# MEN REMAIN

None but Fighting Boers Now in the Field in Western Transvaal.

Elsewhere Boers are Spilt Into Small Groups-Others are Anxious for Peace.

London, March 21 .- A despatch to he Times from Klerksdorp says that in the Orange River Colony, the enemy is split into small groups, and without any prominent leader.

Many Boers are in hiding in the Sastern Transvaal, south of the Delagoa Railway line, where there are still organized commandos, none over three hundred strong.

North of the Delagoa line the Boers are more anxious to lead peaceful lives, and will embrace the opportunity to honorable discontinue hostilis.

ity to honorably discontinue hostili-In the Western Transvaal the waverers have been captured or sur-rendered, and those in the field seem determined to continue the struggle. Lieut.-Col. Wools-Sampson, has been appointed to take charge of the field intelligence service in the Western Transvaal, but the correspondent says it will take time to make the service as reliable as that of the Eastern Transvaal,

and ..... 12 1-20 Sc., University of Toronto, on "Malaria and Mosquitos," at the Collegiate Institute lecture hall, was a decided treat. The attendance, although fair, was not what the lecture deserved. D. S. Paterson, M. A., occupied the chair and introduced the very special values at 40c, 45c and 50c lecturer.

The Professor explained malaria and that theories of bygone days had never arrived at the cause of it. He enumerated the different phases of it, why it was intermittent and why it was marsh. The malaria is a plantlike organization which, when it gets into the blood, gets in the corpuscles of the blood, and eats itself out. He explained in interesting detail the mosquito and the connection it had with malaria, also that it was the female mosquito that did all the damage, while the male is perfectly harm-

"You know," continued the professor, "that foreigners cannot live in Rome during some parts of the year without contracting the malaria fever. Well, two Englishmen have lived near Rome for a year without contracting malaria, by protecting themselves against mosquitos.
"The only remedy for malaria, con-

sequently, is the getting rid of the mosquitos."

The professor recommended very strongly the use of quinine for malar-

The only explanation of the fatality is that Mr. Green dropped a burning match upon his clothing while attempting to light his pipe, or that he spilled hot coals from the pipe, and then did not notice the flames until too late to make an outcry. He, had been paralyzed below the hips for 14 years and his mind was a blank, but he was able to converse, and could have given an alarm under ordinary

Jus. Green was a civil war veteran and was taken with paralysis while in London, England, 15 years ago. He came to the Ypsilanti sanitarium for baths,, but his case was incurable and as his mind had failed he was committed to the care of the Baxters un-til he should be claimed by death.

London, March 22 .- Mr. Balfour yesterday afternoon promised to bring forward a motion in the House of Commons limiting the term of Mr. Dillons exclusion to one week. This was obviously the proper course and the surprising development in the situation was Mr. Redmond's instant demand for an opportunity to debate the notion. Mr. Balfour pointed out that there could be nothing to discuss because it would be out of order to refer to the circumstances in which Mr. Dillon had been suspended. There is some reason to believe the Irish members intend to carry the incident further, but if more disorder should take place the government will not have much trouble in securing the assent of the House to the new rules of proced

Ottawa, March 21-It is evident the

Imperial authorities intend to make an elaborate display at the King's coronation of the military resources of the empire. Contingents have been invited from all the colonies and de-opendencies, and there is every like-lihood that the procession in London when His Majesty proceeds to West-minster Abbey, will be on a far larger and grander scale than at the late Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. India has been asked to send a thousand native troops, but in the case of Canada, Australia and New Zealand, the quotas will not be as large. It is thought that the number to ge from Canada will not exceed 500, and the probable expense will be about \$50, 000. The Imperial Government's invitation is now before the Dominion authorities, and action in regard to it will shortly be taken. Major-General O'GraGdy-Haly was this morning summoned to consult with the govern-or-General in regard to the military contingent to be sent to the corona-tion ceremonies. It is understood that the contingent will be constituted on the lines of that which attended ed on the lines of that which attended Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubiles in 1897. This was under the command of Col. Lord Aylmer, and consisted of 200 of all ranks, composed as follows:— Officer command, I; cavalry officers, mon-commissioned officers and men, 51, artitlery, 28; infantry, 77, other officers, selected, 20; Northwest officers, selected, 20; Northwest Mounted Police, 25. Stanislas Lacroix, the Double: Murderer, Executed at. Hull, Quebec.

am not Afraid to die," Were His Last Words to Priest-Jealousy the Cause.

