Dr. Beattie Nesbitt Arrested In Chicago and Will Return To Toronto to Face Charges

Former President of Farmers' Bank, Who Has Been a Fugitive from Justice for Sixteen Months, Was Identified in Windy City Despite His Aged Appearance, Short Hair and Long Whiskers.

Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, formerly one of the most familias and jovian figures upon the streets of Toronto, was arrested last night by the American authorities at Chicago. Detective Wallace of the Toronto force is now in the Windy City to bring him back to this city. The Toronto police hold three warrants for the doctor's arrest. It is charged that he committed forgery by making and signing false documents in the shape of the padded and altered list of alleged subscribers of the Farmers' Bank, of which he was then the president, and sending these lists to the finance department at Ottawa. This is the only charge now laid upon which the Canadian authorities can hope to extradite the doctor. The other charges are that he conspired with Travers and George Wishart to steal \$350,000 of the proceeds of the sale of the Keeley Mine, and that he made false returns to the government of the same nature as those involved in the charges gainst Col. Munro, president of the bank, at the time of its collapse, and upon which charges

Munro was acquitted. It is said by those who have ceen Dr. Necbitt in Chicago, that he is a broken man. He is said to be prematuredy aged, grown much thinner and to have of his jovial attitude and masterful bearing. It is said that he will scarcely be recognized in Toronto, as his hair is now worn short and he has allowed a long and flowing beard to grow. This man, who has been sought the world over, and who has been reported as being seen in every quarted of it, has never in reality been



Board of Control Complete Revision of the Estimates, But Tax Rate is Not Definitely Settled - Controllers Optimistic-Only Statutory Increases for Civic Employes.

No announcement was made yester-day as to the tax rate for the year, altho the work on the revision of the world's work," declared W. L. Richthe board of control at their private meeting yesterday afternoon. From the remarks of the controllers, however, it was understood that the rate would be about the same as last year—18 mills. Mayor Geary declined to express any opinion except that the announcement would likely be made to-day. The original estimates, he said provided for a 20-mill rate, and hence considerable pruning was necessary. Controller Church stated that the revised board of education's estimates would require 6 2-10 mills, which was the same rate as they received lase year. The rayision of the estimates is now completed, but some clerical is now completed, but some clerical work is required to put them in presentable form.

Salary Increases The work of the board of control in revising the estimates to lower the tax rate was further facilitated yesterday morning when the board passed Controller Foster's motion providing that the civic employes should receive only the statutory increases of salary this year. Controller Foster's first motion to the effect that no further increases of salary be granted this year, was defeated.

Water Rates.

Water rates may be paid at 120 different branch banks this year, and the city treasurer expects that fully 50 per cent of these taxes will be received in this way. The purpose is to relieve the congestion at the office in the city hall. On Monday 80,000 water bills will be sent out.

At their meeting yesterday morning, the board of control decided to recommend that \$5000 be spent to test Ald. Yeomans' scheme of sinking a well at the island as a means of obtaining the city's water. The decision was reached after a letter of A. C. Ames was discussed, which stated that all the necessary tests could be made and a report submitted at a cost of not more than \$5000.







False Report of Pope's Death 413-414 Confederation Life Building Came as Shock to Whole World **TORONTO**

Error in Deciphering Code Message Caused Announcement Which Remained Uncontradicted for Three Hours. Rome Being Cut off From Communication.


