GENERAL REMARKS

As far as the staff is concerned this school is in good condition. With As far as the staff is concerned this school is in good condition. With respect to accommodations much is to be desired. There is no need of recounting the serious deficiencies of the present situation. The use of the improvised, ill-constructed, ill-lighted and ill-ventilated class rooms on the top floor should be discontinued at the earliest date possible. The want of a gymnassium and of proper facilities for physical education should receive immediate attention. It is to be hoped that those who have the important trust of safe-guarding the vital interests of this fine school will act promptly and wisely.

I can not speak too highly of the efficient management of the principal of this school. I was particularly impressed with the remarkable punctuality off the pupils. During my two days' visit—one day was quite inclement—out of 332 pupils and four occasions of assembling only three instances of late coming were recorded. The school may well be proud of such a record. In too many schools this all-important matter of punctuality does not receive the commendable attention that Principal Twohey has given it.

TORNADO WREAKS HAVOC

120 Mile Gale Leaves Death And Destruction In

Its Wake

WIND SWEPT OVER CUBA

Havena, Oct. 23.-A cyclone of precedented severity, accompanied by a terrific downpour of rain, swept over the Provinces of Havana and Pinar del Rio Wednesday night and resulted in 20 deaths in this city and the serious injury of a dozen or more persons.

The damage is estimated at \$2,000, The dead are all Cubans of the poor

Buildings Badly Damaged.
In Havana City the buildings of the University of Havana sustained damages amounting to many thousands of dollars. A partition wall in the American legation was blown down. The office furniture was ruined and the books and records of the legation were wet through.

The light wooden structures over
the sea baths at Vedado were badly
wrecked.
The great unoccupied brick building
covering the old United Railroad
wharf near La Reeia was demolished.
Many Dead and Injured.
New York, Oct. 20.—Advices received here by the Western Union
from Havana state that 19 persons are
known to be dead and many others
were injured by the storm.
Much property was destroyed and

were injured by the storm.

Much property was destroyed and the Prade and other parks were devastated. All traffic in the city was suspended, as a result of the storm. All American sailors and soldiers are reported to be safe.

Brooklyn Dragged Her Anchor.

The United States cruiser Brooklyn dragged her anchors at the height of the hurricane and touched bottom, but got off without damage.

The other warships, the Minneapolis, the Texas, the Denver and the Prairie rode out of the gale safely. More than one thousand tents at Camp Columbia were blown down and the barracks unroofed. One trooper had his shoulder broken.

Wind 120 Miles An Hour.

The storm began with heavy wind and rain. About 6 o'clock in the morning it rapidly increased in violence and at noon was at its height, the wind blowing 80 miles an hour. The city streets were like rivers. Stores were flooded and there was two feet of water in the cable office.

After noon the wind blew at times at the rate of 120 miles an hour.

35 Lighters Sunk.

The greatest money loss was in the harbor when 35 lighters were sunk. Many of these were loaded with valuable merchandise. Nineteen of them belonged to the Ward line of New York.

Pinar del Rio was the centre of the storm. Extensive damage is reported to crops in that province.

100 Miami Houses Wrecked.

A conductor who has arrived at Fort Pierce from Miami reports that one hundred houses at Miami were wrecked by the storm.

The Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church were blown down. The concrete jail is leaning.

The roof was blown off the P. & O. warehouse. The car shed was blown down.

100 Reported Dead.

A special cablegram to The Evening Telegram says: Over one hundred are dead from the worst cyclone which has ever visited Havana. Ninety-four of the fatalities are confined to natives, while 16 foreign residents are reported killed.

Builtdings Shaken.

When the tempest reached its height buildings were shaken as with an earthquake, street cars were washed from their tracks, windows were blown in like paper and roofs and doors swept away.

Several of the smaller frame houses were blown from their foundations and were wrecked. These were situated in the poorer district and were the cause of so many deaths among the natives.

Weather Prophet Saved Lives.

It is estimated that the loss of life and damage would have been greater had it not been for the timely warning given by Father Love at Gunciti. He is a noted weather observator of Berlin College.

