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Parcel Post for Mld. Expeditionary Forces!

The attention of the public is drawn to the very urgent necessity of strictly observing the regulations published by this Department from time to time concerning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should be strictly observed:

- (1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds.
- (2) Parcels should be addressed with the Regimental number, rank, name and surname of addressee, followed by the last known address of the Unit with which the individual was serving; for example:
No. 0978 Cpl. John J. Kent,
2nd Battalion
The Royal Newfoundland Regt.,
Hazeley Down Camp,
Winchester,
Hant's Camp,
England.
- (3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded, if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The Original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel.
- (4) If second address is not furnished at the time of posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribution.
- (5) Parcels containing articles of personal nature or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.
- (6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to soldiers.
- (7) Parcels should be packed securely.
- (8) Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later than the end of November.

REVOLUTION IN HUNGARY.
COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. A successful revolution has taken place in Budapest and the Hungarian National Council has taken over the government, according to a message received here by Count Michael Karolyi to the Berlin Tagblatt. The message reads: "The revolution in Budapest and National Council took over government. Military and police acknowledge National Council completely. Inhabitants rejoicing." (Signed) Karolyi, President National Council.

RIOTING IN BUDAPEST.
BERNE, Oct. 31. The Berlin Vossische Zeitung prints a despatch from Budapest saying that a crowd stormed the military prison and released political and military prisoners. Revolutionary troops seized the eastern railroad terminals and a troop train which were to start on the front. The soldiers in these trains joined the insurgents, who had machine guns and enormous quantities of arms and ammunition and entered the arsenal.

REVOLUTION IN AUSTRIA.
COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. A despatch from Vienna printed in the Tagblatt of Berlin says: "The National Assembly met at 3 o'clock this afternoon. A vast crowd had gathered before the Diet and frantically cheered the red flag which was played by laborers from the suburbs of Vienna. NEW GOVT. OF GERMAN-AUSTRIA.
 AMSTERDAM, Nov. 1. The German Austrian State Council has issued a proclamation, according to a despatch from Vienna, announcing that it has assumed the government of German-Austria and that it will conclude peace in accord with the German empire.

GERMANY RECOGNIZES PRAGUE COUNCIL.
 AMSTERDAM, Nov. 1. Germany, according to an announcement made in the Weger Gazette, has recognized the Prague General National Council and has ordered Consul Getshattel to make the necessary declaration in behalf of the Berlin government.

GOOD PROGRESS MADE.
 LONDON, Nov. 1. (By the A.P.)—Field Marshal Haig's forces made good progress in their attack this morning in the region of Valenciennes. That city is reported to be surrounded on three sides. Fifteen hundred prisoners were taken by the British this morning.

AMERICANS WIN SUCCESS.
 WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES NORTH WEST OF VERDUN, Nov. 1. General Pershing's forces attacked the German position on this front today. At least a dozen villages were captured. More than 3,000 prisoners were taken. Soon after noon the American troops had passed Amcourt and Bayonville. The Americans stormed Audevanne and cleared the Bois-des-Loges where they encountered the most serious opposition of the day. The lines at 6 o'clock this evening extended through the northern part of the Bois-des-Loges to the eastward, and then well north of Aincreville and Clery-le-Grand. Most of the villages captured had been forfeited by the Germans.

IMPOSSIBLE TO COUNT PRISONERS.
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. Official Rome despatches to-day describing the victorious sweep of Italian and Allied armies that are demolishing the Austrian front, say the lines are moving forward in such great leaps that it is no longer possible to identify towns retaken or to count prisoners and guns captured or Italians liberated.

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TISZA ASSASSINATED.
 COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. Count Tisza, the former Hungarian Premier, has been killed by a soldier, according to a Budapest telegram to-day.

