

Well Known in Nfld.

TWELVE YEARS GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT.

TORONTO, Sept.—Rev. Dr. Samuel Dwight Chown, of Toronto, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, who will preside at the opening of the Methodist General Conference in this city on September 27, has been General Superintendent of the Church for twelve years, being associated with the late Rev. Dr. Carman for four years of that time, and being the sole occupant of the position for the last eight years. Dr. Chown has been an outstanding figure in Canadian Methodism for many years. His activities in religious, social and moral reform movements have extended far beyond the borders of the Dominion, and he has an international reputation. The General Conference of the Methodist Church is one of the great religious organizations of this country and this parliament of delegates is representative of every section of Canada, Newfoundland and Bermuda, and the great mission work in China and Japan. During its coming two weeks' session in this city it will plan for the general progress of the Church. Dr. Chown received his education at the Kingston Grammar School, and at Victoria University, Cobourg. The Honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by Victoria University in 1898, and he holds the same degree from Knox College; also the LL.D. degree from Mount Allison and Ohio Wesleyan Universities. He was ordained a minister in 1876, and for twenty years was in the active pastorate, during which he held important charges in the Toronto and Montreal Conferences. Among the official positions Dr. Chown has held in the Methodist denomination are the following:—Chairman of the Toronto West District, 1897-9; Chairman of the Toronto Central District, 1900-2; President of the Toronto Conference in 1906, and Secretary of the Social Service Department, 1902-10. Dr. Chown has been a member of the Joint Committee on the question of Church Union since the beginning of negotiations. He has been an ardent advocate of the union of Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches of this country, and has frequently spoken in public in support of that proposal.

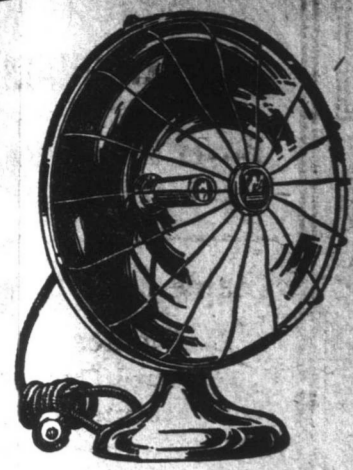

Turkish Peace Prospects Distinctly Improved.

British Troops Only Holding Neutral Zone -- Looting of Smyrna; Anarchy and Bloodshed in Greece Confronted With Food Problem.

PROSPECTS OF PEACE DISTINCTLY IMPROVED.

LONDON, Sept. 21. Prospects of a peaceful settlement of the Turkish question are regarded as distinctly improved tonight, and the special meetings of the Cabinet held chiefly with a view of feeding stores and transporting them to places of safety.

FRENCH AND ITALIAN DETACHMENTS WITHDRAWN. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 21. French and Italian detachments and garrisons were withdrawn to-day from the neutral zone of Ismid and the Dardanelles on orders of their respective governments. The lines are now held exclusively by British troops, supported by combined Atlantic and Mediterranean fleets. In the meantime the Remist vanguard is reported to have reached the neutral zone of the Dardanelles. The next few hours will show whether the Kemalists contemplate action.

ITALY WILL SUPPORT ROMANIA. ROME, Sept. 21. Italy officially informed Rumania to-day that she will not permit any action by Bulgaria which would change

of the Allied forces, has issued a communique in which he declares that responsibility for the consequence of violations of the neutral zone will fall upon the author of such violations.

WANT REFERENCE TO LEAGUE. GENEVA, Sept. 21.

All the British Dominions have declared by their representatives in the League of Nations, assembled here, to be favorable to submission of the Turkish-Greek affair to the League of Nations. Dominion delegates have sent a joint telegram to Prime Minister Lloyd George, urging submission of the question to the League, and it is declared among these representatives, that the Dominions will be disposed to retain their complete liberty of action if the British Government refuses to listen to their request.

