(From the Baltimore Sun)

Kipling called Canada Our Lady of the Snows, but the story which our staff correspondent is telling of her war record shows that when her pride, her loyalty and her affections are enlisted, she is the Vesuvius of nations. Every American ought to read the narrative of Canadian sacrifice and heroism. It is an epic which Homer might have been proud to tell. We confess that, when we compare this splendid enthusiasm this eager devotion, this unquestioned and magnificent courage and unselfishness with certain manifestations of American indifference, half-heartedness and calculating prudence we feel a sense of humiliating moral inferiority.

Some fool Americans before the war used to talk about annexing Canada and extending to it the blessing of republican government. Unless we raise ourselves to the spiritual level of these great-souled people the best thing that could happen to us would be to get Canada to annex us to her. But we hope these letters will thrill our hearts with admiration and will stir us to a generous emulation. To be a Canadian must be, for a generation at least, equivalent to being one of the elect of the earth.

### War Savings Stamps

All persons who buy War Saving or Thrift Stamps should set a \$50 Dominion Government bond as their objective. This may be now be had for \$40 and a few cents, redeemable on January 1, 1924, at \$50. Such an object makes saving worth while.

For one thing it will be a strong incentive to continued saving. Then it is very profitable, the return being 4½ per cent compound half-yearly which is almost 5 per cent. The purchase of a \$50 bond will also be of material assistance to the Government in meeting its heavy after-the-war responsibilities.

## ALLY FORCES ROUTED REDS

Enemy Lost Heavily in Murmansk Sector.

Entente Now North of Lake Onega.

London, Cable.—R enter Despatch.—The War Office has issued the following communication:

General Maynard reports that the Bolshevik force on the morning of the 9th attacked our positions at Koralskayas-Maseika, on the southern shore of Lake Segozero. Our outposts checked the enemy until enabled to take up defensive positions. Then they organized counter-attacks against both enemy flanks, which were carried out with great dash and complete success. The enemy fled to Ostareche, suffering many casualties, including between forty and fifty killed. We captured four machine guns. Our casualties were light. Russian troops, led by a few British officers, entirely gained this success.

We further advanced on the 15th along the Murmansk Railway. The enemy occupied a series of ridges upon which trenches and dugouts had been constructed. The nature of the ground necessitated our carrying the first line defence by frontal attack, after which we out-manoeuvred the enemy from the remaining defence lines.

The enemy suffered appreciably. A mixed company of the King's Royal Rifle Corps and Rifle Brigade, and a company of the Middlesex Regiment, showed splendid dash and enthusiasm. French field guns mounted on railway trucks largely helped to keep our casualties low.

## N. C. 3 SAFE AT PONTA DEL GADA

Picked Up at Sea and Crew Rescued.

N. C. 4 to Take Next Leg To-day.

Ponta Delgada. — Special Cable — The American seaplane N.C.-3 is now behind the Delgada breakwater. Her crew is aboard the U. S. S. Melville.

The N.C.-3 had been missing since Saturday, and it was feared that she had gone to the bottom with Commandant Towers and the crew.

The first news received of the safety of the N.C.-3 was a wireless announcing that she was proceeding seawards this port under her own power. This was followed by her arrival.

The N.C.-4 was tuning up this afternoon at Horta preparatory for its flight to Ponta Delgada.

It is planned to start for Ponta Delgada as soon as the weather permits.

The plan to go direct to Lisbon from Horta has been given up because of lack of fuel, making it necessary to put into Ponta Delgada. The aviators also desire to make the flight during daylight hours, which would be impossible if they started from Horta.

### TO FLY TO-DAY.

Washington Report — Rear-Admiral Jackson at Ponta Del Gada Azores, cabled the Navy Department to-night that the American naval airplane N.C.-4, in command of Lieut.-Commander Read, would leave Horta Fayal, to-morrow at 7 o'clock, Green-which mean time (3 p.m. Washington time), if weather conditions permit. A stop will be made at Ponta Del Gada, the message said.

The early hour set for the flight to Ponta Del Gada was interpreted by naval officials here to mean that Commander Read would attempt to-morrow to make the entire trip of more than 925 nautical miles to Lisbon, the real end of the trans-Atlantic flight. The stop at Ponta Del Gada was thought to be planned for the purpose of obtaining supplies.

### NEW GERMAN PLAN.

Want Discussion of Financial Peace Terms.

Versailles Cable — The arrival of Max von Wasserman, one of the managers of the Reichsbank, who came to Versailles yesterday with Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, is understood to be preliminary to an effort on the part of the Germans to secure verbal exchanges with the Allied and associated powers regarding the financial terms of the peace treaty.