BRITISH RESUME OFFENSIVE.
 LONDON, Nov. 1. The British troops resumed the offensive south of Valenciennes this

EVIDENCE OF AUSTRIAN BARBARITY.
 ROME, Nov. 1. The number of prisoners taken by the Allied forces in their drive against the Austro-Hungarians in Northern Italy is steadily increasing. More than 700 guns have been captured. Immense booty has been taken. As the Italian army prosecutes its victorious advance, says the despatch, most deplorable evidence is coming to light of atrocities by the enemy during the period of invasion. In Italy as in France the fury of the barbarians has been intense against things and persons. Such fury has been witnessed not only by Italian soldiers but by representatives of Italian and Allied press agents accompanying the advancing columns.

BRITISH PROGRESS ON ITALIAN FRONT.
 LONDON, Nov. 1. The British troops on the Italian front have occupied the town of Scille on the Livenna River, fifteen miles east of the Piave, the war office announced. The enemy is falling back rapidly in the Grappa sector.

CAPTURE OF PRISONERS.
 LONDON, Nov. 1. In the past three months the British forces in France have taken 172,659 prisoners and 2,275 guns from the Germans, according to an official communication received from Field Marshal Haig to-night. During the month of October the British forces in France captured 49,000 prisoners and 925 guns.

DIAS HAS ALLIED TERMS.
 ROME, Nov. 1. It is understood that the terms of the Allied nations for an armistice are now in the hands of General Diaz, the Italian Commander-in-Chief. General Diaz handed the armistice terms to the Austrian commander to-day, according to the Evening Star. Terms of the armistice, the newspaper adds, will be published to-morrow.

GERMAN PRESS COMMENT.
 COPENHAGEN, Oct. 31. (By the A.P.)—The Hamburg Fremdenblatt prints a Berlin despatch which asserts that Germany with or without Allies will not permit herself "to be handled as Bulgaria was handled." Eugene Zimmermann in the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger condemns what he calls the government's too ready acceptance of American progressive demands. President Wilson, he declares, has been putting out successive feelers to find how far he could go and the German Government's attitude may have made him believe the Germans are servile souls, who will accept any humiliation.

FRENCH IMPRESSED BY CAPITULATION.
 PARIS, Nov. 1. The capitulation of Turkey, though anticipated has made nevertheless a profound impression in France. The newspapers declare it to be an event of supreme importance.

GERMANY ISOLATED.
 LONDON, Nov. 1. The complete isolation of Germany as a result of the desertion and surrender of her Allies is commented upon as the outstanding feature of the latest developments in the colossal drama of victory. The effect of this isolation upon her armies coupled with the desperate international conditions in Germany is regarded almost everywhere as bringing the end of the war very near, although in some quarters warning is raised that the German army and navy is still in existence, and in the hands of desperate men are formidable and dangerous. The general tenor of comment, however, indicated a belief that Germany must sooner or later accept virtually any terms the Allies impose.

Discussing the position of British subjects in Russia, in the House of Commons to-day, Lord Robert Cecil, Assistant Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, said that the government information was that the amount of bloodshed by the present govern-

ment of Russia greatly exceeded anything that ever took place under the Imperial regime. The British government, said he, "will shrink from yielding within its power to get every British subject out of Russia and unquestionably mean to exact justice on the people guilty of these outrages when they are able to get them in their power."

PREMATURE BUT EXPECTED.
 COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. The rumours of Emperor William's abdication are at least premature, the Berlin Vossische Zeitung says, in Thursday's issue. It adds, however, that the abdication question was discussed at the latest meetings of the War Cabinet, and it is stated that former Vice-Chancellor Desbrouck has left for the front on an important mission for Chancellor Maximilian. It is generally supposed, the newspaper says, that Dr. Delbrueck will present the Emperor with an abdication document.

