ROBERT EMMET DRAMATIZED AT OPERA HOUSE

An Extraordinarily Good Play Presented Monday and Tuesday Nights by St. Mary's Choir.

The thrilling drama of "Robert Emmet," presented in Newcastle Opera House Monday and Tuesday nights by St. Mary's Church Choir, was an unqualified success. The players, all local young people showed real dramatic talent and gave every evidence of careful training and full appreciation of their different parts. Each seemed not only to do his or her part willingly and gladly but to enter into the spirit of the play, becoming for the time being the real character supposed to be represented.

The subject of the play was a specially good one for the stage. Robert Emmet, the distinguished and fiery young patriot who—a Protestant of a wealthy and respectable family in high favor with the viceroy of Ireland and the British Government officials in Ireland—gives his life to bring freedom to his countrymen, Catholic and Protestant alike, was represented by D. S. Creaghan. His devotion to his lady love, finally leading him into the hands of the law, and his eloquent vindication of himself before the judge who condemns him, went straight to the heart of the audience.

Miss Donalds, as Emmet's sweetheart, acted her part with dramatic force and great ability. Miss Hogan as the avowed friend of the rebel leader, and again as a lone of contention between Squires McGuire and Healy, each of whom desired her hand, acted with her usual success. G. V. McInerney, as the carefully loyal Irish squire, did his part well, as did C. P. McCabe, E. J. Morris and James Sullivan, faithful lieutenants of the hero of the play. H. Hachy as the tender hearted jailer left nothing to be desired. J. Manderson as the pompous old judge who regards himself as the chief pillar of law and order, could not be surpassed. Miss Donalds acted the happy little bride to perfection, while Miss Sullivan as Kitty O'Connor, the competent maid-servant, fulfilled her duties excellently. Miss McCabe had a short part to perform, but did it perfectly. The heavy villains of the play were Gen. M. McDade and F. V. Dalton, the former an officer who goes to the furthest lengths to pay off a private grudge against Emmet and the latter a most detestable spy who betrays for the money that is in it. They acted their parts remarkably well. Their detective work was especially admirable. As usual Mr. McCabe had humorous as well as serious parts to perform and did both with the same acceptance. J. C. Demers as The McGuire, who is at length outwitted by the equally comical Healy (B. D. Hennessy) provided much of the fun of the evening's entertainment. The specialties were very good.

Little May Dunn delightfully represented the old lady of long ago in both recitation and tableau. Then six little maids—Maud Keating, Florence McEvoy, Beatrice Dolan, Bessie Donovan, Maggie Campbell, and Helena Griffiths—acted "six little grandmas" to perfection, very skilfully dancing the minuet, etc.

The Bird Song by Misses Agnes Lawlor and Mary McCarron and Masters Chas. Morris and Leo Keating, was a pleasing feature of the evening. Miss Mae Morrison, accompanied by Miss H. Lawlor on the violin, sang a very sweet solo, and both performers were heartily encored. Miss Donald's recitation—Skimpsey the Jockey and (as an encore) The Bald Headed Man, showed fine elocutionary talent.

Much credit is due Miss Nan Quinn and the others who took much pains in preparing for the drama, etc.

The hall was crowded each night.

B. C. ELECTIONS MARCH 28TH.

Vancouver, March 14.—This was nomination day for elections. Two Conservatives were returned by acclamation. For each of the 40 other seats there is either Liberal or Socialist opposition. In the last house there are 39 Conservatives, 2 Socialists and 1 Liberal.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY OBSERVED

Great Parade of Catholic Societies in Chatham Sunday Afternoon, and Eloquent Sermon by Rev. Father Roach.

St. Patrick's Day was exceptionally fine, and many from Newcastle, Nelson, Douglastown, and other places drove to Chatham to fitly celebrate the day.

The A. O. H. divisions of Chatham, Newcastle, Douglastown, and St. Margaret's; The C. M. B. A. divisions of Chatham, Newcastle, Loggieville and Nelson; the Chatham Knights of Columbus; St. Michael's R. C. T. A., and others lined up at St. Michael's Opera House and, with St. Patrick's and St. Mary's bands, marched to the pro-cathedral. The societies presented an excellent appearance and numbered about 400 strong. The bands were in fine trim and played very nicely.

At the Cathedral a vast audience was addressed by Rev. Thos. Roach, who spoke with great eloquence for forty-five minutes, after which mass was celebrated.

