Tagged Salmon

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 11.—Thousands of baby salmon when they start life's cruise in future will carry identification tags for the benefit of science. Small metal discs will be attached to their tails, it was decided at a recent conference of Canadian and United States fishery experts held at Seattle.

British Columbia, Alaska, Washington, California and Oregon hatcheries will each place tags on ten or fifteen thousand little fishes before their release to seek their fortune in the ocean.

The object is to ascertain where they go and in this way determine the direction or "run" of the salmon. The experiment was tried successfully in Alaska and some of the salmon with identification tags were found in the runs along the British Columbia coast and one was caught among the fish going up a river in Siberia.

TRADE TREATY.
OTTAWA, April 27.—R. H. Ross, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Melbourne, who is now in Ottawa, is to leave for Australia to conduct negotiations in regard to the Canadian-Australian Trade Treaty. The treaty was announced by Premier King at the House of Commons to-day.

ARMSTRONG TO PROCEED.

QUEBEC HAS A CLAIM.
OTTAWA, April 27.—The Quebec Harbor Commission has put in a bill totalling \$5,122,109, representing a dollar a head with accrued interest for every immigrant landed in Quebec since 1880. The years 1823-24 and 1824-25 are deducted in the account. The accrued interest amounts to \$2,822,138.

C. N. R. LAYING OFF EMPLOYEES.
WINNIPEG, April 27.—Two hundred junior engineers, employed on trains operating out of Winnipeg, will be laid off permanently this spring, by the Canadian National Railway, it was learned officially here to-day. This action, it was stated, is the result of general business depression reflected in reduced traffic from local railway yards.

TO STABILIZE EXCHANGE.
WASHINGTON, April 27.—An arrangement by which the New York Federal Reserve Bank will buy pound sterling bills in the open market, at the request of the Bank of England, is looked upon by Secretary Mellon as a desirable means of stabilizing exchange, and likely to prove beneficial to the trade and commerce of both nations.

HINDENBURG'S ELECTION REGARDED AS A BLUNDER.
WASHINGTON, April 27.—While it has been realized by those who have been watching the progress of election closely that the German war hero was certain to pole a very heavy vote, few had been inclined to think he actually would be elected. As his triumph is certain to mean difficult period for Germany until it is clear just what change in the Government it means. There can be no question, despite official silence that has been maintained here with regard to the German election, that both the Government and diplomatic observers in Washington feel that election of Hindenburg is a blunder.

TO SERVE SECOND TERM.
OTTAWA, April 27.—It is understood on good authority that Baron Byng will be invited to serve a second term as Governor General of Canada. His term expires on July 19-26.

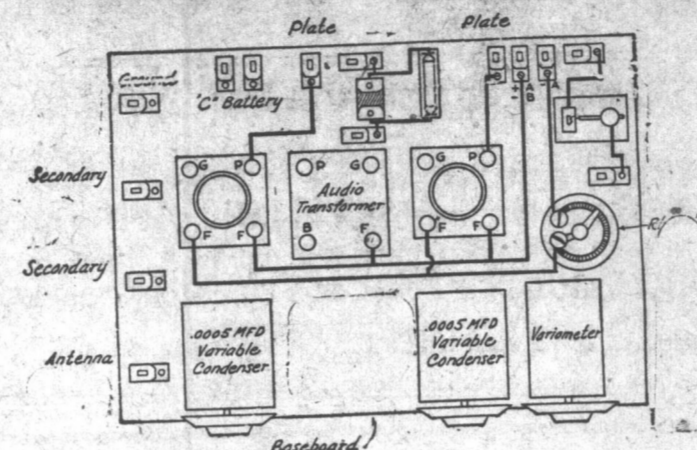
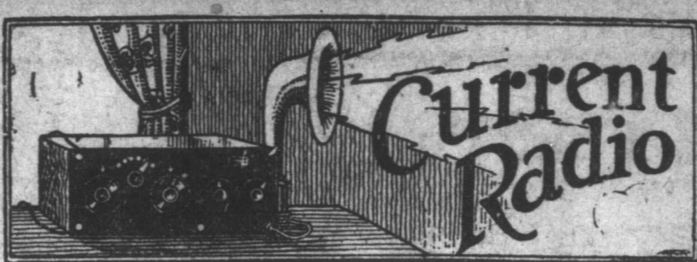
EARTH SHOCKS IN U. S. A.