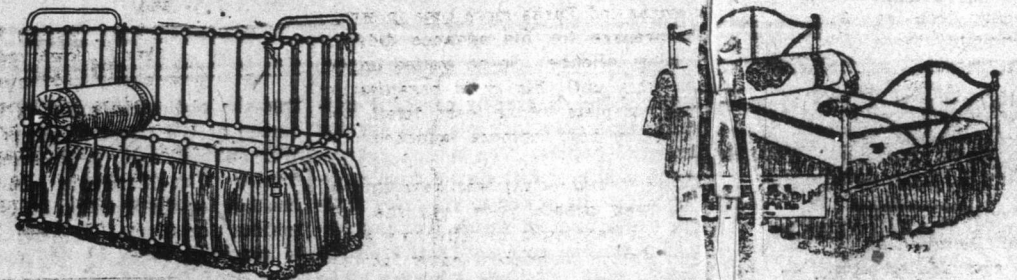

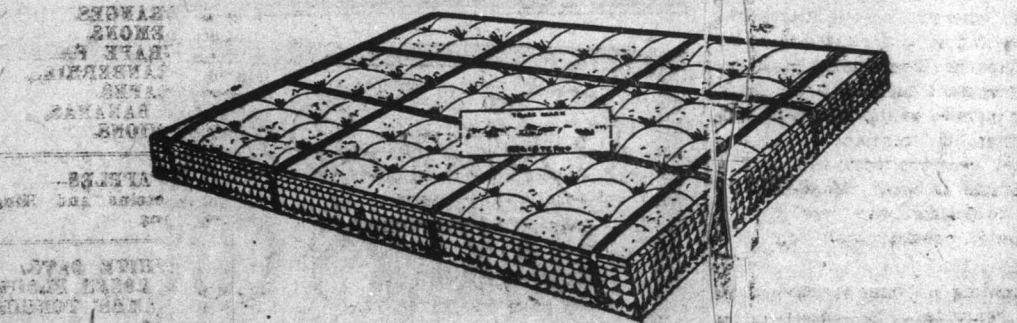

ARCHANGEL, Monday, Oct. 23. In response to a message from Omsk the Government in Northern Russia headed by Nicholas Tshaikovsky has determined to formally recognize the all Russian authority of the Omsk government.

FATAL SMASH-UP ON NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. Twenty-five or thirty persons are reported by the police to have been killed when an elevated train bound for Coney Island on the Brighton Beach Line of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company jumped the track at 7:30 o'clock to-night at Lincoln Road Station, near Prospect Park, Brooklyn. When the train left the rails it crashed into another train and burst into flames. As the rescue work continued the police raised their estimate of the number of dead. They declared at 3 o'clock they believed as many as 100 men and women had perished. Removal of the bodies was made difficult because of the fact that the accident occurred in a deep cut beyond the point where the elevated lines comes to the surface.

SAILORS MUTINY.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. According to Hungarian reports sailors at Pola, the great Austrian base on the Adriatic, have mutinied and seized the warships there. A dispatch from Rome to the Paris Temps, under date of Oct. 27th says that the Austrian fleet had been hastily concentrated at Pola, the dispatch added, but all the ships which were at Cattaro had left that port.

SUCCESS OF LIBERTY LOAN.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. The fourth Liberty Loan was oversubscribed by more than eight million and sixty-six million dollars. Final reports announced to-day by the Treasury shows subscriptions of \$8,846,416,300.

GERMANS MOVING MALE POPULATION.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Nov. 1. (By the A.P.)—The Germans now are removing the civil population in advance of the retreat of their armies from French soil. A document captured by American soldiers contains instructions for rounding up male population capable of bearing arms. The document says that this has been done only in part up to this time because the passive resistance of the population has reduced the forces at the disposal of the local command.

CROATIANS UNITE WITH ITALY.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. (By the A.P.)—Croats who completely occupied the naval base of Fiume on the Adriatic, have proclaimed their union with the Italians, according to a despatch from Berlin to the Berlinische Tidende.

WILL ATTACK FROM THE EAST.

LONDON, Nov. 1. An Allied attack on Germany from the east was foreshadowed by Gen. Nicholl Barnes, member of the British War Cabinet, in a speech last evening at the American Officers' Club in London.

ROYALTY MOVING OUT.

