

## Transforming The Prairies.

SELDOM does a settler in a new country find things exactly as he would like to find them. Take trees, as an illustration. It is true there are large stretches of country in different parts of the world where trees seem to be ideally interspersed. Large areas in the central parts of the Prairie Provinces of Canada are Mke this. Open spaces of forty to a hundred acres or more are almost surrounded by trees, affording excel-lent shelter for stock, and making a varied landscape. But such condi-tions are exceptional, though they earve to emphasize the rule. Mostly the new settler finds too many trees or practically none at all. In the fored in clearing before the settler can hope for any crop. In the latter case, the settler has the advantage of being able to break his land immediately and, if he proceeds in the right manner, soon has it in a condition for producing a remunerative crop. But if he has come from a home which was surrounded by trees, he certainly misses them for a time.
A large part of the Canadian







## GET ON LAND EARLY

The Dates to Plant for Heaviest Yields.

To Make Most Money From Wool Shearing Mast Be Done Properly and Wool Eandled Carefully-A Few Hints Which Have Saved Farmers Dollars. (Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto)

THERE is a best time to sow each class of farm crops to secure the highest returns. It is difficult, however, to know which are the most favorable dates for the best returns of the different crops in all seasons. The results of experiments conducted over a series of years form a good general guide. Some crops give best re sults from later seedings. Seasons vary so much that in some years the grains are practically all sown by the dates at which it is only possible to start sowing in other years. "It is of the utmost importance, however, to start cultivating the land as early as it is dry enough to work to good advantage. The first cultivations should take place for those crops which should be first sown. In this connection & is interesting to study the results of an experiment which was conducted in each of five years at the Ontario Agricultural College, Spring wheat, barley, oats and peas were sown on each of six dates. One week was allowed between each two dates. The experiment was conducted in duplicate by sowing with the grain drill and broadcast by hand in each instance. The following table gives the average results for the ten tests in the five-year period:

Bushels of Grain Per Acre. Spring BarSeedlings. Wheat ley. Oats. Peas.
1st ..... 21.9 46.2 75.2 25.4 2nd ..... 19.2 45.9 3rd ..... 15.4 39.8 64.2 28.5 4th ..... 13.0 37.1 55.8 25.5 5th ..... 8.4 27.6 45.2 21.5 6th ..... 6.7 18.4 37.0 19.5

It will be seen that the spring wheat gives decidedly the best re-turns from the first date of seeding. There is not much difference between the first two seedings of barley and oats, but there is a slight advantage from the first date in the case of bar-ley and from the second date in the case of oats. The peas, however, gave the highest returns from the second and third dates, and even the fourth gave a higher average yield than the first date. After the first week was past there was an average decrease per acre for each day's de-lay as the season advanced of 27 pounds of spring wheat, 47 pounds of barley, 48 pounds of oats, and 20 pounds of peas.

These esults are of special interest and are worthy of careful atten-tion at this particular time.

Sheep Shearing. Shearing should only be carried on inder the most favorable conditions; upon bright, warm sunshiny days when the sheep are dry of fleece and the wool has "risen" somewhat from the body. Cleanliness and care in the removal of all fleeces is very essential and the shearing floor should be swept after each fleece has been removed and tied. This will eliminate a great deal of foreign matter which, although it may add weight,

does so at the expense of quality.

Dung Locks or Tags.—It will be noticed with many fleeces that there are certain hard dung locks or tags adhering to the britch ends. These contain a great deal of moisture and if left on and rolled into the fleece produce a damp heavy condition that very easily be packed and shipped separately, bringing more money this way than if left upon the fleece. The

same is true of all paint clotted locks as well. Rolling the Fleece.—Spread the Beece out on the floor, being careful not to pull it apart and with the flesh 1923 side down. Then fold the belly wool and both sides in until your fleece re-toward the neck, thus leaving the shoulder wool, which is always the superior portion, on the outside of the roll. 

A recent publication says:

Better results can be obtained with pressures in the neighborhood of one ounce than at four ounces or higher, if the vessel is properly placed over the shorter flames resulting from the lower pressure. A burner with a large number of short flames will give better results than with long flames. This is such an important feature that practically twice as much gas will be required to cook with four ounces of pressure as would be required for pressures of from one to two ounces.'

This may not be a high ideal for farmers or anyone else, The chief value of winter dairying that prices for milk, butter and cheese are always greater in winter than in summer, and if the producer of milk can keep winter production costs down to the level of summer costs, the gain in price for the milk, cream and butter sold in winter, is clear profit. Some claim that this cannot be done and that the extra cost of feed in winter, more than

counter-balances the extra prices received for winter dairy goods. ceived for winter dairy goods.

This is probably true where the cow-feeder is obliged to purchase all, his concentrates in the form of high priced dairy feeds, such as oilcake, cottonseed and gluten meals, but where a farmer is able to grow all his roughage, and at least one-half the meal ration, on his own farm, there is probably not so much difference between winter and summer milk costs, as some would suppose, especially on high-priced land. Where cheap, rough land is available for summer pasture, then summer milk can be produced comparatively cheap.

Another phase of milk production in winter worth considering is the labor problem. In winter there is more time to attend to the cows than in summer during the rush of work. Having the cows in a comfortable stable makes pleasant winter work looking after them. If at least half the herd be fresh during November and December, these cows will be going dry at harvest time the following summer, and thus labor is more evenly and more economically distributed throughout the year. Winter dairying may be warmly commended to the people of the Province of Ontario

The Proper Ration for Horses When the Fall Work Closes.

When the fall work is completed and the hard-worked horse is at the beginning of his long period of idleness, feeders naturally plan to change the ration and carry the horse through the winter as cheaply as possible. The horse should get exercise regularly. He should not be taken from regular hard work and tied up in a stall day in and day out. If possible, the work should gradually ease off and the feed, particularly the grain ration, should be cut down accordingly. The idle horse may be wintered almost wholly on rough-ages. Good clover hay, or better, a mixture of clover and timothy well cured will serve as the main winter feed. Roughages are always cheaper than grain, and where hay is available the grain ration of the idle horse should be very small, but if horses are fed atraw in place of hay a small grain ration is required to keep them from losing in flesh. A few roots are beneficial, a good-sized turnip once a day or a few carrots will be found to aid digestion. If hay is not plentiful straw may be substituted at the noon feed and roots given with it. In feeding hay make the morning and noon ration smaller than the night feed, giving about as much at night as at the two other feeds. Idle horses should be fed three times daily. If any grain whatever is fed make it rolled oats and it is not necessary to give more than a quarter the amount used when the horses are at hard work provided plenty of good hay is available.