Because of the protests against the exclusion of the public to the Trianon Park, the authorities have decided to reopen the greater portion of it, restricting the German peace mission members to sixty acres of the enclosure. The German delegations' members have been further increased by the arrival of two widely-known moderates, Gen. Count Max Montgelas and Prof. Hans Delbrueck.

## SIGN TREATY, SAYS "HINDY"

Resistance Out of Question, His Idea.

Scheidemann May Displace Rantzau.

Paris Cable — An important meeting to consider the peace situation was held in Berlin, Friday. It was attended by all the members of the German Cabinet, representatives of the various political parties and a number of generals, the newspapers say. Chancellor Scheidemann, it is added, referred to the possibility of an alliance with the Russian Bolshevik Government, but without advising it.

Field Marshal von Hindenburg is reported to have told the meeting all resistance was impossible, and that the military leaders were inclined to the necessity of signing the treaty.

It was reported in Versailles, with out confirmation, last night, that Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau had offered his resignation, and would be replaced eventually by Chancellor Scheidemann.

In recent demonstrations before the Adlon Hotel in Berlin, the crowd shouted: "Down with France, England, America, Clemenceau, Foch and Wilson." It says that the shouts against Wilson seemed to indicate that he is particularly reviled by the German populace, public opinion "not pardoning him for interpreting the fourteen points at variance with the German interpretation of them."

## TO BUY A BIG MERCHANT FLEET

British Syndicate After International Line.

Total of 960,000 Tons is Involved.

New York Report — Negotiations for the purchase by a British syndicate of the British-owned ships and assets of the International Mercantile Marine Co. have been renewed, and the company has received virtually the same offer for the vessels as was pending at the time the negotiations were suspended last November, when the United States Shipping Board proposed the purchase of the vessels. This was announced to-day by P. A. S. Franklin, president of the Marine Company, who presented the British syndicate's renewed offer to the board of directors at a special meeting.

The offer has not been definitely accepted by the board, but Mr. Franklin said that if it were the International Mercantile would continue in business as an entirely American concern.

The shipping involves approximately 960,000 tons gross, including the Olympic, Baltic and other well known British liners, and the amount of the original offer for the ships and assets was about \$125,000,000.

The United States Government's offer, after hanging fire from November until April, was withdrawn. Mr. Franklin soon afterward went to England and returned with the renewed British offer. The British syndicate is understood to be headed by Lord Pirrie and Sir Owen Phillips.

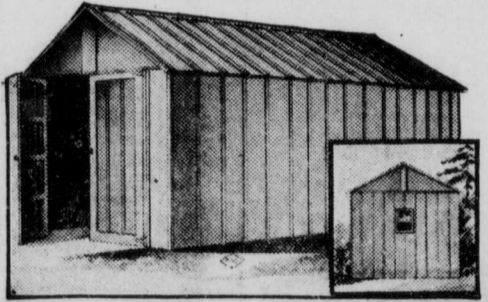

### WEEVILS CAUSE LOSSES.

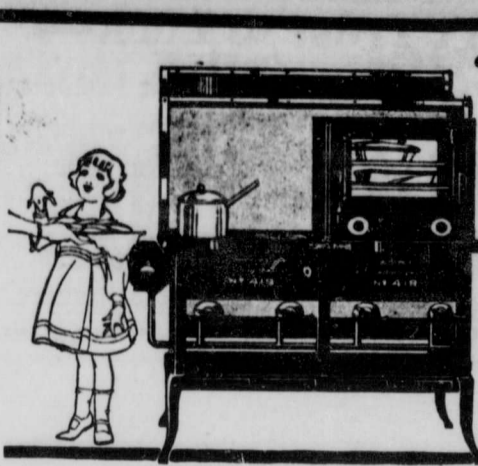
Seed May Be Treated by Fumigation.

The serious losses caused by bean and pea weevils—which amounts to millions of dollars annually—is largely preventable, and by putting a stop to it a valuable and much-needed source of the nation's food supply can be saved. No satisfactory artificial remedies can be applied to kill weevil grubs in beans, peas or cowpeas growing in the field, but they can be easily and effectively controlled afterward if the necessary care is given. The crop should be harvested as soon as possible after maturity, and the seeds thrashed or shelled and treated by fumigation, heat or cold storage, in order to kill the weevils in them before they can increase in numbers and carry on their destructive work.

Weevils not only cause serious damage to peas, beans and cowpeas in storage but also in the field, and are responsible for a curtailment in the acreage planted in these crops. Badly infested seeds are worthless for planting. In one experiment on record only 50 per cent. of infested beans germinated, and of these 30 per cent. were so badly injured that they could not develop into normal plants.