LONDON, Nov. 1. After the proclamation of a Republic in Budapest, Archduke Joseph, the representative of the Emperor, left the city, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Zurich. Emperor Charles, the despatch adds, before leaving Vienna personally gave orders that all conflict with the population be avoided. He instructed the authorities to yield without resistance to the new power.

LOST WITH ALL HANDS.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1. The naval service department announces that all hands of the auxiliary patrol vessel Galliano were lost when it sank on Oct. 30. The next of kin have been informed by the department of Naval Service.

FOREVER MEMORABLE.

LONDON, Nov. 1. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The British War Cabinet has telegraphed Marshall hearty congratulations on his splendid success in dealing a fatal blow to the Turkish Army, and liberating Mesopotamia from the ten years' rule under which its people have suffered for many centuries. The victory was due to the resourceful and energetic leadership, and excellent staff work, and the endurance and resource of all ranks, who worthily maintained the reputations of the British and India armies. The Mesopotamian expedition will be forever memorable in the annals of the British Empire.

O. C. S. MEMORIAL.
LONDON, Nov. 1. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The Overseas Club, which raised \$27,000 sterling for war purposes, is appealing to its 175,000 members to contribute to a war memorial fund, for the purpose of erecting a building in London for overseas use, as a club, and to serve as a centre for other useful activities.

AUTOCRACY COLLAPSING.
LONDON, Nov. 1. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Ex-Emir Asquith, speaking at Glasgow today, said that the most striking change occurring in Europe was the complete and irrevocable collapse of autocracy. In 1914 three Emperors ruled the greater part of Europe, and large part of Asia. 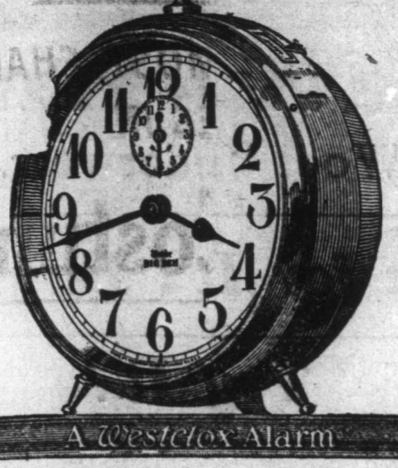

Turkey Signs Armistice Terms.

Shorn of all Power, the Ottoman Government Make an Abject and Humiliating Surrender -- Twenty Five Conditions Agreed to.

Twenty-five clauses cover the terms of the armistice to Turkey, which has been granted by the Allies, and went into effect Tuesday, October 31st. There is no doubt whatever that the agreement of Turkey to the conditions means absolute and unconditional surrender. Every military, naval and civilian condition places upon Turkey the burden of responsibility, to shelve which, or fall in the carrying out of the same, places upon that country the penalties prescribed. There is nothing left unsaid or undone to safeguard the Allies, and every precaution has been taken to prevent internal disorders, during the period of the armistice. Altogether the twenty-five conditions, as under, leave Turkey entirely at the mercy of the Allies, and with the opening of the passage of the Dardanelles to Allied warships, the German vessels in the Black Sea will shortly have a period set to their operations in these waters. Thus ends the short-lived ambition of Turkey to dominate, with German aid, the Balkan Peninsula.

