Vancouver, June 21.—Prince Fushimi was met at the station by the mayor and civic officials, and lined with a number of prominent persons at the Hotel Vancouver. In the afternoon he was driven around Stanley Park and shown the sawmills, showing great interest in the manufacture of lumber. The city was decorated and in the evening illuminated. The Japanese organized a monster parade and a fireworks display on the Inlet. The Prince leaves for Victoria at 1:30 tomorrow.

The telegram says as follows: "Prince Fushimi desires me to inform you of his visit to Winnipeg and of the enthusiastic reception there afforded him by Imperial Highness. ## APARTMENT HOUSE FOR VICTORIA IS ASSURED

Promoters Meeting With Success  
 In Floating Stock of the Company

The organization of the company having the new apartment house in hand is proceeding apace. There have been many applications for stock and the success of the enterprise is assured. The provisional board of directors is composed of the following: Joshua Klugman, W. H. Parsons, H. A. Bulwer, J. A. Hinton, and S. Johns. The plans for the new building have been prepared by F. M. Eastenbury and present a very attractive appearance. The building will occupy a space about 120 feet square and will be surrounded by well laid out gardens and tennis courts. There will be in all about sixty-five suites of rooms in the building, running from one large room and a bath to five rooms and a bath.

Never has the need for such an enterprise been so felt as at the present time. People desirous of obtaining accommodation for a small family have been unable to secure dwellings suitable. The supply of the smaller class of houses is about exhausted. Recently applications have been received by the provincial government, the mayor and the secretary of the tourist association for assistance in obtaining accommodation of this kind but all have been unable to do much for the applicants. Furnished flats will meet the needs of the many visitors from the east and middle west who come here with the intention of spending a number of months but who do not care to remain the entire time in a boarding house or hotel.

According to the plans which appear on another page, the building will present an attractive appearance, the face of the walls being broken frequently by bow windows. A covered colonnade with a broad flight of steps leading up to it forms the entrance.

## WILL NOT SEND FRUIT TO THE SUMMER FAIRS

Provincial Government Will Leave This to Enterprise of Districts

The provincial government has decided that the summer fairs held in Winnipeg and other central points of the prairie provinces do not this year afford an advantageous opportunity for an exhibition of British Columbia fruit, and, therefore, no exhibits will be officially sent. The reason for this is the lateness of the season, which has prevented the fruit from maturing as early as usual, with the result that the dates of these fairs are too early for plums, pears, peaches and apples, which means that cherries are the only ripe fruit with which to make a display indicative of what can be done in British Columbia soil.

This province will, however, be represented at the summer fairs, the districts of Victoria and Kootenay having undertaken to furnish exhibits of their own accounts. The provincial government will reserve its energy for the fall fairs when the most creditable exhibits procurable will be collected and shown to the best advantage.

Will Reside Here  
 John Dilworth, a ranch owner in the Kelowna district, who recently purchased some valuable farm property at Gordon Head, and a home in Victoria returned to the city Friday evening, accompanied by his son, prepared to take up his permanent residence here. Mr. Dilworth retains considerable interest in Kelowna, and will visit that district occasionally.

## HAS DIFFERENT TALE TO TELL OF TROUBLE

Prisoner in Greek Assault Case Says He Was the Victim

With his head bandaged, and a slightly sort of smile coming and going over his pale face, V. Steenestere, the Greek fruit and candy merchant, who on Thursday night was felled to the floor of the Regent Saloon by a blow with a cudgel, was the most conspicuous figure in the prisoner's dock in Magistrate Hall's court Friday morning.

B. Marmas, also a Greek, the man who inflicted the punishment, sat outside the dock and looked the part of a hero eager for an opportunity to appear in the limelight.

There was an unusually large gathering in the auditorium of the court room, but deferred entertainment was its only reward. Neither the accused or his accuser were represented by counsel and the limitations of their knowledge of English made it impossible for the chief justice to shape a case for presentation to the court. Both parties were advised to secure counsel and to agree on an interpreter in order that the trial might be proceeded with this morning.

The charge against the prisoner is "threatening to do previous bodily harm," and two ugly looking knives with which Marmas alleges that the threat was made, were on exhibition in the court room.

It is understood that the prisoner has a story of the trouble to tell which differs materially from that furnished the police by the complainant, and published in the Colonist yesterday morning.

