### IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENT AT COLDBROOK

A Medel Scheme for Industries' Homes and Gardens is Being Worked Out

(The Telegraph).

Last spring The Telegraph had the pleasure of announcing that the Coldbrook Realty & Development Company, composed of New Brunswick and Montreal parties, had acquired the Gilbert property at Coldbrook, consisting of nearly 600 acres, and intended to develop it as an industrial centre. Although the purchase was only made on the first of May last, a great deal of work has already been done toward realizing the aims of the company. First of all, it was necessary to build a spur line from the Intercolonial railway to the property in order to give truckage facilities. This has been done by the Intercolonial railway authority by means of the company, and the spur is already proving a great convenience in bringing cement and other materials needed for the construction of the automobile factory of the Maritime Motor Company Limited, as a site for which two acres have been bought from the Realty & Development Company. It is intended to carry the spur further into the property, and indeed wherever it may be required to give truckage facilities to other factories, for the establishment of which the company is prepared to offer exceptional advantages.

The Telegraph is informed that it is intended to reserve from fifty to seventy-five acres for factories, keeping them entirely separate from the residence portion, where houses will be erected for the factory employees.

A portion of the level land, of which there are about 100 acres, will be subdivided into acreage lots for market gardening purposes, the soil being rich and admirably adapted for the raising of celery, cabbage and other vegetables.

Another large area, consisting of upwards of 400 acres, extends for about a mile up a beautiful valley, with sloping hill sides thoroughly sheltered by a high ridge from the north winds, and presenting opportunities for many attractive home sites. On this portion of the property, it is intended to erect homes for the factory employes, and it is also expected that the level land will be carried to house sites by people, who would like the opportunity of having a few acres of tillable soil in connection with their homes, when they may engage in such occupation as poultry raising, also the growing of fruit and vegetables. Some distance from the well sheltered and sunny hillside offers an excellent opportunity. In developing the property, it is intended to erect a automobile factory and other buildings, near Coldbrook station. From the main line branches will be carried to the various cottages, which will soon be constructed. The company has also built a road up the valley to the site of the reservoir, thus making this portion of the property accessible.

The company also has in view the social advantage of the factory employes, it being intended to set aside the large brick house now on the property, with several acres of surrounding land, (the situation of which is very beautiful) for the purpose of a reading room, library and recreation ground. By the expenditure of a few thousand dollars in improvements this home, which by the way, is a very large one, can be admirably adapted for this purpose.

The company considers that the advantage of transportation, which will be afforded by the Intercolonial, and before long also by the Grand Trunk Pacific, and the St. John Valley Railway, with all of which the company's spur line will connect, will make its property ideal for manufacturing sites.

One objection which is sometimes raised to locating factories outside the city, is that it is difficult to get help. The Coldbrook Realty and Development Company believe, however, that the advantage of comfortable homes, with all city conveniences, and the opportunity of having a small area of land, where they can raise flowers, fruit and vegetables will appeal to many working people who will welcome the opportunity of bringing up their families in the midst of such beautiful surroundings.

The company intends to reserve a block of twenty acres on which intensive farming will be carried on under the direction of a skilled agriculturist, and the services of its farm hands will, with the requisite

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### DR. TOWNSEND GIVES AN IMPORTANT TALK

#### Some Health Matters Affecting St. John Referred to by Sanitarium Superintendent

Dr. David Townsend, of the River Glide Sanitarium, who was in the city yesterday, said that the work on the building at River Glide had been greatly delayed on account of the wet weather. He did not think that the institution would be ready for patients by October 1, as was expected but that the opening would be some time later.

"One great thing that I have noticed in my work in your province," said Dr. Townsend, "is that many of the people do not know how to feed themselves, and for this reason many get into a condition when they submit to the attack of the tuberculosis bacilli. Good milk and eggs form a fine food and the people should be taught the food value of these articles. A glass of milk has as much nourishment as a pound of meat, but even some of the farmers in New Brunswick pass by these foods and eat pork, which is very good when fresh, but which loses its good points when old."

"Many people as soon as they hear that a person has tuberculosis immediately say that he is doomed but this is far from the truth and all one needs is the proper care and advice. The sanitarium at River Glide will be a means of teaching means of prevention rather than the cure of the disease. People should sleep more with their windows open, especially if employed at inside work. Some of the clerks in the big stores will work there all day long and then perhaps spend four or five nights at dances or other indoor entertainments, while Sunday will likely be spent at something that will tire them so that they are in worse condition Monday than on Saturday. This kind of life weakens people so that the tuberculosis germ has a chance to work in their systems."

