NOTE AND COMMENT.

A 125 horse power gasoline engine, six cylinder, weighing only 400 lbs., has been perfected. It is of the two-cycle type. It looks as if steam in a few years will be an obsolete power.

The ordinary wire screen for doors and windows offer no protection from prying eyes. This can be remedied by giving the outside of all screens a coat of thin white paint. Strange as it may seem, the paint will not be noticeable, and while those inside may look out through the screens, outsiders cannot see into the room. The paint should be made as thin as possible with turpentine and applied with a broad, flat brush.

The New York State food investigating commission has carefully looked into the matter of cost, killing, shipping and selling some shipments of meat by the big packing houses. It found that 29 cattle sent from Omaha to New York yielded a profit of 10 cents per cwt.; 350 sheep and 50 spring lambs returned a net profit of 17 cents per cwt.; while 36 hogs

purchased in Kansas City netted 31 cents per cwt. A showing as good as that, however, could not be made in handling meats on a small scale.

Well, he's growing big, now, and according to some writers, is manifesting a desire to "put the boots" to the old man who has fed him on milk and honey since the days of his infancy. Ontario has given of its best and plenty to feed the West, but the time has now come when she needs and can well requite every one of her own and many of her neighbors' children at the old home.

Happy is the boy who early in life chooses his profession or calling, and makes everything he does contribute to efficiency in it. One of the evils of our industrial system is that a boy can work for years without learning a trade. It is this fact that is causing our educationists to advocate technical schools, where our youths can be taught to be proficient in the mechanical art. Factories are willing to employ boys at boy's wages, but when these boys become men, they will want men's wages, and what probability is there of their receiving them unless they are able to do men's work with proficiency and dispatch?

It is pleasing to learn from the officers of the Canadian Highway Association that the children throughout Canada are taking a keen interest in the essay competition on "What Good Roads Mean to Canada" and from all parts of the Dominion papers are being forwarded to the headquarters of the association at New Westminster, B.C.

As an encouragement to the children to busy themselves in the preparation of these essays, the president of the Canadian Highway Association, Mr. W. J. Kerr, is offering valuable gold, silver and silver gilt medals, and also a silver souvenir pin to all competitors whose paper attains a certain standard of merit.

While it should not be necessary for this incentive to interest the young people of Canada in good roads, and their relation to the well-being of the country, the fact remains that in this, as in other things, some inducement is often necessary in order to awaken the younger generation to the economic needs of this country.

Good Roads, as everyone will admit, are badly needed in Canada at the present time, but it is only when the people at large are ready to demand this—not merely to request it—that we can expect the authorities, whether local, municipal, provincial or federal, to act on this matter on anything like a large scale.

The aim and purpose of the Canadian Highway Association, as is well known, is to establish a Transcontinental road that will reach from Halifax, N.S. to Alberni, B.C., and while it is not the intention of this organization to do more than educate the public and act in an unofficial advisory capacity, it is yet doing much good work in this cause and will be largely instrumental in getting this highway, four thousand miles long, completed within five years.

We in this district must do our share of this work, and it behooves the Good Roads advocates of Lambton, to bestir themselves and lend all the assistance they can to the officers of the Canadian Highway Association in the good work they are doing for Canada.

License Act Amendments.

New License Act amendments introduced by Hon. Mr. Hanna provide: Prohibits establishment of storage for liquors in local option municipalities.

Gives Government power to prohibit sale of liquors in any prescribed area when such is deemed advisable. Provides for imprisonment of anyone found drinking in local option districts who refuses to tell where the liquor was secured.

Prohibits licensee or employe from converting time cheque into money or taking same in part payment for liquor.

Holidays in Old Days.

