International disputes, Dr. Munro said there were those of legal nature easy to arbitrate, and those of vital interests, honor or facts. Great Britain would not arbitrate her position regarding the Suez Canal or the United States her immigration laws, as these were cases of vital interests. But the commission of inquiry established at The Hague in 1899 effectively arbitrated the case of facts when the Russian fleet fired on English fishing boats in the North Sea.
 Dr. Munro pointed out that world power had been rejected as a means of achieving international peace and cosmopolitanism did not seem feasible at the present time and the League of Nations was evolved to promote international co-operation as a means of achieving international peace. He described its machinery, mentioning first the deliberative body composed of representatives of 55 states. Germany, he believed, would enter the League this year, and while the United States was not in the League it was sympathetic, and Russia was the only other large power outside.
 Me stressed the fact that public opinion must be behind the League to the Geneva protocol there was now seen a definite attempt to return to the old game of the Balance of Power, and unless the success of the League of Nations was assured by popular interest in less time than the present generation there would be another war, and another war would be another war, and another war would be one of extermination.
