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loyal feeling of the inhabitants was manifested by the most enthusiastic, though not the less orderly and respectful behaviour.

ROYAL ARTILLERY, Woolwich.—An extra reserve battery is in progress of formation, to be composed of married men from 14 to 20 years' service, and the horses when cast in future as unfit for field battery service, instead of being sent to one of the London horse repositories for sale, are to be put in the extra reserve battery, and employed as long as they are capable of doing work in the Royal Arsenal and the batteries of the garrison.

PRUSSIA.—RESIGNATION OF THE MINISTRY.—The Prussian ministry has resigned. The Staats Anzeiger of the 10th says, under date Berlin the 9th, "Yesterday the ministry tendered their resignation to the King."

The rapid progress of this truly great work, must be a subject of congratulation, not only to the stockholders, but to the inhabitants of Montreal and its vicinity at large. The entire grading of the road is finished, the line is completed for a distance of nine miles, and the rails are being laid down at the rate of half-a-mile per day; in addition to which, the timber for the track is laid for five miles beyond the River Richelieu, as well as at St. Hyacinthe.

INSURRECTION AT LEGHORN.—The following proclamation has been issued by the Grand Duke of Tuscany, and refers to an outbreak which has taken place at Leghorn:

INDIA.—LIEUTENANT EDWARDS AND THE LATE VICTORY.—The Journal des Debats de l'Angleterre honours to devote two columns of its space to a recapitulation of the details of the recent triumph in Moulton. It thus sums up its article:—The English newspapers are filled with eulogies on the conduct of Lieutenant Edwards. These eulogies are well merited; that officer, by his audacity and firmness, has saved his country the expenses of a campaign—that is to say, several millions; and without taking any account of the honour which he has conferred on himself, he has added a brilliant page to that history of the Indian army, whose annals, interspersed with romantic events, are scarcely to be met with elsewhere as glorious as those of any army in the world.

NEW ZEALAND.—A count from New Zealand extends to the 31st of March, at which date all was quiet at Wanganui, and had been so for some time previous. Some officers of the 65th regiment had explored the river as far as Pakapika without meeting with any hostile demonstration from the natives. News had been received there from the Bay of Islands of a suspicious character. The natives had established a secret league, and drawn up written compacts, the terms of which were kept with extraordinary secrecy. It was said that the notorious Heke was the main spring of the movement.
