benton upbraided Villa in the latter's office in Juarez, Villa ordered Fierro to place him un-

East Fife, rendered necessary by his acceptance of Secretaryship War. The meeting took place in the village Assembly room, and was opened by the usual formal business, including the adoption of the Prime Minister as the Liberal candidate. Mr. Asquith, Mrs. Asquith and daughter were given a rousing welcome. Mr. Asquith said he was submitting himself to the hazard and inconvenience of the election because he had become Secretary of State for War. Without going into the incidents connected with that change, he declared there had been genuine misunderstandings, and honest mistakes, but in his deliberate opinion there had been nothing, at any stage, or in any quarter, which cast the least doubt upon the honor of those immediately concerned.

None had better reason than he to know the zeal, devotion to duty and sense of responsibility of the military as well as the naval forces. The very fact that the army rested upon a voluntary, and not a mercenary basis, was the best safeguard for the maintenance of the splendid, untarnished traditions of its redoubtable past. "I am certain," continued Asquith, "that they can be counted upon from the highest to the lowest, without exception, to undertake duties which they may be required to discharge. The Army in this country is not a practical political instrument, and has no place in the framing of policy, or the moulding of our laws. (Cheers). The Prime Minister said it was his duty in the post which he had assumed, by searching personal enquiry with the co-operation upon which he could count on, to see that the Army was fit in every shifting condition, for its primary and elementary duty. The Army would hear nothing of politics from him. He expected to hear nothing of politics from the Army." (Cheers). Responsibility for the preservation of domestic peace, continued the Prime Minister, lay with the magistrates and police. Under normal conditions the army could not, and ought not, to be invoked by the civil power. It was only in emergencies which were happily rare that any such call could be addressed to the army. When such occasion arose it was the duty of the soldier, as it was the duty of civilians to comply with the demands of the civil power, but these present tory doctrines struck at the very root, not only of army discipline, but of democratic government. Where did they lead to? They set a precedent, which was capable of an infinite number of applications, and was much more dangerous in its consequences, than the one which went before it. If the Government was to recognize the existence of a dispensing and discriminating power they must recognize it not only in officers but in men, not only in the army but in everybody. At a public meeting two years ago in this same hall he had described Tory doctrines as furnishing the complete grammar of anarchy. (Cheers). He repeated now that these new dogmas, countersigned by Tory leaders, would be invoked whenever the spirit of lawlessness undertook to block the ordered machinery of self-governing society. Turning to the question of Home Rule, Mr. Asquith said: The Bill under the Parliament Act, which was not intended to be a dead letter, was far advanced on its road to the Statute Book. There was neither force nor plausibility in theory, electors were not left in the dark regarding the Government's intentions to take up Home Rule. His supposed silence on that topic was a favorite theme with Bonar Law. Asquith quoted from a speech which he delivered at St. Andrew's on December 7th, 1910, in which he dealt exclusively with Home Rule. We believe that settlement by consent is in the interests of the country, and both great political parties, continued the Premier, those who believe in Home Rule, do not desire to see the new system, started under the most unfavorable conditions, amidst clouds and darkness and civil turmoil. On the other hand those who wish Home Rule is repugnant cannot face with equanimity problems which the Government of Ireland presents, if by misadventure the new hopes and expectations of four-fifths of the Irish people were to be dashed to the ground. Asquith recapitulated his temporary exclusion plan. While admitting its disadvantages, he said it had great merit, it at least got rid of any question of coercion, and gave the population concerned the immediate arbitration ballot. "I am anxious for peace, and, I say this for both sides, it must be peace with honor." In any settlement that is to come we must securely place the Home Rule Bill on the Statute Book, we hope and think that such is not incompatible with providing careful provisions to meet the convictions and susceptibilities of the minority. I firmly believe that in time, after experience, there will be a convergence of forces in the direction of complete Irish unity. They must see some process applied with necessary variations, applied without undue delay, to other parts of the United Kingdom. The conviction that such reconstruction and constitutional organization would lead to greater efficiency in the conduct both of a local and im-

perial interests, and the quickened patriotism of every party would stimulate the larger patriotism of the whole. Asquith dealt briefly with other subjects of political importance such as the Welsh Disestablishment, Plural voting and rating problems. He said there remained one very serious point to be emphasized. If they studied the by-elections of the last two years they would find, with perhaps one exception, every loss to Liberals has been due to split forces. On Home Rule the by-elections had pronounced with an overwhelming majority in favor of the Government policy, and it was indeed a melancholy thing for those whose hearts were bound up in the future prospects of wise democratic legislation, to find the democratic army split. It was time that such a state of things came to an end. It would surely be childish if in great issues before them which could only be brought to success by unity, loyal co-operation they should allow comparatively trivial differences upon issues not vital, to divide forces, which, united, were irresistible.

THE GREATER QUESTION.

At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are the best means to use to get the best returns from the land. Perennials must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to give the best returns, and is the most valuable and economical source of nitrogen for agricultural purposes. For vegetables, grass, and all leafy crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant is making its growth, as well as before sowing the seed. If a liquid manure is preferred, a 1/2 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quantity should not be exceeded. It is a good plan to reduce the Sulphate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful. For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended:— 40 lbs. Superphosphate, 26 lbs. Fine bone meal, 10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia, 15 lbs. Sulphate of Potash, 21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA. 1 cwt. Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 45 square yards. The use of Carbonate of Magnesia, in conjunction with Sulphate of Ammonia, is of great importance in potato culture. For turnips use the following:— 66 lbs. Superphosphate, 13 lbs. Fine bone meal, 13 lbs. Sulphate of Potash, 20 lbs. Sulphate of Ammonia. 1 cwt. Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to square yards. Ammonia of excellent quality is now made by the St. John's Gas Light Company, and may be obtained on very reasonable terms. Full particulars may be obtained at the Gas Works, or at the Board of Trade Building.
