



From the days of Peter the Great, Russian statesmen and people have adhered to their great monarch's far eastern designs and persisted in trying to realize his dreams of Russia on the ocean. This vast purpose of Russia has become so fixed as to be almost a religion.

The occupation of Manchuria is a mighty installment in the realization of Peter's vision. This province of China is an empire in itself. England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales are not onethird as large, nor are they richer in natural resources. With a population of only 15,000,000, Manchuria is capable of sustaining 50,000,000 people. There can be nothing but reprobation for the duplicity by which Russia has established herself in China's fairest province: but the masterful way in which she has assimilated it, without the expenditure of a dollar except for railways and fortifications, without the shedding of blood, and without provoking the ill-will of the natives, commands admiration. The Russians were originally Asiatics. They crossed to Europe where they have undergone an organizing and civilizing process, and now they are returning to their Asiatic mission. The Cossack has inherited from father and son, through generations running back hundreds of Russia's understanding of the Asiatic has been instinctive and congenital that she has been so successful in the work of assimilation. She has extended the net-work of her power over Asia with a far-sightedness not exhibited by the foreign diplomacy of any other nation. The world is kept in the dark as to her diplomatic plans until they are disclosed by results; and in this way she has a tremendous advantage over nations such as Great Britain and the United States, where foreign relations must be openly discussed by

The lease by China to Russia of the Manchurian ports of Dalny and Port Arthur extends for only 25 years, but no one imagines that she will relinquish her hold. Her single port on the Pactfic, Vladivostock, is open to commerce in the winter months only by the aid of ice-breaking devices. Port Arthur and Dalny give her the outlet she has coveted for centuries. She has built 1,700 miles of railway in Manchuria; her forts are there, her soldiers, her ships, her business. These she means to keep there. The only check to her continuous expansion will be the planting of a Japanese Empire on the mainland of Asia; and this is the settled purpose, the burning passion, of Japanese statesmen. According to a writer in Lestie's Monthly there are about 200,000 doctors in the United States, or about one for every 350 people. It has been approximately estimated that the average year. ly income of these men is \$750, or that the public in the country pays \$150,060,000 annually for medical attendance, omitting entirely the money spent for patent medicines, which bring millions of dollars to manufacturers, or the amounts spent for doctors' prescriptions or paid to quacks and commer cial doctors. The preparation for the practice of medicine that gives a man good standing in the profession means an expense of, liberally speaking, \$4,-000 for four years in a reputable medical school, \$1,000 for general expenses during two years' hospital service, and perhaps another \$1,000 for setting up n practice.

The well-known specialist receives some large prices for his work, but in exactly the same proportion the value of the time he gives away is increased. There probably is not a doctor in the country who makes \$100,000 regularly every year, those who make \$50,000 are a mere handful, and the average physi cian, it should be remembered, has an income of \$750.

While the lower courts decided that the "glorious name of Montebello should not be risked in trade, nor used as an advertisement," the supreme court reversed this judgment on appeal, and declared that, inasmuch as nobiliary titles in France can only be considered as parts or complements of ordinary names, they can be used, there fore, in conjunction with trade marks and are subject to the ordinary laws dealing with trading names. In fact, there is only one way in France to prevent strangers from usurping a person's name and title for purposes of trade or otherwise, namely, seeing that the Government will not recognize the proprietary rights to any nobiliary title

Although titles are not considered to be in keeping with republican institu-tions, yet it is a peculiar fact that quite a large number of the diplomatic representatives of the various repubics of South America have their names concealed under grand titles of duke, prince and count, which they have acquired without any difficulty from the vatican by the payment of the neces-sary fees. 

New Classification by United States

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.-Secretary of the Treasury Shaw is issuing order to collectors of customs at all lake ports that dressed frogs' legs from Canada shall not be admitted free of duty. For some three months the department has been wrestling with the conundrum as to whether frogs' legs are dressed poultry within the meaning of the Dingley law, or something else. The secretary, anxious came out cured, happy, and in perfect health after a thorough treatment with this medicine. 



of America by presching an uncount byterian Church in the United States of America, by preaching an unsound and unwise sermon; guilty of charging, in the event of the lynching of the alleged criminal, the responsibility therefore upon the judges of courts of Newcastle County and State of Delaware and thereby tending to lessen reverence and respect to constitutional authorities intrusted in maintenance of civil law; guilty of advocating lynching of alleged criminal if his trial be delayed or if found guilty, through some technicality to be not given capital punishment.


