# MOVEMENT

As an organization, the Scout Move ment is neither militaristic in thought form nor spirit, although it does instill in boys the military virtues such as honor, loyalty, obedience and patriotism.

The purpose of the Boy Scout Movement is to develop character, initiative and resourcefulness in boys by cultivating their interest in the fascinating out door activities of the Scout program.

It is in the wearing of the uniform and doing of things together, as Scouts, that they absorb the force and truth of the Scout law which states: "A Scout is a friend to all and brother to every other Scout."

The Movement aims to supplemen the various existing educational agencies, and to promote the ability in boys to do things for themselves and others. It is not the aim to get up a new organization to parallel in its purposes others already established. The opportunities are afforded other organizations, however, to introduce into their own programs unique features appealing to interests which are universal among boys. The method is summed up in the term Scoutcraft, and is a combination of observation, deduction and handiness, or the ability to do things. Scoutcraft includes instruction in first aid, life saving, tracking, signalling, cycling, nature study, camperaft, seamanship, woodcraft, chivalry, patriotism and many other subjects. This is accomplished in games and am play, and is pleasure, not for the boy. All that is needed is the out-of-doors, a group of boys and a competent leader.

"Something to do, something think about, and something to enjoy with a view always to character building; for manhood, not scholarship, is the first aim to education."

The Boy Scout Movement is developed in practically every country of the world as well as in all the overseas dominions and colonies of Great Britain and the United States. Ac cording to a pamphlet just issued by the Provincial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association, 24 Ritchie Building, St. John, there are in Canada alone some 22,692 registered Scouts, 4,288 Wolf Cubs (jnnior members) and 1.648 unpaid Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters who give at least 52 nights a year, and 24 half days or days to the personal leadership of their boys. Quite a citizen ship contribution.






# Why The East Wants Daylight Saving

Within a few weeks, the question of daylight saving will probably once more become the subject of more or less heated debate in which is siness men, city fathers, farmers with cows to milk, mothers with condens of school age to look after, and last but not least, railroads with time tables to print and trains to ran if possible to the minute, will demand to have their say. The advocates for daylight saving will point out that in England the economy in coal consumption effected by daylight saving during the summer months amounted to \$2,500,000, whereas the dairy farmers of the middle west protest that the morning dews and the natural minking time for middle west protest that the morning dews and the natural mikking time for cows cannot be regulated by clock, while in the North-West where the sammer sun shines eighteen or twenty hours a day the mother of seven children wishes to goodness that the darkness and the hour for bed time came twice as soon and lasted twice as long—what she wanta is a darkness-saving law.

The demand for daylight saving however, is most insistent in East-

however, is most insistent in Eastern Canada and the Eastern States and for every insistent demand there is usually a real reason. The reason apparently is that the so-called standard time in force in the area in question varies considerably from the mean sun time upon which the actual length and intensity of daylight is based. Standard time is a convenient artifice established in order to secure uniform time for neighboring communities or places. The sun is travelling from East to West and the noon hour originally travelled with it, but it was found advisable to fix definite areas in which the noon hour and other hours should remain the same for the convenience of the operation of railroads and telegraphs and the transaction of business wherein contracts involved definite time limits.





# IMPLICIT FAITH IN ABILITY OF C. P. R. TO MEET DEMANDS

Head of Railway Expects U. S. Readjustment of Wages and Rates to React On

At the annual meeting of the C.P.R. Mr. E. W. Beatty, President of the Company, made the following interesting statement regarding the af-

esting statement regarding the affairs of the Company:
"The operations of the Company during the year, the Annual Report for which is now submitted for your approval, have been conducted under conditions which were so exceptional as to costs, as to make it unique in the Company's history, as well as in the transportation annals of Can-ada. The shareholders are aware of the general conditions which the general conditions which so strongly influenced the results for the year in question but I doubt if a full appreciation of them is possible save with a very intimate knowledge of the details, the aggregate of which is so vividly reflected upon the Company's revenues. The cost

of the details, the aggregate of which is so vividly reflected upon the Company's revenues. The cost of labor, materials and fuel reached their peak during the year and extraordinary added costs, such as high exchange and taxes, added their quota to the expenses.

"The back pay which accrued before the increased freight and passenger rates became effective amounted to a little less than seven million dollars and the additional affount required to pay exchange on coal and other purchases, to four million dollars. The total, including provision for income taxes, involved additional costs of approximately thirteen million, five hundred thousand dollars which were charged to the expenses of the year. All these extraordinary and abnormal expenses the Company was able to absorb and pay its fixed charges and usual dividends. This result was only possible because of the excellent character of the Company's facilities provided by you in previous years at large capital expense and the possession by it of equipment years at large capital expense and the possession by it of equipment used with the greatest possible efficiency, which enabled the heavy fall movement of traffic to be effected with a despatch which has rarely I think, been equalled. I
