HUMAN BONES FOUND IN BARN MAY BE THOSE OF TRAMP

Building Owned by Simon Blight, of Wyton Station, Was Burned On June 27 and Bones Were Located in the Ashes and Cinders.

What are supposed to be human bones bearing long shreds of badly burned flesh have been discovered in the rulins of the barn of Simon Blight, of Wyton Station, northeast of London, which was burned to the ground in some mysterious manner on the night of June 27.

No person had been seen in the vicinity on the night of the fire, and as every person in the neighborhood has been accounted for, it is believed that if the bones are those of a human being they are the remains of the tramp who accidentally or maliciously fired the building.

All that has been found has been sent on to Toronto for examination by the owner of the place. Mr. Blight resides quite near the property on which the barn was situated.

The season's harvest, including some fifty tons of straw had recently been placed in the building, so that the efforts of a bucket brigade formed by residents of the locality were of no avail. The fire lasted for some time and burned the crops, with a number of valuable implements.

There had been no storm, so it was suspected that a tramp had entered the place to spend the night and had, perhaps, fired the place while smoking.

The matter was reported to High Constable Hughes, who is of the opinion that the body of a man would be entirely cremated in such a conflagration unless covered by something to protect it from the fire.