French Govt. Monopolies
Revenue derived from the sale of matches and automatic lighters in France totalled 15,660,000 francs for the first two months of this year, showing an appreciable increase over revenue collected during the same period in 1924 which was then considered a record at 11,852,000 francs. The sale of tobacco, which is another Government monopoly, did not however, according to advices received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its French Information Service, produce quite as much revenue this year as during January and February 1924, the figures being respectively 301,926,000 francs and 322,301,000 francs.

OTTAWA, Ont.—(Can. Press)—Products of Canada's tobacco factories in 1923, are valued at \$59,840,010 in a return issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Of these Quebec factories made nearly fifty-four million dollars worth. Cigarettes were the most valued product, their value being \$23,964,031. Smoking tobacco is valued at over eighteen millions and cigars ten and a half millions. Cigarettes ran to \$872,585 and the sale of by-products made about \$180,000.

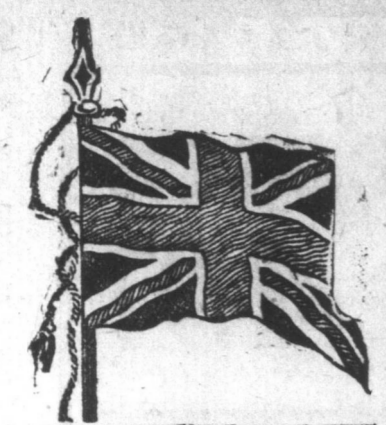

A Misrepresentation of Facts

We wish to call attention to the remarks made yesterday in the Legislative Council by the Hon. A. B. Morine with reference to an article which appeared on Friday last in the Globe and which gave an altogether wrong impression regarding recent legislation in connection with the survey and inspection of local vessels.

The statement made by the Globe was to the effect that the Bill had destroyed the work of generations, was to the disadvantage of Newfoundlanders who followed the sea, and tended to expose them to menaces previously avoided by an independent survey.

The Hon. A. B. Morine condemned in no uncertain manner this misstatement of facts, and pointed out the new measure was nothing more than a consolidation of all the amendments passed since 1916, and that no change of inspectorship had been made or was contemplated. He reminded the House of the care which had been taken in considering the matter to make every provision for the seaworthiness of vessels and to safeguard the lives of passengers and crews, and he was unable to understand the motive which prompted the writer of the article in question to give such a false impression of its merits.

Short Memories

Recently the Globe has assumed the attitude of moral mentor to the Government, and daily produces a long list of suggestions as to what should or should not be done. In one of these articles a few days ago the writer stated that frankly he was unable to recall any administration which had left the doors so wide open for abuses of the most objectionable kind. Apparently the Globe has overlooked very recent history, and in order to refresh its memory we wish frankly to recall certain instances wherein the open door policy was aided and abetted by those who were responsible under the Crown for seeing that they were kept closed. Evidence in a recent trial showed that the receptacle in

which the cash was kept was left wide open and that anyone who wished might help himself. What is more the money disappeared, thousands of dollars of the public funds and the manner of its going is still a mystery.

Another case tried some time previously showed that the doors of the General Post Office were left wide open to permit of abuses of the most objectionable kind, and it does not appear to be due to the supervision exercised that the offences were disclosed.

Again, under the system previously in vogue, the Controller's Department showed a shortage of thousands of dollars, and so wide were those doors left open that no trace can be found of the culprits who helped themselves or of their ill gotten gains.