Father Roach paid a high tribute to the life and labors of Ireland's patron Saint and to the Irish people, whose lot after so much persecution had lately been so greatly altered for the better and which in a few days would be very much more improved. Ireland's religion had kept her men strong and brave and her women models of virginal purity and maternal love and tenderness. Though it would now seem that, in the day of Ireland's good fortune, the A. O. H. was no longer needed, yet it was needed more than ever to combat infidelity and Socialism, and preserve the holy institution of matrimony. The church looked to Irishmen in general and the A. O. H. in particular to preserve the faith of God and the purity of the home.

IN DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Surplus of \$39,000,000 Over Ordinary Expenditure. Debt to be Reduced by \$1,000,000.

Ottawa, March 13.—The salient features of the budget speech are: The largest surplus on record namely, \$39,000,000, being the difference between a total estimated revenue for the current year of \$136,000,000 and an expenditure on revenue account amounting to \$97,000,000.

Capital expenditure for the year including an extra outlay of \$5,000,000 to implement the Grand Trunk Pacific bond guarantee, met out of revenue, with a balance left for debt reduction amounting to \$1,150,000.

No tariff changes and no bounty renewals, pending investigations by the new Tariff Commission.

The Manitoba boundary bill was read a third time, Manitoba gets her extra territory unconditionally. The Lamarche—Mondon amendment in favor of separate schools for New Manitoba was defeated, 160 to 24. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. R. L. Borden voted together against separate schools. Of the 24 who favored the amendment 17 were Liberals (all French Canadians but two from Ontario) and 7 were Conservative—Nationalists of Quebec. Dr. Beland's amendment, that a conference take place between the Dominion and Manitoba to ascertain what vested rights separate school had in Keewatin and, if so, how they could be safeguarded, was supported by the Liberals and defeated 107 to 52.

SUDDEN DEATH OF EX-CONDUCTOR SPROUL

Dr. H. Sproul received word Sunday evening of the sudden death of his father, ex-Conductor Sproul of Sussex, one of the most widely known trainmen on the I. C. R. Mr. Sproul had many friends on the Miramichi, which he used to visit annually, having besides Dr. Sproul of Newcastle, another son a doctor in Chatham.

THE COAL MINERS' STRIKE

240,000 German Miners Out and Those of the United States May Follow on April 1st.

London, March 15.—The Government's efforts to secure a settlement of the coal strike by effecting an agreement between the coal mine owners and their employees, have failed. After three days of joint conferences, the negotiations were broken off this evening and legislative action now will be invoked to secure a minimum wage for all the underground coal workers. In making this announcement to the conference to day Premier Asquith said:

"The Government has done all in their power to secure a settlement of the controversy by an agreement, and they have come to the conclusion, with great regret, that this is impossible and that other measures must therefore be taken."

The Prince Minister stated that the government would ask from Parliament a legislative declaration that a reasonable minimum wage, accompanied by adequate safe-guards for the protection of the employees should be made a statutory term of the contract of employment of the people engaged in underground coal mines. The miners' delegates expressed satisfaction at the turn affairs have taken.

Brussels, March 14.—It is believed that the strike, which threatened all the Belgian collieries, will be averted, as the owners are showing a disposition to concede the increase demanded by the men. The Meriemont colliery has already granted a five per cent. increase.

New York, March 15.—The United Mine Workers of America will not compromise a single demand that they have made of the anthracite coal operators," declared John P. White, president of the mine workers, yesterday afternoon. "I look for a general suspension of work in the anthracite coal fields on April 1st," he added.

The bituminous miners have asked for a ten per cent. increase in wages and the operators have offered in reply, to make a new agreement reducing wages ten per cent.

"We expect to get the increase in the bituminous section," Mr. White said to-night. "Should the unexpected happen there is little doubt that the bituminous men will also favor a strike or that the policy committee should recommend such action."

OCEAN LIMITED EARLY ON ROUTE

Summer Time Change on Intercolonial Railway June 2nd

The summer change of time on the Intercolonial Railway will go into effect on June 2nd, when the famous Ocean Limited will be placed on the route between Montreal, St. John, N. S., and Halifax N. S., with connections for and from the Sydney, and Prince Edward Island, in anticipation of an early rush of summer travel. The time schedule is expected to be practically the same as last year which means that the "Limited" will leave Montreal at 7.30 p. m. reaching Lewis at midnight, and giving through passengers the opportunity of seeing the famed Matapedia Valley during the earlier hours of the morning, and a view of the Restigouche River and the blue waters of the Baie des Chaleurs. The beautiful valley of Wentworth, N.S., will be seen in the more mellowing light of early evening, and the train will reach Truro at 8.00 o'clock connecting with the through night express for the Sydney, and arriving at Halifax at 10.00 p. m.

