**STEVENS CAROLINE.**—Correspondence between the British Ministry and the Secretary of State, communicated to Congress on Thursday last.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13, 1840.  
Sir.—I am informed by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, that Mr. Alexander McLeod, a British subject, and late deputy sheriff of the Niagara District in Upper Canada, was arrested in the State of New York, on the 12th of last month, on a pretended charge of murder and arson, as having been engaged in the capture and destruction of the steamboat "Caroline," in the month of December, 1837.—After a tedious and vexatious examination Mr. McLeod was committed to trial, and he is now imprisoned in Lockport jail.

Sir.—I have the honor to acknowledge, and have laid before the President, your letter of the 13th inst. respecting the arrest and imprisonment of Alexander McLeod, a British subject, and late Deputy Sheriff of the Niagara District, in Upper Canada, on a charge of murder and arson, as having been engaged in the capture and destruction of the steamboat "Caroline," in the month of December, 1837.

These men are to consist of Volunteers, who are to be invited to offer themselves, but should not present themselves in sufficient number, the Companies are to be completed by drafts.

2.—These Companies are always to be considered as first for service, and as officers, Non-commissioned officers, or Private Soldier is to be allowed to present himself in any of them.

3.—Commanding Officers of Regiments will, with as little delay as possible, take the requisite steps (in concert with their Captains, and without calling out their corps for this purpose) for compelling each of their Plank Companies to the following establishment, viz.—One Captain, one Lieutenant, one Ensign, three Sergeants, three Corporals, one Drummer, sixty Privates. Transmitting to this Office, along with the General Annual Return, a general list of each Plank Company distinguishing the Volunteers from the Drafts.

The approval of justification of the outrage by the British authorities, might be a ground of complaint with the Government of the United States, distinct from the violation of the territory and the laws of the State of New York. The application of the Government of the United States to the Government of the Province of Upper Canada, cannot deprive the State of New York of her established right of vindictive, through the exercise of her judicial power, the property and lives of her citizens. You have very properly regarded the alleged absence of Mr. McLeod from the scene of the offence at the time when it was committed, as not material to the decision of the present question. That it is a matter to be decided by legal evidence, and it will be for the court which has taken cognizance of the offence with which Mr. McLeod is charged, to decide upon its validity when established by legal evidence.

The President deems this to be a proper occasion to remind the Government of her Britannic Majesty that the case of the "Caroline" has been long since brought to the attention of her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who, up to this day, has not communicated his decision thereupon. It is hoped that the Government of her Majesty will perceive the importance of no longer leaving the Government of the United States unacquainted of the views and intentions of her Majesty's Government, in respect to a subject which has led to such grave consequences.
