How York Radial Rv. Insidious Seeks For Perpetual Control of County Roads

Real Purport of Dangerous Bill Now Before Legislative Committee—Interested Municipalities, Save East Toronto, Seem to Have Been Chloroformed Into Inaction.

(3) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the said chapter 65, or in the various acts relating to the vendors, or in the Street Railway Act, the company shall with respect and in regard to the location, construction and operation of any and all branches, extensions and alterations of the said railway and the acquisition of lands for that purpose, HAVE THE SAME POWERS AS HAVE BEEN BY THE ACTS RELATING TO THE METROPOLITAN RAILWAY COMPANY, ONE OF THE VENDORS, conferred upon that company in the said regulations, and in all respects of railway and extensions and branches of that company.

In these two clauses of the York Radial Railway Company's bill is revealed the company's general purpose, which is to secure for its radial system the privileges now enjoyed by the Metropolitan Railway. One of these privileges is a perpetual franchise. One of the more specific objects of the bill is to ratify an agreement between the Township of Scarborough and the company, whereby the company is granted a perpetual franchise on the King-street route. According to the bill, the company is to have the right to use any and all lands, buildings, and structures now owned or used by the Township of Scarborough, but to its Mimico line. Any extensions of these lines would also enjoy a perpetual franchise.

It is significant that of all the municipalities interested in the York Radial Railway only one, East Toronto, went before the committee to lodge a protest. Many of the other municipalities had no notice of the bill, and were not organized in any way to protect their rights. The bill was slipped through the committee last Wednesday, all the clauses were passed without one single member of the committee protesting, but the preamble was held over. The bill will come before the committee again on Monday, and is expected a hot fight will ensue.

Mr. Whitney Against It. "I am distinctly opposed to the bill," declared Premier Whitney to the World. He added that he had had no opportunity of examining the bill of the Township of York and York Radial, but he was distinctly opposed to the principle involved, of giving perpetual powers to any company.

J. S. Hendrie expressed himself in the same decided manner. "The bill," he said, "conveys extraordinary powers to a private individual, and it will have to be closely scrutinized. He was opposed to a perpetual franchise, and from the fact that he had had of investigating he had come to the conclusion that the company was not for very good reasons, and he went on to say that municipalities seem times made the most improvident bargains with railway corporations, and their anxiety to secure railway facilities at their doors and then came to regret it. This had been done repeatedly. When the committee had said that the bargain was not a good one for the municipality the railway company had always put in a protest, and the people were satisfied with the terms and wanted the railway badly.

A Far Reaching Bill. Chairman Hendrie is of opinion that the bill now before the committee places the Scarborough and Mimico branches of the York Radial under the same powers that have been granted to the Metropolitan, and yet he says, none of the municipalities concerned in the passage of the bill had come forward to oppose it, except East Toronto, which was represented by Solicitor Lee, Grant of the town and Solicitor Lee, Deane of Mimico. May, McCone, who appeared for a private individual. It was supported by representatives of the Town and Township of Pickering, as well as by a committee of the York County Council, the Scarborough Township Council. Dr. Beattie Nesbitt was the only city of York County member who was at all active in promoting the schemes of the Radial Company. In good bargain for that it was a bargain which he argued that it was as much as it provided them with a powerful lever to secure better terms when the franchise is renewed twenty-five years hence, as the company would be willing to submit them rather than tear up its tracks and expropriate private property.

None of the county members is a member of the railway committee, when the committee convened Wednesday, the clerk, Mr. following members as being present: Beck, Lacker, Macdonald, May, McCone, Nesbitt, Preston (Lanark), Smellie, Smyth and Tupper.

