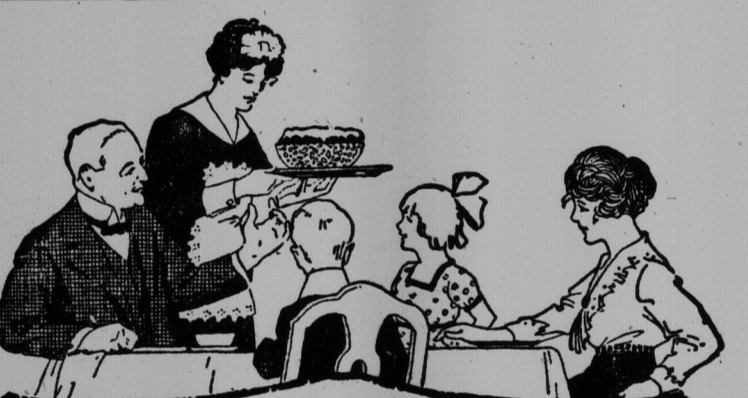

BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW

General Secretary for Canada is in St. John.

Walter Burd, of Toronto, Speaks of Plan and Aims of This Organization of Men in Church of England.

Walter Burd of Toronto, general secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Canada, is in the city on business connected with that society. In the course of an interview Mr. Burd explained the objects and organization of the society. It is the men's organization of the Church of England, and its one purpose is the training of men and boys to service. It is essentially not a social organization but a working body. In the Senior Brotherhood, which includes men from eighteen up, the foundation of all work is prayer, and the ultimate aim is to win the man or boy for Christ. Each member of the chapter aims to bring one man or boy to the confirmation classes and corporate communion.

Each chapter assists in securing candidates for the ministry and in organizing men's Bible classes and Sunday schools. They also assist the church wardens in welcoming strangers at the church door and assist the pastor in visiting. Hospital, prison and hotel work is also accomplished by this chapter. Open-air church services are often held, to reach those who will not attend church indoors. Club rooms are established by the chapter to keep the young men of the parish off the streets at night.

The Juniors. The junior department of the brotherhood is based upon the conviction that the future of the boy lies to a great extent in his training, and the boy in the 'teen' age is full of desire to work. To keep him attached to the church by doing something for him is a mistake. The better way is to give him a worthwhile task which will appeal to his imagination. As soon as a boy learns a religious truth, he should put it into practice in his everyday life, or it will mean little to him. When boys become members of a Junior chapter they are given a task within their powers; then, as their confidence increases, greater responsibility is given to them, so that they are gradually trained as Christian workers, and may supply the ranks of the senior department, Sunday school teachers, boys' leaders, candidates for the ministry, etc.

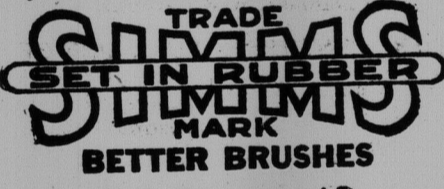
By this means, not only are the boys trained to be workers, and so their allegiance to the church is secured, but they become a power and influence in the life of every boy with whom they come in contact. The results of a Junior chapter to a parish are therefore twofold: It means the bringing in by the chapter of many boys who are at present out of touch with the Sunday school and church, and the developing of trained workers among the chapter members themselves.

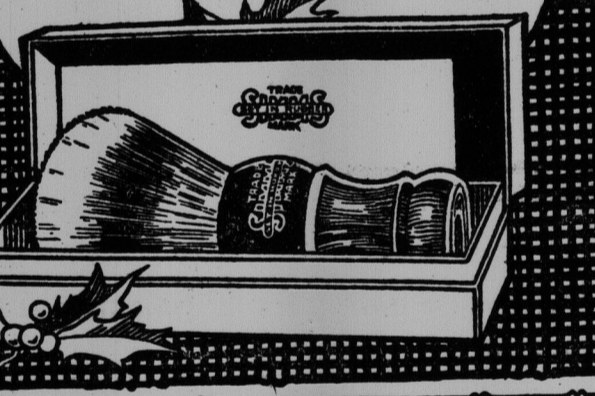

A St. Andrew man becomes a big brother to him, has him to the house to tea, finds him suitable employment, and links him up with the Y. M. C. A. or a similar organization, and with the Sunday school. In other words, the boys is trained to be a better citizen.

Mr. Burd said that we in St. John are badly off, because we have not even a juvenile court. The boy accused of a petty crime is brought into the police

OPERATION ADVISED
Ruling Against Woman Whose Children Were Underfed.

Denver, Col. Mrs. Cassidente, who already is the mother of five, was haled before the judge on complaint of Denver social workers to show cause why her children should be taken from her, the complainant alleging that the children had been neglected and were undernourished.

