



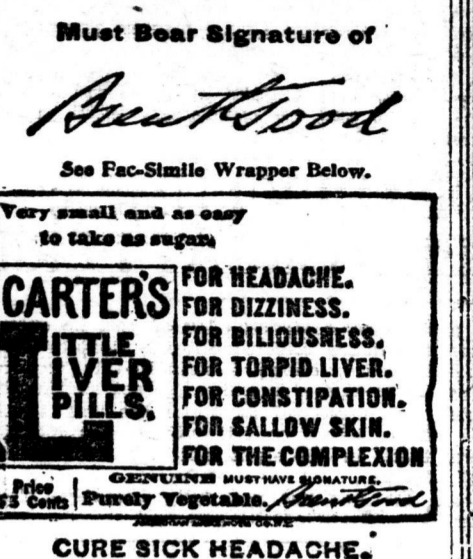
FAMOUS WHISKEY CASE IS SETTLED Distillers Win On Question of Branding of Blended Liquor—Many Appeals.

# DR. MACDONALD TO NEW YORK CLUB

## Tells Canadians There That Canada Is Loyal to Britain and Her Own Nationality.

### A CENTURY OF PEACE

A Dinner in the Metropolitan of America inaugurates the Celebration—Dr. Macdonald's Address.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

New York, Nov. 15.—The annual dinner of the Canadian Club, held this evening in the Hotel Astor, was a great success, and the speeches of many of those on the toast list dealt directly or indirectly with the question of reciprocity.

The 100th anniversary of the signing of the peace of Ghent, which will be celebrated in 1914, and will mark the termination of a century of peace between America and England, was also a favorite theme.

Annexation is dead, the speakers stated.

Many Guests. Dr. Neil McPhatter, of the Canadian Club in this city, presided. At his table, among the guests of honor, were Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, M. P., Canadian minister of labor; President Wm. Peterson, of McGill University; Hon. Adam C. Bell, of New Glasgow, N. S.; James Brereton, president of the Canadian Club of Montreal; Gerald H. Brown, president of the Canadian Club of Ottawa; J. F. MacKay, president of the Canadian Club of Toronto; C. Fred Chestnut, president of the Canadian Club of Fredericton, N. B.; James Mitchell, president of St. Alexander's Society of Montreal; Col. Alexander Graham, president of the "Canadian Club" of Boston; Dr. E. R. L. Gould, General Stewart L. Woodford, John McLean, Daniel Sinclair, Rollin M. Morgan, and others.

A Century of Peace. Dr. McPhatter, in opening the banquet, said he hoped that a monument of some sort would be raised to commemorate fittingly the signing of the treaty and one hundred years of peace.

Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King said there was a danger that some individual or society might try to monopolize the movement for the celebration of the treaty signing. He thought the fact that the United States and England had amicably settled all differences so amicably for so long indicated a warning war spirit in the world.

Owing to a serious illness Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, which was one of the finest of the evening, was read by Mr. J. F. MacKay, of Toronto, and was received with great enthusiasm. It was in part as follows:

Dr. Macdonald's Address. This is a significant occasion. Under the auspices of the Canadian Club of New York, you who were born under the stars and stripes, unite to inaugurate the celebration of a full century of undisturbed peace between Britain and the United States. At such a time it is proper that those who respond for Canada should speak not only of the vastness of our country, or of its undeveloped resources or possibilities in agriculture and industry and trade, but rather of those problems of the higher politics and international relations. For this reason I would have you think for a little of the place, and the part of Canada in this Anglo-Saxon fraternity which you celebrate here tonight.

not for Britain and America alone, but for the world.

Canada's Contributions. Now, the question arises as to the contributions which Canada may make to this Anglo-Saxon fraternity. What place does Canada hold, and what part may she play in league with Great Britain and the United States for the peace of both and for the peace of the world?

Remember that Canada has suddenly emerged from the colonial stage, and now feels stirring in her blood the sense of national dignity and national responsibility.

Annexation Dead. And to our friends in the United States we give you assurance that while we rejoice to recognize how much of what is best in our life we have in common with them, yet our nationalities are distinct, and that we will continue to divide the sovereignties of the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes.

A League of Peace. May we not hope that even in our own day these Anglo-Saxon nations shall join in a league of peace with all other nations of like mind, and shall insist with the authority of their combined prestige and power that on the high seas of international life all nations of the world shall receive peace as can be done, and Britain and America should do it.

## A BRITISH FLAG USED BY PRIESTS SAVED PROPERTY

Irish Dominicans in Lisbon Unmolested While Ensign Protected Their Church.

