CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

Operations in the woods are not being carried on satisfactorily, owing to con-tinued changes in the weather. It has been estimated that at least 25 per cent. of the production of logs will be left in the woods. For some time log hauling in certain districts has been at a standstill. A shortage in the lumber production of the coming season is now almost a cer-tainty, although it should be remembered that some logs were carried over from last season, and these will be available for early sawing. Lumber prices have shown no weak-

Lumber prices have shown no weak-ness during the past week. Prices of every grade are being maintained. At Toronto mill cull sidings, one to two inch, are selling at \$14.50, inch mill cull stocks at \$15.50, and common stock at from \$15.50 to \$19.50, the latter figure being obtainable for 1x12 and 2x12 inch stock. Canada dressing, 10 to 16 feet, sells at from \$19.50 to \$22, one inch dressing and Canada dressing, 10 to 16 feet, sells at from \$19.50 to \$22, one mch dressing and better sidings at \$27, and 14 to 2 inch dressing at \$21.50. Inch No. 1 cuts and better bring \$32, 14 inch \$35, and 14 inch \$36. No. 2 cuts and better brings \$33.50, and No.1 and No. 2 cuts, 142 and 2 inch, \$30 and \$26 respectively. heavy. It is encouraging to learn that in some parts of New Brunswick logging con-ditions have been more favorable, there being sufficient snow to make fairly easy work for the teams. Although the movement of lumber at the present time is not large, prices are very firm, with signs of advancing considerably.

UNITED STATES.

The United States lumber market is rather quiet. Retail dealers have not yet entered the market with any liberality, and conse juently wholesale dealers have found thei, stocks quite adequate to supply the demand. There has been some buying demand. There has been some buying by wholesale dealers, but it has not been of large volume. From these remarks it must not be inferred that the market is weakening; on the other hand, such sales of stock as have been made favor a continuance of the present high prices. a continuance of the present high prices. No. 3 and No. 4 boards have been sold in the Duluth market at \$13 and \$15 respec-tively. There have been some advances made recently in the wholesale prices of pine, which are now believed to have reached the top notch. At Albany fine common is about \$4 higher than the quotations printed in last issue, No. 1, 2 and 3 cuts \$2 higher, moulding strips \$4, shipping and bain boards \$1, dressing \$2 and shaky clear \$2 higher than last quotaand shaky clear \$2 higher than last quota-tions. Both pine and spruce lath are quoted in the Albany market at \$3.50.

The hardwood market is a trifle easier in some respects, white oak selling at about \$2 per thousand lower. There is a good call for ash, maple, basswood and elm.

FORMIGN. Reports from the British markets are of an encouraging character, and as prices of wood goods in all producing countries are unusually firm, there seems little reason to expect a break in the prices in Great Britain. The war thus far does not appear to have affected the timber market. About the only unfavorable feature is the possibility of the present high prices curtailing the consumption. It is said that the cost of building vessels on the Clyde at the present time is fully 50 per cent. greater than it was one year ago. The rea-

greater than it was one year ago. The rea-son for this is found in the high price not only of timber, but also of iron and steel. During the month of January Cana-dian lumber advanced in price in nearly all the leading markets of Great Britain. At Liverpool the advance on second and hard under the other price deals was about third quality Quebec pine deals was about \mathcal{L}_1 per standard, and on spruce deals L1 per standard, and on spruce deals about L15s. There is a brisk demand for birch, which advanced during January about 3a. per cubic foot. In elm the advance was still greater, being quite 7d. Waney pinc is about 2d. higher, but square wood remains at 1s.3d. to 2s.4d. per cubic foot. At Glasgow an advance of about 8s. was wade on first quality broad, and 7 to was made on first quality broad and 7 to 11 inch second quality pine deals ; 11 inch fourth quality is about 5s. higher and nar-rows about 7s., the latter selling at £6 17s. 6d. to £7 11s 3d. per standard. Quebec 6d. to £7 115 3d. per standard. Quebec spruce deals have also been marked up about 55. The current prices are given elsewhere. Some improvment is reported in the Australian market, and higher prices are anticipated.

NEW BRUNSWICK CEDAR SHINGLES.

NEW BRUNSWICK CEDAR SHINGLES. The shingle trade in New Brunswick and eastern markets is very quiet, and practically no orders are being placed. The weather has been particularly inclement, and no hingles are entering into consumption. As a result, dealers will not buy at any price, being fairly well stocked. Western shingles are retaining their fullest tendency and show no indications of any softening. N. B. cedars, it is believed, are the cheapest article in the market to-day, and should enjoy a brisk demand as soon as there is trade for any variety of shingles what-ever. Prices seem to be holding absolutely steady. Ruling quotations at Boston are. Extras, \$3.10 to \$3.15; clears, \$2.65 to \$2.75; 2nd clears, \$2.10 to \$2.20; saps, \$2.00 to \$2.15. Straight cars of extras are quoted by some few makers at \$3.00, but these same manufacturers are asking full quotations of \$3.10 for extras in mixed cars, and are holding all lower gnades most firmly. all lower grades most firmly.





[Correspondence of the CANADA LUMBERMAN.] At a meeting of the "pruce manufacturers held in Boston on February 1 tth, it was voted to maintain the combination prices made in the fall on all sizes of spruce, and to raise the price on laths, 156 inch to \$3,15, and 14 inch to \$3,00. Reports from all the spruce-pro-ducing sections indicate that the cut of logs will not be as large as was anticipated, owing to the poor conditions for logging and lack of show. Until within a short time there has been but very little snow in the northern s ction of Maine, New Hampshire and Ver-mont, and these conditions must necessarily make a short season and smaller stock of logs. The trade from the retail yards in this section is very light. They are only buying what stock they need for an assortment, and the most of them are carrying very small socks. The outlook for building is not very encouraging, as there is but very little new work in sight, which will result in a light trade for the next two months. What few mills that are sawing this winter are disposing of their output at good prices, and the feeling is general that with the open-ing of spring the trade will start up on a good basis of prices and a good demand.