Dr. Ray Sunderland, testifying in the case, said he believed conditions at the Cassidente home were the result of the mother bearing children too fast.

"What would you suggest as a remedy?" asked Judge Graham.

"That Mrs. Cassidente submit to a sterilizing operation," replied Dr. Sunderland.

"I will continue this case until January 10," the judge announced, "and in the meantime I want the doctor's suggestion carried out."

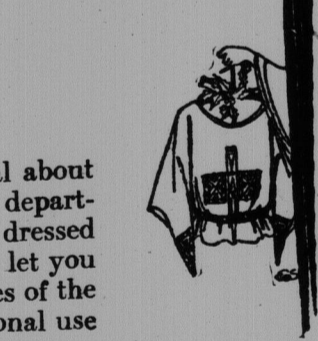

LOOT SHIP VAULTS OF \$125,000

Robbers Take Boxes of Gold from Sonora on a Voyage from Sydney—File Burglar Locks.

San Francisco, Nov. 30—Gold bullion, valued at more than \$125,000 and stored in the specie vault of the ocean liner Sonoma, was stolen while the vessel was on the high seas on her way to this port from Sydney. The theft, one of the most daring robberies of the sea, was discovered when the steamer arrived here Tuesday morning.

Investigation showed that the supposed burglar-proof locks of the vaults had been filed off and five strong boxes containing the bullion removed. Locks, the exact duplicate of those removed, were then snapped on the vaults. This precaution on the part of the robbers covered up their act until the Sonoma arrived here, as an inspection is made each day of the vaults.

Specie is the first shipment removed from a vessel. When those in charge of the bullion opened the Sonoma's vaults, preparatory to delivery, the five boxes containing the bullion were gone. The keys for the original locks fitted the substitute ones exactly.

As soon as the robbery was discovered officials of the vessel notified officials of the company. Captain Matheson, with detectives, hurried to the scene. The bullion was consigned from Australian banks to the International Banking Corporation, according to Frederick S. Sams, general manager of the Oceanic Steamship Company.

Captain and his men scoured the vessel from stem to stern. Three officers of

the vessel have keys to the strong boxes—the Captain, First Officer and purser, officials of the company said. The entire personnel of the Sonoma was examined.

Extreme care was taken in the substitution of the locks, which showed that time was taken in planning the looting. How the bullion was removed from the vessel is unknown, but it is believed that the act was committed before the Sonoma reached Honolulu and that the gold was removed there.

John J. Armour, of this city, has made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors to the Canadian Permanent Trust Company, authorized trustee.

THE PARIS TRIAL

The cross-examination of Miss Christina McKenzie was continued at yesterday afternoon's session of the circuit court in the case against John Paris.

The witness was shown a photograph, but she would not swear it was the same man who was in the office. The man had spots on his face the size of a small pea. She was closely questioned as to the spots and their location. Paris was called forward and the witness pointed out what she called the spots to the jury.

Warren Ogilvie, of Truro, was next called. He testified that he was the managing director of the Eastern Hat and Cap Company. He said that Miss McKenzie was trusted employee of the company and explained her duties. William McNaught also was an employee.

The witness then walked down and looked closely at the prisoner. He said that there was no doubt in his mind that he was the man. He had worked for the witness in 1920. The witness saw Paris last summer. Paris asked if the witness remembered him and said that he had not been paid for his work. He could not remember the date that Paris came for the money. Mr. Vernon then asked several questions that were put out.

The witness said that he had not been indebted to old John Paris last summer. Old John Paris was paid in the regular way on pay day or received a check. The witness had access to the books at all times and explained the method of making entries.

The witness said that the man who did the work and spoke to him about the money was the man in court. Albert Martin.

The next witness was Albert Martin, colored, of Amherst. He said that he knew John Paris. He testified to leaving Amherst on the night of Aug. 3 or 4 about 1.15. He got in to St. John about 6.15 a. m. Johnny Cook, Douglas and Stanley Gay, Herbert Martin, Percy and Clarence Corbet, who were on the train. The witness left St. John for the west on the evening of Aug. 4. Paris stepped off the train at St. John behind the witness. The witness shook hands with Paris and told him he was going west.

On cross examination, he said that he had left Amherst on either Aug. 3 or 4. He then said that he had left on the night of the third. If he had told Mr. Vernon he had left on the night of Aug. 4 he had made a mistake. He said that no excursion train had left Amherst. If Paris had said that he had left on an excursion train he was not telling the truth. He then said that it was called an excursion train. He first saw Paris in the station at St. John. He saw him later that day at the depot about 1 or 1.30 o'clock. The witness told of going to Carleton with John Cook. He went to Paris' home but did not see him. He did not see Paris in Amherst. Paris must have been mistaken if he had said that he had seen the witness in Amherst and had some conversation with him there. The conversation occurred in the St. John station.