London, Nov. 15.—A letter received from Lisbon, written during the excitement of the rebellion in Portugal, says: By a curious turn of fate the British flag from the dominion of which an Irish priest fled in 1840 is now the ensign flying over the modern structures which mark the present day development of his foundation, the fluttering flag warning all Lisbon that respect of person and property must be given them.

As recorded in early dispatches the British flag was raised over the buildings of the Irish Dominicans at the first sign of revolution in Lisbon. How efficacious the act proved may be learned from the correspondent of the Westminster Gazette, who writes: "There is one church here which need not fear desecration, for it is protected, not by holy relics beneath the high altar, but by an English flag at the front door. This is the Irish Dominican Church of Corpo Santo, which looks today like the committee room of a Tory candidate of pronounced imperialist views during a khaki election. Even the priests in the sacristy wear miniature Union Jacks in their buttonholes."

Good Talisman.  
"And it proves to be a perfectly efficient talisman, for whereas a German Lazarist—the ex-queen's confessor—was brutally murdered in his own house after the doors had been battered in with axes, not one of the Irish monks has been molested. The 'scourge' of the Kaiser's wrath did not prevent the revolutionists from sending five bullets after Father Zimmerman, the learned Jesuit priest, when he escaped from Quelhas monastery on Wednesday last. One of these bullets killed or wounded somebody in the crowd of refugees. The Irish Dominicans, on the contrary, can freely walk the streets frequently and in compact groups, but they can hardly be said to do so freely, considering that they are always prisoners on their way to jail, surrounded by abusive soldiers and sailors flourishing rifles, naked swords and loaded revolvers, and followed by howling and derisive mobs.

The Irish nuns of the Bon Succorso, Belem, enjoy the same immunity under the entwined crosses of Saints George, Andrew and Patrick. Even English Roman Catholic ladies who have entered Portuguese religious orders are released from custody once their nationality is ascertained.

Respected Flag.  
"With a small British flag in one hand and a permit from the Republican minister of foreign affairs in the other (the permit not worth the paper it was written on, the flag of almost thaumaturgic virtue), the Dominican Father O'Sullivan sauntered forth today to the arsenal, wherein several hundred Portuguese nuns are herded to-

gether like cattle, and procured the release of an English lady, Miss Tipping, of the Dorothean Order. When the convent and girls' school of that order in Quelhas was pillaged, on Thursday last, Miss Tipping was carried prisoner to the arsenal with the other nuns. As soon as she was discovered to be English she was given a separate room, supplied with everything she wanted and treated with the utmost consideration. She is now living in the house of a friend, and in a short time she will be allowed to leave Portugal. Meanwhile the Spanish, Italian, French and Portuguese nuns remain in prison.

"To return, however, to the Irish sacristy, which supported the books connected with the business affairs of the establishment, were three other small British flags.

"Over other churches waved Spanish, Swiss, French, Italian and other ensigns, but a Chinaman would have pronounced all those flags to be 'bad jobs,' inasmuch as, with two exceptions, the churches over which they waved were closed, while, thanks to the Union Jack, the Irish chapel was the only place in Lisbon wherein mass was publicly celebrated today. The other two churches that remained open were Portuguese, but in neither of them, so far as I am aware, was there any religious service. Certainly, there was no congregation."

## COUNT BONI FILES DIVORCE PETITION

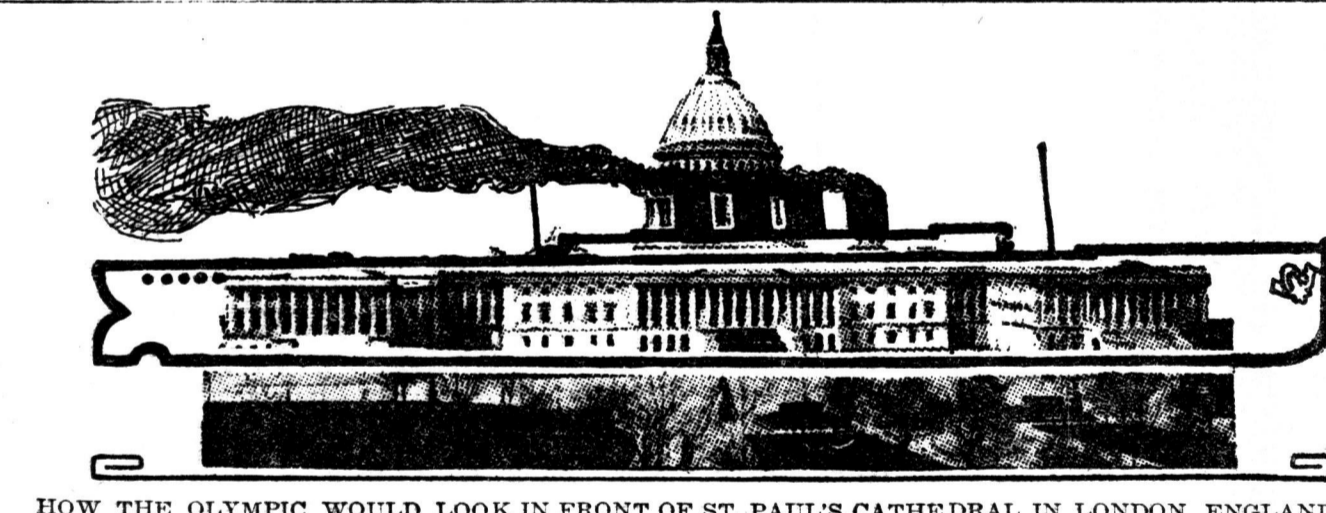
Wants the Church to Free Him From Anna Gould Marriage.