In the sacred name of charity vast sums were squandered by the same administration, and as but a small portion of the relief ever reached those in urgent need it must be taken for granted that the public funds, finding the lid off the chest, grew wings and flew away.

Earl of Oxford

Connections having been completed from Deer Lake last week the current was turned on and the first trial of the machinery took place. A grinding machine was set in operation and everything worked most successfully.

President of the Council Deals With Bread Prices A Matter for an Enquiry.

Yesterday in the Legislative Council, the Hon. Sir P. T. McGrath, in referring to the increase in the price of bread, said he thought the increase in the price of flour had dropped from 8/6 to 5/6 a sack. He pointed out that 11d. or 22 cent bread meant 5 1/2 cents a pound for bread in Newfoundland, whereas the bakeries here were now proposing to charge 12 cents for the trade for a pound and a half or eight cents a pound and the dealers were charging another cent or two cents to the consumer, fourteen cents being charged. He was informed by some shopkeepers, he could say positively on the best authority that one of the three bakeries which had raised the price on the public now contacted with the Public Works Department to supply the same bread to the public institutions for 5 1/2 cents a pound, or say 6 cents.

Odd Fellows Celebrated 106th Anniversary

The 106th anniversary of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, was celebrated in fitting form last night in the presence of a large assemblage of members. The District Deputy Bro. P. G. Soper, with the Grand Officers and Suite were received with the honors of the Order after which the proceedings took the form of a ceremony provided by the Sovereign Grand Lodge and included a dialogue between the District Deputy, Bro. Soper and Vice-Grand Bro. P. G. White.

Circuit Court Returns

The Supreme Court on Circuit, in charge of Mr. Justice Kent, arrived from St. John's on Monday, April 27, at 10 o'clock last night. Included in the party were Deputy Registrar, Crier Cahill, Miss stenographer, besides Messrs. W. J. Browne, J. A. Barron and A. G. King, lawyers. The Court held four days' sittings at Harbor Grace and the following cases were tried:

Mrs. Howe vs. M. J. Kelly (Statement of Executor's Accounts).—Evidence in this case was heard following adjournment at St. John's. Mr. Browne for plaintiff, Mr. Browne for defendant.

The King vs. Reuben Gessle.—This case was heard before a special jury charged with the larceny of fishing property at Dark Tickle, Labrador, last year, consisting of 3,000 feet of lumber, 4 grapnels, 4 wheelbarrows, 1 kedge anchor, trap kags, trap buoys and other smaller fishing property.

Mary Condon Stevenson vs. Samuel Stevenson, Administrator.—Mr. King for plaintiff, Mr. Browne for defendant. The Court ordered, upon suggestion of Mr. King, that the administrator be appointed manager of the property upon condition that he support the plaintiff and her son from the property. This was agreed to by Mr. Browne and so ordered.

Wm. Gessle vs. Samuel Gessle.—This was an action taken by plaintiff for the support of defendant's son, who has deserted his wife and child. Mr. King for plaintiff, Mr. Browne for defendant. The defendant's wife was called and swears to complaint of desertion. After proof of desertion and non-support, Mr. King moved that the property of defendant, or as much as would be necessary, be appropriated for the maintenance and support of the wife and children of defendant. The wife of the defendant was appointed manager with the full control of the property with power to sell from time to time, and to render account of sales if necessary to the court.

Fishery Reports

Sub-Collector W. J. Bragg, in his report to the Board of Trade, dated April 18, states that from Channel to Port aux Basques, 1361 qts. of fish had been landed. The average catch per day per boat amounted to five quintals. Herring bait was plentiful.

MAGISTRATE'S COURT

A man taken in for safe-keeping was discharged. A few civil cases were disposed of.

TERRA NOVA'S CARGO

Up to 10 o'clock this morning the Terra Nova had landed roughly 10,000 young and old seals. The work of discharging is not expected to be finished before tomorrow.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

BERNIE DENIES QUESTIONING PEARY'S SUCCESS. QUEBEC, April 27. An emphatic denial of the reports accredited to him that the late Rear Admiral Peary of the United States Navy had never discovered the North Pole was made by Captain J. E. Bernier here to-night. Bernier stated "I never made the statement that Peary did not discover the North Pole, and I expressed the hope that Amundsen should be the first to reach the Pole, because he deserved it."