Hull, Que., March 21 - Stanislas La-roix, who murdered his wife and an old man, Hypolite Thomas, in Monte-bello, was hanged in Hull jail this morning at 8.05 o'clock. He was strangled to death, our man and grangle after the drop fell. His body was gle after the drop fell. His body was cut down at 8.23, and an inquest held. Rev. Father Forget made a brief tatement on behalf of the morderer. The priest said Lacroix admitted the justice of his sentence, and died at justice of his sentence, and died at peace with the world and his God. He asked forgiveness of all whom he had offended, and asked for their prayers. Lacroix did not go to bed last night, but sat up with the nuns and prayed. His little son was with him until 9 o'clock, and again this morning. Lar croix was impatient for the end, and was very nervous. Mass was cele-barted in the jail, and Lacroix's some and the jailor's little son assisted. The three brothers of the murderer and his two sisters bade him farewell. about twenty minutes to 8. Lacroix prayed until a few minutes before & When Radeliffe entered the cell Lacroix said he bore him no hard feeling, and asked him to do the job well.

The pinioning process took only as few seconds. Radeliffe strapped Lacroix's arms to his sides, leaving his hands free, so that he could hold/war pair of bine prayer beads. Lacroix shook hands with the nuns guards, thanked the governor of the jail for his kindness, and annound that he was ready to go. The march to the scaffold was led by Sheriff Wright, then came Lacroix with

two priests, Fathers Forget and Provost, walking on either side of the murderer. The priests recited prayers as they marched. Radcliffe. lowed immediately behind. The scafhad been generally anticipated, but fold was open, and when the hanging party stood on the platform Father Forget spoke for Lacroix to about 150 people assembled in the jail yard, After the black cap was adjusted Lacroix was cautioned by the priest to keep up heart. Lacroix said, "I am not afraid to die." At 8.05 the signal was given. Lacroix fell nine feet. He allowed to hang for 18 minutes. He did not stir once, not even drawing up his feet. After the body was cut down it was taken into the jails and an inquest held. To-night eroix's relatives will take it to Montebello and bury it.

PAN INTERESTING DISTINCTION.

In such matters the government says it is competent to judge. It can give away, secretly, without tender, without competition, and for nothing 1.660 square miles of pulp land, and no referendum is needed.

### SYMPATHY WITH THE BOERS.

On Tuesday evening the Democrats of the United States house of representatives met in caucus and unanimously voted to express the sympathy of congress with the Boers, points out the Hamilton Herald. We are informed by the Buffalo Enquirer that "nndoubtedly the minority of the house in the resolution adopted represents the true sentiments of ninedenths of the American people," and we believe that the Enquirer speaks

porrectly. With the bulk of the American pecale the justice or injustice of any cause with which Britain is identified does not affect their sentiments. The fact that a cause is the cause of Britain is sufficient to condemn it in their eyes. This may always be taken for granted as a malter of course-as a stact to be reckoned with. American asympathy has always been with the enemies of Britain.

But there are many Americans whose sympathies are affected by principles rather than prejudices, and who strongly sympathize with the Boer cause. One powerful reason for this is their belief that the British Government brought on the war with the object of crushing the Boer republics. To their eyes the struggle presents itself as a struggle between two weak little republics and a powerful monarchy determined to exterminate them. It is not strange that eitizens of a republic who take this view of the war should sympathize with the republics. We can easily understand how American citizens, wedded to republican institutions and not very well informed as to the facts of the Boer war, are fired with inalignation by such words as these, spoken the other day by ex-Congressman John L. Lentz, of Ohio:

If it is good policy, if it is correct morality, for Great Britain to prevent the development and growth republican governments in South Africa, then the time is ripe for the United States to prevent the growth and development of monarchial insti-tutions in North America. If Engdand can justify the barbarous war she is making against the Boers on the ground that she cannot afford to a republic to be established across the Vaal river, then the peo-ple of the United States cannot af-ford to allow a monarchical institu-tion to strengthen itself across the Detroit and St. Lawrence rivers.

