The German Army Compelled To Fall Back All Along The Line

French Take Eight Thousand Prisoners and Capture Eight or Ten Villages - British Compel **Enemy To Fall Back on Scarpe—Enemy Likely** To Retreat Across the Aisne.

From Soissons to the Belgian border the German armles on various important sectors are being put to the test by the French and British. And it is a test that seemingly bodes ill for the Teutonic arms, for nowhere have they been able to sustain the shocks.

Northwest of Soissons, from the Aisne to the Oise, north of the Oise to the region around Roye, in the Arras sector and northward on the famous Lys salient the Germans everywhere have been compelled to fall back under the pressure of the French and British troops.

Hon. Martin Burrell Tells of Great and Valiant Work Army Has Done.

HOST OF SLACKERS BECOME OUTLAWS

Believes Many Misled By Others—Law Will Be Enforced After August 24.

Ottawa, Aus. 30.—The Hon. Martin Burrell, acting minister of militia, in a statement to The Canadian Press tonight, referred to the recent Canadian offensive and expressed in no uncertain tones the government's view in regard to the annesty for deserters, which expires at the end of this week. "Since the first of August," said the minister, "the Canadians have marked their entry into the fifth year of the war by achievements which have confirmed the reputation of the Canadian Corps as the most formidable fighting force of its size on the western battle front. The recent advance made by our men has been important in its results and brilliance in execution. In the past three weeks they have captured ten thousand prisoners, one hundred and fifty runs and thousands of machine guns. During this same brief period they have suffered 10,482 casualties in killed, wounded and missing; 130 officers and 1,474 men having been killed in action.

Their Own Story.

French Forces Advance Two and a Half Miles On Fifteen Mile Line

Paris, Aug. 20-The French forces fighting east of the Oise on a front of about fifteen and a half miles have advanced to an average depth of about two and a half miles and captured numerous villages, according to the French official communication issued this evening. More than eight thousand prisoners have been

South of Roye the town of Beuvraignes has been occupied by the French after bitter fighting.

The text of the communication follows:

South of the Avre, we have captured Beuvraignes after a bitter struggle. In the course of our advance yesterday between the Matz and the Oise we took five hundred prisoners.

"East of the Oise our troops this morning attacked the German lines on a front of about twenty-five kilometres, from the region of Bailly as far as the Aisne.

"On our left we have reached the southern outskirts of the Ourscamp Forest and also the outskirts of

Carlepont and Caisnes.

THE BRITISH TAKE 2 MORE VILLAGES

In Sharp Fighting East of Arras, Along Scarpe River Haig's Men Advance Line Slightly To East of Fampiux-Vierhoek and La Couronne Captured.

London, Aug. 20—East of Arras along the Scarpe River the British in sharp fighting have advanced their line slightly to the east of the village, of Fampoux, while farther north, astricted the Lys River, the British reached L'Pinette and north of Merville have captured the villages of Vierhoek and La Couronne according to Field Marshal Haig's communication to night.

The text of the statement follows:
Local fighting has taken place today on both banks of the Scarpe River. South of the river, hostile attacks upon certain posts which our troops have succeeded in establishing east of the enemy's former front lines were repulsed. North of the Scarpe our line has been pressed forward a short distance east of Fappoux, after sharp fighting in which we secured a few prisoners.

GERMAN LINE

SPLENDID LECTURE ENEMY FORCES BETWEEN AISNE AND DISE ARRE HURLED BACK Prof. H. F. Munro of Colum-

Compelled To Abandon Line on a Ten Mile Front, French Penetrating German Positions to Depth of Two Miles-Enemy Likely To Retire From Soissons To the Chemin des Dames.

(By The Associated Press).

Yesterday's lecture before the Canadian Club on the "Freedom of the Seas," delivered by Frof. Henry F. Munro; lecturer of the department of international Law at Columbia University, was characterized by those privileged to hear it as one of the best addresses ever delivered before a St. John audience.

The speaker said it was his personal opinion that peace could only be enforced by the navies of the world operating on the seas. In the past few centuries Great Britain had been the dominant power on the sea, and it was admitted by all that she had used her power justly. British rule of the seas had also resulted in the abolition of piracy and the slave trade and the charting of practically all the waters of the globe.

Prof. Munro said he believed that when President Wilson spoke of the "Freedom of the Sea," he meant complete freedom in times of peace with a three mile territorial limit.

At the present time the laws which should govern the free use of the sea by all were being broken in three ways: By Germany in the sowing of mines, irregular use of the submarine, the sinking of hospital and relief ships, the sinking without warning of merchant vessels, the slaughter of non-combatants and the bombing of defencless ports. The second way was by the imposing of war zone re strictions by all nations, and the thir was by the violation of private property rights.

AT SOISSONS AND AISNE IN DANGER

Ludendorff, Sparring For Time, Will Not Be Ready To Make Even a Small Spectacular Show For a Couple of Months or Until the 1920 Class Is Ready and Peace Move Will Serve His Purposes Excellently.

Special cable to New York Tribune and St. John Standard. (By Arthur S. Draper).

London, Aug. 20—Out of the conference at the German main headquarters may come a peace rather than a military drive. Ludendorff is sparring for time and he won't be ready to make even a small spectacular show for a couple of months or until the 1920 class is ready, and a peace drive will serve his purposes excellently. Before Hintze, Kuehlmann's successor as foreign secretary of state, started for this conference in company with the Kaiser and Hertling he told the Berlin correspondent of the Kolnische Zeitung that Germany was ready for any reasonable peace but that he did not consider Lloyd George's offer reasonable.

Young Emperor Karl, who wants peace in the worse way, is attending the conference and before he leaves it is likely he will have promised Germany help in the west in return for which the Kaiser and the militarists will agree to aftempt another peace drive.