Rome, Italy, Nov. 15.—Count Boni de Castellane, former husband of Anna Gould, now the wife of his cousin, Prince de Sagan, today filed with the Vatican a formal petition, asking the Pope to confirm his civil divorce and grant him a church divorce. Count Boni, it is said, is suing for the hand of Miss Anne Morgan, daughter of J. Pierpont Morgan, of New York.

De Castellane, in his petition, is said to have set up that his marriage to Anna Gould was illegal, from a church standpoint, the bishop of his diocese not having been formally notified as never having taken place on the grounds of illegality. Children of a marriage thus annulled, however, are regarded in the Catholic Church as illegitimate, on the grounds that their parents were never married.

The Vatican authorities are said to be seriously hesitating before placing the church stamp of illegitimacy upon the three De Castellane children, who, in the care of their mother, are being raised as devout Catholics.

In some circles it is said J. Pierpont Morgan refused to permit De Castellane to pay attention to Miss Morgan until the Vatican has annulled his marriage with Anna Gould.



HOW THE OLYMPIC WOULD LOOK IN FRONT OF ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL IN LONDON, ENGLAND.

London, Nov. 15.—Another record is smashed in this record-breaking age, in the launching at Belfast, Ireland, of the White Star liner Olympic, now the biggest vessel of any kind afloat, costing \$7,200,000.

The Olympic is in reality a great floating hotel and will accommodate 2,500 guests, for whose comfort everything imaginable has been provided. The eleven decks of the new ship have tennis courts, palm gardens, swimming pools, and gymnasium. In addition to the passenger list, the liner will carry a crew of sailors, engineers and employees of 860 people.

If the Olympic were stood up on its bow, it would tower 882½ feet into the air.

The Olympic beats the Lusitania, which heretofore has been the biggest ship, by 96 feet in length, although the Lusitania will probably retain the record for speed. The Olympic is built to make 21 knots an hour.

A Palace.  
She has been described as a "floating palace, and a floating town." Both descriptions are accurate. Her fittings are the last word in ship decoration, and when she has her full complement of passengers and crew there will be 5,860 people on board.

The Olympic is more than a sixth of a mile long, and among the features that make her one of the wonders of the sea are:

- Children's nurseries
- A swimming bath
- A riding school
- Suites of flats
- Millinery and dressmaking shops
- A jewelry store
- Gymnasium
- A roller-skating rink
- A fish-pond
- A garden.

As she was launched a mere hulk, she weighed 27,000 tons, but when finished she will be of 45,000 tons gross register and 65,000 tons displacement.

The Olympic and her sister ship, the Titanic, which will be completed early next year, are each twice the size of the first Olympic, the pioneer liner of the White Star fleet, which was launched in August, 1870. The latest giant will be employed in the mail and passenger service between Southampton, Cherbourg, Queenstown and New York.

The vessel was launched minus the bridge deck and captain's bridge, for through the space left free is 180 feet, deep the danger of carrying away some part of the fixed roof of the gantry above early became apparent.

The White Star ships are all graceful in appearance, and the Olympic,

despite her enormous bulk, compares favorably with any of her predecessors.

When she is finished her perfect proportions, her funnels or so of super-structure, her four enormous funnels, losing their size in that of the whole ship, and her two signal-masts, will, if the drawing of the designers may be taken as an indication, make her very pleasing to the eye.

