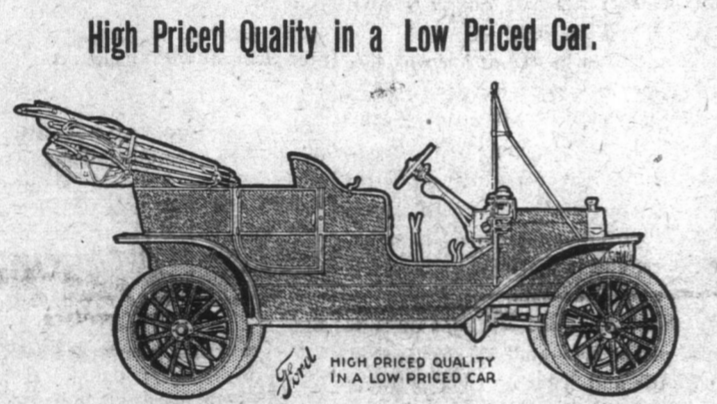

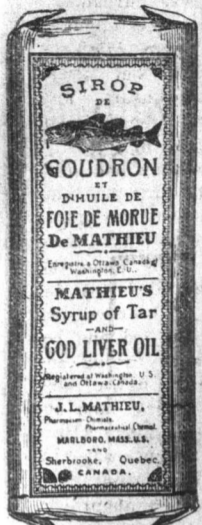

"It's a lucky thing for me," commented the shampoo lady, as she squeezed my dripping hairs over the bowl and prepared to swathe them in the towel. "That so few people seem to take much stock in the proverb about a stitch in time saving nine."

"Why, I've got all of seven heads in my care this winter that'll need maybe two years' treatment before they'll be in a really healthy condition. And there isn't one of those heads but I could put right in two or three months if the folks had come to me when the hair first began to fall out."

A week ago I went to the oculist with a swollen eyelid and a blood-shot eye.

He gave one glance at me and reached for a bottle of medicine on his desk.

"You're the ninth case of pink-eye I've had this week," he remarked as he poised the dropper above me. "Guess there's an epidemic. How long has your eye been troubling you?"

From Palace to Monastery.

Prince Frederick Heinrich of Prussia, who has just entered an Italian monastery as a monk, is a cousin of the Kaiser and a son of the late Prince Albrecht, Regent of Brunswick. He comes of a family noted for its romances.

His brother, Prince Joachim, was dismissed from the German army by the Emperor because of his affection for Marie Sulzer, an actress, who previously had been married in London to the Austrian Baron von Liebenberg.

Another brother, Prince Frederick Wilhelm, was sent to Konigsberg to study and, instead, fell deeply in love with the beautiful and fascinating Countess Paula Lehndorff, the nineteen year old daughter of the famous adjutant-general to the old Emperor William. The Kaiser objected to the match and communicated his objection to the Countess's mother, with the result that the Royal student was forbidden the house and, on his declaring that he would marry the object of his choice in spite of the Emperor himself, he was exiled from the country.

Prince Frederick Heinrich also came in for the Kaiser's displeasure. Finding that his inclinations were entirely opposed to the attitude insisted on by his illustrious rank, he threw over the "pomp and circumstance" of the Court and, under the name of Herr von Roggen, went to live as a private gentleman. This reactionary decision reached the ears of the Kaiser, who ordered the Prince to return to Court or to face a life-long exile. The Prince chose exile. After wandering about in Southern Europe, he became sick at heart and sought solace in the Catholic Church. At length he decided to become a monk, and, abandoning his real name, entered the monastery as Brother Henry.

This Prince, who has tasted of every luxury, now cleans his own cell, sleeps on a plank bed, and on his ill-protected knees assists his brothers to scrub out the corridors. Long hours are spent in devotional exercises, and much time is devoted to the gardens.

In addition to this practical sympathy with the demands of the Roman Catholic Church, the Prince has made his whole fortune over to it, to be devoted solely to charitable and humane purposes. The Kaiser is greatly incensed at the Prince's conversion.