In gathering the crop, exercise care, the bulletin urges to leave no portion of it in the field, as seeds scattered on the ground or left in shattered pods on the dried vines, may carry the pest over winter, and furnish a supply of weevils the following summer. The crop should be harvested as soon as possible after reaching maturity and the seed thrashed or shelled soon afterwards. Storing in the pod does not confine the weevils. Immediately on placing the seed in storage, fumigate with carbon disulphid or carbon tetrachlorid. These chemicals when exposed to the air vaporize into a heavy poisonous gas which immediately kills the weevil. Carbon disulphid is the more generally used, though carbon tetrachlorid has the advantage of not being inflammable. Seed to be fumigated should be placed in an airtight container, such as a tin can or barrel. The chemicals, used at the rate of from 2 to 4 pounds to each 500 cubic feet of space to be fumigated, should be poured over the top of the seed, and fumigation should continue for from 24 to 48 hours.

When there is only a small quantity of seed, the weevil may be killed by heating the seed in the oven for several hours. The oven should not be hotter than 120 to 145 degrees Fahrenheit. Dipping seed in boiling water for one minute is also an effective remedy. Weevils will not feed or cause damage at low temperatures, and if seed can be kept in cold storage at a temperature of 32 to 43 degrees Fahrenheit, no trouble from this pest will result.

### BETTER THAN CLOVER.

Alfalfa Is Superior Crop In Good Land.

During the last few years so much has been written in the agricultural press eulogizing sweet clover that, in many quarters, it has gained a reputation for superiority which, to say the least, is misleadingly exaggerated. A few unbiased remarks on its real value, especially in comparison with alfalfa, may therefore not be out of place.

The reputation for superiority which sweet clover has gained is to a very large degree due to the fact that it is able to do surprisingly well in naturally poor soil or worn-out land deficient in plant food, and in soil lacking in moisture to such an extent that neither red clover nor alfalfa can be grown to satisfaction.

No one who has seen sweet clover flourish in places where, to use a common expression, "nothing else will grow," can deny that sweet clover might be employed as a remunerative crop on the type of land just referred to. However, it should be clearly understood that, though realizing the value of sweet clover as a revenue producer on poor soil, it by no means follows that sweet clover is superior to, or even equal to, other crops of its type, especially alfalfa, on good land. This should be clearly emphasized because many uncritical sweet clover enthusiasts have made the error of concluding, from the behavior of sweet clover on very poor land, that it is also of outstanding superiority on good land suitable for growing such crops as alfalfa. The sooner such a conception is corrected, the better.

If alfalfa can be grown with reasonable success, it surely will prove superior to sweet clover in practically all respects. Alfalfa, when once established, will last for a great number of years and will continue, without reseeded, to yield crops of high quality year after year, whereas sweet clover, being a biennial plant, will have to be reseeded every second year unless it is given a chance to mature seeds and thus automatically reseed itself.

Alfalfa may be grown for pasture, hay, silage, and soiling, whereas sweet clover has a somewhat limited sphere of usefulness. Thus, sweet clover is not likely to make as good hay as alfalfa; neither can it be cured into good hay as easily as the latter. As a forage crop, its chief asset lies in its ability to furnish nutritious pasture, but even as a pasture plant it is hardly equal to alfalfa where the latter can be grown successfully. As, furthermore, sweet clover has some distinctly objectionable characteristics which are not found in alfalfa, for instance, its peculiar flavor and its tendency to become a weed if not properly looked after, there is no valid reason why it should be grown in preference to alfalfa, if the latter can be grown with reasonable success. However, on land too poor to grow alfalfa, sweet clover may be used either as a forage crop or as a green manure crop for the purpose of improving the fertility of the soil.

### "Giant Jacks" of Poultry Policy.

Provisional officers of the National Poultry Council as organized by the delegates to the poultry conference at Ottawa are as follows: President, Dr. Barnes, Ottawa; N. W. Kerr, Brandon, Man., vice-president for Western Canada; Dr. P. C. Gauthier, St. Louis, P.E.I., vice-president for Eastern Canada; and E. Rhoades, Ottawa, secretary-treasurer.

One result of the conference was the formulation of a national poultry policy. The 10 "Giant Jacks" of this policy as adopted by the delegates were summarized as follows:

1. Increased production.
2. Economic production—through stock improvement.
3. Quality payment.
4. Co-operative marketing.
5. Markets intelligence.
6. Standardized product—Government inspected and guaranteed.
7. Service in transportation.
8. Perfection in storage.
9. Increased consumption at home.
10. Advertising and salesmanship in the disposal of products at home and abroad.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson IX. June 1, 1919.