The Maritime Express under the summer schedule will leave Montreal at 8.15 a. m. and through passengers will have the daylight journey through Quebec, and a view of the majestic St. Lawrence as it widens in its course to the sea. Making connection at Moncton with morning express for St. John, the Maritime continuing eastward will reach Halifax at 13.30.

The Ocean Limited will leave Halifax westbound at 8.00 a. m. and the Maritime Express will leave as usual at 11.10 thus there will be a through week day service by two trains equal to the best on the continent.

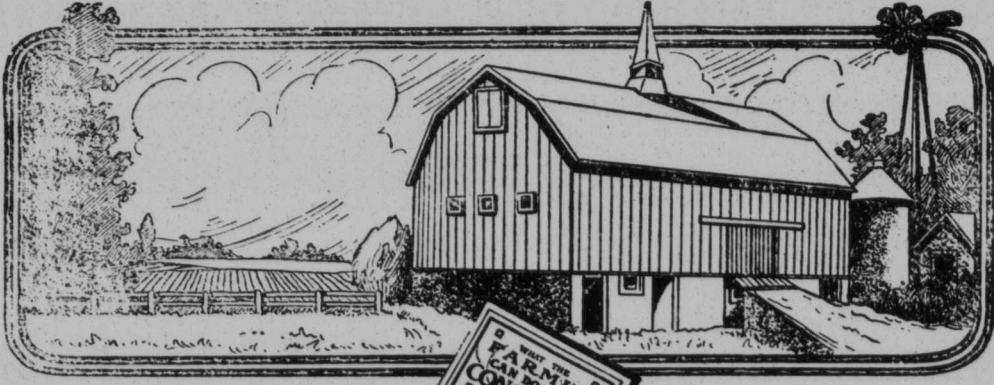

BOB FITZ THE MOST REMARKABLE FIGHTER

Who was the most remarkable heavy-weight fighter who ever put up his gloves under the Marquis of Queensbury rules? Answer: Bob Fitzsimmons. The freckled-faced Cornishman, maker of horse shoes, and built like a reversed pyramid, was the most extraordinary fighter.

Fitz was thirty-five years old when he won the championship of the world from Jim Corbett at Carson City. He was thirty-seven when he lost the title to Jeffries and thirty-nine when he was beaten by the Californian the second time.

Age is a big factor in this story. It serves to show that the rugged product of the antipodes was more extraordinary than Jeffries, who up to the recent disaster at Reno was generally conceded the distinction. Likewise it proves that care of a body can combat the advance of years to a certain extent.

Jeffries was twenty-four years old when he beat Fitzsimmons at Coney Island. He was thirty-five years, two months and nineteen days old when Johnson whipped him in the "battle of the century," July 4. At thirty-five he is an old man. At this same age Fitz was in the zenith of his great power.

After the two knockouts which Jeffries imposed on him, the Cornishman went out and beat all candidates except Philadelphia Jack O'Brien, with whom he creased, until the total period of his existence totalled forty-three years. What other fighter in the history of pugilism can claim such a record? None.

Fitzsimmons is to be considered all the more extraordinary because of the weight handicap which he suffered after he defeated all the middleweights. Never scaling more than 170 pounds he had all the punching force of men of fifty pounds more left.

At twenty-nine Jeff retired from the ring and rested on his reputation. He did much hunting and fishing, but idleness was his principal occupation for six years. And when he was induced to train and knock the packing out of Johnson, his punch bulged out like a submarine boat. He reduced to his old weight after much effort. In training he looked as good as when he had made mince meat of Jack Munro, as his farewell fight. But Ed Dunkhorst could have put up a better battle at Reno than the "mighty" Jeff.

BASEBALL SALARIES WONT BE CUT.

The fact that the minor baseball leagues intend to reduce salaries of players in future has alarmed members of the profession who firmly believe that in the course of time the magnates of the majors, the National and the American, will decide to adopt a similar policy. Alarmists point to present conditions in organized baseball as favorable. From the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico there isn't an outlaw circuit. The players, big and little, are at the mercy of organized major and minor leagues wherever professional baseball thrives upon game receipts. If the major league magnates wanted to slash the screws and chop salaries the players would be compelled to submit or retire from the diamond. They could get no baseball employment anywhere else unless with semi-professional teams paying nominal salaries for one or two games a week.

