The Colonists at Home.

The men of Kinross-shire will be home to-night. They will find the prospect slightly different from the picture contained in the projector's pamphlet, but that they are prepared for. The standing stumps and huge piles of logs, ready for burning, will not look very inviting, but these men, women and children are ready for anything, and will accept the situation with the purpose of succeeding. A more quickly self-reliant set of people never before struck for free homes in a strange land. They have no the slightest repining or discouragement. The women say they won't like doing without "milk" till feed can be got for "cows," but they can use a very few shillings on their own account. When the men are asked if they can chop down and look they show their muscular arms and trees as though they were ready to try. The children are, of course, happy anywhere.

While there are a great many advantages in the manner of settlement adopted by these people, there are also some disadvantages. They will not have the example of native workers to guide them, and may be some time in learning the best methods of doing things. It is feared by some of their friends that advantage will be taken of them when they buy stock, as the prices they have been accustomed to are much greater than the prices here. It has been suggested that an agent of the Government should aid them in making purchases, seeing that they get everything at a fair price. We hardly think they will be cheated much, however, as they are shrewd people and have already learned a great deal of matters and things in New Brunswick.

Arctic Expedition - Six Months Adrift on a Raft of Ice.

NOTES AND NEWS.

NOVA SCOTIA. The passengers by Saturday's train, which got off the track near Hantsport, adopted resolutions calling for an investigation into the condition and management of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Company's line.

Mr. Tashley of Dartmouth, a boarding house keeper, was stabbed on Saturday, by a man by the name of McNab, a clerk in the Crown Land office, because he refused him a drink. During the trial, the other day, at Annapolis, Maryland, of Joshua Nicholson and Thomas R. Whalen, alias Hollahan, for the murder on the 2d of January of a lady named Mrs. Mary Ann Lamphrey, for the purpose of robbing the house, Hollahan suddenly sprang from the dock, and rushing at Deputy Marshal Fry struck him violently over the head with a heavy piece of iron, and escaped. Nicholson also sprang out of the prison box and rushed towards Fry, who was in the dock, and was able to assist in subduing the prisoners, though he was severely injured. After the excitement had subsided the trial proceeded in the usual manner, and on the 10th of May, the jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree.

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PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Beet Root Sugar Exempted from Excise Duty.—The Opposition have Agreed to Advocate Separate Schools, and Wish Demand Them for New Brunswick. OTTAWA, May 14. Yesterday Beatty and Shilley, sitting members, were declared duly elected by the Committees that had been considering their cases. Hon. Mr. Tilley in moving that the House to-day consider the assumption of the old Canada Surplus Debt resolution, defended the proposed increase of debt in a lucid and practical speech. Hon. Mr. Laugher read letters from persons named by Mr. Dorton as being cognizant of his (Langher's) attempt to get votes by threatening not to construct necessary public works, denying Dorton's assertions point blank. Mr. Dorton said he was not satisfied, and on his motion, it was ordered that all papers be placed on the journals.

On motion of Mr. Joly the House went into committee to consider the resolution declaring it expedient to exempt sugar from excise duty for ten years. It appears that the root can be raised to any extent in Quebec, and large quantities of sugar made from it. It is hoped that a large trade could be established if the enterprise were protected for a few years. Hon. Mr. Tilley said he would do anything reasonable to develop native industries if revenue were not too much interfered with. He thought five years exemption from taxation would be fair. Sir Francis Hincks said the sugar duties amounted to fifty cents per bushel of the whole population. The amount of protection by not levying an excise duty would be 48 per cent.
