Get Justice, Appeals to Czar. Berlin, May 6.-A story of a startling Russian society scandal is told in the Schlesione Zeitung, a conservative newspaper published at Breslau, in close touch with aristocratic circles in St. Petersburg. Gen. Sacharoff, com-mander of the Sixteenth Division of the Russian army, and until recently chief of staff to Kuropatkin, married twenty-five years, made 'the acquaintance of Mlle, Woronoff, a woman well known among the jeunesse doree of St. Peters. burg, fell desperately in love with her and ordered his wife to divorce him in order that he might marry his new choice. Mme. Sacharoff refused on account of their children, whereupon the general charged his wife with infidelity and demanded a divorce. The court accepted 'the allegation, found Mme. Sacharoff guilty, granted the divorce and ordered her to do the penance required by the church for seven years. The Governor-General of Poland M. Teherkoff, hearing of the affair, secured the transfer of Gen. Sacharoff to the seat of war, whither Mlle. Woron-off followed him. Mme. Sacharoff appealed to the Holy Synod, which only confirmed the judgment of the civil

band's allegation. Then came an order to confine Mme. Sacharoff in a lunatic asylum, and the general took steps to obtain the church's blessing on his new marriage. 