The man with several vowels in his surname lays claim to being a peaceable citizen who is harassed continually by certain of his fellows who have a grudge against him. He says that while he was drinking in the Regent barroom he was assaulted by Marmas without provocation, that he went to his store and returned armed with a knife, in order that he might protect himself against further assault. He had only one knife. He merely showed this to Marmas as a warning not to attack him again, making no attempt to use it.

The display had a quieting effect on Marmas till Steenestere turned to leave the place, and then the cudgel was thrown and the damage done. The police will endeavor to have a couple of independent witnesses present when the case is called this morning.

**SUPPOSED SUICIDE CAUSES EXCITEMENT**  
 Drunk Disorbs at Water's Edge, Giving Rise to Wild Rumors

A suicide mystery disturbed the police for a considerable time early Saturday morning. Firstly a constable reported that a man had been seen rushing madly toward the harbor in a boat on the inner harbor without hat or coat. Secondly a pair of trousers were found at the edge of the wharf, turned as though removed hurriedly.

"Suicide," said the constable and he telephoned for assistance. With drag nets, ropes and appliances to drag the harbor the constables descended upon the wharf. Near the Burns house a pair of suspenders were found, and a note attached to the neck of the trousers. "Was there any note left on the edge of the wharf?" asked another constable.

"Let's search the pockets," said another. They did and found some letters. The residence of the gentleman was visited. He had not been there. His bed remained undisturbed and it was morning.

Surely it's a case for the coroner, thought the constables.

Ultimately the mystery was solved. It seems that the owner of the suit of clothes which were scattered as schoolboy throws the trail in a paper chase, was passing the Hudson's Bay before the sun rose. He was found in a down town hotel sleeping off the effects of the glass which he had drunk. But he was unable to get back home until the constables delivered the clothes they found.

## BUILDING OPERATIONS ARE NOW BEING RUSHED

Most of Work in Progress is Outside the Fire Limits

Building operations are being rushed at the present time throughout the city, the greatest volume of business being done outside the fire limits. The system of registration by which only those who are doing work within the limits which comprise the business district of Victoria, are compelled to lodge copies of their plans with the city assessor and obtain permits, does not apply to the numerous buildings which are being erected in the outlying districts.

A gentleman remarked to a Colonist reporter: "People who pay attention to the building permit figures are somewhat misled as to the amount which is going on in this city as compared with other centres in Canada. There are thousands of dollars whereas those of Victoria for the past year did not amount to three-quarters of a million. The difference arises because in all cities of the west and middle west and in Vancouver, a permit has to be obtained for nearly every piece of building done within the city limits. These permit fees are added to the building permit fees for the additions and new structures in the congested business section of the city, where, with the exception of one or two buildings, there has been little activity, amounting in 1906 to \$623,000. This did not take into account the hundreds of smaller buildings which went up outside the comparatively congested area comprised by the fire limits."

The average cost of the ordinary two storey residence in the neighborhood of \$2,000. The local contractors have been busy all spring on houses of this description, while the architects of the city are pressed for time to prepare the plans demanded. Were these to be included in the list of building permits, it is probable that they would occupy a different position with relation to the other classes of the Dominion. Arthur V. Kenah, late of London, England, has arrived in the city and will take up residence here. Mr. Kenah, who is a son of Rev. Samuel Kenah, M. A., B. N., who lately retired from active service when senior chaplain and naval instructor of the British navy, is a chartered accountant by profession. He contemplates practicing his profession here as Victoria in his estimation is one of the most beautiful spots in the entire world, and has a great commercial future before it.

Mr. Kenah has not to rely on his own opinion alone, for his father, who visited Canada during the years of his service, entertained the same opinion. Mr. Kenah is for the present visiting Mr. and Mrs. Beresford Hogg, Mrs. Hogg, a cousin of Lord Charles Beresford, and her son traveled with him to join her husband who has spent the last eight months in this city.

Mr. Kenah practised his profession for a number of years in London, the continent having visited most of the continental cities. He speaks French, German and Russian and is an authority upon amateur photography, many of his treatises and articles upon the latter subject being appended in the photographic journals of Great Britain and America. It was his knowledge of the latter which helped to secure him one of the best positions he has held, that of auditing and executing trade control of the British and foreign branches of the Kodak company.