Of course any such view as to the origin of the war is grotesquely and pitifully false. Britain set the Orange Free State up in business as a repub-The Transvaal and invaded British

territory. As for the Transvaal, it might be flourishing in peace and plenty as a republic to-day if Kruger and other schemers had not plotted to "drive the British into the sea" and establish a federated Dutch republic embracing the whole of South Africa, and ventured to make the attempt. No other power on earth would have been so patient as Britain was during years of provocation. But when the wo republics aimed what was intended to be a fatal blow at British power in South Africa, that moment it became necessary for Britain either to withdraw her flag from South Africa or to utterly crush the power which had menaced her supremacy in that part of the world. If the northern states were justified in fighting the southern confederacy to a finish in order to preserve the union, Britain is not less justified in fighting the Boers to a finish in order to preserve

But our American neighbors either cannot or will not examine the facts in the day light of truth. Since Britain cannot perform her task cheered by American sympathy she must go ahead without it. But whether she has that sympathy or not doesn't make much difference. The task is going to be finished.



ance, Economy, a Very Strong Aggregation of Qualities, Is Immensely strengthened by the Addition of Godliness, Which Has the Promise of All

Washington, March 16 .- In this discourse Dr. Talmage advocates the idea that the Christian religion is as good for this world as the next and will help us to do anything that ought to be done at all; I Timothy iv, 8, "Godliness is profitable "unto all things, having promise of the life that now is and of that which is to

There is a gloomy and passive way of waiting for events to come upon us, and there is a heroic way of ing out to meet them, strong in God and fearing nothing. When the body of Catiline was found on the battle-field, it was found far in advance of all his troops and among the enemy, and the best way is not for us to lie down and let the events of trample over us, but to go forth in a Christian spirit determined to conquer. You are expecting prosperity, and I am determined so far as I have anything to do with it, that you shall not be disappointed, therefore, I propose, as God may help me, to project upon your attention a new element of success. You have in the business firm frugality, patience, industry, perseverance, economy-a very strong business firm t there needs to be member added, mightier than them all, and not a silent partner either, the one inby my text, "Godliness, which is profitable unto all things, having the promise of the life that now is as well as of that which is to

I suppose you are all willing to admit that godliness is important in its eternal relations, but perhaps some of you say, "All I want is an opportunity to say a prayer before I die, and all will be well." There are a great many people who suppose that if they can finally get safely out of this world they will have exhausted the entire advantage of our holy religion. They talk as though religion were a mere nod of recognition which we are to give to the Lord Jesus on our way up to a heavenly mansion; as though it were an admission ticket, of no use except to give at the door of heaven. And there are thousands of people who have great admiration for a religion of the shroud and a religion of the coffin and a religion of the hearse and a religion of the cemetery who have no appreciation of a religion for the bank, for the farm, for the factory, for the warehouse, for jeweler's shop, for the office. Now, while I would not throw any slur on a post-mortem religion, I want to-day to eulogize an mortem religion. A religion that is of no use to you while you live will be of no use to you when you die. "Godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is as well as of that which is to come." And I have always noticed that when grace is very low in a man's heart he talks a great deal in prayer meetings about deaths and about coffins and about graves and about courchyards. I have noticed that the healthy Christian, the man who is living near to God and is on the straight road to heaven, is full of jubilant satisfaction and talks about the duties of this life, understanding well that if God helps him to live right he will

help him to die right. Now, in the first place, I remark that godliness is good for a man's physical health. I do not mean to that it will restore a broken down constitution or drive rheumatism from the limbs or neuralgia from the temples or pleurisy from the side, but I do mean to say that it gives one such habits and puts one in such condition as are most favorable for physical health. That I believe, and that I avow. Everybody knows that buoyancy of spirit good physical advantage. Gloom, unrest, dejection, are at war with every pulsation of the heart and every respiration of the lungs. They lower the vitality and slacken the circulation, while exhibaration pours the very balm of heaven through all the currents of life. The sense of insincerity which sometimes hovers over an unregenerate man or pounces upon him with the blast of ten thousand trumpets of terror is most pleting and most exhausting, while the feeling that all are working together for our good and for our

everlasting welfare is conducive of physical health. You will observe that godliness induces industry, which is the founda-tion of good health. There is no law of hygiene that will keep a lazy man well. The latter, who was originally a lawyer of Perigueux, went to South America and claimed to have become King of Patagonia in 1861. Achilles, whose real name was Laviarde, accompanied Antoine on his travells, returned to Paris and assumed the Royal title on Antoine's death. Achilles surrounded himself with a court and lavishly distributed high-sounding titles and decorations.

