Hon. Mr. Mackenzie moved; —
"That the said resolutions be not now read the second time, but that they be recommitted to a Committee of the Whole, with instructions to provide that all proposed contracts before being entered upon, shall be submitted to, and receive the approval of Parliament,—and to expunge that portion which authorizes the Governor in Council to charter a Company to construct this Raisway, without the sanction of Parliament."

PARLIAMENTARY CONTROL ABDICATED.

On June 1st, upon the motion to read the Bill a third time, Hon. Mr. Wood moved in amendment:

"That the said Bill be referred back forthwith to the Committee of the Whole in order to amend the same, so that so large a sum as \$30,000,000 of money, and so large a quantity of land as \$50,000,000 of acres shall not be at the disposition of the will of the Government of the day; and that the said money and lands shall only be disposed of by specific annual votes of Parliament from time to time given, as shall seem to Parliament right and proper, so that Parliament shall not be divested of its most important constitutional function, namely: control over the the public expenditure of the country."

country."
This was defeated by Yeas 33, Nays 100; and among the latter was Mr. Drew. A few months ago the late Government of Ontario usurped the functions of Parliament to the tune of 1,500,0:0 dollars, but what was that to 30,000,000 of dollars and fifty million acres of land. Ontario punished the little usurpation and will do her part towards exacting justice in the greater one.

CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS Hon. Mr. Dorion moved, and Hon Mr. Holton seconded:—

"That the bill be now re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of amending the same by providing that all contested Elections shall be tried and decided by Courts of Justice as local Elections in Ontario and New Brunswick, and Municipal Elections in the Province of Quebec, are tried."

This was defeated by Yeas 50, Nays 80; and among the latter was Mr. Drew. This measure had been adopted unanimously in the Local Assembly, and it has given entire satisfaction to the country in its operations, and when we mention that such men as John Hillyard Cameron and the Hon. Mr. Irving, Attorney-General of Quebec, both strong supporters of the Government, voted and spoke in favour of the principle last session, we can easily understand that Mr. Drew's only motive in voting as he did was to prevent an honest enquiry into the election frauds of his own Riding and others.

THE TUPPER-MCNAB SCANDAL. kenzie, seconded by Hon. Mr. Dorion

moved:—

"That it appears from the statement mrde to this House by the Hon. Charles Tupper, C.B., President of the Council, that on the 31st day of March last, a bill was depending in the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia for the disfranchisement of Dominion Officials at Nova Scotia Elections, and that the vote of the Hon. James McNab, a member of the said Council was material to the decision of the Bill, and that the said Hon. Charles Tupper was desirous that the Bill should be defeated; and that on the said day he received a Telegram from Halifax, as follows:—'Hon. Mr. McNab votes to-day for Disfranchising Bill. Can you guarantee Peter an Office, if his father is put right, A. Wickwire;—to which he replies as follows:—'Your Telegram received. Anything Hill engages to do, I will carry out.—Charles Tupper.' And that in pursuance of the said Telegrams in order to secure the vote of the said Hon. James McNab, an Office in the Dominion Service was offered to the said Peter McNab a son of the said James McNab.

"That in the opinion of this House the

"That in the opinion of this House the conduct of the Hon. Charles Tupper in proposing so to exercise the patronage of the Dominion Government, as to influence the action of the Local Legislature of Nova Scotia, was a flagrant violation of the laws of public morality, and calculated, if unrebuked by Parliament, to inflict deep disgrace on the country and its institutions."