## FINED FOR SPEEDING AUTO ON STREET

Driver Attains Speed of Forty Miles an Hour and Pays Fifteen Dollars

Four hundred yards in 20 seconds, a rate of a mile in one minute and 28 seconds, or forty and ten-elevenths miles an hour, is the registered speed at which H. Palmer, on the evening of Wednesday last, drove his motor car along Fort Street.

The timekeeper was a policeman, and he declared in court Friday morning that he held his watch faithfully to the fraction of a second and afterwards accurately measured the distance covered in the time mentioned. He was prepared to make his statement under oath, but this was not required of him. The speeder who was before the magistrate on a charge of violating the Motor Vehicles Speed Regulation act, which allows for only ten miles an hour, pleaded guilty. The messenger of the garage, to which the automobile belongs, was present in court, and said that he had traveled faster than was permissible, he could not have driven his car at the rate recorded by the constable as it had a limit of thirty miles an hour.

Chief Langley said he was riding his bicycle along Fort street on the evening in question. He was going at a rate of about six miles an hour when Palmer, in his automobile, flew past him. He had no means of registering the speed of the automobile, but he knew that it went more than three blocks in the time that it took him to go one, and after he had been passed he had increased his own speed to a rate of about eight miles an hour. The chief was not satisfied with the garage manager's assurance that Palmer was a careful driver. He said he had noticed him on other occasions, and had seen him making curves on the street when there was no necessity for it.

"Asked if he had anything to say for himself the accused said he knew he had done wrong, but he wanted to test his speed."

Magistrate Hall remarked on the danger of such speed as Palmer had made, and said he was not only endangering the lives of pedestrians but also his own, and if it was necessary, in testing a car, to drive it faster than in future he would select some less dangerous place than Fort street. He fined Palmer \$15.

Where Strawberries Thrive

An accompanying cut is from a most excellent photographic view of a field of strawberries in the Gordon Head district, where the soil conditions are especially favorable to their growth.

Peaches grow to perfection in all the valleys south of the main line of the C. P. R. and as this fact becomes generally known more attention will be given to their cultivation.

Grape culture on a commercial basis can scarcely be said to be established in the province, but wherever their cultivation has been tried, in the southern districts it has proved successful.

Grower A delivered from 1-1-2 acres strawberries 12,596 pounds, for which he obtained \$1,965.10, less 10 per cent for marketing—or over \$390 per acre—this crop was harvested from one, two and three year old vines.

Grower B delivered from three and four acres one, two and three year old vines, 23,128 pounds for which he obtained \$3,287, less 10 per cent for marketing, or at the rate of over \$700 per acre.

For other small fruits the lands are equally suitable, such as blackberries, raspberries, gooseberries, loganberries, wineberries, currants of all kinds.

If, in addition to the strawberries, mulberry trees are planted on an acre of a ten-acre tract, or five acres, the prunes planted twenty feet apart, will give us, discarding fractions, 100 trees per acre, or 500 trees for five acres.

At the end of the first year of growth the trees should not be less than 25 per cent each, which sum will repay cost and planting of the trees.

British Columbia fruit is preferred abroad in the markets of the Middle West, where it commands profitable prices. The exhibits sent to Paris in 1904, under the direction of the provincial government have won the highest honors from all competitors.

The fruit industry of British Columbia is as yet only in its infancy, but the results so far secured are convincing as to its future importance.

The actual extent of fruit-growing land has not been ascertained, but by conservative estimates at least a million acres south of the 52nd degree will produce all the fruit of the temperate zone.

Let me add that Alfonso's aunt, the Infanta Isabella, celebrated as the most skilled four-in-hand whip of the peninsula, has on two occasions been subjected to an experience very similar to that which has now fallen to the share of Don Carlos. She was Princess of Asturias and heir apparent during the six years that intervened between her own birth in 1851, as the eldest child of Queen Isabella, and the appearance on the scene of her only brother, Alfonso XII, in 1857. Again, after his establishment on the throne in 1874 she ranked as Princess of Asturias until the birth of his eldest child, in 1880, compelled her to surrender the dignity to her little niece, the late Dona Mercedes.