St. John could be a very healthy city if proper sanitary conditions prevailed, and in the opinion of Dr. Townsend and he was sure that the people would soon get to realize the proper way of living necessary for freedom from tuberculosis.

He also pointed out that the dust of St. John streets would have a tendency to carry tuberculosis bacilli.

All cases of tuberculosis should be reported to the authorities and then sanitary conditions of the district where the disease prevails could be looked into and improvements made.

Dr. Townsend believed that conditions here would be bettered by the people making the improvements themselves. "In the same way that the people caused the repairs to King street," he said, "so will they eventually demand that foods be handled with all necessary precautions and that cases of tuberculosis be handled with precautions necessary for the prevention of the spread of the disease."

(Continued from page 1) There is a case where the arrest was declared illegal because the policeman did not produce the warrant. This was purely technical, but the court held that the prisoner, a British subject, had no rights that must be respected, although it is not right that a man's money should be taken away from him, unless it is connected in some way with the property stolen. If it is connected with the robbery it is quite proper that it should be taken, but unless it is, it is not a thing to take away his money which he might use for the defence. I believe constables are too much in the habit of taking away everything they find upon a prisoner, which is certainly not right. And this is a rule which ought to be observed by all policemen.

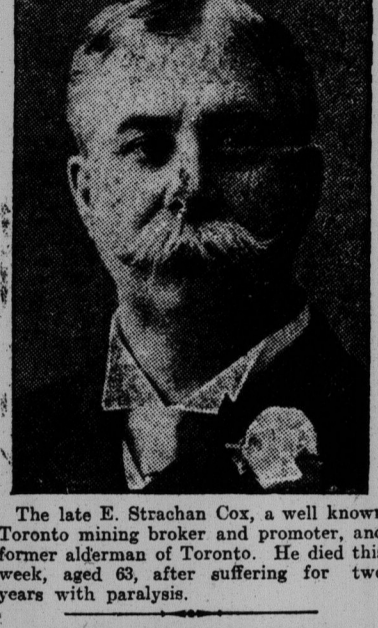

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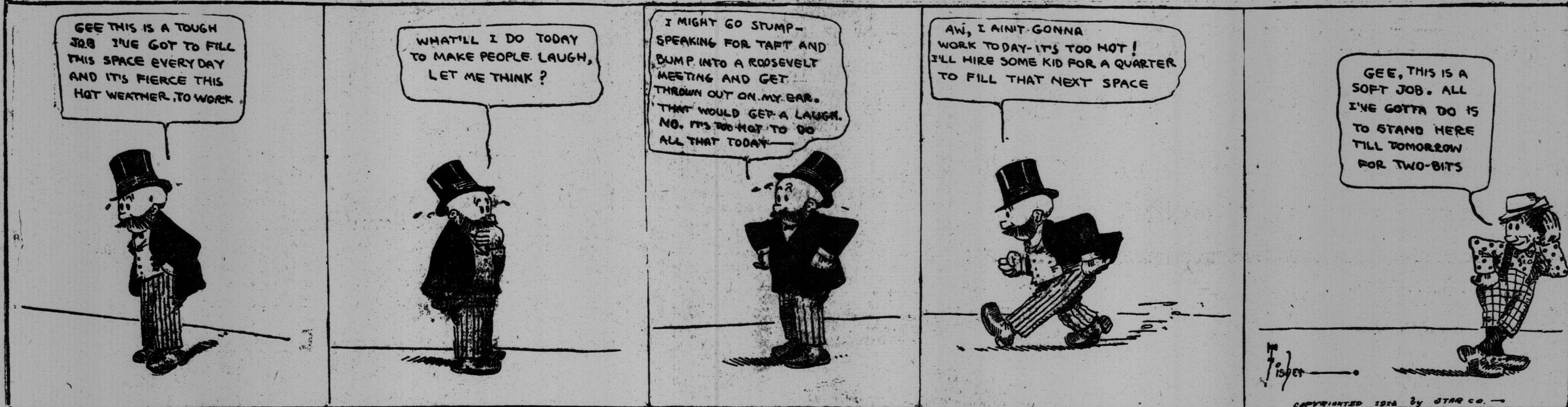