There is a general belief that holidays in Canada at the present are far more numerous than they were in civilized countries in bygone ages. This is clearly a misapprehension, for an old almanac of 1792, of one hundred and 20 years old, gives forty days that were observed as holidays by all the government offices and the banks. In addition the excise and exchequer offices observed six other days, making in all very nearly eight weeks. Every month had its holiday, some three or four, the only month having a single day being May during which month, for some reason or other, the 25th was observed. This will be quite a revelation to the Scroogos who imagine Canadian people have too easy a time. As a matter of fact there are few countries that have so few holidays. There are also few countries if any, in which the people are so diligent and industrious. At Christmas time in the eighteenth century the public offices and the banks were absolutely closed for four days in succession. At other times two days were frequently given up to holiday making. Including the Sabbath Day, it will be observed that one-quarter of the entire year was devoted one-hundred and twenty years ago to

To our amazement, she remained in that upright position for a time which I estimate as five minutes; others in the boat say less, but it was certainly some minutes while we watched at least 150 feet of the Titanic towering up above the level of the sea and looming black against the sky. Then with a quiet, slanting dive, she disappeared beneath the waters."

Reduce Size of Paper Money.

Secretary of the Treasury MacVeigh will recommend to Congress soon that the paper money of the United States be substantially reduced in size and every denomination made uniform in design. It is contemplated to make all notes six by two and a half inches, a reduction of one-third in size, the present dimensions being 7.28 by 3.04 inches.

A Western Yarn.

South Vancouver, April 9.—White a group of ladies were seated in front of the corner stone of Fifty-second Avenue Baptist church yesterday, awaiting the commencement of the ceremonies, a humming bird, attracted by the artificial violets in the hat of one lady, flew to the hat and settled down to investigate. It did not remain long after its discovery that the flowers were not what they seemed.

While ex-reeve Clark, of Harwich, was fishing last week he fell into the peculiar predicament of being himself speared by a fellow fisherman named Todd. Mr. Todd shot his spear for a fish and missed it, but caught Mr. Clark, and one prong went right through his foot.

Mrs. Margaret King, aged 71, relict of Robert King, died at her home in Stratford on Thursday. Several weeks ago, while on a visit with her daughter, Mrs. R. W. Hedley, she fell and hurt herself badly, and never recovered from the shock. The funeral was held on Friday to the G. T. R. depot.

Back To Common Sense.

Just before the Titanic wreck it was announced that steamships were to be constructed like apartment houses, with suites of rooms in which a family might have absolute privacy, even kitchens in which their own food might be prepared. It is possible that the awful disaster may check this particular form of lunacy. For several years there has been a fierce competition in luxury, size and speed. The fact that the latest boat beat the fastest of her predecessors by a few minutes, was bigger, and contained a few more of the comforts of a modern hotel, was chronicled with joy and pride.

It was all foolish, as we see too plainly now. The craze for speed is expensive as well as dangerous. The consumption of coal is enormously increased as the speed is augmented. The eagerness to shorten the voyage leads, not only to excessive and dangerous speed, but to the selection of the northern route, when the more southerly route would be safer.

Luxury also has been carried to excess. It does no harm to a wealthy man or woman accustomed to luxury at home to rough it a little for a few days on the sea. People are ready to do without luxuries or even comforts when they go hunting, mountain climbing, or camping, and they should be able to cross the ocean in something less luxurious than a great hotel or apartment house. Obviously, it is difficult to build a ship like a palace, and at the same time make it seaworthy and easy to handle.

A Forward Step.

Doubtless the time will come when those about to be married will be required to produce, prior to the ceremony, physician's certificates that they are physically and mentally fit to take upon themselves the responsibilities of matrimony. Such a regulation would work no hardship except for those who, for their own sake and the sake of succeeding generations, should not be wedded, and there is no doubt that it would mean a great decrease in the number of mental incompetents and physical unfit in the country.

In the meantime, a start in this direction has been made independently by the dean of the Cathedral of S. S. Peter and Paul, in Chicago, who has announced that no couples will be married there unless they are able to present certificates of health. The first marriage under these conditions has already taken place and it does not appear that any objections were made by the happy couple, who were able to qualify.

For its own protection the state must effectually take cognizance of this question. One step which, in Ontario, might help considerably in the right direction, says the St. Thomas Journal, would be the placing of the issuing of marriage licenses in the hands of responsible physicians, giving them authority to use their own judgment when the fitness of any candidate for matrimony was in dispute, and making it obligatory for both man and woman to appear before the granting of a license.