What the Fight Means. One of the arguments advanced by the Radial Railway in support of its application to the railway committee of the legislature is that there is no united opposition from the municipalities thru which the present extensions of the system passes, and that in fact

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PERPETUAL FRANCHISE CLAUSE RATIFICATION OF WHICH IS NOW SOUGHT IN THE LEGISLATURE

Section 18 of the agreement between the corporation of the Township of Scarborough, the corporation of the County of York and the Toronto & Scarborough Electric Railway, Light & Power Co., Limited:

The rights and privileges granted by this agreement to the company to construct and operate its line, plant and works upon the roads of the municipality shall, subject to the other provisions of this agreement continue and exist for a term of twenty-five years from the first day of November, A.D., 1904, and shall be renewable for the further successive terms of twenty-five years, from the termination of the said term of twenty-five years, upon terms and conditions and provisions to be agreed upon between the municipality and the company, and in case of an agreement as to the whole or any of the terms, conditions or provisions of the agreement of renewal (including any question as to revision of rates or payment of a percentage of the earnings of the company to the municipality) cannot, at the expiration of any such term of twenty-five years, be arrived at between the municipality and the company, then the terms, conditions and provisions of the said agreement of renewal or any of them, upon which the municipality and the company cannot agree, shall forthwith be referred to the arbitrators, three arbitrators, one to be appointed by each party, and the third to be chosen by the arbitrators appointed by the parties before entering on a consideration of the matter referred to them, or, in case of the inability of the said two arbitrators chosen by the parties to agree upon a third arbitrator, such third arbitrator shall be appointed by the chief justice for the time being of the court of appeal for Ontario, and the award of any two of such arbitrators shall be binding and enforceable as if it were the award of the three arbitrators, and every reference hereunder shall be deemed an arbitration within the meaning of an act respecting arbitrations and references, being chapter 62 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1897, and of the amendments thereto, and shall be governed by the procedure thereunder.

The foregoing, under clause 8 of the bill before the legislature, is declared "to be valid, binding and effectual according to the terms hereof, and the same shall have effect and may be enforced as therein provided as fully and effectually as if the said terms were embodied in this act."

OTTAWA CITIZENS BY LARGE VOTE ENDORSE MUNICIPAL LIGHT PLANT

By Majority of 409 Favor Purchase of Consumers' Electric Co. and Rebuke Antagonistic Legislators.

Ottawa, May 18.—(Special.)—The citizens are jubilant to-night over the success of the bylaw authorizing the city to spend \$200,000 to buy out the Consumers' Electric Company. The electric interests put up a terrific fight against the bylaw, and only the most sanguine friends of municipal ownership believed that their cause could win out against such formidable odds. Majority for the bylaw 409
The wards populated by the middle classes—St. George, Wellington and Central—voted heavily in favor of the bylaw. The outlying wards, where coal oil is the chief illuminant, were hostile. There is great rejoicing among members of the city council, who accept the verdict as a triumphant vindication of their fight against the Ottawa Electric Company's bill in the Dominion parliament, and their unsuccessful fight before the Ontario legislature.

CROWD CALLS COUNCIL THIEVES IN VOTING AWAY OF GAS RIGHTS

Exciting Time in Philadelphia City Hall—Mayor Favoring Public Ownership, Will Veto Council's Act.