HAIR POWDER

The first English ladies who had the courage to wear powdered hair were as much pointed at for their singularity as the wearers of a crinoline would be to-day. It was in the beginning of the reign of George the First that the pioneers ventured to make themselves so conspicuous, and at the time when the next King was crowned there were only two hair-dressers in London; but in the year 1785 it was calculated that there were in Great Britain no less than fifty thousand hair-dressers! IN THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE

Railway Extension-- Annual Reports-- Important Legislation.

Fredericton, March 9.—The report re central railway shows income of \$58,776.90 and expenditures of \$78,652.98, a deficit of \$19,876.08.

The receipts for game licenses in 1911 were \$38,672.17 and for 1910, \$31,010.19.

Total territorial revenue for 1911 was \$528,439.04 as compared with \$404,491.64 for 1910.

Fredericton, March 12.—In the House of Assembly today, in committee, Premier Fleming presented amendments to the Act to aid construction of the St. John Valley, one of which provides that the company shall deposit with the Receiver-General \$1500 per mile as security for payment of the difference between the roads earnings and the interest on the bonds guaranteed by the Government.

In the agricultural committee Sec. Hubbard said it had been decided to appoint men to look after contesting.

Fredericton, March 13. Today, the bill which provides for the construction of the Gibson and Minto railway and for the lease and operation of the old Central railway by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company passed its second reading.

An act to provide for the introduction of medical examination and savings banks in the schools was then taken up. Hon. Mr. Grimmer explained that the bill proposed to make it possible though not compulsory. The second section provided for the establishment of school savings banks.

Fredericton, March 14.—Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the New Brunswick factories act to make it unlawful for children under 14 years of age to work in any manufacturing or mechanical plant, for delivering telegraph or telephone messages during school hours and to facilitate the work of the factory inspector in securing true statements as to the age of children employed.

In the Public accounts committee on motion of Mr. Robinson, it was recommended that the Crown land department gather and furnish information showing how much pulpwood is manufactured in pulp in the province each year and how much pulp wood is exported from the province each year from Crown lands in both instances.

Fredericton, March 15.—The Public Works Report shows that the total expenditure for bridges in 1910 was \$162,524.35 and in 1911 \$236,128.95, an increase of \$73,604.60. The road expenditures for 1910 were \$97,622.32 and in 1911 \$103,119.90, an increase of \$5,497.58. The total increase for roads and bridges for the year 1911 was \$79,102.18.

Fredericton, March 18.—W. F. Hatheway and D. P. MacLachlan moved a resolution to ask Dominion Government to appropriate annually for next ten years \$4,000,000 a year to be divided among the provinces and expended upon agricultural and industrial education. Carried.

DRUNKEN MAN SMOTHERED

Another Dies From Exposure--Wm. Hunter's Body Found.

St. John N. B., March 18.—The dead bodies of three men were found here on Saturday. They were William J. Hunter, a former J. C. B. engineer lost since Feb. 26, George

McAdoo, a painter, and Jas. Halfpenny, a laborer. McAdoo, while drunk, died from exposure and Halfpenny smothered in his own home while in the same condition.

ACCIDENT CLAIMS IN UNITED STATES

Showing How the Accident Law Works in Wisconsin Under the Industrial Commission of the State.

(Publishers Press News Service)
MILWAUKEE. — Instead of receiving \$3000 asked by the father of Frank Winslow for the death of his son who was killed while employed by the city of Milwaukee, the Wisconsin industrial commission in the first case against the city under the new law, awarded the parent \$102. It was shown the father was not dependent on the son's wages.
All these accidents had been settled practically without delay or difficulty. The money came when it was most badly needed.
On the average, it takes \$82 in fees and costs to get \$18 to the family, by the ambulance chasing system. In Wisconsin no workmen's family in case of his accidental death in the

course of his employment will receive less than \$1500, and the amount in most cases will be \$3000 — and lesser injuries accordingly.
Chief Justice Winslow, reading the opinion of the supreme court, said: "If experience shall demonstrate that it (the law) is practicable and workable, and operates either wholly or in part to put an end to that great mass of personal injury litigation between employer and employe, with its tremendous waste of money and its unsatisfactory results, which now burdens the courts, the long and painstaking labors of those legislators and citizens who collaborated in framing it will be fittingly rewarded by a result so greatly to be desired. That result will mean a distinct improvement in our social and economic conditions."

