CITY'S SHARE \$751,000
T.S.R. RECEIPTS SOAR

Income of Company in 1911 Was \$450,000 Ahead of the Previous Year.

According to a statement issued by the city auditor, the city has received from the Toronto Railway Co. the total sum of \$751,000 as percentage on receipts and payment for mileage during the year ending Aug. 31.

Last year Toronto received from the railway company \$661,339, the big increase this year being of course in the percentage receipts, which were \$68,730, as compared with \$57,403 in 1910, an increase of \$9,327.

A very vivid idea of how the business of the company is mounting up is to be gathered from the fact that its receipts this year exceed those of last year by \$450,000, representing an increase in sales of all classes of tickets of 10,119,274.

The total income of the company last year was \$4,643,531; in 1910 it was \$4,192,015.

WHY THE CHANGE OF FRONT, MR. SEALEY?

The Protection Utterances of Wentworth Reciprocally Candidate R called.

STONIC CREEK, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—At a meeting here to-night the interests of Gordon C. Wilson addresses were delivered by E. D. Smith and Hon. J. S. Duff. During the remarks the minister of agriculture quoted from a speech by W. O. Sealey, former M.P. for Wentworth, who is now a reciprocity candidate. Speaking before the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association in 1908 Mr. Sealey said:

"The matter that I am going to deal with this afternoon is that of a tariff on vegetables and small fruits. I think tariff matters could be regulated and improved to our general advantage. We are not to be blamed for the fact that it should be able to preserve the home market for home products along agricultural lines. The majority of the people in Canada are agriculturists. It is a question of how we can bring about these results. Manufacturers have secured protection for themselves, and by a plan and policy that seems to benefit not only one particular line of manufacture, but the great majority of the industries of this country. As vegetable and small fruit growers you ought to get the support of every locality in which you are located. Perhaps not more than ten or fifteen counties produce vegetables and small fruits to any considerable extent, and if you get the support of these counties, you will not be entirely justified. As we should consider for a few moments how best to increase the support which they give, and how best to protect them during the approaching Dominion session. Manufacturers will have tariff matters up, and so will agriculturists. The vegetable and fruit growers are interested in too small an area, and it occurs to me that the general agricultural interests of the Dominion should be combined from east to west, and in that way we would copy to some extent the manufacturer. The present duty is 2c a quart, and when strawberries are selling at 5c or 10c, 2c would be 20 or 30 per cent, but none could be collected on this. It is collected on strawberries when they come in from the south and are \$1 a quart, 6c a quart, and so on. Cabbages and cauliflowers are out of season it is largely the wealthy who are able to buy them, and as the tariff would be raised largely out of luxuries rather than necessities, it would be a proper thing to increase the duty on strawberries when they are in season. Cabbages and other vegetables would follow.

LOTS OF TYPHOID IN CITY AND THE FLY IS BLAMED

Record for August Was 44; Last Year 13—170 Gallons Bad Milk Destroyed.

In his report on communicable diseases, submitted to the local board of health yesterday, Dr. Hastings states that there were a total of 51 cases of typhoid in Toronto during the months of July and August. Last year the total was 13. Comparing months, the record for July, 1910, was 10; for July, 1911, 7; August, 1910, 13; August, 1911, 44. The apparently big increase for the month of August is explained by the M. H. O. as due to the fact that 14 of the cases reported for this month should have been included in the July list, and the every busy house fly are blameable for these outbreaks of "Auntie fever."

Dr. Hastings states that during July and August he had inspection made of 18 restaurants, some of which were found in a decidedly unsatisfactory condition. Screens were ordered on all windows and doors, instructions given for the protection of food against fly contamination, and also the improvement of the general sanitary conditions.

References made in the report to the tuberculosis nurses show that the staff, under the supervision of Miss Dyke, have been active in keeping the city during July and August 575 cases were under observation.

R. C. Packard, the new chief of dairy inspectors, has evidently been busy. Also his activities seem to have been entirely justified. Thus 42 samples of water were examined from milk cans; all were in a bad state, giving a bacterial count on agar as high as 38,000,000, and the lowest gave 600,000 per c. c.

Four hundred and forty-six quarts of milk were emptied because of the presence of formaldehyde; 224 quarts of milk were emptied because of putrid decomposition; 47 samples of milk were examined for bacteria and gave a bacterial count of one million and upwards. In only one sample was the count below 600,000.

On the 12th of August the sanitary department sent 849 notices to citizens to abate certain nuisances.

TORRENT OF BURNING LAVA PUSHING DOWN MT. AETNA

Noise is Like the Bombardment of Heavy Artillery—Peasants Abandon Their Homes.

CATANIA, Sicily, Sept. 12.—The crest of Mount Aetna now presents a terrific spectacle. Heavy smoke lies over it with frequent brilliant flashes, and the bombardment which is continuous along a line nearly two miles in extent, is like the firing of heavy artillery. The torrent of burning lava, estimated at 3000 feet wide and four feet deep, is pouring down the slope. Everything in its way has been destroyed. The trees of the lava stream have been uprooted and set on fire, and the lava stream is sweeping through the fields, sending up a cloud of smoke and waves of steam.

MR. FOSTER VIGOROUS.

Home-Coming Was Celebrated With Enthusiasm—Mr. McNaught Replies to Attacks.

Never since McNaught's Hall on College-street was formed out of bricks and mortar has its capacity been taxed to such an extent as was the case last night, when Hon. George E. Foster addressed his constituents in North Toronto for the first time since he was nominated.

Every seat in the building was accommodating two persons, and the aisles were crowded with workers of people clamored around the door of the hall and corridor outside, to listen, even if they couldn't get a glimpse of the speaker.

From his experience down east Mr. Foster said he believed the majority of the Province would give a majority against reciprocity.

Referring to the effect of the proposed reciprocity, if it goes into effect, will cause the death of the laboring interest in Canada.

Mr. Foster said that it was the avowed purpose of reciprocity to take British Columbia out of the western United States.

The fact that 750,000 people, happy and contented, were employed at present in the industries and factories of Canada was a splendid indication that the national policy should be maintained.

Mr. Foster concluded his remarks by describing the foolishness of Canada in "butting into" the politics of the United States.

McNaught Resents Attacks. The ability and popularity of Mr. Foster were next referred to by W. K. McNaught, who was himself a representative of the American trusts.
