



are holding our own in numbers, and, unless emigration increases extraordinarily between now and April 1921, our population may easily show a fair increase at the next census. It will hardly be the same in France. She has suffered severely in actual sacrifice of life, and probably has fewer people than before the war within her old territories, but the restored provinces of Alsace and Lorraine will perhaps just make good her loss.

Belgium is recovering quickly, and may not have lost much population through the war. Germany has lost some millions through the surrender of territory, and probably the population in what territory remains to her is not increasing . Austria, once part of an empire of over 50 millions. is now a small land with only nine million people, and many of them are nearly starving.

What the losses or gains in Russia may be no one can say. And it is difficult to reckon exactly the populations of the new States in Middle Europe and the Balkans. But probably the population of Europe as a whole has not greatly increased during the past few years, if it has iacreased at all. Stoppage of emigration may, however, have set off to ome extent the war wastage of lives. It is satisfactory, in any case, to know that the English-speaking countries of the world are becoming nore populous. To the 112 millions of the United States there may be added at the next census at least 65 million whites in the British Empire. This does not necessarily imply the consummation of that great Anglo-Saxondom of which we sometimes talk, for both in America and in the British Empire the race is very mixed but it does mean that nearly 200 milion people will be linked throughou the world by a common tongue. 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

In all associations it is the rule for the executive of the organization to put in concrete shape the expressed views of the majority of the members of the body. The two conventions which were held in St. John's, voted nearly unanimously for two-thirds the teachers' salary the year of re tirement. The N.T.A. Executive made no effort to carry out the will of the majority of its organization. They average salary for five years.

If the present Executive of the N.T.A. does not want to carry out the wishes of the teachers, the teachers should call another convention next summer and elect an Executive that will. The slogan of the convention should be, Teachers should be placed on the same footing as other civil servants and be retired on two-thirds the salary they are receiving when they are retired.

The Exchange Question. HON. JOHN ANDERSON RETALI-ATES.

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir,-I would pass by "Curb roker's" insolent letter, which appeared in your issue of the 17th inst., were it not that I am afraid other persons, as ignorant as "Curb Broker" himself (which scarcely seems ossible), might have misconstrued ny meaning when I said it was more profitable to this Dominion-to import from Canada than from the United States. These are the words and

"It is to Canada we must look for the reduction in the high cost of living in foodstuffs, and other productions of that great manufacturing country. With exchange on New York at 10% to 15% against Canada and Newfoundland and exchange still going up, we are paying for pork, flour, beef and all other kinds of commodities imported from the United States ten to fifteen per cent, higher than from the Dominion of Canada. If the latter can supply the goods, and prices being equal, we must increase the trade of Newfoundland with our sister Dominion.

"For example if we buy from the United States:

200 brls. Pork at \$40..\$ 8,000.00 200 brls. Flour at \$10..... 2,000.00 Payment by New York exchange at 15% 1,500.00

We pay \$11,500.00 Dominion of Canada.

200 brls. Pork at \$40.. ..\$ 8,000.00 00 brls. Flour at \$10.. .. 2,000.00

\$10,000.00 Collection draft 1/4 of 1%...

United States-Pork \$46 per bar el: Flour \$11.50 per barrel. Dominion of Canada-Pork \$40. pe barrel; Flour \$10.00 per barrel."

When citing the instances of Pork and Flour, I was merely, as I clearly stated, giving examples of what exchange meant, and I implicitly made the proviso that "if Canada can supply the goods, and prices being equal, we must increase the trade of Newfoundland with our sister dominion. It is, therefore, preferable to purchase Pork and Flour or any commo dities in Canada, if possible. 