He telephoned to Columbia Camp at 7.30, one hour before the storm descended, that a cyclone was coming, and his warning was immediately heeded.

Dutch Steamer Lest.

San Juan, Porto Rico, Oct. 20.—The Red line steamer Philadelphia, from La Guaira, Venezuela, for New York, arrived here yesterday 48 hours late. Her captain reports that a Dutch steamer was lost in the cyclone. between Curacac and Lugausica.

The Philadelphia encountered the cyclone upon leaving the harbor of La Guaira on Monday. She was blown ashore and slightly damaged. This and the heavy weather accounted for her delay in reaching here.

20 Miles of Raliway Destroyed.

Twenty miles of the raliway connecting La Guaira with Caracas has been totally destroyed by the storm, according to officers and passengers of the Philadelphia. The Philadelphia left here for New York yesterday afternoon.

Damage Along Florida Coast.

New York, Oct. 20.—Communication with Miami, Florida, has been restored by the Western Union. Miami reports that the hurricane struck the coast there at 6 o'clock Wednesday morning. The trainsheds at Miami were badly damaged. The Methodist Church and a number of houses were unroofed.

Mr. E. F. B. Joinston asked for a week's remand. "I do not know the particulars," he said, "and desire time to examine into the case." 

ON STRIKE BRITISH SERVICE ENJOYS CON-FIDENCE OF THE WORLD.

> Energetic and Constant Protection of British Commercial Interests Everywhere Chiefly Due to Devotion to Duty and Ability of the Consular Corps—Admission Depends Upon Personal Examination.

The career of Sir Ernest Mason Satow is illustrative of the British consular service as well as of the diplomatic abilities of the man. When 18 years old he was stadent interpreter in the Japan service; when 21 years old he was promoted to interpreter, and at 24 years he was sceretary of the British legation in Tokia, in which capacity he served nineteen years. In 1884 he was made agent and consul generel at Bangkok, and in the following year he was promoted to the office of Minister resident. After three years of Minister resident, After three years service at this station he was transferred in the same capacity to Montevideo, where he remained until 1893, when he was appointed envoy extraordinary and Minister plenipotentiary to Morocco. In the same year he was given the post of British Minister in Tokio, and shortly before the troule broke out in China he was ordered to exchange places with the Minister to China, Sir Claude Macdonald, at Pekin.

During this time the student receives \$1,000 annual salary. If he quits the service within five years he has to pay an indemnity of \$2,500 to the state. After a successful university course the student is promoted to the position of assistant, with an annual salary of \$1,500 at the start, and is attached to a consulate or mission in an Oriental country. In this position he has to pass a second examination in Turkish and international law, and in regard to the language, history and administration of the country to which

Successful applicants for consular service in other countries are, as far as possible, first employed for some time in the foreign office in London to learn the details of diplomatic service. Subsequently they are given a trial as vice-consul, and after a service of at least two years in this position they may be promoted to consul, consul-general and even higher. Officials in this service are frequently transferred from one country to another, unlike the officials in the consular service of the Orient and East Asia. The practice shows that transfers are usually made to countries with the same economic conditions. WOMEN STREET CLEANERS. A Spotjess Town In Munich Swept by Fair Sex-Does Not Now Cause

A PURE SOAP

Any Surprise.

A mild sensation is caused from time to time when the newspapers announce that the women of some town, tired of living on filthy streets, have underliving on filthy streets, have undertaken to give the municipal authorities an object lesson in the art of street cleaning. But the streets of Munich, that famous old Bavarian art, musical, dramatic and educational centre, are cleaned year in and year out solely by women, and no one wonders at it except the newly-arrived foreign student or tourist, says Ernest Sauer.

The street cleaners of Munich have been women for so long that if some one were to ask the worthy burgomaster when they first began to sweep the thoroughfares of the city he undoubtedly would first have to consult the municipal records in order to give an unimpeachable answer. 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


Disheartening Discovery Just When Regulations Were Relaxing.

Is An Electric Motor a Machine?

An interesting problem was discussed by the Glasgow Chamber of Commerce recently. It arose out of the refusal of the Ceylon customs authorities to admit an electric motor free of duty as a prime mover.