### MARCONI SIGNS

Have Some Control Over His Operations.

Ottawa, March 19 .- Wireless telegraphy has now been put on a busi-ness footing. Yesterday Marconi made an agreement with the Government by which the famous wizard of the wireless deep will be permitted to establish his apparatus in any Canadian, lighthouse.

The Government contract respecting the Marconi wireless telegraphy was signed by Marconi and on behalf of the Government yesterday. The terminal points in Canada are to be left open to Marconi, who is given the right to install a plant in any light-house at his own expense, but if he fails to do so on being requested by the Government, the latter shall have the right to do so at Marconi's ex-pense. Marconi is to have control of all arriving messages and the Gov-ernment of seaward messages. The \$80,000 is to be paid on the installation of the plant.

OLD AGE PENSIONS.

London, March 19.-The House of Commons to-day passed the second reading of the Aged Pensioners' Bill granting deserving poor persons pension of from five to seven shifting weekly, at the age of 65. It is esti mated that the sum of \$10,000,000 be required annually to pay the pen-sions, the national exchequer and the local authorities each providing half the amount required. As the Government, at to-day's session, declared it could not provide its share, the scheme is not likely to become effective.

Farmers in Essex County Will now Have Their own Piped Supply.

Hails From System in Use at Walker Farm-Petition is Widely Circulated.

Walkerville, Ont., March 19. -Within a few weeks the farmers on the Tecumseh road will have an improved water supply of their own, the water being piped from the system now owned and operated by the Walker farm. A petition is being circulated and almost unanimously signed for

Work on the new system will be commenced in a short time and rushed along to completion before hot wea-ther arrives. In addition to many market gardeners and others, a large canning factory will be benefitted by the improvement. 



### BREWER GETS \$1,800 DAMAGES

Jury Awarded Big Verdict in the Railroad Case--Judge Compliments Counsel.

**Grand Jury Makes Presentment** -Ridgetown Larceny Case Falls Through.

At two o'clock this afternoon the jury in the case of Brewer vs. the L. E. & D. R. R. brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for \$1,800.

Planet readers are already familiar visiting his brother-in-law, Frank with the facts of this case. On Dec. 15, 1900, Ernest Brewer, while driving, was struck by a train on the Lake Erie crossing near Dresden. His two horses were killed, wagon destroyed and he received injuries which resulted, the defence alleged, in de-forming him for life. He sued for \$2,000 damages. The case was first tried last year when the jury dis-

> Matthew Wilson, K. C., who appeared for the railroad, addressed the jury yesterday afternoon. He was followed by Col. J. B. Rankin, K. C. counsel for the plaintiff, Brewer, who addressed the jury for an hour and a

half this morning.

His Lordship charged briefly and submitted a series of questions to the jury to base their verdict upon. His Lordship took occasion to pay a high compliment to Mr. Wilson and Col. Rankin on their conduct of the case He had seldom, if ever, he said, seen a case so ably conducted by counsel on both sides and in which counsel had the evidence so well in hand, and put it before the jury with so much clearness and particularity of details. His Lordship said there was therefore little need to comment upon the evi-

In response to Judge Ferguson's questions the jury this afternoon gave

verdict as follows:—
That the Railroad Company were negligent in the manner of running the train, not ringing bell or blowing whistle, as the statute provides. That the plaintiff was not guilty of

any negligence which was the caus of or contributory to the disaster.

That the plaintiff could not reasonable care and diligence have voided the accident. That the damages should be assess-

ed at \$1,800. His Lordship entered judgment for efforts of her foster father to corrall \$1,800 with costs, both of abortive and present trial.