Six Perished in Fire.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, April 23.—Two bodies have been recovered, and it is believed that at least four more are in the ruins of the Hotel Thoma which was destroyed this evening. In the ruined upper story were found two bodies, both fully dressed, they evidently having been suffocated. They have not been identified.

A light which burned for six weeks in the rear of a house on Blug street, Pittsburg, excited the curiosity of neighbors and resulted in the discovery that W. R. Roblin, a wealthy man, who lived a reclusive life, had been dead for a month or more. Beside the bed in which he lay dead was found a bottle marked carbolic acid.

Civic Affairs.

The terrible drain which prevents disease makes upon life is its most apparent effect, but as was set forth at length in the Evening Telegram some years ago by the Hon. John Harvey its economic effects drain the pockets of its victims. An excessive death-rate with the disabling diseases which fore-run death is a public scandal. As it can be prevented by reasonable expenditure of public money it is economically unsound civic administration which permits the waste of life and substance to continue.

As we mentioned yesterday, difficulties similar to those which prevail in this community have existed elsewhere and have been surmounted. If other cities have cut their death-rates in two, why cannot St. John's? The provision for a more abundant water supply from Winsor Lake is a proper one. The money spent in this direction no one should begrudge, nor is money wasted which is used to keep the supply pure at its source. But the work is only half done, if half the people in the city are inadequately provided with water, and the point made by the Hon. John Harris, in the Legislative Council, about the proper and sufficient distribution of the additional water which is being brought to town was an excellent one. An abundant supply of water is one of the first steps in reducing ill-health and death. Moreover it should go a long way towards a more adequate disposal of house sewage in which the city is notoriously deficient.

But what about the sanitary state of our streets? Even Water Street, paved and sewered, is not clean. As for other streets, foul is not an adequate description of their state. How

The vessel lost her cable in a storm and came to port to get a new one. She reports fish very plentiful on the Banks.

SUFFERS FROM CONCUSSION.—The little boy James Tibbo, who was knocked down by a horse on Henry Street Monday night, suffers from concussion of the brain and was very ill Monday night and yesterday, though the doctors at the Hospital hope to pull him through. The lad has suffered from deafness for some time and did not hear the carriage approach when the accident occurred.

Loss of Geo. R. Allston.

Capt. Smith being interviewed about the loss of his ship, the Geo. R. Allston, to-day, said: We left Cadiz with salt and wine on March 30th bound for St. John's. We had a fairly good run till April 18th, when in lat. 41.35 N. and 37.00 W., a gale from the W.S.W. arose, veering soon around to south and blowing fiercely. At 4 a.m. on that day the ship was hoisted. The wind dropped away after a few hours and left a heavy sea running. The ship was quite helpless. A sea struck the vessel astern and broke off two of the lower rudder irons, leaving it hanging by the upper brace. The rudder was driven from side to side by the sea and threatened to tear the stern out of her. Things continued this way all night. In the morning of the 19th the vessel began to make water. A heavy swell was on and nothing could be done to secure the rudder. Shortly after the schr. Marie, Capt. Driller, bore down and took the crew off. They remained on the Marie till the 25th April, when the Coronation, on the way to Grand Bank, took them on board and landed them on the 27th. The mate of the Marie set fire to the Allston. The crew lost all their clothes.

C., is heard asking that the case be withdrawn for want of evidence. Blackwood is heard contra. Furlong is heard in reply. Further hearing is postponed till 2 p.m.

Must Toe the Line.

The time given by Judge Knight to one of the Topsail Road farmers who was before the court last week for having night soil on his farm having expired, Health Inspector O'Brien, as directed by the court, reported on the matter. As the matter has not been dealt with to the satisfaction of the inspector he recommended a further suspension of the judgment until Saturday next, and this was granted. Commenting on the case His Honor signified his intention of backing up the efforts of the Health Inspector in all matters relating to the conservation of the health of the public. If the obnoxious matter complained of by Mr. O'Brien is not removed to his entire satisfaction by Saturday a heavy fine will be imposed.