HINDENBURG'S ELECTION CAUSES NO REACTION.

BERLIN, Apr. 27. The election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg has up to the present failed to produce any untoward reaction in the popular mind, and editorial comments in the organs of both political groups also reveal a desire to avoid partisan recriminations. As President-elect, Von Hindenburg enjoys the benefit of the "law for the defence of the Republic," and this automatically brings a cessation of political hostilities so far as he personally is concerned.

FRENCH VIEW OF THE ELECTION.

LONDON, Apr. 27. The election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the German presidency is regrettable, but is no catastrophe, in the opinion of various European countries except France, where the German people by electing the Field Marshal are held to have thrown off the mask and issued a challenge to France and the Allies. The Paris press appears to believe that not much separates Von Hindenburg and the monarchic militarists.

U.S. FREIGHTER AND GERMAN SHIP IN COLLISION.

ANTWERP, April 28. The United States Shipping Board freighter Innko was in collision with the German motor ship Isis, near here to-day. The despatch to Lloyd's agent says the Innko with a 17 foot hole in her number one hold has been beached to prevent her sinking, and that the Isis is making water. The Innko is a vessel of 4,045 tonnage.

WAITING ON CHURCHILL'S SPEECH

LONDON, April 28. The two thousand guineas race at Newmarket to-morrow and every other topic of conversation went by the Board to-day while the people of the Old Country awaited Winston Churchill's presentation to the House of Commons of his first budget as Chancellor of the exchequer.

A STRIKE BY WAY OF PROTEST.

BERLIN, April 28. The Communist organ Tot Fahn (red flag) publishes an open letter to the Trade Union and Socialist Executive urging a twenty-four hour strike on the day of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's entry into Berlin to assume the Presidency, to which he was elected Sunday.

MARSHAL FOCH'S REPORT TO-MORROW.

PARIS, April 28. The Allied Council of Ambassadors at its meeting to-morrow will, it is understood, give Marshal Foch's report on Germany's violation of the Versailles Treaty quick scrutiny, and will then await the further study of the situation by Chancellors of the various interested powers before taking action.

This tremendous loan of fixed charges constitutes one of the reasons why the financial outlook of the National Railways continues to be so depressing.

It would seem to be only fair that the Government should deduct from the total on which fixed charges have been paid the amount of \$6,400 per mile for each of the lines built under a guarantee and not under a subsidy.

It was one of the points brought out by Dr. J. W. Bridges, Associate Professor of Psychology at McGill, and Director of the Research Committee of the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene, when he addressed the members of the Kiwanis Club on "Problems of Mental Hygiene" at the Windsor Hotel.

It was to the children of the world that those interested in mental hygiene were turning their attention, said Dr. Bridges in his address.

AMERICAN SUGAR.

Centrals Cunagua and Jarona Leading All Cuban Mills in Production. N.Y.—Earl D. Babst, president of American Sugar Refining Co., on his return from his annual Cuban trip, said: "In four months Centrals Cunagua and Jarona have produced 1,000,000 bags of Cuban raw sugar. We believe this is a world record even counting our four cane mills against six cane mills of two other mills operating the first four months of a crop. This means 140,000 tons of raw sugar, or 50% more from these two plantations in four months than from the entire last crop of the State of Louisiana and its 100 factories, or about one-third the entire last crop of Porto Rico from its 40 factories, or about one-sixth the entire last crop of beet sugar from 90 factories throughout the United States.

"This record is a great tribute to Antonio G. Mendoza and to his Cuban agricultural and manufacturing organization especially when it is recalled that the first axe went into this tropical forest at Cunagua only eight years ago and at Jarona only five years ago and at that uninhabited wilderness to-day 180 square miles are grown with cane.