Commentary.—I. What faith is (11: 1). I. Now—The subject of faith is introduced in the discussion in the preceding chapter, and the writer stops here to consider the nature and operations of faith. Faith—Trust, unwavering confidence, a conviction that brings certainty. Substance—The original word means basis of foundation. Things hoped for—One cannot truly hope for something unless there is a basis upon which the hope rests, otherwise he is indulging a false hope. What God has said in his word or the conviction that he gives by his Spirit furnishes something definite and positive for the faith to grasp. The submitting, trusting heart believes it. The evidence—The demonstration or proof. A demonstration is equivalent to a certainty. When a proposition in mathematics is demonstrated, it is clearly shown that the conclusion cannot be otherwise. Things not seen—"Things not seen" are the realities of God and his universe outside the visible world, which are revealed to our higher intuitions by nature, by divine manifestation, or by the written record. The animal man, the sensualist, never thinks of or truly embraces these truths. The worldly forget them. The atheist denies them. And these are all incapable of that spiritual heroism recorded of the ancient worthies.—Whedon.

II. What faith does (11: 2-40). 2. Elders—This term includes noteworthy members of the Hebrew race who were illustrious for their piety and faith in the ages of the past. Many of these are mentioned by name in the following verses. Obtained a good report—"Had witness born to them."—R. V. By faith Abel offered..... a more excellent sacrifice—Two antediluvian characters are included in the apostle's list of Old Testament worthies, Abel and Enoch. Abel's sacrifice was more excellent than Cain's because it was more cheerfully chosen, a living sacrifice, chosen and offered in a spirit of faith and love. Abel's heart entered into the transaction. Obtained witness that he was righteous—This witness was born in the Lord's acceptance of the sacrifice, God thus testifying that Abel's "gifts" pleased him. 5. By faith Enoch was translated—Enoch had faith in God and was enabled to walk with him. His faith enabled him to triumph over sin. Before his translation..... this testimony—Witness.

I.—What faith is. In the lesson we have the long roll-call of the heroes of faith. It is a theological expression, and we may forget that it has other than a religious significance. It is not some strange and peculiar power supernaturally infused by Christianity. The faculty is inherent in the nature of men and one most commonly used in daily life. It is the ground-work of all our knowledge and is essential to the existence of society. It underlies all forms of human activity, and every great enterprise begins with, and takes its first steps in, faith. Evangelical faith uses the same faculty in securing Christian experience and realizing its expectations. It is the faculty with realizing its expectations. It is the faculty with which we grasp unseen things, and always deals with the invisible and unrealized. When its object passes out of either sphere, it emerges from the realm of faith into that of knowledge. Christian faith it not simply the assent of the intelligence to revealed truth, or the acceptance of the historical events and purposes of Christianity. Its object is Christ alone. It is an act "the venture of the soul" in resting its moral state and building its hopes on Christ. In the lesson the writer defines it as "the substance" that is, that which stands under, supports and gives reality to the "things hoped for." There is danger of stumbling over its simplicity. Christian faith rests on a conscious personal compliance with every known condition. Apart from the former it has no footing. Apart from the latter it can not act, and the effort is presumption. True faith begets appropriate works and expresses itself through them.

II.—What faith does. It places supreme honor on the word of God. The soul's stupendous interests must be staked on God's word. Jesus sought to awaken or discover faith in all the suppliants of his beneficent miracles. His power was hindered in its exercise by unbelief. "If thou canst believe," Faith is the personal ground of justification. Sanctification and peace (Rom. 5:1). In its deepest significance faith is a confession of moral need and impotency. The sacrifice of Abel was not only an expression of his faith, but a confession of his sin. The thank-offering of Cain expressed neither, and was rejected. Faith is the link which unites the soul with the value and virtue of the atonement. It presents the empty vessel to the flowing stream. Faith is the source and animating principle of the Christian graces. Faith imparts stability. Read Rom. 11:20; Psa. 125:1. The soul can not be overthrown until it is separated from its source of strength. The weakest soul is strong with Christ; the strongest, weak apart from him. The Christian armor is the lesson were all "through faith", and it is the "victory that overcometh

the world." The triumphs and endurance, equally excellent, recorded in the lesson were all "through faith", and the world-old heroes await the final triumph of its latest victor for their crowning. "God having provided some better thing for us, that they without us should not be made perfect." W. H. C.

