During the last few months, however, the Canadian route has had a great deal of attention directed to it and a Stoadily increasing patronage.

Mercantile men who have been importing via Halifax, Quebec and Montreal, are highly satisfied with the freight service. From investigation The World finds that goods brought by the Canadian route in summer can be laid down in Toronto-from Liverpoel in 10 or 11 days, while by the New York route it takes 13 or 14 days. In the winter, when goods are landed at Halifax and come upover the Intercolonial and connections it takes 18 days, or about the same time as via the New York route. The Here is another point: It will be found at the end of the season that goods on Beimported by the Canadian route two shillings and six pence a ton cheaper than by the New York routes. The World will venture to say that such is the experience of importers who have patronized both routes year in and year out.





"Then," ventured the reporter, "if the telephone, wires are put underground the rates will be increased?"

"I won't say, but you may draw your own conclusions. Some one has got to pay for it. The wires are on the streets because the people want the convenience and you can't confiscate peoperty that is standing in the streets and is of no value anywhere else. And you may be quite certain that when the old Montreal telegraph lines that have been on the streets for forty years, and the old Dominion lines are removed, some mighty good reasons will have to be presented to Pariament. Anyway, you may bet, the wires will not go underground for some months."

"Do you know of any system of underground wires that is working astafactorily?"

"No, I do not. Wires will not work as well underground as suspended in the air. There is what we call retardation on account of their close proximity to the earth. When I say that it would be impossible to speak over an underground wires one hundred miles long, you can understand that the retardation, or muffling, would be very considerable even for a short distance; it would, in fact, make a difference in the efficiency of the city's system of at least 25 per cent. Then there is the city's own electric alarm system. Why does not the city put it underground? And there is the police patrol system, and with reference to this, our contract with the city is void just as soon as the wires have to go underground, and then the city will be without its pasteol service. Oh! there are many things that enter into the consideration of this question that the public and the papers do not recognize."

Anyway aerial wires preferable. I have not known of any underground system that works as well as the aerial wires. The Philadelphia scheme may be successful if the pipes can be kept dry and arrangements for quick repairs can be made. Another thing is, that when wires are put in cables there is a sympathy between one wire and another caused by induction; this is very noticeable the aerial wires and must be very propunced.

caused by induction; this is very noticeable in aerial wires and must be very pronounced in cables. If the burial of the wires is to be successful, submarine cables, as in Paris and Hondon, must be used; they are expensive, but work better than the pipes.

The Company More Willing Than the Public.

John J. Wright, Manager of the Toronto Electric Light Company: "In the first place the electric light wires cannot go in the same conduit with the telephone lines. The heavy current of the electric light machinery induces a corresponding current in the telephone wires and interferes with their business. While the wires of the two companies are overhead on opposite sides of the street the currents can be kept away from each other." onduit with the telephone lines. "Wouldn't it be keeping them away from each other to be put in separate pipes?"

"No, to a certain extent an iron pipe would reduce the induction, but hardly to a sumicient degree to make it practicable. The great point the citizens must bear in mind, with recard to the burial of the electric wires, is that they cannot expect to have the use of the telegraph; telephone and electric light at the present prices, if the companies are compelled to put the wires ould not give their service at the present prices. The point, therefore, is that the use of these modern convenience—will be placed beyond the reach of many who now use them by their necessarily increased cost. There is no place in the United States where a complete system of underground wires has been made. The New York State Legislature has more than once passed an act to compel companies to put their wires underground before a certain date; the dates are long past and permits are to-day being granted in the city of New York for electric light and other wires to be run overhead. It will be a long time before the reform you are agitating other wires to be run overhead. It will be a long time before the reform you are agitating will be consummated. All electric currents have a certain amount of tension or present the statement of tension or present the statement of t all electric currents have a certain amount of ension or pressure which is all the time tend-ing to cause an escape from the wire; the least ault in the insulation of a wire will cause a

leakage, which when commenced multiplies it-self very fast, resulting in the complete break-ing down of the insulation at that point. The leakage may be caused by dampiess, and the destruction of the insulation of course renders destruction of the insulation of course renders useless the wire for its entire length.

"We are more willing to put the wires underground than the public are to have them put down, but we see the difficulties, of which the public know nothing. Just as soon as a practicable system is discovered the electric companies will be ready to use it. Think of the companies will be ready to use it. Think of the dost it would involve in the case of our company with wires extending in one straight circuit alone 21 miles! Then take companies like the ladephone and Electric Light, whose customers are more permanent. We could not tunnel over to a man's store when he might also the convenience for a short time; we would require a three years' contract and that would be practically prohibitive.
