ly , to settie the boundaries of the free fishery 0 be enjoyed by the subjects of the United
tates in common with those of the Colonies. As some of our read rs may wish to be better informed of the nature of the duties of these
gentlemen, we will endeavour to enlighten them on the subject. By the late treaty between the two nations, commonly called the Reciprocity treaty, the people of the United States are to be
allowed to take fish in all parts of the coasts of allowed to take fish in all parts of the coasts of
theso colonies, except the rivers. The words of the treaty are as follows
"The inhabitants of the United States shall have, in common with the subjects of IIer
Britannic Majesty, liberty to take fish of every kind, except shell fish, on the sea coasts and
kin shores and in the bays, harbours, and creeks
of Canada, New Branswick; Nova Scotia, Prince of Canada, New Brunswick; Nova Seotia, Prince
Edward Island and of the several Islands thereunto adjacent, without being restrieted to an distance from the shore, with permission to
land upon the coasts and whes of these cololand upon the coasts and ehores of these colo-
nies and the Islands thereof, and upon the Magdalen Islands, for the purpose of dryiag their nets and curing their fistr,"," arl fisher