GREECE OVERTHROWN WITH REFUGEES. ATHENS, Sept. 21.

With a thousand refugees arriving daily from Asia Minor and insufficient wheat supply at home, Greece is confronted with a food problem so grave that international help given quickly may alone save thousands from starvation. Already some two hundred thousand refugees are here, having been dumped unceremoniously on the Grecian shore or disembarked on the Islands of the Aegean where not only food, but water is missing. Some estimates place the number of refugees likely to be sent to Greece at five hundred thousand.

REPUBLICAN M.P. KILLED. LONDON, Sept. 21.

Deputy Devins of the Southern Irish Parliament and five other Republicans are reported to have been killed in a fight near Sligo on Wednesday night. The Nationalists lost one killed and two wounded.

GLASGOW UNEMPLOYED UGLY. GLASGOW, Sept. 21.

Thousands of unemployed made an ugly raid on the police here last night when they became enraged over the refusal of a theatre proprietor to allow them permission to hold a mass meeting in his building. The police intervened when violence was threatened and in clearing the crowds they were attacked by unemployed and one policeman was stabbed in the back seriously.

CARPENTIER TO FIGHT AGAIN. PARIS, Sept. 21.

A million francs in cash receipts will be received for the first time in the history of boxing when Georges Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe, meets the undefeated Senegalese, Battling Siki, at the New Buffalo Velodrome Sunday afternoon.

THE RIGHT OF SEARCH. WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.

Unless defendants take an appeal from the decision of the Court in Boston on Tuesday and permit a high tribunal to pass upon the claim of the United States prohibition navy to jurisdiction over the seas beyond the 3 mile limit, the British Government is expected here to take up the subject diplomatically with the State Department.

A CURIOUS DECISION. GENEVA, Sept. 21.

The Council of the League of Nations, decided to-day to increase the non-permanent membership in the Council from four to six. This will make a membership of ten with non-permanent members in the majority.

SIR MONTAGUE ALLAN'S TRIAL. MONTREAL, Sept. 21.

Sir H. Montague Allan, President of the defunct Merchants' Bank, who is accused by the Canadian Finance Department of signing a return to the Federal Government in connection with the Bank's standing for the month of October which contained a false statement, will be tried in Court on October 12th.

PRESIDENT SIGNS TARIFF BILL. WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.

President Harding to-day signed the Tariff Bill of 1922, making the new rates effective at midnight tonight.

FORD PLANTS RE-OPEN. DETROIT, Sept. 21.

The plants of the Ford Motor Car Company, in the Detroit district, that were closed last Saturday because of the coal situation, thereby throwing one hundred thousand Ford workers out of work, in different parts of the country, will re-open tomorrow morning, it was officially announced to-day.

INJUNCTION DECISION DEFERRED. CHICAGO, Sept. 21.

Judge James H. Wilkerson this afternoon deferred decision on the Government's Bill for a temporary injunction against the railroad strikers until Saturday and continued the restraining order now in effect until that time.

Forest Fire at Donovan's

The Jewish New Year.

On Saturday, September 23rd, the Jewish people of America in common with their brethren all over the world will celebrate in their respective synagogues to observe according to the traditions of their fathers, a solemn holiday, Rosh Hashanah, namely New Year. Among Orthodox Jews the second day of New Year is also observed. The Jewish New Year must not be confused with the secular new year since it is not a day to mark time but to record spiritual experiences. Its Biblical basis is found in Leviticus 23:24: "In the seventh month (that refers to the Hebrew Calendar) on the first day of the month shall be a solemn rest unto you, a memorial proclaimed with blasts of horns, a holy convocation."

In common with many Jewish holidays and ceremonials Rosh Hashanah has undergone a transformation that has given it a significance not shared today by the celebrations usually accorded the secular new year. At that time, amidst feasting and hilarity, a new year is hailed and the old year is rung out. The new year of the Synagog celebrates a solemn occasion to take judgement of one's self and obtain direction for guidance. More than all it is viewed as a Day of Judgement and so viewed in order that men and women surveying the achievements of the year and their own particular conduct may obtain sufficient incentive to amend their ways, and in a repentant mood project their souls along higher planes and to loftier altitudes.

