OUR BOYS.



CHANGES.

MPORTANT changes have been made in our Railway work. Mr. Burford's resignation has been accepted, taking effect at once.

Our work in the West End of the city will in the meantime be under the supervision of Mr. T. S. Cole, Travelling Secretary for the Dominion. Mr. W. C. Jex, a man of practical knowledge in railway life, and of some experience in Y. M. C. A. work, has been engaged as Railway Secretary, and will devote his time solely to Christian work among the Railway employees.

We carry on this work at present, as in the past, relying on the good providence of God to direct our efforts to the moral and spiritual good of the Rail-

way Men of this country.

The meetings at Union Station, G. T. R. Round House, T. G. & Bruce R. Shops, and the West End Rooms will all be continued. The Yard and Shops at York will also shortly be opened. The field is large, but with God's blessing we hope to cover it.

T the close of a religious service in North Wales, a young man remained behind. The aged minister asked what had induced him to stay. Without any other remark,

Without any other remark, he answered, "My mother's hand on my head!" Being asked to explain himself, he told the following story:—

"When I was but a youth, I left home. The day I left. my mother came into my room, and put her hand on my head, and said, 'Now, my boy, you are leaving me; but remember God. If you serve Him, He will be your Friend; but if you forsake Him, evil will overtake you.' I have never forgotten the pressure of that tender hand. Wherever I went I felt it. I came in here to-night, and through the service it pressed upon me more firmly, and when the service was over it held and kept me here."

We cannot present our standard of success better than by reprinting the following extracts from an address delivered at the Y.M.C.A. Conference held at Liverpool last autumn:--

"God is pleased to vouchsafe us indications of His presence and of success in our work even while engaged in it.

"When the individual members of the Association are men filled with the Holy Ghost, and when their testimony has a pungency that affects the consciences and ease of their companions in business, leading them also to feel their need of and seek the Saviour:

"When the prayer meetings of the Association are lively and interesting, and attended by the members, and especially by the members of the Com-

mittee:

co-operation in prosecuting the great aim in view between the members and the Committee :

"When God's holy Word is read in our meetings with becoming reverence

and awe:

"When the truths of God enunciated, whether by Bible classes or addresses, are carried home with convincing ard converting power to the hearts of the unsaved present:

"When the Association awakens prayerful interest in the welfare of young men at large, leading to special

efforts in their behalf:

"When upon the young men of a town or neighbourhood through its instrumentality there is brought to bear a testimony to Divine Grace and its sufficiency to save them:

"When the Association is holding its legitimate place in relation to the churches of Christ, encouraging the members in the proper observance and acknowledgment of Divinely-appointed institutions and ordinances:

"When God gives the work favour in the eyes of those who have means to

help it:

When consistently with the main. tenance of its principles; more, when, because of the maintenance of its prinmen of public spirit and ciples, enterprise come forward with a noble generosity, as they have done in many large cities, to enlarge its opportunities, by placing suitable and commanding premises at its disposal with a view to the increase and extension of its useful-

"Then we need not hesitate to say, 'The work is succesful.'"
