In order to give publishers of newspapers the widest opportunity of increasing their subscription lists, the Government of this Dominion have enacted that all newspapers when sent from the office of publication direct to subscribers should go through the post office free.

How to Visit the World's Metropolis.

Continued.

On leaving St Paul's Cathedral our journey lies east, and our first move is for Chesapeake, the Broadway of London. The word cheap is old Saxon for market and hence this street was at the side of the market as *Baschop* was the market of the east of London.

Turning from the principal thoroughfare, we enter the city hall, known as Guildhall. This structure was erected in 1411, although additions were made to it in 1666.

Pursuing our journey we come to a 'focus centre' in which some nine or ten streets pour their traffic continuously. As we stand on the obelisk in the centre we look around to see to the north corner the Bank of England, a large stone building standing on eight acres of land.

In the eastern corner we have the Royal Exchange or great centre of business. This is the third building that has been erected on the present site and is 390 ft long by 250 ft broad, having a quadrangle of 170 ft by 112 ft. Attached to the exchange is a tower 177 ft high that contains a musical clock with a peal of fifteen bells.

At the south corner we have the Mansion House, the chief magisterial court and residence of the Lord Mayor. The Egyptian hall is the largest room in the Mansion House and is capable of seating four hundred guests.

The gates of the tower are strengthened by the port-cullis—a gate of iron bars made as a trellis and drawn into a grove above the arch.

As we proceed to the Norman Chapel of St. John we pass the place where the young princes were buried. Beauchamp Tower is interesting from the fact that so many prisoners of note were confined here.

The most noteworthy as well as interesting event was the marriage of Miss Julia, eldest daughter of B. H. Calkin, Esq., to H. Percy Blanchard, barrister, of Baddeck, C. B.