CONDITIONS.
London, Nov. 1.—The terms of the armistice granted by the Allies to Turkey follows:—
First.—The opening of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus and access to the Black Sea, Allied occupation of the Bosphorus forts.
Second.—The positions of all mine fields, torpedo tubes and other obstructions in Turkish waters are to be indicated, and assistance given to sweep or remove them as may be required.
Third.—All available information concerning mines in the Black Sea is to be communicated.
Fourth.—Allied prisoners of war and Armenian interned persons and prisoners are to be collected in Constantinople and handed over unconditionally to the Allies.
Fifth.—Immediate demobilisation of the Turkish army, except such troops are required for surveillance on the frontiers and for the maintenance of internal order. The number of effectives and their disposal to be determined later by the Allies after consultation with the Turkish Government.
Sixth.—The surrender of all war vessels in Turkish waters or waters occupied by Turkey. These ships will be interned in such Turkish port or ports as may be directed, except such small vessels as are required for police and similar purposes in Turkish territorial waters.
Seventh.—The Allies to have the right to occupy any strategic points in the event of any situation arising which threatens the security of the Allies.
Eighth.—Free use by Allied ships of all ports and anchorages now in Turkish occupation and denial of their use to the enemy. Similar conditions are to apply to Turkish mercantile ships in Turkish waters for the purpose of trade and the demobilisation of the army.
Ninth.—Allied occupation of the Taurus Tunnel system.
Tenth.—Immediate withdrawal of Turkish troops from Northern Persia to behind the pre-war frontier already has been ordered and will be carried out.
Eleventh.—A part of Transcaucasia already has been ordered to be evacuated by Turkish troops. The remainder to be evacuated if required by the Allies after they have studied the situation.
Twelfth.—Wireless telegraph and cable stations to be controlled by the Allies; Turkish Government messages to be intercepted.
Thirteenth.—Prohibition against the destruction of any naval, military or commercial material.
Fourteenth.—Facilities are to be given for the purchase of coal, oil, fuel and naval material from Turkish sources after the requirements of the country have been met. None of the above materials are to be exported.
Fifteenth.—The surrender of all Turkish officers in Tripolitania and Cyrenatica to the nearest Italian garrisons. Turkey agrees to stop supplies and communications with these officers if they do not obey the order to surrender.
Sixteenth.—The surrender of all garrisons in Hedjaz, Assir, Yemen, Syria and Mesopotamia, to the nearest Allied commander and withdrawal of Turkish troops from Cilicia, except those necessary to maintain order as will be determined under clause six.

Seventeenth.—The use of all ships and repair facilities at all Turkish ports and arsenals.
Eighteenth.—The surrender of all ports occupied in Tripolitania and Cyrenatica, including Misurata to the nearest Allied garrison.
Nineteenth.—All Germans and Austrians, naval, military or civilian, to be evacuated within one month, from Turkish Dominions and those in remote districts, as soon after that time as may be possible.
Twentieth.—Compliance with such orders as may be conveyed for the disposal of that portion of the Turkish army which is demobilised under class five.
Twenty-first.—An Allied representative to be attached to the Turkish Ministry of Supplies in order to safeguard Allied interests. This representative to be furnished with all aid necessary for this purpose.
Twenty-second.—Turkish prisoners are to be kept at the disposal of the Allied Powers. The release of Turkish civilian prisoners and prisoners over military age is to be considered.
Twenty-third.—An obligation on the part of Turkey to cease all relations with the Central Powers.
Twenty-fourth.—In case of disorder in the six Armenian vilayets, the Allies reserve to themselves the right to occupy any part of them.
Twenty-fifth.—Hostilities between the Allies and Turkey shall cease from noon, local time, Tuesday, the 31st October, 1918.

John Anderson interviewed. Mr. Anderson was interviewed by a Telegram reporter yesterday. He told of his recent trip to the United States and Canada. The weather was during the trip, and a most enjoyable time was experienced. He is now in St. John's, N.B., Sackville, New Brunswick, Boston, New York, and Montreal, at the Windsor Hotel. In the city, he was interviewed by a Telegram reporter who questioned him on his part in the Housing Problem here; also by the representative of a leading firm of architects. During his stay there he attended to give his consideration to the Housing Problem, and outlined a scheme to that outlined in Montreal. This he is doing. He tells us that the plan is to have a membership of 10,000, with a paid up capital of \$1,000,000. In the meantime, the membership would be made up of 10,000 men who desire to be transferred to C. Beverley Enquiry.