"It has meant efficient organization by the colonos to get 1,300,000 tons of cane making a total of 350,000 cwt. loads hauled by 12,000 oxen to the plantation railroad, which is a standard gauge railway system of only 175 miles and which hauls these 60,000 car loads of cane to the mills. About 12,000 men were at work in the fields and about 1,300 at the factories whose bateyes or factory towns are undoubtedly the most complete and beautiful working quarters in the world.

"This raw sugar will be moved to the United States in our own ships and will make about 35 cargoes of sugar to be refined into about 900,000 barrels of refined sugar or enough to sweeten the country about ten days. "Both Cunagua and Jarona at the end of March were leading all mills in Cuba in production and will finish their crop early and very close to the original estimate of 1,200,000 barrels.

SUBMARINE BOAT.

Basis Of Patent Settlement With Germany \$40,000 A Boat On 44 Boats. N.Y.—Pres. Carse of Submarine Boat Co., referring to claims against the German government for infringement of patents, said cases which apply to 440 German boats are still undecided. Basis of settlement is \$40,000 a boat, which was the amount allowed by our government for release of our patents on cost-plus basis.

He also stated that the company's Port Newark properties were being consistently developed. This property is leased by the company at annual rental of \$50,000. Company also has an option regarding purchase. Speaking of Submarine Boat's fleet of 32 cargo vessels, President Carse said: "Northbound trips made by our Gulf fleet are paying well. Our international business is very satisfactory. We have been taking sugar from Cuba to Vancouver and lumber from that port to Newark as a satisfactory basis. We have received shipments of cast iron pipe, averaging about 25,000 tons from our Gulf ports. "Three ships which we chartered have been taken at very good rates. Electric boats are going well at better prices, and this is all commercial business."

ANNUAL BOSTON MARATHON. Mellon Beats Out DeMar By 100 Yds. (By BOB WHITE, Boston Post Staff).

BOSTON, April 26.—The leading long distance runners of the United States, Canada and other great athletic nations of the world gathered here to-day for the 29th annual Boston A.A. Marathon.

MacAulay Going Well. MacAulay at South Framingham was third, closely following Schou Christensen, of Chicago, and DeMar.

At Natick MacAulay was still in third position, but DeMar had taken first position from Christensen, the latter falling behind and Mellor, the winner, creeping up to second place.

Wesley, the next checking station, saw MacAulay advance up a place and pressing DeMar for the lead. The time was a second and a fraction over that of last year.

The spurt probably marked MacAulay's finish, however, for within the next ten minutes three men had passed him, leaving the Canadian in fourth position.

The winners were all pretty well up in front at this point, with the exception of Frank Zuna, who was still far behind, but running strong.

MacAulay fell behind slowly from here to the finish and three men passed him, leaving him in seventh place.

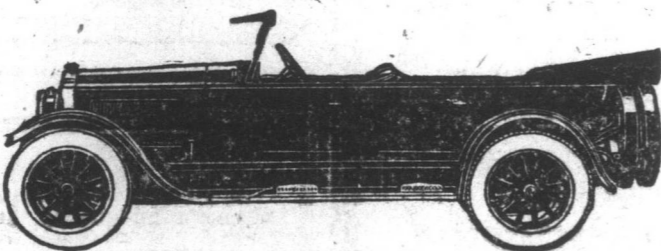

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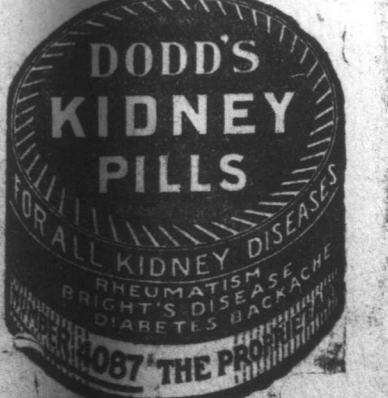