The Day of Judgement is thus set by the religion of the Jew in life and not after man's departure from this mortal world. The day, given him by tradition to pass in review his deeds as recorded on the tablets of his soul, serves as a means of passing judgement on himself. Aware of his own failures and shortcomings he is in a mood to repent and to live and serve in larger measure and ampler ways.

The soundings of the Shofar, or trumpet, is associated in the minds of the worshippers with the thought of calling them to repent of their sins and improve their ways during the new year.

According to Jewish legend, New Year marks the Anniversary of the creation of the world. Following their legend this year will be the 5833rd year since the world was created. Of greater importance is the interpretation put upon this legend by the rabbis in whom it became the Anniversary of the birth of man. All mankind is thus endowed with a common birth right and hence the peculiar significance of Judaism for mankind is stressed on this day.

Among Orthodox Jews elaborate preparations have been made for this holiday and that of the Day of Atonement which falls five days later. During the four weeks previous, penitential prayers are recited and this ceremony continues until the eve of Yom Kippur.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

GREECE WILL NOT YIELD THRACE

ATHENS, Sept. 22.—Greece will never permit Thrace to invade her homeland, and the resolution of which is an essential preliminary condition to any peace conference. This declaration was made in a statement to the Associated Press by the Greek Foreign Office to-day. "We have lost Asia Minor, but we must keep Thrace," the statement said. "Our army in Asia Minor, which has been fighting for ten years is absolutely exhausted, but the Greek Nation will never permit Thrace to invade her territory. We have demobilized military classes 1912 to 1918, but citizens to 1922 are keeping on a war footing, making our total army one hundred and fifty thousand men, available for Thrace, should it fall into the hands of the Turks." Unhappily we lack ammunition, artillery and general equipment. The Smyrna massacre speaks for itself. Greece is a democracy. Internally Greece is quiet. There is absolutely no danger of a revolution. Foreign reports of disputes are the outgrowth of the insistence of our troops that they be returned, instead of being demobilized on the islands. But these weary men have no revolutionary designs; they only wanted to go home. We found that out when we sent our Athens army, as a precaution, to Thrace immediately after some returned soldiers exclaimed sadly, "what are you treating us as weary patriots as enemies?" Our King remains loyal to the people demanding him, and wanted him. By what right shall any foreign nation interfere with the expressed will of the Grecian people?

LABOR'S DEMAND.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—The attitude of the British Labour Party toward the Near Eastern situation is succinctly set forth in a cable message to Australia and New Zealand Laborites. "British Labor is opposed to any war in the Near East, and believes the only way of avoiding it is by reference of the dispute to the League of Nations, in which Turkey, Russia, and Germany should be included. We are strongly opposed to Great Britain acting unilaterally, and demand settlement by discussion and agreement."

NATIONALISTS SEIZE TOWN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 22.—Turkish Nationalists have seized the town Ezine on the Asiatic side of Dardanelles, and are threatening Kalest, important British position on southern side of Straits. Nationalists move, in the opinion of naval experts here, will enable the Turks to prevent free ingress to Dardanelles of British Atlantic fleet, units of which are on the way from Malta. Important positions invaded, were up to-day, occupied by French and Italians, and from them heavy Turkish batteries can command entrance to the Straits. Ezine is a small town in the valley of the Meander River, in Zigma District, south of Dardanelles, and less than twenty miles from Kum Kalest. The latest news, which Nationalists are threatening is on the waterway itself, aimed at the entrance to Straits from the Aegean. Both places are within the Zone of Neutrality laid down by the Treaty of Sevres, but it is uncertain from available data whether Ezine is within the Military Zone of Neutrality proclaimed in May, 1921. There would appear no doubt, however, that Kum Kalest is within the latter zone, against the invasion of which a warning was issued in Constantinople to-day by the British general, Harrington, Commander in Chief of Allied forces.