KILLANIN FAVORS GALWAY PORT

Lord Killanin Advocates Irish City As Trans-Atlantic Port for Steamship in New Issue of Empire Review.

London. — The establishment of Galway, Ireland, as a trans-Atlantic port is advocated by Lord Killanin in the forthcoming issue of the Empire Review. He predicts a revival of the trade of the Irish port, which was at one time second only to London as a port of the United Kingdom.
The writer argues that there are many considerations of a patriotic and sentimental nature, imperial, national and local, favoring the opening of a port there, but he contends that its commercial aspects are of primary importance. By starting from such a terminal port a "through-Ireland" route to Newfoundland and Canada from England will greatly shorten present routes, will save travellers and mails to the United States the time will be cut down considerably. In the past when Canada was undeveloped, all the requirements of the trans-Atlantic trade were met by the present service from England to the United States, but with the growth of the British Dominions in North America the necessity for a more direct service is becoming urgent. At the Imperial Conference held this year it was resolved that a more direct route to Canada and Newfoundland was necessary, and the only practicable shortening of the route is by way of Ireland.

IN THE LIMELIGHT

Crown Princess Cecilia of Germany has presented the future German emperor with another son, the fourth. Latest reports say that the mother and Kaiser Bill are doing as well as could be expected. So is the baby. But what's worrying the kaiser most is the fear that other royal families won't have enough girls to marry his grandsons to. Princess Cecilia is one of the most beautiful of the European royal women; also she is one of the best mothers.

SMILING JOE HAS RELAPSE

Brave Little Lad Who Though Trapped on a Rack for Four Years Was Always Cheerful and Staffing.

(Publishers Press News Service)
New York. — Poor "Smiling Joe" was doomed to spend another long season strapped to the rack. For "Smiling Joe" had had a relapse. They thought he was cured for good when they loosed him from the board on which he had been strapped for four of his 10 years, but he shows signs of increasing weakness.
Little Joe was able to totter about with his brothers and sisters a few weeks ago. A few days later he was

taken away to Roosevelt hospital to see what could be done for the pain in the back that has begun to bother him again.
He went away smiling still, true to the brave spirit that has given him his name.
"Smiling Joe" is known the country over by his picture used in advertising tuberculosis work. His smiling face helped to bring in \$250,000 to a crippled children's hospital.

NEW WOMAN IN UNITED STATES

For the First Time in the History of the United States a Woman Speaks About Politics.

New York. — The wife of Congressman Martin W. Littleton is a great help to her eloquent husband. Recently he was unable to keep an engagement to address a political meeting. Mrs. Littleton went in his place and made the speech.
And the oratorical brilliance of Mrs. "Peggy O'Brien" Littleton, her intimate knowledge of the big political issues of the day, and her sledge hammer directness in dealing with them, forced the big audience to rise, at the conclusion of her speech, and cheer her as no other woman orator has been cheered before.
Mrs. Littleton is a dainty winsome woman, devoted to her husband and to her two children, and the spotlight of publicity is the farthest thing from her thoughts.
"Am I a suffragette?" she says. "I can only say what I did in my address, that among the good things we have inherited and added to are peace, freedom, justice, education, religion, opportunity and suffrage."
"Woman is the teacher of men. Her work in politics is to teach her children the love of country, the responsibilities of suffrage, the constitution and laws of the country and how they can be preserved. Her work should begin at the cradle to make her children good citizens and should only end at the grave."

INSIST SPANISH RIGHTS Temporary Deadlock With France Over Morocco.

Madrid. — The Franco-Spanish negotiations on the subject of Morocco are temporarily in abeyance because of Spain's insistence on the establishment of a separate Spanish protectorate over the south and west of Morocco. Spain is willing to give up the hinterland, but refuses to abandon the coast zone. Spain also claims a conditional right to the collection of customs in the Spanish zone, which France opposes, on the ground that this would destroy the French plan of reimbursing the holders of the Moroccan debt through the collection of the customs by French functionaries.

SPAIN HAVING HANDS FULL

Barcelona. — General Wyleriano Wyler, captain-general of Catalonia, in an address recently to a contingent of troops bound for Melilla to reinforce the troops there who are having hard fights with the Rifis, said significantly: "Perhaps we shall meet at Melilla soon." This is generally construed to mean that the situation in that part of Morocco is so bad that General Wyler is going there to take the supreme command.

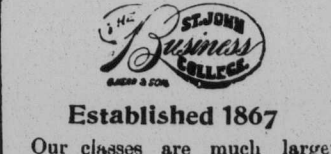