Passengers May Go Shopping.  
Here are some of the dimensions of the new vessel:

The Olympic has fifteen water-tight bulkheads, and two thousand side-lights and windows. Her largest plates, each 36 feet in length, weigh over four tons each. Her double bottom alone is built up with about 270 tons of rivets; and the three million rivets that have been used in the entire ship weigh some 1,200 tons. Her largest double beam, 92 feet in length, weighs four tons, her stern frame seventy tons, her rudder one hundred tons. Each of her engine crank-shafts weighs 118 tons, the castings for her turbine cylinder 163 tons, and her anchor nearly sixteen tons. This last is held by a chain-cable of which each link weighs fourteen tons.

Like the same company's Laurentic, launched a couple of years ago from Messrs. Harland and Wolff's south yard she will be a triple-screw boat, the two outside propellers being piston driven by high pressure quadruple expansion reciprocating engines, while

the central propeller will be actuated by a low-pressure turbine engine.

The Olympic provides accommodation for 5,000 passengers, and her crew will number 860.

The passengers will find that never have they travelled the ocean in such luxurious surroundings.

A tropical verandah restaurant, with lattice work covered with growing vines, is one of the luxuries provided for saloon passengers. Then there are children's nurseries, a tailor's shop, a modiste's parlor, a jewelry store, a Turkish bath, a gymnasium, a swimming bath large enough and deep enough for diving, a grill-room, palm lounge, shower baths attached to the cabins, and a fish-pond where one may catch trout for dinner.

In addition to the ordinary suits of rooms the new liner offers flats.

One of the upper decks is to be completely enclosed to serve as a ball-room, which can also be used as a skating rink or theatre. By day this enclosure, the windows of which are constructed on the railway carriage principle, fitted with jalouse shutters, may be used as a sun parlor and promenade. It will be large enough to accommodate several hundred passengers.

## A FRIEND OF EDWARD'S

London, Nov. 15.—Of all the members of the diplomatic corps for many years past none probably was on such intimate terms of friendship with the late King Edward as the Marquis de Soveral, who has just resigned as Portuguese minister. After making himself popular in London society as secretary to the Portuguese mission he returned to Portugal for a couple of years and then came back to London in 1891 as Portuguese minister. From that time on he moved less in general society, keeping almost exclusively to Edward's inner circle. On one occasion, it is said, the marquis' name was inadvertently omitted from the list of guests invited to Sandringham for the week end. When King Edward discovered the error he telegraphed to the marquis to come at once. The minister arrived just before dinner. When he entered the room the King exclaimed: "Why did you wait to be asked?" "Well," replied the marquis gravely, "of course, knew far too much to have presumed on the King's friendship to the extent of coming without an invitation. I had got as far as my door when your command arrived."

## LARROUX'S POWER IS ON THE WANE

Republicans Declare Leader Too Orthodox—Court Military Clique Favors Moroccan Conquest.

Barcelona, Nov. 15.—Spanish Radicals are disgusted over the statement of Alexandre Larroux, Republican leader, that Spain will be a republic within the next three or four years.

It is more likely, the Radicals declare, to be a republic within three or four weeks, or months, at best. It is beyond question that Premier Canalejas' failure to make any perceptible progress with his anti-clerical programme in the Cortes is rapidly increasing popular discontent. This, together with the encouragement given the revolutionists by the success of the Portuguese revolution, is taken as a serious menace for the monarchy.

The Republicans feel that Larroux is too orthodox. They suspect him of a plan to establish a republic on military lines, similar to that of France, which is almost as distasteful to Republicans as the monarchy itself. For that reason Larroux is likely to be out of touch with the sentiment of the extreme Republicans.

The military group at court, reckless and regardless of consequences, is trying to force King Alfonso to adopt a policy of open conquest in Morocco, calling for the use of thousands of troops. There are rumors that Alfonso is on the point of yielding. To send more troops to Africa would be sure to cause a revolt.

No indication as to the purpose of the request was made, but there was a ready response. About a thousand names were sent in. There was much gossip as to the intention of the marchioness, but during today and yesterday a circular in the following terms has been received by each of the "Marys" from Lady Bute:—  
"Queen Mary's Coronation Gift—Preliminary Notice.  
On the occasion of her coronation it is proposed that the Marys of the British Empire should offer a gift to Queen Mary either in the form of a personal ornament or in the form of a sum of money to be placed at the Queen's disposal. As it is intended to give all Marys who wish to do so an opportunity to join, any sum can be given from 1d to £1. A list of all the contributors will be kept, but not the amount given by each. The gift will be limited to those who bear as their first name the name of Mary, Maria, May, or Marion.  
As it is apparent that such a gift would lose much of its attractiveness were it to be brought constantly under her majesty's notice, it is to be hoped that all those to whom the idea appeals will tell their friends about it, so that no reference need be made in the newspapers. A committee of Marys is being formed, and a collector will shortly call upon you in case you wish to subscribe.  
The foregoing circular has been received with mixed feelings, as many of the poorer Marys thought they were to be recipients and not subscribers.