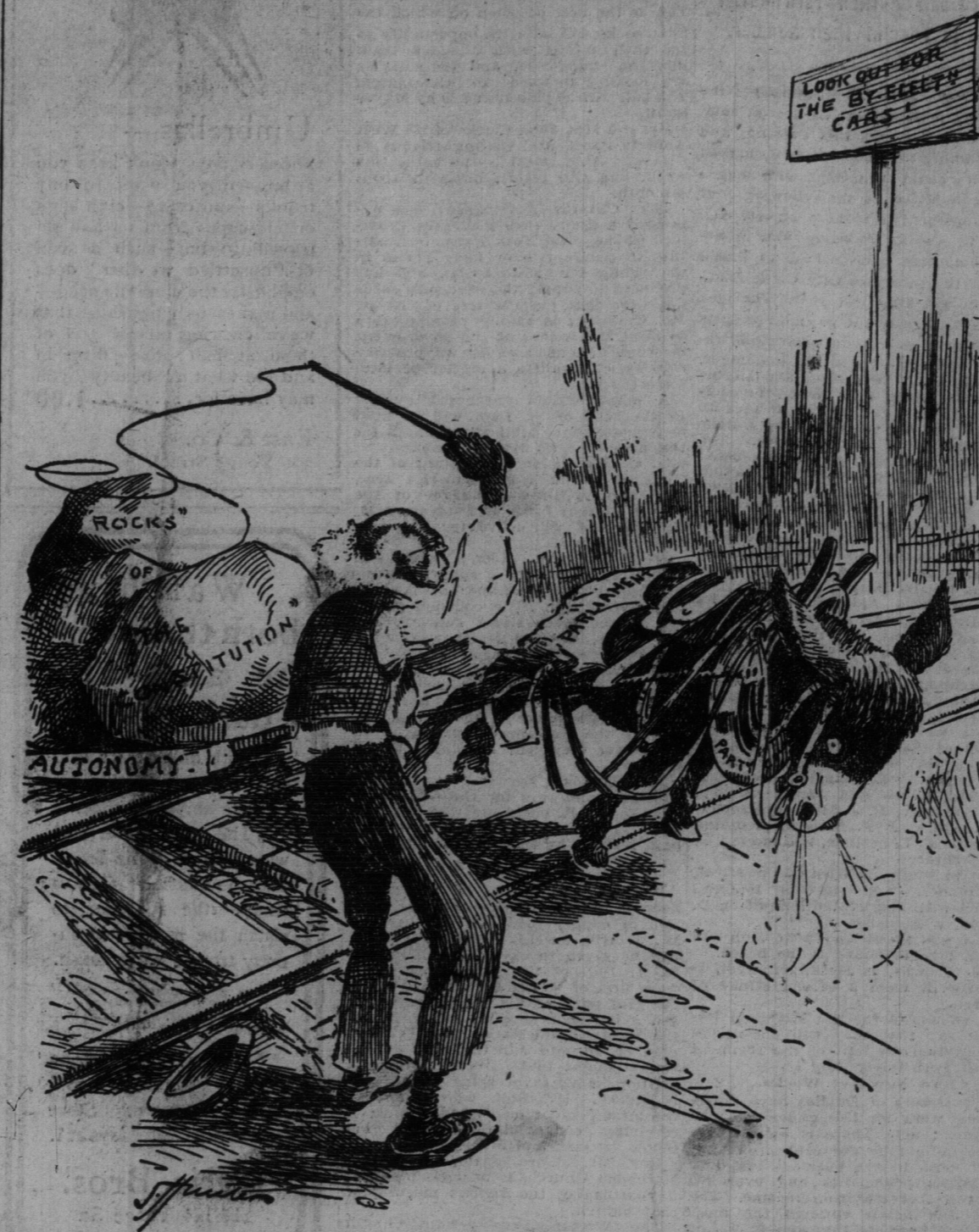
Philadelphia, May 18.—Amid scenes of disorder unprecedented in the annals of Philadelphia's legislative body, the city council to-night voted to lease the city's gas works to the United Gas Improvement Company for a term of seventy-five years for the total sum of \$25,000,000, the money to be paid in various amounts before the end of 1907. The council chamber and committee rooms were crowded with excited citizens protesting against the lease from 1 P.M. to 9 P.M. The council passed the bill and sent it to the mayor. The climax was reached when the council chamber was announced after three hours of debate. The moment President George McCurdy of

common council announced the vote, a great uproar was started in the gallery, which was crowded to the door. From all over the gallery came cries and cries of "thieves." The crowd continued the uproar until police started to clear the gallery. At the same time they sang uncomplimentary songs. In clearing the gallery, there were several clashes between the police and some of the spectators.

Mayor Weaver has announced himself as unalterably opposed to the lease, and in favor of a postponement of the whole question until 1907, when the city has the right to take back the works on payment to the gas company of the amount of money expended. Mayor Weaver is expected to veto the bill, and in that event both chambers will probably pass it over his veto.

Conservatives to Contest By-Elections With A Right Vigor.

Ottawa, May 18.—(Special.)—There was an enthusiastic caucus of the Conservative members held to-day in the room six when arrangements were made for the campaign in the coming by-elections in London and North York. It was decided that a strenuous fight would be put up in both ridings. A number of the leading Conservative members will stump the two constituencies, and a battle royal will be waged with the coalition of the west-plank in the platform.