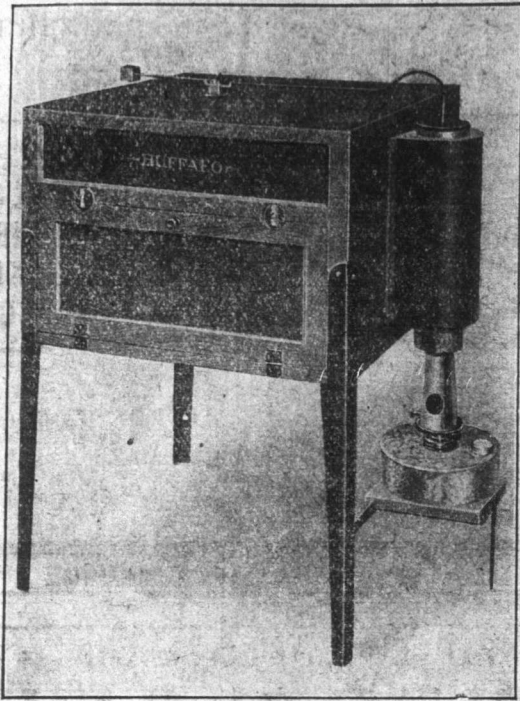

Welcomes Peary and Bartlett.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 3. London is making much of Commander Peary. The interest in his visit is not confined to scientific circles, but is very general. The Royal Geographical Society, entertained him at luncheon at their club house today. Peary's arrival there was awaited by a great crowd that literally filled the streets, and as he passed he was accorded a very hearty reception. Entering the club house he was received with a noisy demonstration of welcome by the distinguished party of scientists and explorers. When a few moments later Captain Robert Bartlett, the Commander of Peary's steamer Roosevelt arrived, the cheering was renewed.

Sir George Nares, one of the oldest surviving Arctic explorers, was among the notable guests, others being Lord Strathcona, Lord Roberts, Sir George Reid, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Sir Hiram Maxim, Dr. Scott Heltie, Secretary of the Royal Geographical Society and many explorers and naval officers. The United States Embassy was represented by Secretary William Phillips, and Commander Edward Simpson. Toasts to King Edward, President Taft and Commander Peary, were drunk. The British newspapers treat the visit of Commander Peary as one of the leading events of the day, and extended to him an enthusiastic welcome. Lengthy articles, editorials and interviews are printed by them, recalling his successful expedition and expressing keen pleasure that the British people can meet him in London.

Attack on Prince Buelow.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 3. A remarkable attack on Prince Von Buelow, the former Imperial Chancellor to the German Empire, in connection with the memorable interview with Emperor William, published in October, 1907, by the London Daily Telegraph, is contained in a lengthy volume which is about to be issued by the ex-Government Councillor, Rudolf Martin. The Chancellor is accused of treason towards the Emperor.

The book asserts that the interview never occurred, and that the table talk, the gist of which the Premier communicated to Prince Von Buelow, was put into the form of an interview by the German Foreign Office, reaching the Telegraph from the hands of a journalist. Herr Martin gives the names of prominent personages to support his assertions, one of the chief of whom is the former Councillor of the German Embassy in London, both he and Herr Martin have left the Government service.

Resignation Disrespectful.

Special to Evening Telegram. LIMA, Peru, May 3. The note of resignation, which the Minister to the Argentine Republic, Derival Arguco, presented to the Government, has been returned to him by the Council, because of its alleged disrespectful terms. In resigning, the Minister said that the direction of Foreign Affairs in Peru has been characterized by many mistakes during the past thirteen months.

Sir C. Furness Unseated.

Editor Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 3. Sir Christopher Furness who, as a Liberal, has been representing the constituency of Hartlepool since 1900, was today unseated by the court and his recent election declared void, on the ground that he had illegally employed demonstrators and made improper payments through agents. The Court emphasized that Sir Christopher was not personally guilty of any corrupt or illegal practice, but he must suffer for the acts of his agents.

Fast French Dirigible.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, May 3. The surprising announcement was made today that there had been constructed under the direction of the War Department, and with strict secrecy, a dirigible balloon of the Semi-Rigid type, capable of a speed of 50 miles an hour, and that the machine would be ready for the summer army manoeuvres. The new military craft has been named the Frigate. It measures 3,200 cubic meters and has two cars within which are contained motors, designed to develop 240 horse power.