The Titanic Tragedy.

The world stands stunned at the magnitude of the disaster which overtook the Titanic, the latest word in the building of luxurious and supposedly safe passenger steamers. The greatest tragedy of the sea in all history is recorded in the story which tells of the Titanic striking the huge iceberg, of the hours of fearful waiting, of the plunge of this ten-million-dollar boat to the bottom of the ocean, two miles below, leaving only a few hundred of the men and women above water.

Everything human ingenuity could suggest had been employed to strengthen the colossal creation and insure its safety against the uttermost perils of the ocean. Water-tight compartments were many; by ordinary injury the vessel would have been unsinkable. But without thoughtful and even scientific calculation, the mind can hardly comprehend the power of the impact of the moving monster against the unyielding ice barrier. Steel must have crumbled, rivets and joints broken, beams and columns buckled, throughout the mighty fabric. Fittingly named Titanic to accord with its giant frame Titanic also was the shock which in a moment produced the greatest shipwreck the world has ever known.

AN IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION.

While all the towns around us are forming associations of their business men for the purpose of improving the town, what is the reason that our town could not have one? It will cost nothing to meet once in two or four weeks and talk over the situation. While it might not do much to boom the town, yet we should get better acquainted with one another and with one another's wants and wishes. A community of spirit creates an enthusiasm which is very apt to display itself in some direction. The old saying that everything comes to him who waits, may have been true in the old time, but under the spirit of the present age if a person wants a thing he must go after it. We believe there is go-ahead spirit enough in town to carry an improvement association through to good results if it were only started; and we also believe that after it was fairly started the good effects of it would be felt immediately. Perhaps not as some towns have done in getting great branches of industry to settle here, but in plans of beautifying and improving what we have, and in being ready to embrace opportunities, if any should come. An association of this kind could be made useful in providing men to fill the public offices who have the interests of the town at heart and who are willing, with the assurance of support, to sacrifice their time and talents for the betterment of the town, and thus do away with the haphazard way of electing town officials that has been in vogue here for some years past. Such an association could be made a pleasant and profitable institution even if not much in the way of a "boom" resulted from it. Who will make a move in the matter?

NOTE AND COMMENT.

A department of good manners has been instituted in the Los Angeles high school. In this department the pupils will receive special instruction in deportment, courtesy and general good conduct. Such a department properly conducted might render a very useful service to this community. Courtesy and good conduct in the child form the foundation for good citizenship in the adult.

Experiments conducted by the Agriculture Experiment Station of Nebraska have shown, says a press bulletin issued by that institution, that corn and alfalfa will form the most profitable ration for fattening hogs. The cost per 100 lbs. grain in these experiments varied from \$3.60 for hogs fed three parts corn to one part chopped alfalfa, to \$4.34 for those fed three parts corn and one part shorts, and 45.59 per 100 lbs. gain for those fed one part corn and one part shorts. Alfalfa grows to perfection in Lambton.

One of the cheapest things that have appeared in connection with the loss of the Titanic is the attempt, as recorded in the press, of Miss Pankhurst, and other English suffragettes, to belittle the courage and chivalry of the male passengers on the great liner, who sacrificed their lives in order that the women and children might be saved. As long as the suffrage movement is headed by such women as these it has little hope of recognition.

Man is naturally a home-loving animal. In fact, most animals are home-loving. And when a man asks a woman to share his life, it is usually taken as a gentle hint that he wants her to make him a home and ask a lot of general oversight of his affairs and a special oversight of himself. He likes to know that she does things for him just for the reason that she loves him, and is interested in him and his well-being. He loves his home more if there is some impress of her personality upon it. He likes best the meal she prepares for him. Of course, he says very little—perhaps nothing—of all this, being a man.