U. yesterday afternoon when the president, Mrs. David Hipwell, was in the chair and there was a good attendance. 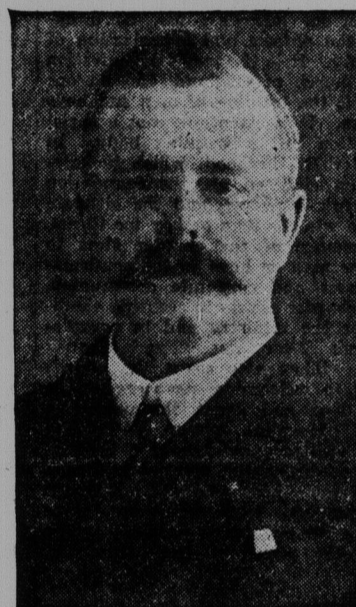

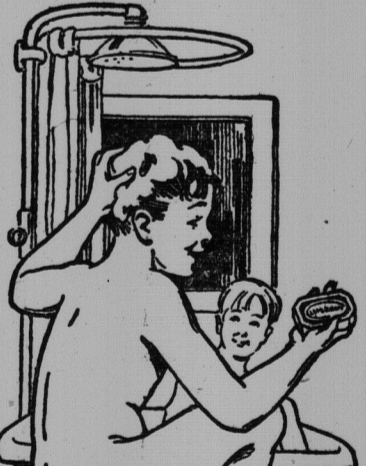

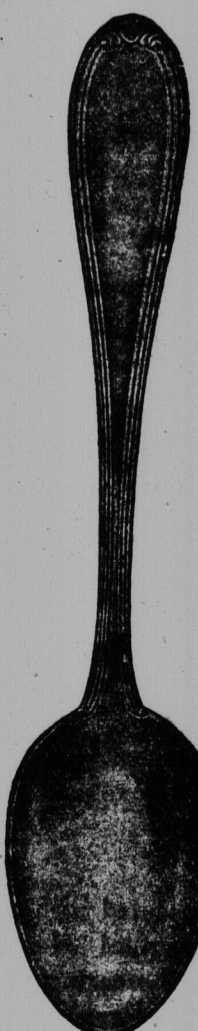

EIGHTH DAY OF THE PARIS TRIAL

More Evidence for Defence Heard This Morning.

Truro Witnesses on the Stand—Two or Three More for the Prisoner are Yet to be Called.

Evidence for the defence was continued this morning in the second trial of John Paris, a mulatto, charged with the murder of Sadie McAuley in St. John on August 2. Today was the eighth day of this trial. The witnesses who testified this morning were all colored people residing in Truro and all told of seeing the accused there at various times during the first three days of August. G. H. Vernon, counsel for the accused said that he would have only two or three more witnesses for the defence. The prosecution was conducted by Hon. J. F. Byrne, attorney-general, assisted by Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C.

The cross-examination of Archie Paris was resumed when the court opened. The witness said it was conductor Capson who was on the train when he and John Paris came to St. John. Conductor Capson was in court and the witness identified him as the man who was in charge of the train.

The witness said he had known John Paris nearly all his life and had not known him as John McCann.

Maxwell, the witness said, had a ticket to St. John. When interviewed by Detective Power, the witness said he did not tell him the accused was on the train. John Paris, the witness said, was dressed in dark clothes. He could not say if he had a mustache. The witness did not know there was a farm laborer's excursion train from Truro on August 2 until he returned to Truro.

He said Maxwell was alone in a seat when he got on the train at Truro. The witness got in with him, and went to sleep. Just before reaching Moncton, John Paris got in the seat and woke the witness. He was again awakened by the conductor after the train left Moncton. The conductor asked for tickets and the witness and Maxwell showed the check. The conductor started searching for his but the conductor did not wait.

The witness said that he did not know if Paris could write. He knew Paris' grandmother, Mrs. Latzer and his aunt, Janie Paris. John Paris was the only boy he had seen around the accused's home there.

He said he knew one Arthur Paris and two named John, including the accused. The other John Paris, he said, was more than sixty. He said the latter had three boys, Frank, Bernard and Joe. He did not know any of them being called John.

To Mr. Vernon, the witness said he was laid off his work as pullman car porter on account of no work. He said that he had not told Detective Power that John was on the train as Maxwell was asking in connection with the Paris case and thought he wanted to know who else was on the train. He said he had told Detective Biddiscombe that John Paris was on the train with him. He said he did not see John Paris give the conductor any ticket or money.