GOVERNMENT TO HELP

Will Assist the Western Farmers in Building Elevators. Regina, Nov. 15.—The report of the elevator commission, appointed Feb. 26, by the Saskatchewan Government, has been handed to Premier Scott. It is a bulky document, and the commissioners, Professor Robert Magill, of Dalhousie University, N. S.; George Langley, M.L.A., and E. W. Green, Moose Jaw, secretary of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association, are unanimous in their findings. Public interest largely centres upon the commission's finding in the matter of ownership and operation of initial elevators, and on this point the commission favors none of the schemes outlined before them in their entirety.

but have evolved a solution, embodying what appears to them to be the best features of several of them. Government ownership and operation, municipal ownership and operation, state ownership and operation, and various modifications of these are all discarded, as faulty in some important particular, nor does the present system receive unqualified commendation.

The solution offered by the commission takes the form of a co-operative joint stock company, owned entirely by the agriculturists of the province, upon the directorate of which the Government shall have no representative whatever. It is suggested that a minimum of 15 per cent be paid up by the farmers on such of \$50 shares as are subscribed for, the maximum number of shares allotted any one person shall be ten, and that 25 elevators be the minimum number proposed to be operated by a company before the central body can be organized and government assistance called for. It is suggested that this assistance take the form of a loan for each elevator, such loans to be secured by mortgages, and to be repayable in 20 equal annual installments, principal and interest.

AGED AND INFIRM AND HAS NO HOME

A Pathetic Case Before Police Magistrate This Morning. Thomas Murray, old, infirm, near-sighted and partially deaf, appeared in the police court today. Murray has always been of exemplary character, but some time ago was sent to the county jail to be taken care of. Magistrate Love expressed the opinion that Murray should be admitted to the Asylum for the Insane, and he released to give him an opportunity of entering the institution. He is unable to work, and has no one to care for him. "I will not leave you to perish," said the magistrate. "If they refuse to take you in at the home, I will have you again provided for at the jail. The trouble is, they are now caring for people in the home who are able to work, while others unable to help themselves are unable to gain admission."

KING CALLS MEETING

Continued From Page One.

Lords Play a Trump. London, Nov. 15.—The Globe this evening gives currency to a report that Premier Asquith is considering the resignation of the cabinet, as the King has refused the guarantees sought by the Premier.

When the House of Lords assembled this afternoon Lord Lansdowne, the leader of the Opposition, played a card which possibly may be the prelude to a highly interesting development in the political game now under full headway. He would tomorrow, he said, move "That this House invite His Majesty's Government to submit to its consideration the terms of the Parliament Bill."

The Earl of Crewe, Liberal leader in the Upper House, replied that he would be in a position tomorrow to state the Government's intention with regard to the Parliament Bill. This new move on the part of the Opposition is regarded as excellent tactics, calculated to embarrass the Government, as it is difficult to see how the Liberals can consistently report in their campaigns against the Lords in the face of an offer to consider the Government's proposal.

The postponement of Premier Asquith's statement is regarded as being intimately connected with Lord Lansdowne's notification of the step he intends to take tomorrow, and reports already are in circulation to the effect that a dissolution of Parliament may not be quite so imminent as has been announced.

Did Not Consult Peers.

Lord Lansdowne this afternoon took occasion to deny the report that the recent constitutional conference broke down because the peers would not allow ex-Premier Balfour to accept certain terms. He said there had been no consultation whatever with the peers regarding the terms proposed at the conference, and he intimated that although the conference did not report a definite agreement, other and more successful conferences might be possible.

EXPERTS TO TEST THE FIRE ENGINE

Machine of Local Company Will Be Given Thorough Trial.

Fire engines will be a subject of discussion at the meeting of No. 3 committee tonight.

At the last regular session it was recommended that the engine offered by the Canadian Fire Engine Company of this city be purchased at a cost of \$5,300.

The council sent the matter back to the committee for further consideration tonight. It is more than probable that the former recommendation will be again sent to the aldermen, with a further suggestion that a competent man be employed to make a test of the machine.

BRISTOL STORY DENIED.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The minister of marine, Hon. Mr. Brodeur, states there is no foundation for the report that one of the five new Bristol cruisers ordered by the admiralty is being built for the Canadian Government. It is understood that the Canadian Government proposes to adhere to its policy of having the vessels for the Canadian fleet built in Canada if possible. Tenders for the construction of the new Canadian cruisers and destroyers will be called for shortly.