In the case of King vs. Chas. Norrie, of Ridgetown, yesterday Norrie was found by the jury to be not guilty. Walter Mills, of Ridgetown, handled the case exceptionally well for the defence and made a telling address to the jury. In addressing the jury the Judge said that the case was rathe long drawn out, but it had been most thoroughly tried. The charge is a ing further he charged in favor of the prisoner "by the British law," continued the Judge, "every man is innocent until he is proved guilty. The jury was only out about 15 minutes before it brought in the ver-

dict of not guilty.

ment as follows: To His Lordship Justice Ferguson: We, the grand jurors at the present assizes, beg leave to make the following presentment:
We wish to congratulate your Lord-







#### LORD DUFFERIN.

A Tribute Paid to His Memory by a Te-

The death of Lord Dufferin cannot timely. He was near four score, and led an active, occupied life to Those who knew him will be the first to resent the notion that his fame and name suffered any lipse from the dealings of Whitaker Wright with the companies of which our ex-Governor-General was the ninal head. It cannot be urged not a business man, Everybody knew he was not, and it went without saying. It need not even be pleaded in extenuation. There was nothing to extenuate. a fault, and Lord Dufferin was sinned against rather than a sinner To everybody with whom he ever had intercourse, the news of his death will come as a heart pang. Brilliant, gay, affable and agreeable are the adjectives that throng one's mind as it reverts to his six year's stay amongst us. He was too sanguine and too generous ever to be classed with those of slower mind whose ability was of a colder and more matter-of-fact order. That he

was our ablest Governor-General since Confederation is probably untrue; but let the crisis have what it might his buoyant intellect would have seen a way to tide it over. His genius was hardly constructive, though he left traces of a practical turn of mind at both Nia-gara and Quebec. He was a clever, dexterous Irishman, of perfect address with the most courteous manners and a friendliness of demeanor never excelled. When reading a biography of his illustrious relative, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, one is irresistibly reminded of Lord Dufferin. I do not think he acted the part. It came naturally to him as part of his birthright. Sheridan's biography says: "The latter part of his life was embittered by misfortune, prin-

cipally arising from his own impro-Mental anxiety completed the destruction of his health, and the famous wit and statesman, who was born in Dullin, died there in 1816." If Lord Duferin was not improvident he was certainly very open-handed. He was the first Governor-General for some time who was not suspected of 'making a good thing out of his office.' His predecessors had laid by money to meet the requirements of their declining years in England. Lord Dufferin set an example of profuse hospitality at Ottawa, which

has been bllowed by all his successors. He was one of the most interesting men in the world. He would recall passages in his life from the days when he was at Eton and Oxford, where he was a contemporary of Goldwin Smith, down to the day of his departure from London to assume the Governorship of Canada. Anecdote followed anecdote, now of contemporary statesmen, in the Gladston Cabinet, then of actors and actresses. He was intimate, too, with spotsmen, and had himself rid-



### of Truce. lave Personal Interview With Him-Boers Have Been Hard Pressed of Late.

Pretoria Under a Flag

KITCHENER

Pretoria, March 23.—Acting President Schalkburger, F. W. Reitz, exsecretary of State of the Transvaal, and Commandants Lucas Meyer and Krogh, with their secretaries and attendants, arrived here yesterday, March 22, at 2.04 p. m. on a special train from Balmoral, about fifty miles east of here. They came into Balmoral under a flag of truce.

Upon arriving here, Mr. Schalkburger and his party drove immediately

er and his party drove immediately to Lord Kitchener's headquarters where he had an interview with the British general. The Boers after-wards proceeded to the railway sta-tion and entrained at 5 o'clock for Kronstad, where they will go out

under a safe conduct.

For a week past Mr. Schalkburger and his colleagues have been stationed at Rhenoster Kop, north of Balmoral, where they have been closely pressed by British columns. spatch riders entered Balmoral Friday night and notified the British of the approach of Mr. Schalkburger and his party. It is reported that the Boer position at Rhenoster Kop had become almost hopeless, and that Mr. Schalkburger narrowly escaped cap-

TO NEGOTIATE PEACE.