Meddlesome persons who are continually prying into other people's affairs and carrying tales between

friends and acquaintances create a great deal of mischief and are best contented when they can spread scandal. It seems more natural for them to speak ill of a person than to utter words of praise, and their habit of gossiping becomes so fixed that they can talk scandals almost unconsciously. It is just as easy to say a good word for friends and acquaintances, even if not wholly deserved, as it is to speak ill of them, and the effect on the community is always beneficial in a general way. Scandal gathers as it travels by word of mouth and can never be recalled when once in circulation. Try speaking well of everyone and see what a change it will make in your own happiness as in the well-fare of others.

There are a lot of people in this world that seem like the dog that used to lean against the fence to bark—dead tired. Motion is as foreign to them as a steeplechase to an elephant. If they are in the race at all they manage to be at the tail end. They never think of doing anything until the time for action is past and somebody else has reaped the benefit that always accrues when a man's heels follow his thoughts. Slower than molasses in January, these people give an indescribable pain to those who have anything to do with them or their affairs. One feels like giving them a thump in the back of the neck or otherwise assisting their thoughts and members to more concerted and rapid action. Laxness of either mind or body is a fatal disease. A man in this age must step a lively pace if he expects to have a fighting chance, even. Get up and dust. "Whatever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might."

BACK OF A SNAKE.

It Can Easily Be Broken by a Crack With a Canoe.
The first impulse of a man on seeing a snake is to stamp on its head, which, according to The Rosary Magazine, is unwise. A snake's skull is very tough, as behooves a part of the body that is always liable to be knocked against stones, etc., owing to the extreme shortsightedness of all serpents.

The back, on the contrary, can be broken with a light rap, for it consists of a delicate system of ball and socket joints. Should snakes be harmless the best plan is to leave them alone; should they be dangerous a shot from a revolver is safe and effective. In case no revolver is at hand a rap with a cane will be sufficient, but care must be taken to keep away from the head of the creature. A snake does not normally go about hitting its skull against hard objects. It does this only when in a hurry. Moving at its ordinary pace, it feels its way with its long, delicate, forked tongue.

In the same way when about to swallow its food it touches it all over with its tongue in order to ascertain where to take hold, and this process has given rise to the mistaken idea that a snake covers its prey with saliva prior to swallowing it. No doubt a considerable quantity of saliva is generated during the process of deglutition, but it does not come from the tongue, which is merely used as a feeler.

When a snake bites it bisects its head up to the nape of its neck and opens its jaws till they are in the same plane—i.e., at right angles to the body. These jaws are provided with six rows of strong, sharp teeth, four on the upper jaw and two on the lower jaw.

This is a very formidable arrangement, but when you remember that a medium sized constrictor can project its head with sufficient force to knock a man off his feet and will either on provocation or sometimes without it let go his catapult, rat trap machinery you are likely to avoid constrictors so far as is possible. Such a snake can take hold of a man and shake him or strip the skin and flesh from the part seized as if it were paper.

The First Cigarette.

Before the discovery of America the old world had never imagined tobacco and its delights. Christopher Columbus and his followers were the first from the eastern hemisphere to see men smoking. When they landed on Oct. 12, 1492, on the island to which he gave the name of San Salvador they beheld, to their astonishment, a group of natives sitting on the shore puffing clouds of smoke from their lips and nostrils. On closer inspection it was found that the dried leaves of some herb were wrapped in the leaves of the maize or corn plant and formed into cylindrical rolls, one end of which was put into the mouth, the other kindled and the smoke was drawn in and puffed out again. In short, the Indians were smoking cigarettes.

A society for the protection of authors was founded as long ago as 1785. Authors themselves were not members of the society, which was instituted for their benefit by noblemen and gentlemen, who subscribed 2 guineas annually in addition to an entrance fee of 10 guineas.

Their purpose, as defined by themselves, was "to assist authors in the publication and to secure to them the entire profits of their own works"—that is to say, they published books, but took no fees for doing so. They were amateurs, however, engaged in trade in competition with professionals, and their enterprise was unsuccessful. The society was wound up in 1749, and the balance in hand (\$20 12s.) was presented to the Foundling hospital—London Author.

During the past year there were but three accidents to British trains attended with loss of life, the total number of fatalities being but fourteen. For the seven years preceding, the average of killed in railroad accidents was but 23.
