

Big Rum Fleet Hovering Off California

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 30-Sixteen Britfsh, Belgian, Panamain and Mexican rum-runners, the greatest mobilization of liquorladen ships in the history of the Pacific coast rum-running trade, are hovering off San Diego in an effort to land 95,000 cases of Scotch whiskey and gin valued at \$4,750,-000, before July 4, prohibition enforcement officers state.

Combatting this rum-running fleet are the coastguard cutter Vaughan and the six fast patrol launches. One launch, suspected of being engaged in landing liquor from the rum fleet, was captured in the harbor yesterday and her crew of 28 were held for inquiry. Coastguard officers place the actual number of vessels engaged in bringing liquor here from British Columbia

Traffic Menace at Fair Vale and Proposed Solution



THE above is a sketch plan of the dangerous viaduct at Fair Vale, where the Canadian National Railway passes over the road leading from the city to Gondola Point, the scene of a recent bad accident and one of the most dangerous curves on the New Brunswick highways. The plan shows the two stone abutments, about 24 feet apart, between which a roadway about 18 feet runs. Since the sketch was made the ditch, originally six feet in width on the right-hand side of the road coming to Saint John, has been partially filled in with loose gravel, which helps to some extent but does not remove the menace of this hazardous

It will be noted by the sketch that a motorist approaching from either direction, is not able to get a view of approaching traffic until well within the opening of the viaduct, thus causing great temerity on the part of those who know the situation well, and a positive danger to visitors unacquainted with the road.

AT first glance it appears as though the simplest way to allow straightening of the road would be to cut off about three feet from the approach corners of the stone

abutments. The Times-Star is informed by expert authority, however, that while this would be an improvement it would not answer the purpose from an engineering point of view. The most feasible and satisfactory undertaking would be the widening of the viaduct by at least ten feet.

The dotted lines on the left of the sketch

above indicate the location of the proposed new position of the western abutment, which would be moved back ten feet from its present location and give a 34-foot opening, or one of about the same dimensions as the underpass between Coldbrook and Brookville. Besides affording a safer margin for vehicles passing under the railway, the moving of this abutment would also widen the field of observation for the driver so that he could see approaching traffic before it had actually entered the viaduct, and thus would apply him to govern his actions accordenable him to govern his actions accord-

WIDENING of the viaduct would not be costly, but it WOULD be a HUMANI-TARIAN UNDERTAKING, and one that all motorists would welcome and appreciate. More important still, if it were the means of avoiding one fatal accident, it would be worth fifty times the cost.

lie Debetcher.

An emergency call was sent to Oxford, and the fire department from that town hurried to the scene, arrivin about 5 o'clock. Two hours later, after a desperate battle, the firemen got the flames under control, and prevented further damage.



Why Teaching is a Real Man's Job-Why Men are Justly Afraid of Telephones - The Young Lawyer Who is Being Not Only Chased After, But Run Down by Girls -Shall She Marry Her Mail-Order Husband?

DEAR MISS DIX—Do you think it unmanly to teach, and that instructing others is primarily a woman's job? I don't. I think that a man can be as successful in this line of work as any one else, but many throw up their hands in horror at the thought. Do you think that as great a success could be made in teaching as in any other profession? JIM.



ANSWER:

If you rate success in terms of money, many other professions hold out greater inducements than teaching does, although fortunes have been made in private schools.

But if you count success in the opportunity it gives you for self-development along the highest lines, for leading an intellectual life and for doing good to your day and generation, then no profession offers higher rewards than teaching.

So far from teaching being unmanly, it is, on the contrary, the greatest and most responsible work that any man can take upon himself, for the material he works with is not wood, nor iron, nor gold, nor silver, but immortal souls. He doesn't build houses. He builds character. He doesn't plant potatoes. He implants ideas that will influence unborn generations for good or evil. He does not fashion metal into curious shapes. He molds the thoughts of children. He does not sell dry goods or groceries. He "sells" ambition and high ideas and righteousness.

no other human being on earth does any work so vital as that of training the minds of little children. They come to the teacher plastic and are as clay in his hands. Listen in on any group of children and you can hear: "Teacher says this; teacher says that; teacher does this; teacher does that." Teacher is their guide, their oracle, their model.

And especially is the job of the teacher important in this country, where in our melting pot are assembled a thousand incongruous ingredients that all have to be blended together into a homegeneous whole of Americanism.

Many of the children come to school from homes of fifth and squalor, from homes of ignorance and vice, from homes of unpatriotic nationalities, and it takes a man who is every inch a man to undo the work of their parents, to combat the influences of their homes, and to turn them into law-abiding citizens.

This is no work for a dainty, young girl to perform in the interim between the time she graduates and the time she gets married. It is the lifework for a strong man who has consecrated himself to a cause.

And so I think that the young man who takes up the profession of teaching is the greatest and most potent of all missionaries, and that he renders a service to his country that should entitle him to be decorated with the Congressional Medal.

Mr. Burden, in his paper entitled "School Sports in New Brunswick," said that an outside control, such as exists at present under the M.P.B. of A.A.U. of C., did not produce the best results, chiefly, due to the lack of knowledge on the part of the athletic officials of school conditions. Such an organization as he suggested could be affiliated with the A.A.U. of C., but would take over the entire control of interscholastic sports to the advantage. of those participating therein. 



Pilgrimage to National Shrine to Commence From Moncton

MONCTON, June 29-The pilgrimage of the Acadian peo-ple of the Maritime Provinces to their national shrine at Grand Pre, N. S., is expected to leave this city on August 18, it was learned at railway headquarters here today. There is some doubt yet as to what form the excursion will take but in previous years a special train has been run to the land of Evangeline and an elaborate program carried out at the church which has been erected a few feet from the famous Evangeline's well and the long row of willows originally planted by French settlers, prior to 1755, when the expulsion took