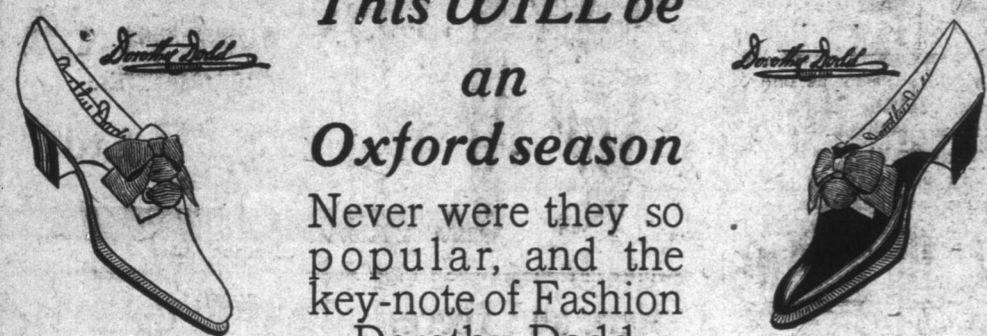

Municipal Election.

To the Electors of the Municipality of St. John's:
Gentlemen.—In compliance with a request made to me by a number of electors, property owners in St. John's, that I should submit myself as a candidate for the office of Councillor at the approaching Municipal Election, I beg respectfully to solicit your support and influence in the matter. In deciding to seek election at your hands, I am actuated by a desire to do all in my power to bring about a better condition of affairs in the control and management of the departments of the government of the city. It will be my first duty, should I be elected, to see that the revenue necessary to carry out the work of the Council will be raised from sources which will bear fairly upon all citizens, and unjustly upon none, and that the expenditure will be made economically and usefully in the interests of the whole city and that the various departments be conducted on business principles. The first and most pressing need is the completing and extending the water service of the city. It is essential that the benefits of our water supply be made available to all citizens for protection against fire and for domestic use. It is necessary that the full pressure of water from the new service from Winsor Lake should be available at all times, especially on the higher levels. In this connection, also, a good supply of water should be installed on the South Side, for the use of citizens residing there. It will be my duty to see that these matters are accomplished and as speedily and as economically as possible. I shall also devote my efforts to improve the sanitary affairs of the city, the installation of a sewerage system which will not bear heavily upon individual citizens, but which will meet the needs of the city generally, the substitution of the concrete drains for the disease spreading cobble stones at present in use, with constant and regular flushing, and the extending of the sprinklers to all the streets of the city. These objects can be obtained without increased expense. I shall also endeavour to bring about a little system of appraisement of property by which people will not be taxed upon mere apparent values, but upon real value of their properties, ascertained upon proper and competent appraisement. I shall do all in my power for the improvement of the city generally. Between now and polling day I shall canvass the city, and fearing I should not meet each and every voter, I ask them to kindly regard this as a personal appeal for their valued support.

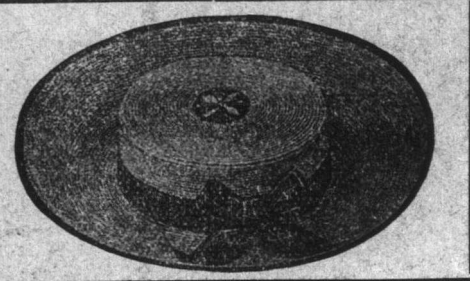

Our Montreal Letter.

A Chime of Bells for St. Patrick's Church.

A chime of ten bells will be installed in St. Patrick's belfry in a few days. There are at present two bells in the tower, and eight new ones are to arrive from the famous White-chapel Bell Foundry, London, England, on May 3rd. The bells will be blessed on Pentecost Sunday, May 15th, by His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi. The chimes will be rung at the Eucharistic Congress. The late Rev. Father Dowd, S. S., concentrated his efforts in building up St. Patrick's Church; the late Rev. Fr. Quilivan, S. S., in embellishing it with the artist's brush; Rev. Father Martin Callaghan saw it consecrated; and now the last of the Sulpician band of pastors, Rev. Gerald McShane, S. S., will complete the work of beautifying it by the installation of the chime of bells, marble altars and several new stained glass windows.

