SPEEDING UP MUNITIONS.

LONDON, To-day Sixteen National Munition fac-tories have been established in Eng-land. After consultation with the French Ministry, the British Government decided to set up additional ten large establishments. This announcement was made in the Commons last evening by Minister of Munitions Lloyd George, who told of the pro-gress made by his department, over-coming the shortage of shells that had prevented the army on the continent from doing all it might otherwise have done. These new factories are being erected in the vicinity of arsenals and existing armament arsenais and existing armament establishments, and according to Lloyd George, when the Government has completed in a few weeks the developments it is now engaged in, the supply of shells will be doubled. This will not merely enable us to support our men, but will enable them to cleave their way through to victory.
Lloyd George explained that until the
new factories are built the work of
his department will be directed to speeding up existing contracts. At first the Government had been faced with grave labor shortage. Some machines were lying idle because no one could be found to work them. One third of the machines engaged in Government work at the outset were not being utilised at night. During three months this Department had succeeded in adding nearly forty thousand men and women, nearly half the men skilled, to the ranks of workers connected with armaments. They were pouring further supplies. His Department also enrolled one hun dred thousand volunteers, but it had been found difficult to remove the majority of these from their present employment. However scores o thousands of skilled men who had en listed had been traced and arrange ments made with the War Office for the return of these men to the factor ies, while Trade Union leaders agree to a relaxation of trade union restrictions. He had not been able to con vince men without giving figures which he dare not give. Were all re-strictions relaxed, hundreds of thousands of men could be added to the works. Steps, Lloyd George said, had been taken to increase the supply of machine guns and hand gren ades for trench warfare. Dardanelles. What It Will Mean. When the Allied Fleet forces the

Forcing the

Dardanelles, reaches Constantinople, and makes the way clear to the Black Sea, the public will then realize fully the value of the operations which have aroused not a little severe criticism. The first result of the achievement will be restoration of communications between Russia and her Western Allies

The fact is not generally realized that at the beginning of the war the entrance to the Baltic was blocked by the German fleet, the Dardanelles closed by the Turks, while Archangel the only other outlet for Russia, was shut off by ice. The consequence was that there was no means of getting ammunition and other goods into Russia, and it is now fully recognized that the whole explanation of the Russian set-back in Galicia is the simple one that big guns, huge stores of ammunition, and military equipment of all kinds are waiting until a means can be devised of carrying

them to the vast armies. And it is the Allied Fleet which is attempting the task of opening up a way for this pur-There are also two other good rea-

sons why the Dardanelles must be orced. The autumn of 1914, according to the story of "The Dardanelles" (Andrew Melrose saw a heavy wheat harvest garnered on the shores of the Black Sea. It was a food supply of infinite value to the Allied forces at a ime when the price of wheat was mounting by leaps and bounds over the world. But so long as the Dardanelles are closed to our merchant ships, the Russian wheat must lie iseless in the granaries. And so, if only to restore trading communications between East and West, the atempt on the Dardanelles had to be

The second reason why it is essential that the Dardanelles should be forced is that the Turks will be cut off from their supplies of weapons, munitions, and skilled advisers. There will be a rapid end of them as a fight ing force, and a deadly menace to the vhole of our Eastern Empire will be

There seems no doubt that a plot has been hatched between the Germans and Turks to rouse the fanatisism of the 300,000,000 Mohammedans into carrying on a religious war against Great Britain. The Sultan has declared a holy war, and it is sedulously reported that the English are determined to crush the Mohammendan faith. That is why the Allies have decided to launch an attack at the very heart of Turkey in order that the so-called holy war will become, for the Sultan, a war of self- preser-

### Aviator Sleeps As Hydroplane **Drifts on Sea**

Had Descended in the Adriatic Owing

to Carburetter Trouble. Rome, July 22.-While "Gink" Dougherty, a young American birdman, slept peacefully in a hydroplane drifting about on the Adriatic, the entire Italian aviation corps at the Taranto naval base searched for some trace of his craft, believing he had encountered Austrian airmen or a submarine. The story reached Rome to-day.

Dougherty, whose home is in Buffalo, is an instructor in aeronautics at Taranto. He was on scout duty the morning when word came that an Austrian submarine had been sighted off the coast and he flew cut to reconnoitre at five o'clock with a twohour supply of gasoline in his tank. The two hours passed and the Buffalo airman failed to return. When four hours had gone by John Lansing Callan another American aviator, and a dozen Italian birdmen had their machines wheeled from the hangers and started in search of Dougherty.

For nearly an hour they sped along the coast. Finally twelve miles out an Italian sighted a drifting hydroplane and slid into the water beside it. There sat Dougherty asleep in his seat. After half an hour's flight he had been forced to descend because of carburretter trouble. Something had come loose and dropped into the water, Dougherty said.

"I hadn't slept well the night before and the wind lulled me to sleep almost before I knew it," said the American. "I knew somebody would find
