CANADA'S FINANCES.

The Dominion's finances were never more pros according to the half-yearly financial statement which has been issued. A striking feature of the statement is the decrease in Canada's debt by ten million dollars as compared with a year ago. AUSTRALIAN COMPULSORY SERVICE.




