# PANIC AT PETERHOF PALACE; BOMBS IN CZAR'S GARDEN

## Wild Consternation in Imperial Household Follows Unearthing of Deadly Dynamite Machines.

New York, July 11 .- According to a St. Petersburg dispatch to the World, there was wild consternation at the Imperial palace at Peterhof yesterday following the discovery in the garden of that place of several bombs filled with

The excitment and dread were indescribable. It was obvious that the bombs must have been placed there by someone connected with the palace, either as officer, guard or servant, and everyone equally was under suspicion. Gen. Trepoff, the commandant, immediately put in motion all the machinery of his office to discover the culprit, but thus far without result. In the meantime the person of the Czar is being more rigidly guarded than ever, if increase of precaution is possible.

#### Preferential Resolution Carried With Cheers

London, July 11.—The resolution in favor of preferential treatment on a reciprocal basis, introduced in behalf of the Montreal Board of Trade, at the opening yesterday of the sixth congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, was carried at today's session amid a remarkable scene of enthusiasm. The vote was preceded by a further animated discussion for and against the resolution. The Australian delegates considered It to be impracticable, while the Madras representatives approved of it. The British delegations appeared to be divided, but when an expression of opinion was called for a forest of hands went up in favor of the resolution, and only a dozen voted against it. 



## RECIPROCITY LAWS **NEXT PROBLEM**

May Engage Attention of Winter Congress.

Washington, D. C., July 11. - Tariff reciprocity at the beginning of tariff revision may be made the chief issue of the short session of the Fifty-ninth Congress.

It is more than likely that after the election in November steps will be taken in the direction of the passage of a general reciprocity law. This does not mean that any such law will be passed next winter, because that absolutely is impossible at the short session of Congress. It is likely, however, that some preliminary action will be taken by way of appointment of a commission or joint committee of the two Houses of Congress to draft something in the way of a reciprocity law which will meet the demand for such commercial arrangements.

Whatever reciprocity there is must be by a new law, because the reciprocity feature of the Dingley act expired two years after its passage, and none of the treatles negotiated under its provisions succeeded in securing ratification by the Senate.

The reciprocity of the future must be statutory, that is to say, the President must be authorized in some way eithe by the operation of a maximum and minimum tariff, or by a horizontal reother countries.

This would not mean revision of the tariff, if reciprocity could be accomplished on a percentage basis, that is to say, by the application of a more general principle of the present law without disturbing the rates themselves, thus provoking a general tariff discussion. It practically is certain that the joint commission idea will be adopted at the short sesison of Con-

It is too early yet to say whether President Roosevelt will or will not liscuss the tariff in his next message to Congress. He consented to eliminate that subject last fall because he had so many irons in the fire he did not deem it advisable to take up a new one and endeavor to keep that also at white heat. 


