No doubt Red Tape would muddle through this war, but it would be at such a cost of Red Blood that victory would be hardly worth while. Officaldom is slow to learn; it is a series of watertight compartments, almost impervious to ideas. The other day I heard a Canadian officer of considerable experience as an army doctor say: "The hospital trains are getting worse and worse. At the outset the demand for hospital trains was so unexpected that practical railway men and army surgeons were left pretty much to their own devices in fitting up trains. So long as Mr. Red Tape with his rules and regulations, his forms and formulae, has been hampering the successful prosecution of the war, he is going to be given short shift. Red Tape might fight Zulus, but not the Germans.

DOMINIONS WILL BE TAKEN INTO CONFIDENCE OF BRITISH GOVERNMENT

London, July 21,—Replying to a debate in the House of Commons today, on the situation in the dominions and colonies, Arthur H. Steel.* Maitland, under secretary for the colonies, said it was the Intention to take the responsible ministers of the overseas states into the confidence of the government in every matter that might arise, not only during the war, but also in the question of the settlement of peace.

That was the reason, he said, Premier Borden, of Canada, attended the cabinet meeting July 14. 