NEWFOUNDLANDER KILLED.

NORTH SYDNEY, Sept. 22.—Edward Fleming, 41, married, was found dead in his place in Jubilee Colliery, Sydney Mines, this morning at four o'clock. The column bar of the man's coal cutting machine lay across his abdomen. Medical opinion said he had the breath knocked out of him by the blow, and that the weight of the machine gradually suffocated him. It is supposed he was setting the machine to make a top cut and stumbled, causing it to fall on him. He was a native of Newfoundland and is survived by a wife and five young children.

Municipal Council.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Council Chamber. Mayor Cook presided, and Councillors Martin, O'Connell, Vincombe, Doherty, Ryan and Downen were present. After confirmation of minutes of previous meetings, the following business was given consideration.

Deputy Minister Finance Keating acknowledged receipt of cheques for \$22,292.36 and \$7,000.00 respectively, being payment of amounts due for interest City Debt and contribution towards upkeep of Fire Department on December 31st. Last, thereby liquidating the indebtedness left the present Board by their predecessors. A cheque was also forwarded the Treasurer Department during the past month for \$49,187.46, in payment of interest City Debt and contribution to Fire Department for the half year ending June 30th last.

Mr. C. J. Fox wrote in reference to the condition of Kenne's Hill, and asked that same be given attention. This road is already receiving the attention of the Council's Road Inspector.

Mr. N. W. Chown referred to the petition submitted by the residents of New Gower Street to the late Commissioner, asking for better lighting facilities, Lime Street. Same will be given attention by the Lighting Committee.

Mr. J. T. Nash asked that some repairs be made to Adelaide Street, north of New Gower Street. This street owing to the recent rainstorm, is practically torn up, and is dangerous to vehicular and pedestrian traffic. The Engineer will have same attended to.

Request of W. P. Caul, regarding alley fronting his premises, Flower Hill, asking that same be moved a few feet from its present position, was referred to the City Engineer.

Walter Gosse, Plymouth Road, again called attention to the inconvenience caused him, owing to persons being permitted to excavate for cellars and grow the gravel on sidewalks. The Engineer pointed out that the property was partly private and partly public. It was ordered that the persons responsible for blocking the sidewalk in this way be compelled to have the gravel carted away immediately.

M. W. Myrick, Military Road, wrote in reference to placing of concrete curb and gutter in front of his premises, and intimated that if the adjoining residents were approached they would very likely be willing to co-operate in improving this thoroughfare. It is decided to communicate with them.

During the past week, the Council held a special meeting in order to consider the petition received from the residents of the Battery Road district, and on Monday last visited the place in question to see what could be done to meet with the wishes of the petitioners. The placing of water and sewerage in the locality and the improvement of sanitary and road conditions would be such a costly undertaking as to be beyond the means of the Council, but they are prepared to do something, and the petition will be communicated with regarding same.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—A. H. Murray (extension for landing coal) Water Street; D. J. Pearce (dwelling) Golf Avenue; Church Lads' Brigade (extension to Armstrong Harvey Road); T. C. O'Connell (extension) York Street; Bert Hayward (extension to garage) Water Street, West, subject to the usual conditions.

Plan submitted by Mr. D. J. Pearce, to erect stable, Golf Avenue was deferred pending the report of the Health Officer.

The City Engineer reported on the work done in the City during the past week. He stated that twenty notices were examined and any necessary repairs effected; that the Reservoir, at corner of Cookstown Road, is being opened for examination, while the work of repairing Job's Bridge has been completed.

The widening of the Waterford Bridge Road, which was temporarily suspended during the past couple of weeks, will be resumed next week, and the road will be widened east of Mr. Conens property.