Thos. E. McGrath, recalled and examined by Mr. C. E. Hunt. He read extracts from Lloyd's English and American registers giving her dimensions. She was built in 1885 and had new boiler installed in 1902 and repaired in 1909 and 1913. She was also sailed, that is salt was put in to preserve the timbers. The titles of the different sales of the ship were put in evidence and also a record of her stranding at Riverhead, St. Mary's, Nov. 24th, 1917. After coming back from Placentia she was measured by Tide Surveyor Watts of the Customs.

To Mr. Howley: She was built of oak, yellow or hard pine, with galvanized iron and copper fastenings. The repairs were done under the supervision of American Lloyd's surveyor, Mr. Jas. Wheeler assisted Mr. Watts in measuring the ship. He is a shipwright by trade. To Capt. MacDermott: The class "class expunged" might deter underwriters from insuring her. Her class would be expunged if she were out of repairs. The real meaning of the class is that she had not been surveyed for re-classification. The statement that she was engaged on short lay service does not necessarily mean she was unfit for any other. The classification in Lloyd's does not apply to her after coming to Newfoundland.

To Mr. Hunt: I don't know of any vessel whose class is expunged sailing out of St. John's. I have no record of her being re-classified. To Mr. Summers: I don't know from the fact that she was on dock that she was re-classified. I do not know if Mr. Black received any remuneration. To Capt. MacDermott: I think a ship has to be of a certain class before taking a trans-Atlantic voyage. To Mr. Howley: Her classification would depend entirely on Lloyd's.

G. C. Fearn, sworn and examined by Mr. Hunt. The purchase was made by Capt. Jesse Winsor. He was sent by Mr. Barr and he selected the boat. He had an idea she was going to the sealfishery. I went through Boston. My business was to see to getting the transfer. She was bought because I and Mr. Barr and some others considered getting a ship to run to Montreal or Halifax. A declaration of ownership was made by me before the British Consul at New York. The Beverley Company had not been formed then. Capt. Winsor exceeded his instructions and made a mess of the negotiations. We paid \$65,000 for her and she underwent \$13,000 repairs. She came here with a cargo from New York. She was to have come direct but put into 2 or 3 places owing to no defect, but because the pilot wanted to be sure. She called at Sydney. Capt. Winsor was nominally in charge, but an experienced man from Nova Scotia was in command. I arrived before her. I made the necessary declarations for her registration at the Custom House. David M. Simpson was a shipbroker. I had no business with him as Capt. Winsor had already paid for her. She came here May 19th, 1917, with practically a full cargo, mostly oil. She was built in 2 parts - the bottom being the foundation. It had an oak deck and was built in the best way. There was a stich pine flooring over the keel and the transoms were heavy indeed. She had ports in the sides, through which cargo was wheeled. The upper part was not intended to meet rough weather and the top was intended for passengers. On arrival here it was decided to make her into a vessel fit for work on this side. It was decided to remove the upper structure. Application was made for estimates for the removal. In New York I had learned the alterations would cost thousands of dollars. A specification was drawn up and the repairs were to be made under Mr. Black's approval. As the men were building a vessel at Placentia it was decided to get the work done there. The only rotten wood was about the cook house. We strengthened the second part of the ship by putting in 6 or 7 beams. The repairs were made by Mr. Palfrey. Mr. Black visited there several times and approved of the alterations being made, and offered suggestions. We did not intend her for trans-Atlantic work but hoped she would help the freight situation by running her to Halifax or New York. The idea of sending her across would not appeal to me. To Mr. Summers: Our contract at Placentia was for \$18,500 and extra sheeting, etc., cost about \$2,000 more. The estimate at New York and Boston was about \$40,000 or \$50,000. To Mr. Hunt: She was never mine personally. My interest was about \$5,000. The top deck was removed here by Mr. J. Duff, who bought it. Her large engine hatchway would operate against her being a trans-Atlantic boat. The way it would operate against her was if the upper works were carried away she would fall and go down quickly. Mr. Palfrey is a practical man. We took the men off the Elizabeth Fearn to work at the Beverley. She was 3 or 4 months at Placentia. Captain George O'Reilly brought her back. There was nothing special in the trip, either way. She made a trip to Montreal and ran ashore there. She was of marvellous strength built. Capt. Turner took her to Montreal. Capt. O'Reilly was then mate of her, returned by her. She grounded there in a dock where there was not enough water. She was repaired there and was on dock after coming here. It was after being at Placentia she went to Montreal. Mr. Black was also consulted in her repairs. After coming off Reid's dock she was sold to Mr. Mann. To Mr. Howley: I got a certificate from Mr. Black after she was repaired at Placentia. She carried a cargo of fish products to Montreal. It was insured, but there was very little on the hull. She brought about 8,000 lbs. of flour from Montreal. That also was insured. When she went ashore at St. Mary's about 400 or 500 lbs. of flour were put aboard Baird's