HOLD ELECTION FIRST. COLONIES DON'T WANT TO BE DRAGGED INTO BRITISH POLITICS.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, May 18.—The Daily Chronicle says that it would be very much surprised in the event of a colonial conference being suggested for next year. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other colonial statesmen did not reply that a conference after the general election would be more convenient, the suggestion before the election would mean dragging the colonies into party politics at home and would expose the imperial relations to misunderstanding and disappointment, a fact which must be obvious to colonial statesmen.

THE NEED OF THE WEST. CANNOT AGREE.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, May 18.—The Morning Post's parliamentary correspondent gives credence to the rumor recently afloat that Mr. Chamberlain and Premier Balfour have been unable to come to terms regarding the fiscal question. No written reply is now expected in answer to Mr. Chamberlain's deputation some time ago.

JUSTIFYING MICHIGAN AUDITOR, MR. HANNA LIES VEIL ON OLD GOVERNMENT'S WORK.

The employment of a Michigan auditor temporarily by the provincial secretary was the subject of a want of confidence resolution in the legislature last night. On the motion to go into supply, Mr. Auld (South Essex) submitted an amendment deprecating the employment of an auditor from the United States. He said if it was necessary to get a man out of a three-hour machine factory for this work a good man could have been found in the United States at the time of his engagement, at \$200 a month, to perform work in connection with the provincial secretary's office that could have been as well performed by a citizen of Canada.

HEARD FIRING WEDNESDAY NEAR PARACELS ISLANDS

Hue, Upper Cochinchina, May 18.—A small steamer that arrived this morning shortly after midnight reports having heard heavy firing in the direction of the Paracels Islands yesterday. The steamer early yesterday morning sighted a naval squadron standing off the Paracels from the east coast of Hainan Island. It was unable to determine the nationality of the vessels, but it is thought that they were moving against the Russian fleet. It is thought that Vice Admiral Togo is massing his ships to command the waters between those islands and Hainan. Kamimura's cruisers, may have opened fire on Rojostevsky's scout ships.

P. M. G. IN AN EXPOSE CONDONES AN OFFICIAL GUILTY OF WRONGDOING

Boycott of Algoma Tells How Postmaster of Thessalon, Accused of Falsifying Returns, Was Allowed to Resign, Then Dismissed and Later Re-Engaged.

Ottawa, May 18.—(Special.)—It is apparently only necessary to dig below the surface of any department of this administration to exhume unsavory jobs that were never intended by the perpetrators to see the light of day. The opposition did a little spade work to-day, an ather result was the uncovering of a large-sized scandal in the postoffice department. Sir William Minto was under the fire of the opposition batteries for the three hours of the short session, and before it was over he was as limp and wilted a minister of the crown as has been seen of recent times. The postmaster in question at the gentle art of explanation, He floundered this afternoon, and finally got stuck in the mud that oozed from the excavations in his own department. When he seemed embedded beyond all possible hope of exorcism, the minister of finance came to his rescue, but the last state of Sir William was worse than the first. As the discussion is not yet over, but merely held over until to-morrow, there will be another special investigation.

The matter was brought up by Mr. Boyce, Conservative member for West Algoma, before the session on May 17. For some days Mr. Boyce has had on the question paper a question regarding the postoffice at Thessalon, Ont. This question was answered by Sir William yesterday, and to-day's discussion was the direct outcome of that answer and some careful investigation work on the part of Mr. Boyce among the files of the postoffice department.

Mr. Boyce pointed out that the postmaster at Thessalon was J. B. Dobbie, who resigned in May, 1904, and was re-engaged in the fall of this year. On April 11, 1904, an investigation was ordered into the affairs of the Thessalon office, and the inspector reported to the department that there was a shortage in funds of \$500. Postmaster Dobbie was credited with an alleged remittance of \$500, which he claims he made to the postoffice department by registered letter, but no record could be found of it. Further defalcations were made, and if it were not for the \$500 was sent there was a total shortage of \$1000. The inspector sent down an investigation of the matter post office letter 500. In his opinion, no satisfactory evidence that money was dispatched. Some days later, the inspector was asked to visit the office again, to take over the books, and some one in charge. It leaked out that for some reason of his own the postmaster at Thessalon had been making false returns for four or five months. On May 18 last year, the inspector made a report to the postmaster general.