Health Officer Brehm reported two cases of Diphtheria and one of Scarlet Fever in the city for the week. It was brought to the notice of the Board that a number of owners of houses on Colonial and Patrick Streets have not installed sanitary appliances, although notified to do so. It was ordered that, as soon as the time allowed expires, legal proceedings are to be taken against the persons in question, and the Plumbing Inspector will be instructed to have this order put into effect.

Several routine matters were disposed of, accounts presented were entered paid.

There being no further business, the meeting then adjourned at 8 p. m.

Gave Libel Award to Charity.

LONDON.—The £2,000 damages awarded to Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, M. P., Parliamentary General Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, in his libel action against the National Labor Press, Limited, of Salford, for charging him, in the weekly journal, the Communist, with treachery to the miners during the coal strike in April, 1921, is being given to charity by Mr. Thomas. "I want to law simply and solely to vindicate my honor," he said in an interview recently. "I had not the slightest intention or inclination to benefit myself financially." Judgment for the £2,000 was given in February last, but Mr. Thomas did not receive the amount until August 4. A great portion of the money, Mr. Thomas said, would go to charities in his own constituency, Derby, the Royal Derbyshire Infirmary and the Mayor of Derby's fund for the provision of boots and clothes for poor children during the winter would benefit, he said. It was his intention also to send a substantial donation to the Railwaymen's Orphanage, and perhaps, to other charities associated with railwaymen.

Poor But Honest.

The news that A. S. M. Hutchinson's novel, "If Winter Comes," is to be produced on the screen by the famous Fox films reminds me of a story I heard the author tell about a friend of his who was once staying with a wealthy host.

When he went to his bedroom he found the dressing-table heaped with silver articles of toilet, and promptly bestowed them in a drawer to make room for his own humble belongings.

His visit ended, he left for home by an early morning train. Arrived home, he was greeted by a telegram from the wife of his host, demanding—

"What have you done with the silver?"

He wired the reply: "Poor but honest; look in the lower drawer."

Nfld's Place in the Sun.

The island colony to the northeast of Canada appeared in the news recently when the British cruiser Raleigh went ashore in the Straits of Belle Isle. Similarly, the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic Ocean, successfully carried out by British aviators, attracted attention to Newfoundland for a season. For the most part, however, the Newfoundlanders seem to pursue the peaceful tenor of their way without concerning themselves, or being of much concern to the world outside.

But Newfoundland's interests are tied up with the interests of other lands by common bonds. At the present time, the high tariff policy of the United States is calculated seriously to affect the fishing industry of Newfoundland, the main industry of the Colony. American tariff barriers are tending to interrupt the flow of trade; and as the Newfoundland fishermen find themselves discouraged from seeking access to the markets of the United States, they are inclined to look more across the Atlantic, to the markets of the United Kingdom and Europe. As the oldest British colony, loyal to the British connection, Newfoundland would naturally welcome a greater influx of British goods and capital, as well as more reliable markets for Newfoundland produce.

The possibility of federation with Canada has been mooted one more than on occasion. It is, indeed, almost a perennial question in Newfoundland politics. Canada is regarded as a big neighbour. Newfoundland is rich in undeveloped natural resources. It is believed by some political leaders that union with the Dominion would bring more capital to Newfoundland, to open up the untapped sources of mineral wealth, perhaps of coal, and the other enterprising communities like the industries associated with the name of Lord Northcliffe would soon be established on the Island. But colonial independence is strongly cherished on the Island. While the prospects of becoming a prosperous maritime province of the Dominion of Canada seem alluring, there is still much to be said for the policy of remaining an independent state under the British flag.

The necessity of keeping down the taxes in Newfoundland is stressed among other arguments against federation with Canada. The fear of higher taxes has tended likewise to withhold from Newfoundland a state educational policy. The need for a public school system, to unify the educational resources of the colony, is being impressed upon an increasing number of citizens of Newfoundland. In place of the present system of separate schools, maintained by the various church denominations and the Salvation Army, the opinion is growing that a common school system, state-controlled, would be a step toward establishing Newfoundland's

Death Watch Beetle Weakens Destruction.

