Halifax Relief.

At a meeting of the citizens of Wolfville, called by His Worship, the Mayor, on Monday evening, an association for the relief of the sufferers in the Halifax disaster, was formed under the name of the Wolfville Relief Association.

The following officers were appointed:—President, J. D. Chambers; Vice-pres., Rev. E. F. Dixon; Secy., F. E. Whirelock.

The president, Mr. Chambers, then took the chair and the following committees were appointed:—Ways and Means Committee—May- or, J. E. Hales, Mr. Carter, Mr. Gresham.

Entertainment and Assignment Committee—Mr. Hugh Calkin, Rev. G. W. Miller, Dr. A. J. McKenna, Rev. R. F. Dixon, Mrs. L. G. Moore, Mrs. J. D. Chambers.

Reception and Train Committee—Mrs. Marguerite DeWitt, Mr. Fred R. and, Miss Helen Moore, Mr. Ernest Baras, (ch) Mayor J. E. Hales. Clothing Committee—Ladies of Wolfville Red Cross, Mrs. W. H. Chase, president.

Medical Attendance Committee—All physicians, all druggists, Dr. G. E. DeWitt, (sawyer).

Publicity Committee—B. O. Davidson, Prof. Hanney, Conc. Harvey. After an informal discussion concerning the financial obligations of this Association, it was moved by Dr. Cullen, seconded by Dr. Roach, that this Association request the Mayor and Town Council to set apart a sum of money sufficient for the maintenance of refugees from Halifax.

What the Soldier Gets.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.

DEAR SIR:—It is quite evident that a great many people have the idea that when one of the boys goes out to France and becomes disabled it is the end of their career—and that the government here in Canada leaves him to his fate. Just why the government does not do what they are doing—as they have every right to do—I cannot say. Perhaps they are afraid that some of our patriotic (?) citizens will object to the returned soldier being given so much.

In order to make it a little more clear I would like to have you publish what they are willing and anxious to do for all the disabled men. Slightly over a year ago I was wounded and disabled. Since then I have had many months in different hospitals with the best of medical attention in them all. Everything possible was done for me and my disability reduced to the lowest degree. During this time my pay and allowances went on as usual. Upon being discharged I was granted an additional three months pay as a bonus, a six months free tuition at any college or university I wished to attend. During that time I will also receive one dollar a day per allowance as before, and eight dollars per month pocket money, and a pension in the neighborhood of thirty dollars per month. This latter will continue for life, as also will any medical at-

ention that I may need in connection with my wounds. It is some of the young fellows who are about to be called up under the Military Service Act would consider that they would perhaps not be quite so unwilling. If a man is killed he dies an honorable death, and that is the most any one can wish. If he is disabled the government will do everything in their power to lessen his loss. PENSIONER

Miss Baxter, daughter of Dr. G. O. Baxter, Union street, St. John, is one of those who had a narrow escape from death in the destruction of the Military Hospital on Pier 2, Halifax. Miss Baxter was detained in that institution and when the explosion came, ran for safety. She fell down the stairs in the hospital, but fortunately escaped with slight bruises. Talking with her mother this afternoon, Miss Baxter said she was most outwitted. The St. John Standard said: "Miss Baxter won distinction by her valuable services to the wounded during her narrow escape."

(Miss Baxter graduated from the Seminary two years ago and later from a Toronto institution. She is a niece of Mrs. R. C. G. Harris, this town.)

The Premier's Visit.

Sir Robert Borden, premier of Canada, paid a visit to Wolfville on Tuesday, and spoke before the students of Acadia in the morning. At 2 p. m. he addressed a large and representative audience in the Opera House, under the chairmanship of Mr. W. H. Chase, president of Kings County Union Government Association.

Sir Robert is a plain and forceful speaker, and the audience followed him with the closest attention. He first described the situation in Halifax, whence he had just come, after spending three days among the desolation and horrors caused by the terrible explosion. The scenes he witnessed there simply baffled description, extending as they do over two square miles, and the cause of which seemed to be unsolved by mystery. He found there among the sufferers, women and children, the same fortitude as exhibited by the boys in the trenches, and feelingly acknowledged the wonderful aid and sympathy from all parts of the Dominion and from the United States.

Sir Robert then approached the issues of the present general election. "Personal consideration was," he said, "quite indifferent with that of the world-wide issue, now being fought out on the battlefields, and not now, now by our united efforts the future generations of Canada would come under the rule of Germany. "Make no mistake about that," he solemnly declared.

"Stand together to the end." The greatness of Canada cannot be based upon wealth alone. Every Canadian has the obligation of military service. He owes that duty to the state to serve and protect it, and that can only be done by a willingness to fight for it.

The Military Service Bill, Sir Robert declared, was nothing new. "I first saw light 49 years ago, and it principle reconfirmed in 1904 by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Voluntary service had given splendid results, but it was not suited with much unfairness and difficulties. He had seen splendid accomplishments of Canadian division at Vimy Ridge, deeds that Canada may justly be proud of.

Two alternatives now present themselves: First, either to leave the Canadian to go at the front without aid; or, second, to enforce the principle agreed upon 49 years ago. "We can only win this war by the last alternative, which will enable every man and woman to serve Canada." Selection by the Military Bill was not left to blind choice, but to an impartial tribunal, which will protect the interests of all, giving a right of appeal therefrom to a higher court thus guaranteeing its enforcement fairly, impartially and devoid of favoritism.

There was a cry in some quarters that there was an abundance of reinforcements in England available. There was, he declared, no authority for idle gossip and the government would barely be able to provide reinforcements for the gallant defenders of the "Road to Calais," even by enlisting the greatest expedition in enforcing the act.

By adopting the referendum, made so manifest, he asserted, Canada goes out of the war, and Canada now covered with glory by the glorious deeds of her boys, would then be covered with shame. The critical stage of the war is now, and had not the United States come in, the end of the war may have come and been very different.

The safety of Canada today depends upon the gallant efforts of the troops in the trenches. The first battle line in Canada. The first line will stand firm, provided Canada does the same.

The formation of a Union Government was quite impossible until its value had become generally recognized. He, Sir Robert, invited Sir Wilfrid Laurier to join it, and after deliberating two weeks finally replied he could not accept unless Military Service was abandoned. Sir Robert said "No. Will abandon neither conscription nor the boys in the trenches."

There were, he declared, eight strong and sturdy Liberals who had joined the Union Government. He had seen three Liberals of Quebec in the last election, but without success. This Union Government, he said, was an alliance against the Hun. The ablest and best men of Canada were, he maintained, now sitting in Capeil or the good of Canada.

While mistakes had been made by the late Conservative Government, yet he insisted they made fewer than any other previous government. He challenged any one to deny that a real Union Government existed, and in conclusion, he said, that the union of the boys was absolutely confident of result. "If Canada did its duty."

Dr. Carter made a few telling remarks and the proceedings were terminated by singing the National Anthem.
