Leading Englishmen Consider it Impracticable-Bernard Shaw's View.

VIENNA, May 20—A despatch to the Tageblatt from London says that 177 answers of leading British politicians, Generals and writers to a circular ask-ing their opinions of the raising of the

ing their opinions of the raising of the disarmament question at the Hague conference show that only eleven believe disarmament is practicable. Sixteen are violently against it.

The rest are more or less sceptical, including ex-Prime Minister Balfour, the Marquis of Lansdowne, Lord Rosebery, the Duke of Devonshire, Austen Chamberlain and Sir Conan Doyle. The Duke of Sutherland prefers arbitration. Bernard Shaw declares that disarmament is pure nonsense. He adds that with the assistance of a progressive income tax Great Britain could treble her armaments. Why therefore disarm? Mr. Shaw is against war because he is afraid, and he believes that war will only come to an end when every one has the courage to confess himself a coward.