London, March 24.-The news that the wandering Boer Government had entered the British lines is regarded as having but one meaning, namely that another attempt is being made to negotiate peace. The fact that the censor passed the news of this move ment is accepted as confirmation of this opinion. Nothing is actually known here of the intentions of Messrs. Schalkburger, Reitz, Meyer and Krogh. It is possible they have only sought permission to traverse the British lines in order to consult with Mr. Steyn and the Boer generals De Wet and Delarey, but whatever their object the news has been welcomed in London as pointing to the possibility of peace. British Government Charged With Failing to Appreciate the Situation.

League is Mischlevous Creation of Half-mad Demagogue -- Gave Danger,

London, March 22 .- The sensational exit of John Dillon, the Irish Nationalist, from the House of Commons Thursday last continues to be the topic of the hour. The Irish Nationalist papers backed up Mr. Dillon's declaration regarding Mr. Chamberlain's lack of veracity with cheerful frankness, though the Dublin Evening Telegraph remarks that Mr. Dillon was guilty of a slight anticipation regarding Mr. Chamberlain's damnation, which, it says, is only coming, though already in sight.

IN THE COMMONS.

In the House of Commons yesterday afternoon Mr. John Redmond raised the question of Mr. Dillon's suspension. He pointed out that the regulations covering the suspension of disorderly members are at present abrogated preparatory to the adoption of the new regulations governing the business of the House. Hence Mr. Dillon's suspension, in the absence of any existing rules, appeared to be for an indefinite period.

Mr. Balfour, Government leader of the House, promised to propose a mction dealing with the matter next Wednesday

existing until this year the suspension of a member entailed absence from the precincts of the House for a week. These rules were formally adopted ar-nually, but were omitted at the commencement of the present session, as Government measure was introduced creating a sliding scale of punishments for disorderliness. If it were now law the suspension would be for forty sittings, and an apology would have to be sent to the Speaker before the offending member could return.

### OXFORD LOST TO CAMBRIDGE

Result of the Great British University Annual Boat

Light Blues had the Advantage at the Start and Mained it to the End.

Putney, Eng., March 22.-The Cambridge crew to-day fulfilled the expectations of the prophets, and won the fifty-ninth boat race with Oxford as they liked. At no time throughout the race did Oxford in the slightest degree flatter the hopes of the supporters of the dark blue. Any possible chance which the Oxonians might have had was scattered by the result of the toss, giving the light blues (Cambridge) all the advantage of station. Immense crowds, as usual, turned out to view the contest, and the weather, though showery, was not so inclement as it had been most of the previous years. Cambridge was the first to take the water, Oxford following after a slight delay and both crews paddled to the moored skiffs at the starting line. The start was delyed owing to the force of the tide making it difficult to keep the boats noses straight. Lieut.-Col. Frank Willan, the umpire, however, finally got them away in a capital start. As was anticipated, the livelier stroke of the light blues gave them the earliest advantage, and their lead was increased at every stroke. By the time Craven's steps were reached Cambridge had a clear length to the good, and it was patent to every one that they had the race in hand, bar-ring accidents. Huntley's somewhat sluggish stroke appeared to be too slow to suit some of the powerful Ox-ford men behind him. Their weight would have told, at least in the earlier part of the race, had they been given more chance. As it was, each landmark on the river banks found them further and further in the rear, and at Harrod's stores their troubles were increased by the wash of their oppon-ents' boat. 





### WEIRD SKETCH OF BOER RUSH

Graphic Description of the Recent Great Drive of Gen. DeWet.

With Shouts of "Storm, Burghers, Storm," the Enemy Broke Through Lines.

London, March 12.-Full details of Lord Kitchener's great drive in Orange River Colony have reached London by mail. Bennett Burleigh, in a weird picture of the night battle, after describing the preparations and surrounding of the Boers continues: "It was about 8.45 p.m. that the real