The bells are named in commemoration of:
The reigning Pontiff, Pius X.
The reigning Sovereign, Edward VII.
The papal legate to the Eucharistic Congress, Cardinal Vincent Vannutelli.
The head of the archdiocese, Archbishop Bruchesi.
The Seminary of St. Sulpice, and the

former pastors of St. Patrick's and its present clergy.

There will also be a Congress Bell, a Choir Bell and a Children's Bell. The inscriptions on the various bells are as follows:
1.—Pius, Edward, Vincent.
2.—"Instaurare omnia in Christo."
3.—Paul, Gerald, James.
4.—"In Domino Confido."
5.—Patrick, Andrew, Cornelius.
6.—"Holy Father, keep them in Thy name whom Thou hast given Me: that they may be one."
7.—John, Martin, Thomas.
8.—"I have loved, O Lord, the beauty of Thy house."
9.—Charles, George, Frederic.
10.—"Spes Messis in Semine."

Free Education for Catholic Children.

Beginning in September of this year Catholic children living in the city limits will not be obliged to pay the usual fee of twenty-five cents a month. But children coming from

outside Municipalities like Ste. Cune-gonde, St. Henri, St. Jean Baptiste and others, though annexed to the city proper, save for school purposes, it being the wish of the people that they manage their own school taxes and run their own schools independent of the Montreal Catholic School Board, will be obliged to pay two dollars a month fees. For Protestant children attending Catholic Schools, the fee will be two dollars a month, and Catholic children attending Protestant schools must pay two dollars and a half a month. Such regulations were passed by both the Catholic and Protestant Commissioners.

A Fight for Supremacy.

The Controllers and the City Council are at war over certain powers. The Controllers claim that their powers are supreme, hence the Council must sanction all that emanates from them. The Council, on the other hand, claim that they have the right to reject or favour any appointments made by the Board. This caused a deadlock over certain appointments and other recommendations made by the Controllers. Ald. L. A. Lapointe, the leader of the Council said:

"On all sides there is talk of friction, of dissension, of a contentious spirit between the Council and the Board. I dare any of them to point out such an instance. It is in the action of the Council in amending one or two, out of two or three hundred, reports submitted by the Board? Well let us take up the instances. Is it the Proulx matter?"

Council amended the report of the Board and it can feel assured that, in doing so, it responded to popular opinion. Judge Cannon condemned almost everything connected with that station. The revelations made before the Royal Commission relative to it, are notorious and yet the Board recommends full payment of the contractors' claim. Council amends that report in such manner that the city is likely to be saved about \$3,000. Is this obstruction, is this friction? If so, I am for friction every time it saves the city thousands of dollars.

"In the matter of parks superintendent, according to the resolution of Council, this position is left vacant, the Board being requested to give the matter study."

"I maintain that any act of Council thus far is beyond reproach. The present body of aldermen is a good one and one determined to see that a good administration is given the city."

"As to the allegation that we are holding caucuses in order to assert ourselves against the Board of Control, all that is utterly unfounded in fact. We are a reform Council elected on a wave of reform and, after the lesson handed out to former administration, we cannot afford to deviate from the road of reform."

The fight has been carried to Quebec in order to have special legislation passed favoring the powers of the Controllers.

"It is a very important question and I cannot say what we will do until I thoroughly studied both sides of it," said the Premier. "There is no doubt that some solution of the present difficulty must be made. Public sentiment in Montreal appears to be strongly in favor of leaving the authority to negotiate contracts in the hands of the controllers. You can rest assured that the Government will do all in its power to protect the interests of the citizens of Montreal."

"The Herald appears to have taken a very strong stand on the subject," continued the Premier.

Sir Lomer asked the controllers to submit a statement of their position to him in writing. This will be done immediately.