Deceased leaves four sons and three daughters, Albert and William with the Royal Naval Reserve, Thomas with the Canadian Army, and Peter living in the city; Mrs. M. P. Comford, at Toronto, and two daughters in the city, Misses Kitty and Ida, and three sisters and one brother residing in Boston, to mourn their sad loss. "Sam," as he was familiarly known, was popular with all and his friends were legion. He was an upright, industrious citizen, and the sympathy of the whole community, in which the Telegram joins, will go out to the sorrowing family and relatives.

The Epidemic. Three deaths occurred from Spanish Influenza yesterday, the victims being Daniel Cairnes, who died at home; Thomas Guy, and a patient named Sparrow, of Portugal Cove. Four patients were removed to the convalescent ward. Two were released. There are now about 80 patients at the Hall, a few of whom are very ill. Six seamen, two from the Novelty, and four from another vessel, were admitted for treatment. There was a general improvement in conditions yesterday, and the worst of the epidemic has passed. Three more deaths, making 8 for the past 3 days, have occurred at Ganilo.

world is probably accurate. None of the King's men... people rushed to his standard with greater zeal and rapidity. None have exceeded the valor of the Newfoundland troops who fought at Beaumont Hamel. None are more determined that foul Prussia shall be deposed from her position as the bully of the world.

False Optimism About U-Boats.
The position of the war today is on the whole satisfactory, but there are some who forget the maxim inscribed on our barometers, "Slow come, slow go." That which has been preparing for nigh on 50 years following the gradual development of Prussianism evoked by Frederick the Great is not going to collapse, as certain foolish people think, "Crumbie" is the better word. Prussianism is crumbling on the Western front to-day, but while the Kaiser's right hand is faltering on the West, his left hand is barging in the East. While the arch-ventriloquist uses Karl of Austria as his vocal puppet, he is striving to arrange for the withdrawal of more divisions from Russia to face the British, French, and American divisions in France.

The question of the duration of the gradual crumbling process comes back to the question of ships. In this matter the Newfoundlanders here around me are assuredly helping to crumble Prussianism by providing timber, that otherwise would have to come from Scandinavia or across the Atlantic—to come at a risk that is, in my opinion, too lightly minimized by our officials. You who have crossed the Atlantic know that the submarine danger is by no means at an end. True, it is being checked, but the U-boat is still steadily sinking valuable tonnage and valuable cargoes. All politicians would like you to believe that the submarine is finished, because they like you to hear pleasant things, and submarine news is heavily censored. From this results the general optimism which now surrounds that ugly topic. I have often thought that one of the worst evils of a censorship is that it tells or "dopes," as you boys say, the Government as well as the people. Do not, I pray, let this false optimism about the submarine cause you to relax your efforts in getting that timber which is one of the great necessities of war. Every stick, as you call them, that is felled is one more plank in the bridge of victory. Few can desire peace more eagerly than those who face the submarine in that long, long journey across the Atlantic. It is this voyage which helps to give to Transatlantic cable, gram and seiber look which somewhat surprises those of us who supposed that the Americans, the Canadians, and the New Zealanders would go to war whistling ragtime. Every tree that is felled by the axes wielded by woodmen trained for generations in the vast forests of Newfoundland brings those Prussian thieves nearer to the seat of judgment, nearer to the prisoners' dock where they will assuredly stand to await their sentence. Every tree you cut down brings nearer the day when the world will hold the German railways and the German mines in part payment for the illimitable and horrible destruction of the cities, villages and churches of France and Belgium.

