An Act to establish and continue a Survey in the Township of King, in the County of York.

**W**HEREAS Joseph Larkin and several others have by their petition shown, that no survey was made by the Crown of the Lots north of Lot number fifteen, in the seventh concession of the Township of King, in the County of York, in Upper Canada, to the line between the said Township and the Township of West Gwillimbury, when the lots in the said concession from the south line of the Township, northerly, to and including the said Lot number fifteen, were originally surveyed;—that in consequence of there having been no such original survey of the said lots, the settlers then resident in the said seventh concession, about twenty-eight years ago, employed George Lount, Esquire, a Provincial Land Surveyor, to survey the said concession from the south-east angle of number sixteen in the said concession to the north-east angle of number twenty-seven in the same concession, which was the most northerly limit of the settlement in the said concession at that time;—that a great many of the petitioners have been settled upon their lots in the said concession for more than thirty years; and since the survey of the said George Lount was made, until the present time, they have held their lands according to such survey;—that any alteration in the said survey will create great loss and inconvenience; and that it is desirable to establish the survey so made by the said George Lount;—And whereas the Petitioners have also prayed that the residue of the lots in the said seventh concession from and including Lot number twenty-eight northerly to the line between King and West Gwillimbury, as aforesaid, be laid out and surveyed in the like manner and on a continuation of the like course and line as the other lots were from sixteen to twenty-seven, as aforesaid; And whereas it is desirable to grant the prayer of their petition; Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

I. The survey so made by the said George Lount, from the south-east angle of Lot number sixteen, in the seventh concession of the Township of King, to the north-east angle of number twenty-seven in the said concession, shall be and is hereby established as the only legal and valid survey, and shall be considered to be the true and original survey thereof.

Lount's survey confirmed.

II. The survey from the north-east angle of the said Lot number twenty-seven, northerly, to the line between the Townships of King and West Gwillimbury, shall be continued in like manner and on the like course and line as between the said Lots number sixteen and twenty-seven; and, when the same has been continued, such survey shall be deemed to be the only legal and valid survey, and shall be considered to be the true and original survey thereof.

**III. The Council of the Corporation of the Township of King shall have power to pass By-laws for the purpose of raising a sum of money by way of assessment upon the owners of the said lots from and including number sixteen, northerly to the line between the Townships of King and West Gwillimbury, sufficient to pay for making and completing the said survey or surveys, and for placing the necessary stone monuments along the said portion of the Concession, and for all other necessary expenses in carrying this Act into effect.**

**IV. This Act shall be deemed a Public Act.**