battle of the night commenced. "The Boers within the girdle realized that was their last chance to break through. So when night's curtain was fairly pegged down, and only inky shadows hung in the west, the battle began. Our men had been bidden to spare no ammunition, but to keep the Boers in front. The enemy, using the ground to every advantage, creen up to where they had seen the crept up to where they had seen the columns settle down. Then began a terrible fusilade from their Mausers to try and find or force an opening. Closer and closer they crept, the soldiers' Lee-Mefords incessantly pumping back lead until the weapons were near-ly too hot to hold. The blackness of night was speckled as with myriads of fireflies dancing in dark underbrush. Bit by bit the old tactics were em-ployed by the enemy. Daring spirits, jumping from the spruits, galloped their horses up to, and where possible through, the lines, for it is hard to hit anything in the dark, even with a scrap of parer or phosphorus on the foresight of your rifle. Cattle were again requistioned to overrun the defenders of our line. By nine o'clock the battle was raging from ten miles north of Heilbron for fully thirty miles away down the Heilbron-Kroonstad Road. Boers were being kill-ed, wounded, or made prisoners by the wire fence, the Heilbron outposts, and in the columns' lines. The contest swelled, and Maxims, pom-poms, and cannon joined in the flare and din.

A MAGNIFICENT SPECTACLE. "It became not merely a battle, but a pyrotechnic display on the grandest cale, infinitely bigger and nosier than anything ever seen at the Crystal Palace or the Military Tournament. The armor-clad trains flashed their electric searchlights and bellowed with the best, using rifles, Maxims, and uick-firing 12-pounders. So close were the mobs of cattle and horses pushed up to the columns that more than half a score of times the gunners used case to stampede them, turning them back. With splendid persistence the Boers tried again and again to break through, but relatively few succeeded -say, forty on Rawlinson's right, a score elsewhere, and a dozen, mayhap, to the north, between Heilbron and Gottenberg. Some there were who got hung up, horse and rider, and were Others sought safety and escape by climbing trees. Up and down leapt the floodtide of battle without intermission from nine p.m. until two a.m. About ten p.m. 120 Boers charged the line six miles north of Hellbron, held by the Leinsters. Glad to see them come, the wild Irishmen rose to meet them, with yell, cheering, and a volley, and then dashed at them with the bayonet. Brer Boer broke and fled incontinently. A few whose horses carried them too far, were shot and bayoneted, and half a dozen made prisoners. But that Irish yell-I eard it miles away, and it came Eke a fresh breeze sweeping down the line as presage of victory. And later on in a crucial moment, when 300 had got up to Rimington's lines, their lead-er, Irish Mike, raised a wilder yell, as he called upon his men to hurl them back. They responded most gallantly, took up the cheer, which absolutely rolled along the entire lines from Gottenburg, Heilbron, almost to Kroon-stad, or at any rate to Houts Kop. The battle of the night was won, although between three and four a.m. there was

a sputtering of rifles, it was as no-"With daylight the wounded Boers and prisoners were collected. A badly-hit Boer, jammed in a tree, was found dripping with blood by Rawlinson, who discovered six others dead on his front, several wounded, and took thirteen prisoners. A little later he bagged forty more hiding in the grass. There were sixty-five dead horses on Rimington's immediate front. He took that day eighty-nine prisoners, not counting dead or wounded, together with 200 horses and 1800 cattle. Byng found twelve unwounded Boers in the morning and captured others later in the day. It was so, but in a lesser de-gree, with General Elliott's force. Shortl, after five a.m., Saturday, 8th, the final advance began. There was a little firing, a few rounds by the scouts just before the columns moved forward. Thereafter the Boers made no resistance, but hastened to turn their horses loose, and hide in rocky defiles and in the reeds and marshes of Rhenester and the various experies. of Rhenoster and the various spruits.

BEATING OUT THE ENEMY. "The task was how to beat them out, and how to search the groundno easy task for tired men and jaded horses. There were places we passed that were most inadequately explored and beaten. Boers were pulled out from under the rocks and out of ant bearholes. One man had got into a hollow tree and was given away by his lanky knees and leather-patched trousers. Another actually ventured to lie down in the water of a sluggish pool, hiding his body beneath the surface, and breathing through a reed. He was accidently discovered and hauled out of the bulrushes, a mangrown, bearded Moses Boer. And so on with many variants ere five p.m., and the hunt was finished, and 300 Boers for certain were bagged, together with over 5,000 cattle and 1,800 no easy task for tired men and jaded gether with over 5,000 cattle and 1,800 horses. "De Wet, who had hastened south with 400 burghers, or thereabouts, having found a weak place at Wornkop, near Kroonstad, approached the line of blockhouses, driving eattle and horses. Amongst the madly harried animals lying flat on herseback rode animals, lying flat on horseback, rode De Wet and his followers. With the yells of Boers and cracks of stock whips and sjamboks, the cattle were driven up to our lines. Then, in a roar of excitement, amidst shouts of Storm, burghers, storm!" the enemy broke through. At least the leading sections, some 250 or more, escaped, los-ing six killed and half a score wounded in the rush. With them went Meritze, Mears, Van Steenkamp, and others. The 250 who followed lost direction, ran up against some of our horse and cattle lines, were stopped, and had to gallop back. There were minor attempts made elsewhere. A few Boers scrambled out upon their stomachs, leaving their horses behind, and going afoot, and there were others who discovered breaks in the wire fence, or made them, through which they stole, scattering in many Next directions. morning columns found lying along their front many dead and wounded horses and cattle, and a number of dead and wounded Boers. 

