WHEREAS it is provided by the 58th Nection of the Act 31 Victoria, Chapter 6, intifuled "An Ac. respecting the Customs", that the importer of any cattle or swine may slaughter and cure an i pack the same in bond, under such Regulations and restrictions as the Governor in Council may from time to time make for this purpose.

And whereas it has been found expedient to give effect to the said Section 58, in so far as regards the importation of swine, and to at ter the terms of the Regulations for this purpose, adepted by Order in Council of 22nd of May, 1868:

Lits Excellency, on the recommendation of the donorable the Minister of Cus toms and underthe provisions of the said Act has been pleased to order, and it is here by ordered, that the said Order in Council of the 22nd day of May, 1868, and the Regulations thereby establised be and the same are hereby repealed, and that the following Regu ations be and are hereby adopted and established in little thereof—that is to say.

1 Upon the importation of swine for the purpose of slaughter, the Importer shall enter the same for Warchouse, upon the usual form of such entries, stating upon its face, the number stated value of the herd, and also the quantity of pork bacon, hams and lard, which the animber stated will produce when slaughtered and dressed at 13 pounds weight for each live hog so imported, and the amount of duty to which such produces is or may be liable under the rate prescribed by the tariff in force at the time bring as the proper duty on meat of that kind. Such Importer shall these execute a bond to the Queen, in double the said one year of the said products of the swine so imported and converted into pork, become null and void, otherwise shall be end become null and void, otherwise shall remain in full force and virtue.