John A. Maxwell.

John A. Maxwell, colored, of Truro, steam-driller, said he went to the west from Truro on Wednesday, August 3. He said several people left Truro that night for the west. He said he knew Archie and John Paris, and saw him again on the train between Amherst and Moncton. He said he knew the accused since the first week in last May. He said it was on Wednesday, and he met him in Inglis street, Truro, near a shoe-shine. He said he just made himself acquainted with the accused.

Q—"Was it quite a light?"

A—"No, it was not very bright. I saw him and then I just kept on going because I was not very well acquainted with him as I never saw him before," explained the witness.

He said he next saw John Paris on the morning of August 2 in Inglis street near a shoe-shine owned by "Professor" Boonski. Paris was on a bicycle. The witness said he was in the west when the gasoline was stolen. He returned from the west between October 27 and October 30. Further questioned, he said he knew nothing about the gasoline until three weeks ago. He said he next saw Paris on the night of August 3.

He said Archie Paris did not know the witness' right name, which was John Alexander Maxwell. Archie knew him by the nick-name of "Lullie." He said he had three brothers, seventeen, fifteen and twenty-five. The witness said he was twenty-two. He said he was not well acquainted with William Bayard. He met him about three weeks ago. He knew William's son, who was called "Krug." The witness said he also knew Oscar Clyde and his family. He said he had not been in the Clyde house since last spring. He said he was not related to the accused. He said he met Mr. McNaught about two and a half months ago at Foundry Hill. He said he knew Miss McKenzie by sight about two weeks ago. He said "Doc" Bayard told him who she was. He had asked Bayard who she was.

Q—"Why?"

A—"Oh, I just wanted to find out who she was."

The witness said he remembered John Paris getting into a fight with Nobel Paris at Foundry Hill.

Q—"Was it quite a light?"

A—"No, Nobel struck John and that was all there was to it."

The witness said this was some time in July. He said he was in error when he said he had not seen John between the first week in May and Nov. 3. The fight took place on July 25 or 26, at a place owned by a colored man named Oliver. There was a dance there that night. The witness said Nobel was a son of John Paris and there was another brother, Dave.

He said he was at Truro station on Sunday night, July 31, but he did not remember seeing the accused. He said he knew Chief Fraser and Officer Boss to see them. He said he did not remember any conversation with the accused when they were together in the train just after leaving Truro. He said a white man and his wife sat on the side of the seat for about an hour after the train left and until the white man got a seat for himself. He said he went to sleep about an hour after he left Truro and woke up an hour before the train reached Amherst. He said he slept for about half an hour. He said he got off the train while at Amherst and did not see John Paris until the train left Amherst. He said he slept for about twenty minutes after leaving Amherst until John Paris came into the seat and sat

Major Burroughs, divisional commander of the Salvation Army, received word last night that his eldest son, Capt. Harold Burroughs, had arrived safely at Tokio, Japan. Previous to entering the foreign service of the army Capt. Burroughs was stationed at Kentville, N. S.

SALVATION ARMY.

It was announced that Salvation Army headquarters this morning that Sunday, December 4, had been set aside as a day of prayer throughout the eastern territory of the army, which comprises Eastern Canada, Newfoundland and Bermuda. STEAMSHIP FARES.

Montreal, Nov. 30—It was announced by the various steamship lines yesterday that second class continental passenger rates, eastbound and prepaid to and from New York, Cherbourg, Rotterdam and Antwerp, have been fixed at \$5 over the British rate instead of \$15 as heretofore. The Danzig rate is now \$16 and Labau \$46 over the Liverpool rate.

Norman Green, colored, of Truro, chauffeur for T. S. Pattillo & Co., said he saw Paris in Truro on August 1 between 12.30 and 1 o'clock, coming from William Bayard's. That night there was a ceremony at the Oddfellows' Hall. The witness said he left the hall about midnight and he saw Paris when the witness reached "The Island." He said he saw Paris again on the following day and on the afternoon of the 3rd while the witness was on his way home to tea. He had not seen the accused in Truro since.

The witness said he first told Mr. Vernon about seeing Paris on August 2 when he went to Mr. Vernon's office about a week before the first trial. He said he knew Paris almost all his life. He knew the accused as "Jack the Witch." He did not remember seeing Paris on Sunday, July 31. He said he knew Stewart Fraser for five or six years. He said he went home from the Oddfellows' social with Sadie Bayard, daughter of William and sister of Lou and "Doc" Bayard. When they reached Wm. Bayard's house, the witness said, he saw John Paris come out. Until Court here adjourned until 2.30 o'clock