MODERN FEMALE DRESS. Practical Talk on Its Evil Features

"The Evils of the Present Mode of Dress," was the subject of an able talk at the Toronto W.C.T.U. meet ing the other night by Dr. Lelia A. Davis, sister to the Commissioner of

Crown Lands for Ontario. Aided by a chart, Dr. Davis first explained the relative positions of the organs of the body. Proceeding, the speaker said, although the oculists hold that veils were largely responsible for the weak and strained eyes from which so many women suffered, the trailing skirts which were at the present time so fashionable, carried into our home the filth of the street. The greatest curse of modern dress, however, was to be found in tight clothing. Dr. Kellogg, of the Battle Creek Sanitorium, had written a book on "The Induence of Dress on the Health of American Women," in which he showed that corsets were put on girls at about the age of from 12 to 14. Their waists were bound in at the time nature required for them the greatest freedom.

It had been proven that while in sleep a woman's breathing was as full and deep as a man's. Only the upper portion of the lungs were used when tight clothing was worn. Mr. D. G. Sargent had found by experiment in which a number girls were required to run 540 yards in their loose gymnasium suits, and the same distance in their ordinary clothing, that the action of the heart was increased from 84 to was increased from 152 beats per minute. Then it was known that an athlete whose heart impulse was 100 beats after a little exercise, even if there were no evi-dence of disease, would not be en-

couraged to enter a race. Some idea may be formed of the extra strain which tight clothing entails on this important organ. From experiments it has been found the pressure exercised by corsets var-ied from twenty-one to twenty-eight pounds. This pressure affected all immense waste of vitality that was caused, women became unfit for private and public duties. Every child had the right to be well born, but

Sons of Charles Darwin.

The four sons of the late Charles Darwin have all made a mark as scientists. Professor George Darwin, F.R.S., LL.D., D.Sc., was senior wrangler in 1868, is one of the fore most mathematical physicists of the age, and has for eighteen years been Plumian professor of astronomy and experimental philosophy at Cam-His brother, Horace Darwin, also

at Cambridge, has been associated with him in investigations of terresrial physics. The philosopher of Down could not even have read the papers of his son, for mathematics were to him a sealed book.

Major Leonard Darwin, R.E., late Liberal Unionist M.P. for Lichfield, is honorary secretary of the Royal Geographical Society. Before retiring from the army in 1890 he was an in structor in military engineering at Chatham, and for the last five years of his service was on the staff of the Intelligence Department of the War Office. In 1874 and in 1882 he was sent to observe the transit of Venus, and has also served on other scienti-

fic expeditions. Francis Darwin, F.R.S., is a distinguished botanist. For many years he assisted his father, and he has inherited his tastes. It was characteristic of the famous naturalist to be often regretting that he was not a botanist, the fact being that many an expert would have been glad to possess half his knowledge of plants.

Butter by the Yard.

In Cambridge, England, butter is sold by the yard. For generations it has been the practice of Cam-bridge folks to roll their butter into lengths, each length measuring a yard and weighing a pound. Deftly wrapped in strips of clean, white cloth, the cylindrical rolls are packed in long, narrow baskets made for the purpose, and conveyed to mare The butter women who, white linen aprons and sleeves, preside over the stalls in the market have no need of weights or scales for dispensing

The university peo-ple are the chief buyers of the curiously shaped article.