I have never wavered in my conviction that peace will be dictated by the Entente Allies in Berlin or thereabouts but it will not be necessary for the Allied Armies to fight their way to the Prussian capital. Remember that Germany is not a homogeneous country, but an upstart confederation of peoples who greatly dislike each other. Once the Entente Forces enter Germany, as they certainly will, the white flag already hoisted by Austria will be sent up by a score of petty Courts. Prussia, which is as much hated in Dresden and Munich as in Great Britain and her proud Dominions, will then stand almost alone. Her satellites and parasites will, like Austria, endeavour to make peace. We must stand behind our gay and gallant Prime Minister, Mr. Lloyd George (cheers), President Wilson (cheers), M. Clemenceau (cheers), and Signor Orlando (cheers), not forgetting that noble and pathetic pair, the King and Queen of the Belgians. (Cheers.) We must see to it that Prussia pays town for town, village for village, ship for ship, jewel for jewel, picture for picture, dollar for dollar. That is, she must pay full compensation for all that she has gorged and stolen, sacked and burnt, drunken as she is with lust over her paper victories. (A voice.—"And shivering in paper clothes.") (Laughter.) Prussia will be reluctant to yield, but yield she must to the will of the civilized peoples of the world, fighting for the liberties of mankind. (Cheers.)

ORD NORTHCLIFFE ON SHIPS FOR VICTORY.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S ZEAL.

(London Times, Sept. 20, 1918.)
Viscount Northcliffe spoke yesterday, Sept. 19th, on the war to the officers and men of the Newfoundland Forestry Companies engaged in road-cutting and other timber operations in Scotland.
In welcoming Lord Northcliffe to a great camp at Kenmore, Major Illivan, in command, said he was pained to see that his lordship had actually recovered from the long onchial trouble which had affected him during the present year. He repeated his hearers of the many speeches made by Lord Northcliffe in Newfoundland over a long series of years predicting the present war. Lord Northcliffe and his distinguished brother, Lord Rothemann, by introducing industry and art of paper-making to the island, had given employ-

ment to thousands of Newfoundlanders, and brought greatly increased prosperity to Britain's oldest Colony now a Dominion.

In response to a unanimous demand for a speech on the situation of the war, Lord Northcliffe said: Many of you have heard my war utterances as far back as the better part of a score of years. But neither you nor I could have realized that the youth of Newfoundland would one day, by some mysterious instinct, and with no selfish object, revisit the land of their fathers, there to prepare for the crusade in France. I have often been asked by my own folk as to the origin of the Newfoundlanders. You all know the authentic story of a noble dame who, when bidding a well-known Prime Minister of Newfoundland to a smart London function, added to her card of invitation the words, "Please come in native dress, if possible." (Laughter.) The Newfoundland friends round me are mostly the sons of men whose forebears came from Thomas Hardy's Wessex. They sailed from Poole Harbour and from Bris-

tol, and their descendants to-day will find their character accurately described by Mr. Hardy in his books, "The Woodlanders," "Far from the Madding Crowd," and "Under the Greenwood Tree," and the great array of works of genius in which Mr. Hardy has enshrined the people of the chief State of the ancient heptarchy. When these men of Wessex arrived in Newfoundland they found themselves to be the contemporaries of Portuguese, Frenchmen, and Basques, who were also making their way to what was then called "The Isle," to fish for cod. More recently came the great migration of Irish to Newfoundland, and so, interwoven in the language of the Isle, are to be found not only ancient Wessex words preserved by Hardy and by Barnes, the Wessex poet, but also many Irish words. Here and there in Newfoundland may be found descendants of the original French who settled there, and also those of some of the Red Indian nations, but on the whole the claim of Newfoundland to be the most purely British overseas community in the