WESTMINSTER HALL IN DANGER.

LONDON, Sept. — (By Canadian Press.)—Westminster Hall's famous roof, one of the architectural glories of the world, is being saved from imminent danger of collapse at a cost of over £100,000. The cause of the trouble is a tiny grub known scientifically as xestobium tessellatum, and popularly known as the death watch beetle. The roof has withstood time and the elements for over 400 years in an excellent state of preservation, but this pestiferous wood-boring grub through the centuries has been steadily eating the heart out of the timbers and perforating their outer surfaces with innumerable exit holes until they resemble gigantic pepper canisters. An extraordinary feature of the insects work is that while outwardly a timber may appear to be quite sound, the interior may be wholly eaten away. This is explained by the habit of the grub, which lives continuously in the wood until it has passed the chrysalis stage, and works to and fro in little tunnels. After three years it emerges

and prepares to take its nuptial flight, usually in May and June, which are the popular marriage months. In connection with the festination of the roof the first work has been to get rid of the devastating grub. This has proved a difficult task, as the use of any insecticide containing poison or chloroform would have seriously affected the members of the House of Commons during the sittings of the House. Finally a remedy which is regarded as equally effective has been procured, consisting of a mixture of benzine, Castile soap and cedar wood oil. With powerful air blasts the timbers have been cleaned of dust and the solution has been sprayed on the wood at a pressure of sixty pounds to the square inch. Every part has received at least two soakings.

Chemical Treatment Kills Grub.

Whether this treatment of the timbers is all that is needed fine alone will show. Experiments have proved that the female will not lay her eggs on wood so treated, and that the grub must die if it touches it. The lifetime of the grub in the wood is three years, and the solution will last longer than that. Periodical spraying may follow. The woodwork in the roof has been reinforced in such a manner as not to

detract from the original beauty and design thereof. Sir Frank Baines, Director of Works in his Majesty's Office of Works, has prepared the scheme and is responsible for carrying it out. The work has been going on since 1914, and it will be completed next Spring. The great historic Westminster Hall, which was the Royal residence until 1512, when it suffered greatly by fire, was built by King William II, surnamed Rufus by reason of his red complexion. He reigned from 1087 to 1100. The beautiful roof which is now undergoing repair was built in the 14th century. Westminster Hall, where the mortal remains of King Edward the Peacemaker lay in state before being conveyed to the tomb, is one of the most famous, in its tragic dignity, of the possessions of the realm. Within its walls have been such state trials as those of William Wallace, Sir Thomas Moore, Anne Boleyn, Somerset, Stafford, Charles I. and Warren Hastings. The preservation of such glorious a monument of England's "island story"—for all the many acts of injustice and the agonies of mental suffering that its walls have looked upon,—has been regarded as a sacred duty.

Fads and Fashions.

A cunning hat for a small miss is the shape of an overturned flower pot, with a crown of red leather and a narrow upturned brim of black velvet.

The Balkan blouse suit is sponsored for winter wear. One example in a rich red is embroidered in the same deep shade and collared with squirrel.

New French models are characterized by long notices joined at the hips to full, long skirts, or by draped, slender lines, which fit smoothly over the hips.

Some French frocks manage the waistline without belt or girde; dresses are either very loosely bloused at the waistline, or the fullness is gathered at either side.

On the street it's a snug little turned-up collar, but when the wearer is indoors its turns down into rows and rows of frilly net ruffles. The cuffs possess the same magic.

A dress striking in design and color is of violet crepe meteor embroidered in green and gold. Circular panels and an overjacket are both points of interest in the costume.

As though to deny the predominance of draped models, many straight frocks, trimmed oddly with fur, are being shown. They are designed to wear under the fur coat or the long coat trimmed with fur.

Even blouses are affected by the strong tendency toward drapery. From the left shoulder of a cream-colored crepe blouse hangs a graceful drapery, bound, like neckline and sleeves, with grosgrain ribbon.