"In order," said Mr. Boyce, "to draw the attention of the house to that report, I will state some of the heads." The inspector visited the office on May 10 and made a careful audit. He found that credit had been taken by the postmaster on April 1 for \$600 of district letter 500. No such number appeared on the record of the postal department as having been received. The inspector also found that credit had been taken for \$500 further remittance of \$600 on April 30, but no bank receipt could be found for it.

"I am satisfied," wrote the inspector, "that it was never sent. The postmaster or his assistant has been falsifying the returns."

Daughter at Fault. The inspector further said in his report that he had examined the assistant in the postoffice, and had secured the following information: The assistant (the daughter of the postmaster) had handed over to Postmaster Dobbie on April 1 for \$600 of district letter 500, the following sum: \$72 a short time before the date of the report.

they have the support of a large proportion of the people of the County of York. This claim is absolutely without foundation. It is true that there has not been so much opposition on the part of the residents of the county to the application before the legislature. It is also true that there is a strong feeling throughout the county against granting any more privileges to this straggling company.

In 1902 when the Metropolitan Railway attempted to secure legislation seeking connection with the radial railway, it was ably assisted in its efforts by the same members of the county council as are now helping the radial railway, a petition of over 1000 names of residents along Yonge-street from Aurora south was presented against the company's application, and at the same time distinctly stated that they were not represented by the petition of the county council. The same determined feeling against granting any more privileges to this company or its offshoots exists to-day.

Either the great fight against the monopoly held by the radial railway system has developed in connection with the Metropolitan Railway, which is the centre and model of the rest of the combination.

East Toronto's Fight.
East Toronto Town is at present fighting its own battle against the demand of this company for a perpetual right of way through the town of North Toronto. Town has fought against the Metropolitan Railway for the last ten years and has spent thousands of dollars in endeavoring to secure the rights that municipalities should have over its own streets. The council of North Toronto have been thrown down so frequently that they have become disheartened with the tactics of the politicians in the past. No request has been made by any of the municipalities to take part in the present application of the Radial Railway Company, except that which emanated from the company itself in concert with the York County Council.

Exclusive Rights for Whole System.
Six or seven years ago when the Toronto and Suburban Railway made application to the York Township Council for a perpetual franchise on extensions this company then contemplated, the request was definitely refused. The privileges already held by the various branches of the radial system are perpetual only at present in the case of the Metropolitan Railway. What the radial company is seeking now is to make this same privilege extend to all its branches. In this case not only will the franchise be perpetual, but the rights will be absolutely exclusive. All the leading highways of York County are already in the hands of this corporation. They have a free right of way over the territory that they now control with privileges of switches and turnouts wherever necessary or desired. These conditions would make it impossible for a municipality to hand over its streets to another company for a line of tracks in other words the whole street would be monopolized and the municipality would have to build a highway to provide a way of traveling for its own people.

Not a Representative Council.
Under the present county council act there is practically little representation with the municipalities. The bi-yearly elections in York County Council have shown the interest of the people in this body to be practically nil. The people are not seized of the power concentrated in the hands of this body. Under the old system every member of the county council formed a portion of the councils of the minor municipalities, and was directly in touch with the people each year. When this law was enforced in York County the Metropolitan Railway met strong opposition from a good many of the representatives of the southern end of the county, the portion of which at that time was only concerned in radial railway construction for suburban traffic. Before any legislation granting further rights to this monopoly is undertaken, the municipalities through the whole of York County should have an opportunity of expressing themselves definitely on such an arrangement, if the bill is held over a chance will be allowed the municipality of East Toronto to get another chance to elect municipalities, which will be readily accorded in nearly every instance.