A Crown that is Not Wanted. On the other hand, the working of Fate are sometimes hailed with delight by the very people who the general public regard as victims of its caprice. Grand Duke Michael, the only surviving brother of the present Emperor of Russia, is known to have been perfectly sincere in his joy when just three years ago the long awaited birth of Cesarevitch Alexis relieved him of the obligations of heir to the Crown.

Queen Alexandra is more favored than any other consort who ever shared the British throne. She is the only lady member of the most exalted order of English chivalry—a degree of "Lady of the Garter" being especially created for her. A new verse has been added to the National Anthem in her honor. She can ride by the side of her royal husband in the great coach of state, which no Queen consort of England has ever done before. In fact, in honor of his beautiful Queen, Edward VII. has had precedents to latter.

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Her Majesty has, of course, her own household, quite separate from that of the King. It comprises a Lord Chamberlain (Lord Cobham, of Caicos), a Secretary (Earl of Gosford), a Treasurer (Earl de Grey), and Private Secretary (Hon. Sidney Greaves), among the gentlemen. The ladies of the household include a Mistress of the Robes (the Duchess of Buccleuch), five Ladies of the Bed-chamber, four Bedchamber women, and four maids of Honor.

In common with the King, the Queen enjoys the privilege of riding in a numberless motor-car. Not long ago an officious country policeman stopped the royal motor because it bore no number-plate. On learning whom he had held up, he was ready to faint with confusion, but the Queen reassured him and drove off smiling.

It is high treason to plot against the Queen's life while His Majesty is alive, though it would cease to be so after the demise of the King. Should Queen Alexandra survive his present Majesty, an annuity of \$350,000 will be hers, on which to keep up the state and dignity proper to a queen-dowager. It is interesting to know that though the Queen is a subject of her Majesty, it is necessary to secure the re-marriage of a queen-dowager.

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pointment when the birth of the ill-fated Prince Imperial in 1857 at Paris robbed him of the rank of heir apparent to the throne of France, which he had enjoyed as long as the marriage of his cousin, Napoleon III, and Empress Eugenie, had remained without issue. Firmly convinced that their union would be childless, he had grown accustomed to regard himself as destined to inherit the crown, and had already mapped out the policy which he intended to pursue when invested with the reins of power. The birth of the Prince Imperial meant to him the destruction of the hopes and plans, and the ambitions of a lifetime, and so strong were his feelings on the subject that he found it quite impossible to conceal his intense chagrin. Few persons are aware of the fact that at the time of the accession of Queen Victoria, in 1837, this same Prince Napoleon stood fifth in the line of succession to the throne of England through his mother, Princess Caroline of Wurtemberg, who was a descendant of King George II. of England. As a Roman Catholic, Prince Napoleon would of course have been barred from the British crown. But he was so indifferent to matters of religion that it is doubtful whether he would have hesitated one minute about becoming a convert to Protestantism to secure the throne of Great Britain.

An Unlucky Heir-Apparent. Prince Emmanuel, Duke of Aosta, has been subjected to an even sadder disappointment than the late Prince Napoleon, for after enjoying for a time the rank and prerogatives of heir apparent, not only to the throne of Italy, but also the crown of Spain,

he has been obliged to surrender them. From 1870 to 1873, when his father, younger brother of King Humbert, reigned at Madrid as Amadeus I, the Duke of Aosta bore, as heir to the Spanish crown, the title of Prince of Asturias. This, however, he forfeited through his father's abdication and return to Italy. On the assassination of his uncle, King Humbert, at Monza in 1900, the Duke of Aosta became once more an heir apparent, this time to the crown of Italy, the marriage of the present sovereign, King Victor Emmanuel III, and his wife, Queen Helena presented her husband with a son, who bears the title of Prince of Piedmont, and whose birth entirely changed the status of the Duke of Aosta, depriving him of his prerogative as next to the King in the line of succession. It is a tribute to his character that the Duke has borne of circumstance set-back with apparent equanimity.

"THE LITTLE CITIZENS"

Nearly a Queen. After the death of the Duke of Clarence, and until the birth of the eldest son of the present Prince of Wales, the Duchess of Fife, Princess Royal, occupied so high a place in the line of succession to the throne of England that the prospects of her becoming Queen Regnant were seriously considered. The Princess Royal is a hater of the pomp and glamor of court life, and it may safely be asserted that there is nothing which could possibly appal her more than the prospect of being compelled to take her place on the throne of Great Britain.
