BUFFALO BILL

ent Out by Gen. Miles to Investigate the Messiah Craze—The Fort Keogh

Story Denied.

BISMARCK, N. D., Nov. 28.—Buffalo Bill has arrived accompanied by his old pard, Frank Powell, known as "White Beaver," and R. H. Haslan, known as "Pony Bob," who once rode 108 miles in eight hours and ten minutes. Special conveyances with relays were engaged to take the trio to Standing Rock Agency. Buffalo Bill has a commission from Gen. Miles, which is believed to be the most important of any issued since Sitting Bull's surrender. The party will go direct to Sitting Bull's camp, on the Grand River. It will be remembered that Sitting Bull did not come in on Saturday, the regular ration day, but sent word to Agent McLaughlin that his child was sick. It is believed that Buffalo Bill is. sent out to get at the bottom of the Messiah craze, with almost unlimited authority to act. This is Buffalo Bill's first visit to this section since the Custer massacre.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 23.—Gen. Wesley Merritt has received dispatches from the Indian Territory to the effect that the Indians in the vicinity of Fort Reno are somewhat unsettled, due to the Messiah craze, but that no trouble is feared. Their religious dances, however, are carried on with much fervor and are participated in by Indians from other reservations.

Tink RIDGE AGENCY, Nov. 28.—Unless the Indians are frightened or driven into a fight during the next week there is every probability that the Indian troubles on Pine Ridge Agency will be settled without difficulty. No hostile Indians can be found among the 4,000 gathered here.

WASHISTON, Nov. 28.—The advices received by the War Department yesterday from the seat of the threatening Indian troubles are reassuring, and indicate a gradual subsiding of the ghost dance.

CHICAGO, III., Nov. 28.—A special from Wiehita, Kansas, says reports from Fort Reno tell of greatly-increased excitement among the ghost dancers, and considerable accessions to their ranks, especially among the Klowas and Apaches. The more excitable reliskins are cutting themselves with knives and spears and the sight of blood has had the effect of greatly arousing the warriors' spirits. Several lodges of braves mounted their ponies, approached the fort and dared the soldiers to come out. The runner's sent north by the Caddas and Kiowas have not yet returned, and scouts are on the lookout to intercept them, as it is feared reports of bloodshed may hasten an outbreak. Great unessiness prevails among the whites on the west border of Oklahona and Green county, Texas.

Detroit Free Press: The residents of this city have continued to receive all reports from Grace Hospital as to the condition of little Matilda Oreach with eager interest. The two girls, Matilda and Emma, who were released from the uncomfortable position in which they had remained for 34 days late Sunday night, are both quite comfortable. It is hoped that the wound on Emma's side will be sufficiently healed so that she may leave the hospital in about ten days.

The original wound left as nearly as can be expressed in figures about 140 square inches of skinned surface. Of this the larger graft covered about 40 inches, and a number of other small grafts of pieces of skin have already been made. The top of the scalp is entirely bare, the periosteum having been destroyed by the accident. It is of course impossible to graft skin over this surface. Considering a Practicable Scheme to Enter New York City.

Montreal, Nov. 28.—For a long time past the Canadian Pacific Railway has been endeavoring to discover a practicable project for getting into New York City, and the officials have now under consideration two such schemes, both of which are likely to be adopted. The first one is to run a road across New York State with a starting point on the St. Lawrence, either opposite Rockville or a point between that town and Montreal. Along the west side of the Hudson River is the West Shore Road, but it is learned that the Canadian Pacific can secure a new and independent route down the river, the proposed railway to be located some fifteen miles west of the West Shore. It is stated that the new extension would provide not only a splendid through line for the Canadian Pacific to New York, but also supply an important section of New York State with much desired railway accommodations.