Knocking Newfoundland

JAMES L. FAUNCE APPEALS FOR HELP FOR OUR STARVING (1) PEOPLE.

Who James L. Faunce is, none seem to know, but as a champion knocker of this country he is invincible. Here is a letter which he wrote recently to the Philadelphia Public Ledger with the captions used by that paper:

STARVING AND NO CLOTHING.

Picture of Sad Condition of Inhabitants of Newfoundland and Labrador and an Appeal for Their Aid.

To the Editor of the Public Ledger: Sir—The Baptist Temple people of this city have done wonders for the unfortunates of Newfoundland and Labrador, and I want to interest everybody in this great work for humanity. Many of the people are starving and they need clothing badly. Everybody who has cast-off clothing should send it either to the Baptist Temple or to the subscriber, at 900 Chestnut street, or to the Grenfell Association, 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

I want to give a few facts concerning Newfoundland and Labrador, basing what I shall say upon twenty-three consecutive summers and two winters lived there in part among the people. About wartime the cod trap was introduced, and in numerous cases men caught as many fish in a week as before in a month with line and trawl, or in some cases as many as in an entire summer, hence the fishermen sold their small boats and bought traps.

For the last two years the fish remained in the deep water, and these men find themselves with no boat to go where the fish are located, from ten to thirty miles from the shore.

The supply system which had been in vogue there for a century ordinarily would overcome this condition by having the merchant advance money with which to build boats and taking the catch of the next summer in payment; but this system ended with the war and no credit can be had. Generations have lived and died under this system, and when it suddenly was taken away these men were helpless.

As one man said to me: "What can I do? I must go or starve." Under these conditions, these people cannot buy clothing, as it is abnormally high; a pair of pants costing \$2 here is \$8 there; and a coat on a vessel showed me a suit for which he paid \$23 in New York and which he took to a tailor in St. John's to have duplicated, the price being duplication being \$28.

They possibly can get some little flour and such things as the country might furnish, such as fish, seal, birds and caribou; but clothing, never; hence this appeal for worn clothing to go to this sub-Arctic climate to men who are worthy and their families. At Flower's Cove this spring were sixty cases of beri-beri, which is a form of starvation; and the Rev. Mr. Richards told me the winter to come, looked worse than the one that has passed.

The matter of clothing is very serious, and it is no easy job even to give it away, as I have learned, for it must be done by those who know the people in order to avoid error. The clergymen are in the best position on that point, and are a very fine lot of men. You cannot leave the island under the law unless you have \$500.

Lightning's Laws.

HOW NOT TO GET STRUCK.

Thunderstorms may now be expected at any time, and people will put into practice all manner of theories to avoid being "struck" by lightning.

Now, lightning is electrical, and obeys the laws of electricity; thus it prefers a metal path to any other, which explains why lightning conductors are made of copper. That being so, it is absurd to put up an umbrella during a storm; the metal frame simply "asks for it."

Warm, moist air is a better conductor than cold air, so, in a thunderstorm, keep away from crowds of people and animals. Air in motion reduces the resistance to electricity; draughts, therefore, must be avoided and windows must be kept shut. The idea that an open window will let the lightning out is wrong; it is much more likely to let it in!

For the same reason, don't sit between the door and the fireplace; there's almost sure to be a draught there. Since the chimney is sooty, and soot is an excellent conductor of electricity, keep away from the fireplace.

If you are out in the open, don't run; running creates a draught that may be just enough to provide the path of least resistance that the lightning is looking for. If in an open space in which you are the tallest object, make yourself as small as possible; in other words, lie down!

You must shelter under a tree, select a beech, and avoid oak trees like poison; the chances of an oak being struck are fifty-seven times greater than those of a beech. Better still, keep away from trees, especially isolated ones.

But, after all, the chances of being injured by lightning are very remote; in London it works out at something like one in ten million.
