## SAYS THAT BATES DESERTED WIFE

She Found Girl-Wile and in Fierce Battle at the Babe Hungry.

Declares That the Infant Had Greatly Improved When Brought to London.

Mrs. Mary Miller, of 183 Hess street north, Hamilton, mother of Mrs. Ida Bates, gave evidence in the police court this morning against her sonin-law. James Bates, who is charged with criminal neglect in not providing proper food and medical attendance for his infant child, James Bates, jun., the child dying, it is alleged, as a re-

of this neglect Mrs. Miller testified that Bates remained at home for three weeks after the child was born last June, and then deserted his wife for six weeks, going to Niagara Falls. In the meantime the witness had moved from Dundas to Hamilton, and returned to visit her daughter, whom she found "pinched with hunger, and the child in the same She took her daughter back to Hamilton and kept here there for five weeks. During this time Bates letter, until just before he came imself and took her away under the retence of having found plenty work in Niagara Falls, where he said he intended living. Instead he came an entire stranger here. Mrs. Miller stated that the baby improved while Mrs. Bates remained with her, and would have been a fine child had it

been properly cared for. She testified that her daughter is now only sixteen years of age.

Doctor Testifies.

Dr. F. P. Drake attended the deceased child at Victoria Hospital from Oct. 27 to 29, and testified that death edge and nursed their anger. was either caused by malnutrition or want of assimilation of proper food. The child ought to have had medical

treatment. Mrs. Martha Caravella, sister of the defendant, James Bates, stated that the child was in a very serious condition while the Bates family were living by themselves on Bathurst street, but if it had had medical attention it would no doubt have improved. In answer to a question of the prisoner, Mrs. Caravella admitted that the child's mother had sometimes neglect-

Mrs. Ida Bates testified that her husband had neglected her, and failed to provide her with proper food and clothing, and had never allowed her any money to spend on herself or child. When her husband asked her if he did not often return and find her talking to the neighbors in the back yard, and his meals not ready, said that they persisted in calling her out, and never gave her a chance to do her work.

On the evidence offered, Magistrate Love decided to commit Bates for trial on a charge of criminally neglecting his child, at the general sessions of the peace, which open on the first Tuesin December.





Washington, D. C., Nov. 15 .- Mr. C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture for the Province of Ontario, used the following words here tonight in the course of an exceedingly able address on "The Problem of the In-different Farmer":

"In the Province of Ontario we have 175,000 farms, whose annual productions total about \$250,000,000. If by some magic of process of regeneration we could turn all the indifferent farmers into wideawake, progressive, upto-date farmers, the total production would easily be doubled, and it is not beyond the reach of possibility to reble our output."

The address was one of the features of the fifteenth annual meeting of the international Association of Farmers Institute Workers. Canada is well repesented by many prominent workers, ncluding G. A. Putnam, of Toronto, superintendent of Ontario Institutes, who has been president of the Interna-tional Association for the past year; Dr. G. C. 



#### BRITAIN AND PERSIA.

A crisis has again arisen in Britain's relations with Persia. Three weeks ago the foreign office dispatched an ultimatum to the Persian Government, declaring that if within three months order were not established on the trade routes leading northeastward from the gulf, British officials would seize a portion of the port customs and apply it to equip a gendarmerie under British direction. This, if carried out, may commit England to the occupation of Southern Persia, as Russia already has entrenched herself in the north.

The Persian Government has replied that such action would infringe its independence, and asks to be allowed itself to make a surcharge upon the gulf customs and maintain the necessary police. It points out also that a considerable loan has almost been secured from a London firm, by means of which it may be able to show itself quite competent to conduct the affairs of Persia. Along with the Persian reply comes news of angry mass meetings in Constantinople, denouncing Britain as traitor to her role of protector to weak peoples and free governments, and call-

For this reason I would have you think for a little of the place, and the part of Canada in this Anglo-Saxon fraternity

which you celebrate here tonight.

Hundred Years of Peace. A hundred years ago there were distrust and recrimination and bitterness between the mother country and this daughter republic. 





#### A BRITISH FLAG **USED BY PRIESTS** SAVED PROPERTY

rish Dominicans in Lisbon Unmolested While Ensign Protected Their Church.

London, Nov. 15:-A letter received from Lisbon, written during the excitement of the rebellion in Portugal, says: By a curious turn of fate the British flag from the dominion of which a Irish priest fled in 1640 is now the ensign flying over the modern structures which mark the present day development of his foundation, the fluttering flag warning all Lisbon that respect of person and property must be given them.

As recorded in cable dispatches the British flag was raised over the buildings of the Irish Dominicans at the first sign of revolution in Lisbon. How efficacious this act proved may be learned from the correspondent of the Westminster Gazette, who writes: "There is one church here which

need not fear desecration, for it is protected, not by holy relics beneath the high altar, but by an English flag at the front door. This is the Irish Dominican Church of Corpo Santo, which looks today like the committee room of a Tory candidate of pronounced imperialistic views during s khaki election. Even the priests in the sacristy wear miniature Union Jacks in their buttonholes Good Talisman.

"And it proves to be a perfectly efficient talisman, for whereas a German Lazarist-the ex-queen's confessorwas brutally murdered in his own house after the doors had been battered in with axes, not one of the Irish monks has been molested. The far of the Kaiser's wrath did not prevent the revolutionists from sending five bullets after Father Zimmerman, the learned Jesuit priest, when he esfrom Quelhas monastery on Wednesday last. One of these bollets killed or wounded somebody in the crowd of refugees. The Irish Dominicans, on the contrary, can freely walk the streets: indeed, they are the only monks in all Portugal who can do so. It is true that monks of almost every other European nationality also walk the streets frequently and in compact groups, but they can hardly be said to do so freely, considering that they are always prisoners on their way to jail, surrounded by abusive soldiers and sailors flourishing rifles, naked swords and loaded revolvers, and fellowed by howling and derisive mobs.

"The Irish nuns of the Bon Succorso Belem, enjoy the same immunity under the entwined crosses of Saints George, Andrew and Patrick. Even English Roman Catholic ladies who have entered Portuguese religious orders are released from custody once their nationality is ascertained.

Respected Flag.
"With a small British flag in one, hand and a permit from the Republican minister of foreign affairs in the other (the permit not worth the paper it was written on, the flag of alm thaumaturgic virtue), the Dominican Father O'Sullivan sallied forth today to the arsenal, wherein several hundred Portuguese nuns are herded to-

gether like cattle, and procured the release of an English lady, Miss Tipping, of the Dorothean Order. When the convent and girls' school of that order in Quelhas was pillaged, on Thursday last, Miss Tipping was carried prisoner to the arsenal with the other nuns. As soon as she was discovered to be English she was given a separate room, supplied with everything she wanted and treated with the utmost consideration. She is now living in the house of a friend, and in a short time she will be allowed to leave for England. Meanwhile the Spanish, Italian, French and Portuguese nuns remain in prison. Count Boni, it is said, is suing for the hand of Miss Anne Morgan, daughter of J. Pierpont Morgan, of New York.

De Castellane, in his petition, is said to have set up that his marriage to Anna Gould was illegal, from a church standpoint, the bishop of his diocese not having been formally notified.