The mayor and controllers also had an interview with Mr. Bourassa, who is acting as leader of the Opposition in Mr. Teller's absence. Afterwards the mayor said:

"I feel that as a result of the representations made by us and by the Citizens' Association, when the citizens' bill comes up it will meet with the favor of the friends of Montreal on both sides of the Legislature. As the situation in Montreal is at present there is a deadlock. We want legislation which will prevent a recurrence of such a state of affairs and will make it possible for the civic administration to legislate coherently. For this purpose it will be necessary to give the Board of Control wider powers."

Mayor Guerin and the four Controllers returned from Quebec looking well satisfied with the results of their visit to Quebec. The deadlock at the City Hall did not seem to be weighing on their minds to any perceptible extent, and they were exceedingly optimistic in regard to the early and satisfactory settlement of the points of dispute between the Council and the Board of Control.

Controller Wanklyn said that it was positive that everything would come to a satisfactory conclusion.

"This is not a personal quarrel between the Controllers and the aldermen," he said. "It is only an effort to make the civic machinery run more easily and smoothly. That is what we are at Quebec for. We believed that it was our duty to see that matters were settled for the best interests of the city."

The Controller also said that the trouble arose owing to the newness of the system. It could not, he said, reasonably be expected to run smoothly at first. There had been mistakes and omissions in the Act authorizing the commission system, and those had to be reflected before all friction would be obviated.

Mangled by Bear.

New York, April 26.—With his body badly torn and mangled by teeth and claws and his left arm almost torn from its socket, Richard Spicer, keeper at the Bronx Park Zoo, was rescued unconscious this afternoon from the bear pit after a desperate struggle with an angry bear. His condition is critical. Elwyn Sandborn, a photographer, escaped from the pit with minor hurts after a hard fight with the animal.

Spicer attempted to make the bear sit up and pose for a photographer with her cubs and she sprang at him. Dealing him a terrible blow with her paw, she then seized him by the arms and dragged him into the den, clawing and mauling him.

Sandborn grabbed an iron bar and rushed to the rescue of Spicer, who was unconscious, but the bear turned on him. The photographer, however, managed to fight her off with the bar until the cries of a hundred spectators brought other attendants, who beat off the bear and rescued the imperilled men.

Quebec Takes Firm Stand.

Washington, April 23.—Efforts of the United States to have modified in some way the new pulpwood policy of the Province of Quebec have been unsuccessful. United States Consul Foster, at Ottawa has telegraphed to the State Department that Premier Laurier yesterday informed him that the Province of Quebec declined to modify the new law.

This measure prohibits the export of timber cut on Crown lands, except in manufactured form, such as pulp and commercial lumber. Considerable loss to American paper mills will be caused by the new law, which goes into effect May 1.

Diphtheria—Adult Stricken.

Another case of diphtheria developed this morning, in a house at Springdale Street. This time a young man 27 years of age being stricken. The disease is of a virulent type and the patient will be removed to the Hospital this afternoon. A little girl 8 yrs. old developed scarlet fever at 50 Monroe Street yesterday and will be nursed at home.

OUT CANVASSING.—Mr. John Coaker was out last night canvassing the Higher Levels. He was given a good reception. Messrs. Mullaly and Channing got a good reception at Holytown. Mr. Charles Ryan will begin his canvass to-night. He also is taking well with the voters.

Smuggling by Wholesale.

Assistant Collector LeMessurier was to-day advised that the following smuggled goods were seized on John Pollis of Benoit's Cove yesterday and will be confiscated: 32 packages of Stag tobacco, 20 packages of cigarettes, 41 packages of plug tobacco, 18 tubs butter and 2 sacks of sugar. The contraband goods were brought from Halifax, and it is likely the delinquent will get into serious trouble.

Corral These Goats.

Goats are at large of late on the higher levels and are proving very destructive. During the past few days they have been on the rampage, and entering Mr. G. Snow's garden on Cook Street destroyed several fruit and ornamental trees. They broke the glass of the hot beds in Mr. McKinlay's garden and ate all the young cabbage plants he was rearing. The Council should get the Impounder to round up all those animals.

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