Trying to Stupefy Members.
The scheme of holding over important legislation of this kind to the dying days of a session is one of the ancient dodges adopted by corporations not willing to let the full light of day in on the transactions which they wish to put thru. A government which has been elected in the interest of the people as opposing such a corporation grants as this cannot afford to produce itself in the initial session by passing the bill now asked by the radial railway company. A commission to deal with the electric railways of the province has already been promised by the government. This commission could safely be trusted to deal with a matter of this kind and devote sufficient time to the question by hearing all the municipalities interested as would bring about a reasonable and more satisfactory plan in the interests of the whole community.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS
"Buy of the Maker"

Street Commissioner Moon's horse and cart were struck by a suburban railway car this morning and hurled about the tracks. Fortunately the cart was with a rough shaking up, and no damage was done to horse or cart.

The Suburban Railway Co. has placed an electric brake on one of the cars, and if the experiment is successful they will be placed on all the cars.

105 LOADS OF LIVE STOCK WERE AT CITY MARKET

Prices Lower for Exporters—Market Dull and Dragg.

Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the two railways, amounted to 105 loads since last Tuesday, composed of 1652 cattle, 1862 hogs, 190 sheep and 223 calves.

The quality of fat cattle was fair to good, a large number of them not being finished.

Trade in exporters was the most unsatisfactory since the decline in prices took place. Prices for all classes of shippers were declined, but not as much as before.

At present the outlook for the export trade is dark. The great trouble is to be that prices in the country are and have been almost too high for the time of the season.

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STRIKERS STILL OUT.

Situation in Canada Foundry Remains Unchanged.

There was no change in the strike situation at the Canada Foundry yesterday. The officials are not at all concentrated, and do not purpose giving the agitators their demands. One official said yesterday that the men were striking against a proposition to give them more money. No man was compelled to work under the premium system unless he wanted to. It was voluntary with every man to say whether he would work on a straight time basis or on the premium system. If he wanted to make more money he applied to be given work under the premium system, but he wasn't forced to work under it.

The company claim that unionism does not enter into the question. They neither favor nor are they opposed to the union. They aim to give the most competent mechanics all they can earn in 80 cent per week more than is earned in other foundries is given to those who can and feel disposed to earn it.

RUBBER MERGER IN STATES, TOO. Thirty Plants Now Controlled by the United States Company.

Detroit, May 18.—The Rubber Goods Manufacturing Co. has given assurance thru circular letters that neither the Detroit nor any other of its plants will be affected, as to local conditions of the rubber goods industry in the United States.

The acquisition of the controlling interest in the Rubber Goods Manufacturing Co. by the United States Rubber Co. will increase the number of companies in the rubber goods industry in the United States from 14 to 20. The Rubber Goods Co. manufactures all sorts of rubber products, including boots and shoes, which business is largely handled by the United States Rubber Co. As these companies are now in competition with each other, the business of each supplements the other.

The capital stock of each company is \$25,000,000 common and \$25,000,000 preferred. It is not proposed to merge with the United States Rubber Co. total of \$75,000,000.

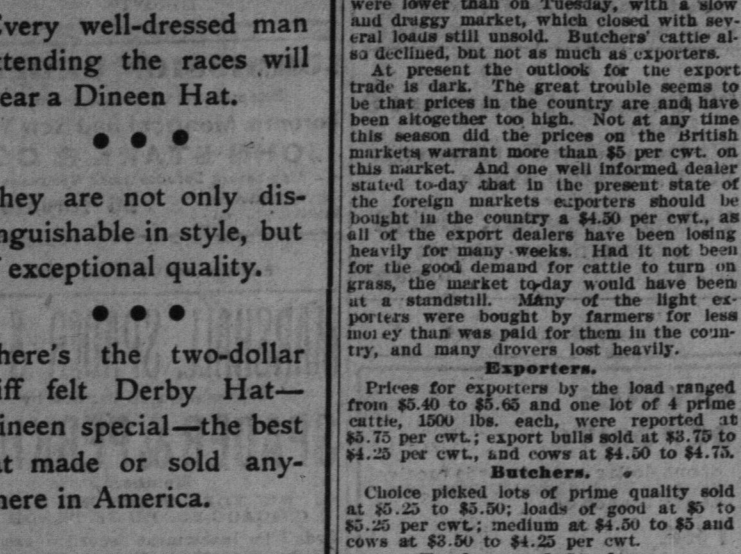