### SEVEN CONDITIONS

For Allotting Orders Under Canadian Credits.

The following seven conditions have been adopted by the Canadian Trade Commission in Ottawa for the guidance of "trade group" organizations in making allotments of orders secured under the Canadian credits established abroad:

1.—Every manufacturer under certain conditions must have an opportunity of sharing in the business on the same terms. There shall be no discrimination in favor of or against a manufacturer because he is a member or a non-member of any organization.

2.—Every manufacturer desiring to share in the business must at the present time be actually engaged in manufacturing or equipped to manufacture a similar class of goods as that for which an order is solicited.

3.—If in the opinion of the executive of an export organization, promulgated through the president or vice-president, any manufacturer desiring to share in the business under allotment is not in a position to manufacture and produce a satisfactory article, the executive will be justified in refusing to recommend such manufacturer to share in the order.

4.—If for any reason a manufacturer to whom an order has been allotted is unable or unwilling to complete same, he shall not be permitted to arrange for its manufacture elsewhere.

5.—All allotments should, if possible be unanimously agreed to, but if that cannot be done, the executive, through

its president or vice-president, may make a ruling, and if such ruling is not acceptable to any parties concerned, there shall be the right to appeal to the Commission.

6.—No allotments are to be considered as final until confirmed by the Commission, and orders forwarded in the usual manner.

7.—In the case of firms not specifically conforming to the standard of products required, orders must be surrendered to the Commission for allotment to other firms able to accept.

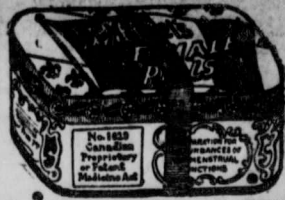

### PRIDE OF THE TURK.

Regards All Other Races With Utter Contempt.

We must realize that the basic fact underlying the Turkish mentality is its utter contempt for all other races. A fairly insane pride is the element that largely explains this strange human spectacle. The common term applied by the Turk to the Christian is "dog," and in his estimation this is no mere rhetorical figure; he actually looks upon his European neighbors as far less worthy of consideration than his own domestic animals. "My son," an old Turk once said, "do you see that herd of swine? Some are white, some are black, some are large, some are small—they differ from each other in some respects, but they are all swine. So it is with Christians. Be not deceived, my son. These Christians may wear fine clothes, their women may be very beautiful to look upon; their skins are white and splendid; many of them are very intelligent, and they build wonderful cities and create what seem to be great states. But remember that underneath all this dazzling exterior, they are all the same—they are all swine."

Practically all foreigners, in the presence of a Turk, are conscious of this attitude. The Turk may be obsequiously polite, but there is invariably an almost unconcealed feeling that he is mentally shrinking from his Christian friend as something unclean. And this fundamental conviction for centuries directed the Ottoman polity toward its subject peoples. This wild horde swept from the plains of Central Asia, and like a whirlwind, overwhelmed the nations of Mesopotamia and Asia Minor; it conquered Egypt, Arabia, and practically all of Northern Africa, and then poured into Europe, crushed the Balkan nations, occupied a large part of Hungary, and even established the outposts of the Ottoman Empire in the southern part of Russia. So far as I can discover, the Ottoman Turks had only one great quality, that of military genius. They had several military leaders of commanding ability, and the early conquering Turks were brave, fanatical,

and tenacious fighters, just as their descendants are to-day. I think that these old Turks present the most complete illustration in history of the brigand idea in politics. They were lacking in what we may call the fundamentals of a civilized community. They had no alphabet and no art of writing, no books, no poets, no art and no architecture, they built no cities and they established no lasting state. They knew no law except the rule of might, and they had practically no agriculture and no industrial organization. They were simply wild and marauding horsemen, whose one conception of tribal success was to pounce upon people who were more civilized than themselves and plunder them.

### To Calculate Interest.

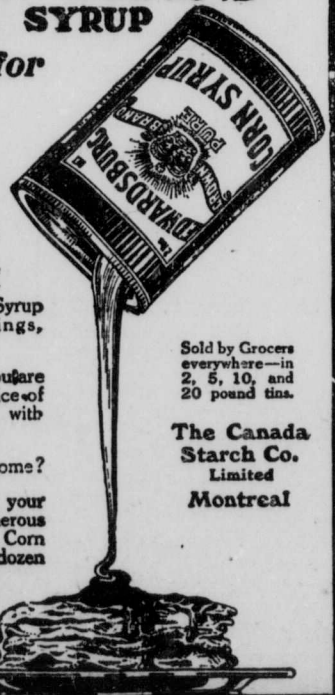
