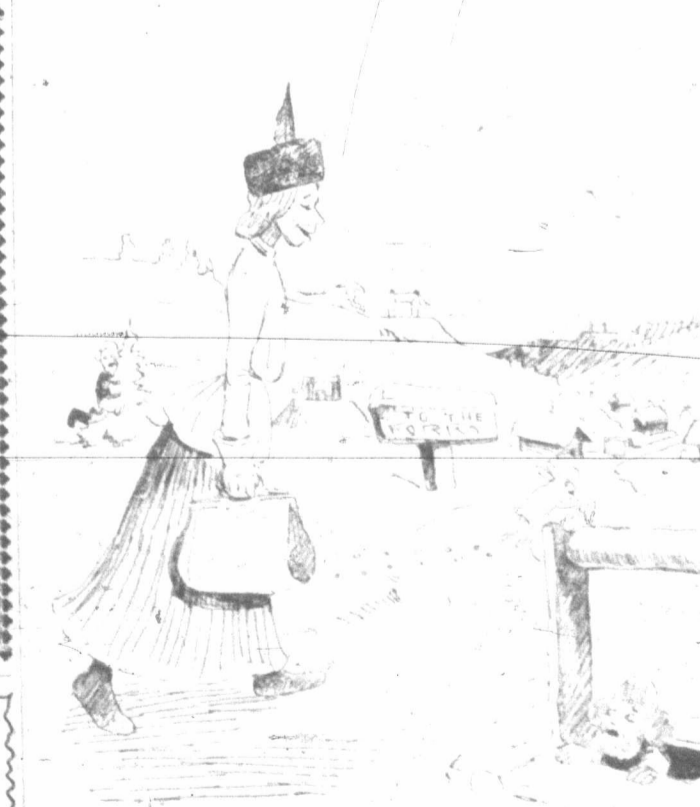

WILL BE INTRODUCED BY LLOYD

To Hold Election for Congressional Delegate

SENATOR FOSTER AT WORK

To Have General U. S. Land Laws Made Operative in Alaska—Her Value Recognized.

From Saturday and Monday's Daily. Washington, Dec. 20.—Representative Lloyd has introduced a bill providing for a congressional delegate from Alaska. The bill appoints August 1, 1902, as election day and provides that the delegate shall take his seat next session.

Senator Foster proposes to introduce a bill to extend the land laws of the United States to Alaska and failing the passage of this bill, will present a bill to allow the interior department to lease grazing lands in Alaska under the same laws as in the United States. Growing interest is taken in this subject as the value of the grazing lands of Alaska becomes recognized.

There was some talk recently of removing the army post at Fort Canby, but the war department has given assurances that the post will remain where it is.

London, Dec. 20.—The demand for the extradition of St. John Dix who is charged with having wrecked the Scandinavian bank at Whatcom, Wash., was granted today in the Bow street police court. The prisoner is allowed 15 days in which to appeal.
